## The Greening of LV's Electricity

#### New source for local electric power

On February 1, electric power to the Village will become "greener." That's when the Clean Power Alliance will join Southern California Edison to provide electrical energy to Camarillo, including Leisure Village.

The Clean Power Alliance (CPA) is a new California power provider that will deliver electricity from clean and renewable sources – such as solar, wind, and hydroelectric power. Last February, the Camarillo City Council voted to join the CPA, which now partners with Edison to meet local energy needs.

Residents are unlikely to notice any difference in service. Electricity from CPA-owned wind turbines in Kern County will be delivered to Edison and will be distributed through the existing Edison transmission system. Monthly bills to customers, as well as maintenance and repair of the electrical system



will still come from Edison.


LV residents will automatically be enrolled in CPA's service beginning on February 1 at the lowest of three monthly rates available. The basic charge will provide about 36% of electric power from renewable sources and cost between 1% to 2%

to Camarillo from various sources such as these wind turbines located in Kern County and owned by the Clean Power Alliance (CPA).

## LV Board Considering 2019 - 2020 Budget

On December 13, the Leisure Village Association Board of Directors held a working Board meeting to hear our Association Department Heads present their budget requirements for 2019 -2020. Each department presented their budget for the upcoming year, with their fincial needs and the anticipated increase or decrease in funds required.

Most of us know very little about the Leisure Village Association budget process, except that it affects our Association dues each year, usually in an upward direction. How is that determined? Can we be sure our money is being spent prudently?

The formulation of the Leisure Village Association budget is a very lengthy, deliberative process that involves our fellow residents and the Board of Directors. The Finance Committee, led by co-

Ruiz, consists of 12 residents who make up the committee.

The initial budget is prepared by the Association Department Heads. Those departments are: Recreation Center, Security, Landscape Support, Resident Services and Administration. The initial budget consists of the anticipated costs each department will incur during the next fiscal year. Those costs are both fixed and variable, plus additional requirements not budgeted in previous years. The budget also includes anticipated contributions to reserves and capitol expenses. It is then reviewed by the General Manager, who submits it to the Finance Committee in August.

The members of the Finance Committee, our neighbors who have extensive experience in finance, receive the budget and evaluate every item, line by line. The committee allocates two

chairmen George Jones and Merle members to review each department and they consider expenses from previous years as well as other variables, prior to recommending an approved amount for their assigned department. Those recommendations are brought to the full committee in a closed meeting in November. From that meeting, the committee provides their recommendation to the Board of Directors for consideration in December (meeting just held).

> A town hall meeting will be held on Monday, January 14 at 7:00 p.m. to explain the budget to the community and answer any resident questions. Subsequently, the budget will be voted on by the Board of Directors in their February meeting.

> Whatever the budget amount turns out to be, it can be trusted to be what is needed to run and maintain our community in the best possible manner.

less than Edison's base rate. The middle tier will deliver 50% clean energy and cost about the same as Edison's equivalent. The 100% renewable energy option will cost an estimated 8% more than that of Edison. Qualified customers will continue to have access to financial assistance, rebates and incentives.

Customers can opt out of the Clean Power Alliance at any time and return to having only Edison provide their electricity. Mailings to residents explaining the changes and rate options began in December and will continue into February.

SoCal Edison says that the two entities are not in competition, but simply will share in providing power to customers. Thirty-one cities in Southern California have joined the Clean Power Alliance, which aims to help reverse climate change by reducing the so-called carbon footprint.

## Are You Prepared to "Ready, Set, Go?"

Leisure Village was lucky. The November wildfires were stopped before they got to the perimeter. What did arrive is the message that residents should make certain that they will be prepared if there is a next time. Whether it's a wild fire, a flood, or an earthquake, Villagers have now been warned – put on alert – that in our community there are actions we should take as independent residents and actions we should consider as good neighbors when another emergency heads our way.

The "Ready" part was explained in last month's issue: the packed emergency kit (with necessities like water, food, medications, copies of important documents, etc.) that is already packed.

To get "Set" requires accurate information, available online, by landline, by door-to-door or a public address announcement by officers driving through the Village. The Ventura County (VC) Fire Department and Sheriff's Department is the only official source of this information. Residents can access it by registering (now) at:



Capt. Brian McGrath of the VC Fire Department emphasizes that all information and evacuation orders come only from County agencies, not from the Village Security Team. He advises that residents don't call our Gate officers for information; they'll be involved in assessing and reporting Village conditions to County officials. However, he tells residents, "If you feel unsafe and have a place to go, go!" at any time.

"Go," Capt. McGrath says simply means when residents get an evacuation order – by phone, text, email or a public announcement, they should "Leave immediately" and drive far away from the threat. If residents don't have a destination, such as a relative's house, go to a large parking lot, (i.e. the Outlets) if that appears to be out of harm's way.

Leisure Village adds a unique aspect to "Ready, Set, Go" – our neighbors who are not as mobile as others. VC Community Relations Officer Sheila Norman suggests that neighbors talk to each other now about an evacuation plan that assists those who don't drive or use a walker or wheelchair, so that no one is left behind.

## DON'T BECOME A STATISTIC – 80,000 DIED OF FLU LAST WINTER!

Deaths from influenza in the last flu season (2017-18) was the highest toll recorded in decades. To put this shocking statistic into perspective, flu-related deaths usually strike about 12,000 to 20,000 annually; but during the past winter, an estimated 80,000 Americans died of the flu and its complications. The severity of the disease put more people into hospitals, caused more cases of Pneumonia and more deaths, --particularly among children and the elderly, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

Influenza experts knew it was a very bad year; the flu vaccine (which is adjusted every year) did not work very well. They also knew that fewer people opted for protection from the deadly disease by getting inoculated with the vaccine (now available at chain pharmacies.) Experts nevertheless strongly advise everyone to "get the flu shot!" At the least it makes illnesses less severe and saves lives.

Last year 80,000 Americans died of the flu. But, that is not the worst on record. We have to go back to the 1918 flu pandemic, which lasted almost two years, and killed more than 500,000 in this country, according to historians' estimate. Today there is a vaccine – and be aware that the flu is highly contagious, and easily transmitted. During flu season we may come in contact with the airborne germs most anywhere.

Do you know how the vaccine works? It takes about two weeks after you receive the vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body. These antibodies provide protection against infection with the viruses



that are in the vaccine. Each season's variable is determined and prepared to fight the most common strain (or strains) of the disease, according to scientists' latest research.

Traditional flu vaccines (called "trivalent" vaccines) are made to protect against three viruses: Two influenza viruses (HiNi) and an influenza B virus. There are also vaccines made to protect against

four flu viruses (called "quadrivalet" vaccines.) These protect against the same viruses as the trivalent – with an extra additional B virus.

"There are more Americans and more elderly Americans today than in decades past," stated Dr. Daniel Jernigan, a CDC spokesman. Many such facts are taken into account when analyzing vaccines that will shape up to be a good match, he explained.



## **How Aging Affects Our Feet**

Henry David Thoreau once wrote, "An early-morning walk is a blessing for the whole day." From sunup to sundown, we rely on our feet constantly to get us wherever we need to go. They are undoubtedly the unsung heroes of the human body, but over time, age-related changes - not to mention normal wear and tear - can take their toll. And for some older adults, being able to walk at all is a blessing in and of itself. So, what exactly changes with our feet as we get older?

To start with, there's a decrease in collagen production which causes the natural cushioning of the feet to diminish. Without this padding, the feet lose their ability to absorb shocks, often leading to severe soreness and pain when walking. Blood circulation can also begin to slow as we age, especially for those dealing with diabetes, vein disease, or other conditions. Proper circulation is crucial in

keeping the human body healthy, and when the feet don't get the blood supply they need, several problems can arise - severe swelling being chief among them. Arthritis, particularly in the big toe or top of the foot, can lead to stiffness, dull aches, and decreased range of motion.

While all of these changes are certainly common, seniors should not assume that foot pain is to be simply tolerated. Seniors can take steps to care for their feet, reduce their risk of the aforementioned problems, and maintain their independence. With these tips, seniors can embrace Thoreau's words and enjoy all that the day has to offer.

#### Foot Care Tips for Seniors

- Invest in proper footwear that conforms to the foot (not the other way around). Comfort is certainly key, but flexibility is also important. It's highly recommended that seniors buy shoes that have a half-inch gap between the tip and the longest toe.
  - Take regular walks, paying par-

ticular attention to proper posture (head erect, back straight, and arms swinging).

- Have feet checked frequently by a podiatrist, especially if diagnosed with diabetes.
- Wash feet thoroughly with soap and water, especially between the toes. It's also imperative that they are dried thoroughly to help prevent fungal infections.
- Use lotion after washing/drying to reduce the risk of the skin becoming dry and cracked.
- Avoid walking while barefoot, to help avoid cuts and scrapes.
- Ensure proper toenail maintenance by cutting across the nail and avoiding trimming the corners.
- Promote proper circulation by stretching daily, keeping the feet

propped up, and wiggling toes after sitting for long periods of time.

• For any acute foot pain, apply the RICE treatment: rest, ice, compression, and elevation. Seniors should get off their feet, put ice on the injury for 20 minutes every hour, wrap it with a bandage, and keep the foot above the knee.

It's easy to take our feet for granted, but there's no denying that they play an essential role in maintaining our overall independence.

There are a few key factors in kitchen experimentation and since this month's dish is a good example, there is no recipe. I know "freezer stew" sounds pretty unappetizing, so.... call it something else.

- **1.** Learn to take a chance. In following a recipe, make a decision to substitute an item in the recipe. It won't always turn out but each time you do it, you will increase your chances of creating something extra special the next time.
- 2. Try to always keep on hand items like celery, onion, car-

rots, new potatoes and the like. Chances are one of these days you'll make a stew with leftover meat of some kind and these items fill out the dish

- **3.** Practice making a roux.
- **4.** Label those frozen Tupperware containers with dates and contents
- 5. Remember that rotisserie chickens are a great 3-4 meal item depending on how many in your family. I can make one last for at least 4 meals for me. It is very important to remember that not all parts of the chicken cook in the same amount of time, so whereas


