# Dr. La Porta Presents Armenian Identity Lecture

NEW YORK - Dr. Sergio La Porta delivered a lecture on Armenian identity in the Middle Ages on Friday, November 30.

Hosted by the Armenian Center at Columbia University, the lecture, titled "Networks of Knowledge: Communication and Identity in 12th-14th century Armenia," took place at the university's Faculty House.

Welcoming La Porta back to his alma mater, Mark Momijan, chair of the Armenian Center Board at Columbia University, highlighted La Porta's achievements in Middle Eastern studies, including his undergraduate degree from Columbia College and his PhD at Harvard University in Near Eastern Languages and Civilizations as well as his subsequent research and teaching positions. La Porta, a specialist in medieval Armenia, is currently the Haig and Isabel Berberian Professor of Armenian Studies at California State University, Fresno.

"The students at Fresno State consistently rank Dr. La Porta as among their favorite professors," said Momiian before welcoming La Porta to begin his evening's presentation. "They love the enthusiasm he brings to his lectures and the way he engages class discussion."

Providing a historical backdrop of Armenia during the 12th to 14th centuries, La Porta touched upon Armenian dispersion and political fragmentation in the region at that time. Because of Armenian emigration, other groups of people took the opportunity to come into the area, resulting in cultural integration among the Armenians and the neighboring Georgians, Turks and Kurds.


While they were not the dominant culture in the region, La Porta pointed out that Armenians were able to both adapt to their changed environment and create a sense of community to keep the country together during a time of cultural hybridity, especially one without the modern technologies that exist today. In reaction to this cultural hybridity, La Porta noted that "borders of barriers" were created that emphasized differences between these groups of people in relation to racial, economic. religious and dietary restrictions. "By denigrating the other, we get a clear distinction between who we are and who they are," said La Porta.

Focusing his attention on the three significant reasons as to why Armenians were able to maintain their community during this time, La Porta said that the trade routes, the development of a cultic community and the formation of a textual community, were integral to Armenian cohesion at the time.

The trade routes that passed through Armenia, including the Mediterranean transit route, the Mongol silk route and the Levantine route; were important in sharing ideas across Armenia and helping Armenians create social contact among the scholars, pilgrims, merchants and soldiers who traveled these routes. The trade routes also helped bolster the Armenian economy.

"In the 13th century, we witness increased economic prosperity," said La Porta. "How come at a time when there's political fragmentation and destruction, the economic situation doesn't seem to be as negatively affected? Part of the reason is you have all this capital moving through Armenia, which is advantageous for the cities, especially in eastern Armenia."

Aside from trade routes, Armenia's monastic centers also served as a bridge among the peo-

ple, During the 12th to 13th centuries, Cilicia was the center of Armenian intellectual activity, which housed monastic centers and created an intellectual group coming out of this region. "Armenians traditionally were not in urban cities," said La Porta. "They preferred hunting and feasting and fighting in the beautiful countryside that is Armenia and that is where most of their monasteries were set up. These centers served as important centers of cultural interaction and definition."

According to La Porta, scholars from Greater Armenia traveled to Cilicia to enhance their education.

"These schools become primary centers of education for the cultural and religious elite of Armenia," he said, noting that there wasn't a great degree of centralization among Armenians and each monastery had its own traditions and its own rules. "A trans-regional connection and a core curriculum were developed based on books, sacred spaces and on certain texts, such as the Cappadocian Fathers, Philo and Aristotle."

The development of a cultic community also research and Armenian history. helped in forming connections by certain saints and special sacred areas that held Armenians together, especially the idea of pilgrimage sites, in particular, Jerusalem,

"Pilgrimage sites served as points of communication and exchange," said La Porta. "You have Armenians from all over converging on these holy sites."

Although Armenians were able to maintain a sense of community under difficult circumstances, La Porta pointed out that there were challenges threatening this unity, in particular from missionaries during the Middle Ages who traveled the trade routes near Armenia. Franciscans and Dominicans friars converted tens of thousands of Armenians to Roman

> Catholicism during this time and while Armenians kept their language, those who converted were in communion with Rome and recognized supremacy of the Pope. In response to these attempts at conversion, the of the Armenian Church and knew the textual community was, according to La Porta, "essential for the success of this response.'

Concluding his presentation, La Porta remarked that there was "a new definition of Armenian communal identity presentation as well. through the creation of shared communal and sacral boundaries and of an intellectual elite built around a common textual

The evening concluded with a question-andanswer session followed by a gift presentation a rare book on Armenian illuminated manuscripts by Frederic Macler, a pioneer in the field of Armenian Studies, to La Porta as a show of gratitude from the Armenian Board at Columbia University.


This lecture is part of the Armenian Studies Program Fall 2012 Lecture Series and is co-sponsored by the Armenian Students Organization.

## Margaret Ajemian Ahnert to Speak On her book *The Knock at the Door*

FRESNO — Author Margaret Ajemian Ahnert, will speak on her book, *The Knock at the Door*, at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, November 1, at the University Business Center, Alice Peters Auditorium, Room 191, on the Fresno State campus.

This Thomas A. Kooyumjian Family Foundation lecture is part of the Armenian Studies Program Fall 2012 Lecture Series and is co-sponsored by the Armenian General Benevolent Union, Greater Fresno Chapter.

In *The Knock at the Door*, Ahnert relates her mother Ester's terrifying experiences as a young woman during the Armenian Genocide. Ester was separated from her foster family at the age of 15, during a forced march away from her birth town of Amasia. She narrowly avoided kidnapping, faced unspeakable horrors at the hands of soldiers and was forcibly married to an abusive Turkish wagon-driver. Throughout her ordeal, she reminded herself that "this, too, will pass," a mantra which enabled her to survive these nightmarish experiences. Eventually, she escaped captivity and was able to make her way to America.

The book has been translated into Armenian, Turkish, Spanish, Italian and French, with Russian, German and Polish translations in the works. It was named the Best Historical Memoir of 2008 at the New York Book Festival, as well as one of the Best Books of 2007 by USA Book News.

Ahnert received the Distinguished Humanitarian Award in 2009 and the Ellis Island Medal of Honor in 2011. In July 2010, she established the Margaret Ajemian Ahnert Scholarship Program that aims to support and empower female journalists in Armenia.

# 500th anniversary of Armenian print celebrated

The Armenian Studies Program and College of Arts of Humanities held a reception and lecture in honor of the 500th anniversary of Armenian printing on Sunday in the Henry Madden Library during Armenian Cultural Month.

Faculty and students of the Armenian Studies Program were on hand with university President John Welty, Provost William Covino, Dean of the College of Arts and Humanities Vida Samiian, and guest speaker Kevork Bardakjian Marie Manoogian Professor of Armenian Language and Literature of the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

The reception was held on the second floor next to the Leon S. Peter's Ellipse Gallery where there's an exhibit of Armenian literature, including pieces from the Matenadaran, Mesrop Mashtots Institute of Ancient Manuscripts in Yerevan. Featured prominently in the exhibit is the Codex Etchmiadzin, which features four miniature paintings dating to the 6th century bound at the end of the book.

While Saint Mesrop Mashtots created the Armenian alphabet in the year 405 A.D., Armenians did not begin publishing books until the mid-16th century, nearly 200 years after Johannes Gutenberg invented the printing press.

Dr. Welty, a longtime supporter of the Armenian Studies Program, spoke a few words in honor of the exhibit.

"Today is a great example of what a difference private support makes to a university and the fact that we enjoy this exhibit and get to learn and reflect upon years and years and years of history is a great tribute to those who have supported the university."

Sergio La Porta, the Haig and Isabel Berberian chair in the Armenian Studies Program, remarked upon the intellectual progress over the centuries by Armenians and

their utilization of technology despite being so small in numbers.

"Looking on this wonderful collection of books, and also looking at the screen and what's being done electronically, it reminds me of how Armenians have always been forward-thinking in how they've approached their life and their culture," La Porta

Armenians were one of the

first to develop printing in the Middle East and the first to develop photography in Jerusalem. They're currently at the head of digital technologies in the area and are put to special work archiving histories.

"I think the printed book exhibit here today is a wonderful testament to that forward thinking and that vision of how Armenians see their culture, not only as a mark of their past, but as a guidepost to their future," La Porta said.

Dean Samilan, another strong supporter of the Armenian Studies Program on campus, commented on the full turnout of the event.

"It is really a pleasure to see what our small Armenian studies, with only two faculty members, can do."

"When I think about what the Armenian studies has done over the last 30 years, it has been the most engaged pro-

gram."

The 500th anniversary of Armenian printing also carries special significance as this year Yerevan was chosen as the 12th World Book Capital by UNESCO.

# **CSUF Marks 'Anniversary of Armenian Printing'**With Oct.14 Lecture by Dr. Kevork Bardakjian

FRESNO - Armenian Studies Program Director Prof. Barlow Der Mugrdechian announced the opening on September 17 of an exhibit on "The 500th Anniversary of Armenian Printing" on the second floor of the Fresno State Henry Madden Library.

The Armenian Studies Program will host a special reception from 2-5PM on October 14, on the second floor of the Henry Madden Library, to mark the official opening of the exhibit. The reception is free and open to the public and refreshments will be served.

The exhibit is co-sponsored by the Armenian Studies Program, the College of Arts and Humanities, and the Henry Madden Library.

Special guest speaker for the day will be Dr. Kevork Bardakjian, Marie Manoogian Professor of Modern Armenian Language and Literature at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, who will speak on "The Impact of the Armenian Script and Printing on Armenian Identity and Letters." Fresno State President Dr. John Welty, Provost Dr. William Covino, and Dean of the College of Arts and Humanities, Dr. Vida Samiian, will also speak at the afternoon reception.

The exhibit features rare printed books and several examples of earlier manuscripts from the Armenian Studies Program collection. The majority of the printed works are from the Parnay Collection of rare books, 300 early printed works, the majority published by the Armenian

Mkhitarist congregation of Venice, but which includes books from Constantinople, Tiflis and elsewhere, now part of the Armenian Studies Program. Mr. Ray Parnay donated the collection, once belonging to his late father Mardig and late uncle Serope Y. Parnay (Yedi-Kardashian), in 2006.

A 1782 "Guidebook to the Holy Places of Jerusalem" is the oldest book on display. Other works include a translation of Homer's *Iliad* (1843), an 1859 *History of Vartan and the Armenian Wars* by Yeghishe, and *A Geography of Place Names of Greater Armenia* (1855) by Very Rev. Fr. Ghevond Alishan.

On display also is a special facsimile reproduction of the 9th century "Etchmiadzin Gospel" (Codex Etchmiadzin) on load from the collection of Arminee Shishmanian and the late Dr. Leo Shishmanian of Fresno. The Etchmiadzin Gospel contains the "Final Four Miniatures," the earliest known Armenian miniature paintings, dated to the late 6th century.

## Prof. Richard Hovannisian to Speak on Smyrna in Fresno, Oct. 5

FRESNO -- Dr. Richard G. Hovannisian, Professor of Armenian and Near Eastern history at UCLA, will speak on "The 90th Anniversary of the Burning of Smyrna" at 7:30 PM on Friday, October 5, 2012, in the Industrial Technology Building, Room 101 auditorium, on the Fresno State campus (corner of Barstow and Campus Drive).

This year marks the 90th anniversary of the Smyrna Catastrophe when much of the city, the second largest in the Ottoman Empire, was destroyed by fire during the final phase of the Greco-Turkish War.

The calamity marked the end of a strong Christian presence in the historic Aegean coastal regions and turned hundreds of thousands of Greeks and Armenians into refugees.

In this illustrated lecture, Prof. Richard Hovannisian will discuss the important role of Smyrna (Izmir) in modern Armenian history and the inferno that engulfed the city in September 1922.

Hovannisian is the editor of the recently published Armenian Smyrna/Izmir, the eleventh volume of 23 proceedings from the UCLA conference series "Historic Armenian Cities and Provinces." He also traveled to Izmir and environs in June 2012 as the historian-guide for a NAASR Armenian Heritage Tour led by Armen Aroyan.

Hovannisian is the author of Armenia on the Road to Independence, the four-volume history The Republic of Armenia, and has edited and contributed to more than twenty-five books including The Armenian Genocide in Perspective; The Armenian People from Ancient to Modern Times, and others.

# Author from Fresno explores 1992 L.A. riots

Bullard High School graduate Aris Janigian was inspired to write by Fresno's William Saroyan. But it was what he saw while living in Los Angeles that inspired him to write about the 1992 Los Angeles riots.

Those observations, and what he was able to learn about what became the biggest riots in United States history, serve as the backdrop for his new book, "This Angelic Land" (West of West, \$18.95).



Janigian, who recalls growing up in Fresno's Armenia town and seeing Saroyan riding his bicycle, says Saroyan was a big influence on him because he wrote about everyday people who ended up having international significance.

That structure is used in "This Angelic Land," a story that follows a 27-year-old bar owner during the six days the city was in chaos.

"My idea was to write a novel that would recreate the events of the riots and use that to make sense of what happened. I have been wanting to write about the riots for many years, but I didn't feel like I had the chops to pull it off," Janigian says. "About two and a half years ago "decided to go at it"

He has hands-on experience in farming. When he's not writing, Janigian returns to Fresno to work in his family's wine grape business. From 1993 to 2005 he was senior

professor of humanities at the Southern California Institute of Architecture.



# ARMENIAN POETRY IN CELEBRATION

Two famous Armenian opera stars, Victoria Avetisyan and Yeghishe Manucharyan, will join poet Diana Der-Hovanessian at the Longfellow National Historic Site in Cambridge, Mass., to celebrate the publication of her 25th book of poetry, Armenian Poetry of Our Time, from the Press at California State University.
