■ Sam and Meline Kalfayan escaped massacres in Armenia and came to Fresno. They pledged over \$500,000 to FSU's Armenian program.

Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan lost most of their families to Ottoman Turkish massacres of Armenians, but escaped with their lives. They traveled across the Armenian Diaspora, and arrived in the San Joaquin Valley with virtually nothing.

On Monday, they announced a gift worth well over \$500,000 to the Fresno State University Armenian Studies Program.

"Sam" Kalfayan's and Meline Babessian's lives crossed the world before they met and married in California.

Wise real estate investments brought monetary success. They contribute the fruits of success to the perpetuation of Armenian history and culture, to memory.

"Having lived in the old country," Sam Kalfayan said during a presentation with FSU President Harold Haak, "we are still at

heart Armenians."

The couple have no children and no remaining family, Kalfayan said, "so we have adopted the children of Fresno State University as our children."

After a brief news conference at Fresno State, the Kalfayans told their story.

"Sam" Kalfayan left Armenia when he was 4, crossed the Black Sea and landed in Cairo. He traveled to Wisconsin and then to the Valley.

Sam Kalfayan's father died in Cairo, but he retains a vivid memory of him raising and lowering little *pince-nez* eyeglasses. His mother sent a photograph of herself and her son to America, and she became a "picture bride" of her second husband in Racine, Wisconsin.

The trip across the Atlantic was difficult, especially for Sarkis Kalfayan, who was swept overboard. The ship turned around, and Kalfayan was hauled back on deck with a badly gashed leg. A scar remains.

Speaking Armenian, Turkish, Arabic and French, Kalfayan arrived in Racine in 1921. He spoke no English.

The family moved to the Valley, and Sam Kalfayan attended Dinuba High School.

Meline Kalfayan's stops with her family — the Babessians — included Istanbul, Italy, Germany, Paris, Greece, Cyprus, Paris again and Uruguay. Her father had been a pharmacist for the Turkish army, so was spared the massacres, which took the lives of 72 relatives on his side. Meline Kalfayan cannot estimate the number killed on her mother's side.

Her family made its way to Paris, but her father sensed that World War II was near. At the American embassy, officials told the family to expect a 10-year wait before admittance to the United States. Her father, Hovannes Babessian, took the family to Uruguay instead.

There, his painstaking creation of a map of Uruguay impressed a U.S. State Department representative, and won the family entrance to the United States.

"If they said, 'We invite you to paradise,' it wouldn't have given them as much pleasure," Sam Kalfayan said of his in-laws.

Kalfayan volunteered for service in World War II, serving in the Army and becoming a translator for Gen. George S. Patton.

After the war, he studied at Fresno State, and worked for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. He earned a master's degree in agricultural economics at the University of California.

Kalfayan worked as consultant and city manager for cities in Central and Southern California, investing in real estate along the way.

Meline Kalfayan's father created another extraordinarily detailed map in Los Angeles, this one recalling the history of the United States. It wound up on the wall in Omar Khayyam's restaurant in San Francisco, owned by the late George Mardikian of Fresno.

Kalfayan bought it back for \$5,000. Fresno State eventually will get the map, too.

The Kalfayans' bequest to the university will provide an endowment supporting the Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan Center for Armenian studies.

It will finance scholarships, research and instruction.

Sarkis Kalfayans Donate \$500,000 to CSUF Armenian Program

FRESNO — California State University, Fresno President Dr. Harold H. Haak announced on Monday, May 6, 1991 the naming of the Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan Center for Armenian Studies at the university. Mr. and Mrs. Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan, have pledged more than one-half million dollars as an endowment to support the faculty and students of the CSUF Armenian Studies Program.

The gift, which will be made in part now and in part as a bequest, ultimately will provide an endowment fund to support the Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan Center for Armenian studies. The naming of the Center for Armenian Studies for a benefactor is the first such occasion within the twenty campus California State University system.

Sarkis Kalfayans Donate \$500,000 to CSUF

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Following the announcement, a luncheon was held in the University Business Center, hosted by Dr. Haak and by Barlow Der Mugrdechian, Acting Director of the Armenian Studies Program, and attended by university officials, members of the Center for Armenian Studies Advisory Board, and leaders of the Armenian Students Organization.

During the ceremonies honoring the Kalfayan, Dr. Haak said, "Today we celebrate the commitment that the Kalfayans have made. Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan have a deep and abiding commitment to the university and to our Center for Armenian Studies."

"We were proud in late 1988 to announce the creation of an endowment providing permanent support for a professor in Armenian Studies. Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, Director of the Armenian Studies Program, was chosen as the Haig and Isabel Berberian Professor of Armenian Studies. It is my personal privilege to announce yet another gift that will provide a permanent financial foundation to supplement the state budget for the students and faculty who are at work in the Armenian Studies Program. One of the unique hallmarks of distinction on this campus has been our Arme-

nian Studies Program which since 1964 has provided regular classroom instruction in Armenia history, language, literature, art, and culture. The Program has produced scholarly research and publications advancing our knowledge in these same subjects, and the wider community has been served through symposia, instruction on weekends, and visiting speakers, who have brought a continuing stream of information providing an historic as well as a current perspective on Armenian culture"

Sarkis Kalfayan remarked, "My story and my wife's story is the kind of life and early struggles as immigrants that many people could tell. But wherever we lived in Cairo, in Racine or in Los Angeles, our Armenian heritage was important to us."

"We decided to make this bequest because we wanted our heirs to be the students who will follow us as long as there is a university here. These students and their teachers will tell anew the story of the Armenian people: their history, their art, their culture, their literature, and their language. In research and in publications, they will discover new information and share it with the world."

"My wife and I receive the satisfaction today that many people never are privileged to know: that our lives will have a permanent impact long

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Barlow Der Mugrdechian, acting Director of the Armenian Studies Program, commenting on the significance of the new endowment said, "There are few occasions in the life of the university as important as this. CSUF, as one of the centers for Armenian Studies in the United States, will continue to attract top students to study in the Program. The continuing education of students and the community about Armenian culture is our highest priority. Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan's life-long commitment to education is evident. How fitting that as a graduate of Fresno State, Sarkis, and Meline Kalfayan, should continue their close ties with the university."

"Sarkis Kalfayan's recent trip to Yerevan underscores his desire to see that not only students from the United States benefit from the endowment, but also that deserving students from Ar-

menia will have the opportunity to further their education at CSUF."

"The Kalfayan's dedication to Armenian culture and to education in general will serve as an example to future generations."

The agreement setting up the endowment calls for scholarships for deserving students studying in the Kalfayan Center to be called the Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan Scholars and Barsam and Aghavni Kalfayan Scholars.

Support will be provided for research in Armenian history, language, literature, culture, and art and the publication of the results of that research will be in memory of Hovannes and Aznive Babes-sian, Meline Kalfayan's parents.

The Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan Assistantship will provide support for a position in instruction or research in the Center.

Sarkis Kalfayan has been the Chairman of the Center for Armenian Studies Advisory Board since 1989 and has been active in the Armenian and non-Armenian community. In November of 1990, he travelled to Armenia to confer with leaders of Yerevan State University about the forthcoming

exchange agreement between YSU and CSU Fresno. He has actively been involved in the improvement of the university and the community in which he lives.

Sarkis Kalfayan was born in Samson, and led to Cairo, with his parents in the latter part of 1914. In 1921 he arrived in Racine, Wisconsin. Sarkis settled in Yettam, California in 1926 with his parents Barsam and Aghavni Kalfayan. The Kalfayan family immediately became involved in the St. Mary Armenian Church of Yettam.

Mr. Kalfayan married Miss Meline Babessian in June of 1949. Meline was born in Tokat and came to in America 1940. Her feather Hovannes Babes-sian, was a scholar and a teacher and author of many Armenian books.

In World War II Kalfayan served in the armed services and due to his knowledge of foreign languages he was shipped to the Third Army headquarters as General Patton's interpreter in the European Theater. When the fighting ended, he was transferred to Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Forces in Berlin.

Mr. Kalfayan received a B.A. in economics from Fresno State College and an M.S. in agricultural economics from UC Berkeley. Later he received a Masters in Public Administration from USC. Mr. Kalfayan worked over twenty years as a city manager, mostly in Suthern California. For two years he was a consultant with the city and county of Fresno preparing a master plan. He has also been employed as an economist and statistician by the Federal Raisin Administration.

Active in the community Sarkis is a member of the Battle of the Bulge Veterans Association, the Shriners, a member of Eastern Star, the Downtown Exchange Club, the AGBU, the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church, and the Knights of Vartan. Mr. and Mrs. Kalfayan enjoy gardening and reading.

This donation from the Kalfayans coupled with the doantions of others to the Leon S. Peters Building campaign, and the Haig and Isabel Berberian Chair of Armenian Studies, bring total contributions benefiting Armenian Studies to more than \$1,000,000 during the past five years.

Kalfayans Pledge \$500,000 To CSUF Armenian Studies

FRESNO - With an endowment pledge of more than \$500,000 from Sarkis and Meline Kalfayan of Fresno last week, the Center for Armenian Studies at California State University, Fresno will be named after the benefactors, the first such occasion within the 20-campus California State University system.

The Center already serves as an umbrella for the Haig and Isabel Berberian Endowed Chair, the Sahatdjian Library and the Avedian Archives. The endowment will expand the capabilities of the Center through research and publications as well as provide

teaching fellowships and student scholarships. The Center has an Advisory Board of 15 community leaders appointed by the university president.

The gift from the Kalfayans, coupled with donations of others to the Leon S. Peters Building campaign and the Berberian Chair, brings total contributions benefiting Armenian Studies in Fresno to more than \$1 million during the past five years.

Forty percent of the endowment's proceeds will be devoted to students' scholarships, preferably from recognized universities and

institutes in Armenia. Twenty percent will be used to support research in Armenian history, language, literature, culture and art, and publications, with another twenty percent going to teaching fellowships. The last portion of the endowment's proceeds will be used to meet other academic needs as determined by the director of the Sarkis and Meline Center for Armenian Studies. The agreement also allows the university the option of establishing a second Endowed Chair in Armenian Studies in the names of the donors.

In 1986, CSUF's first chair in Armenian Studies was founded, and named after Haig and Isabel Berberian.

The major portion of Kalfayans' gift will come as a bequest in their wills.

The couple have no children and no remaining family, Kalfayan said, "so we have adopted the children of Fresno State University as our children."

Both Kalfayans lost most of their families to Ottoman Turkey's organized massacres and barely escaped with their lives.

During the news conference where they pledged the \$500,000 gift, Sam Kalfayan told FSU President Harol Haak: "Having lived in the old country, we are still at heart Armenians."

publications as well as provide teaching fellowships and student scholarships. The Center has an Advisory Board of 15 community leaders appointed by the university president.

This gift from the Kalfayans, coupled with donations of others to the Leon S. Peters Building campaign and the Berberian Chair, bring total contributions benefitting Armenian Studies to more than \$1 million during the past five years.

"It if wasn't for the help of others, I wouldn't have ever gotten the chance to go to school and get to where I am today," he said. "My wife and I are donating to the university because we wanted our heirs to be the students who will follow us and tell the story of the Armenian people."

"Sam" Kalfayan, who serves as advisor to the Armenian Studies

Center, was born in Armenia in 1911 and fled to the U.S. with his family during the Genocide. He settled in Yettum, where he immediately became involved with the St. Mary Church.

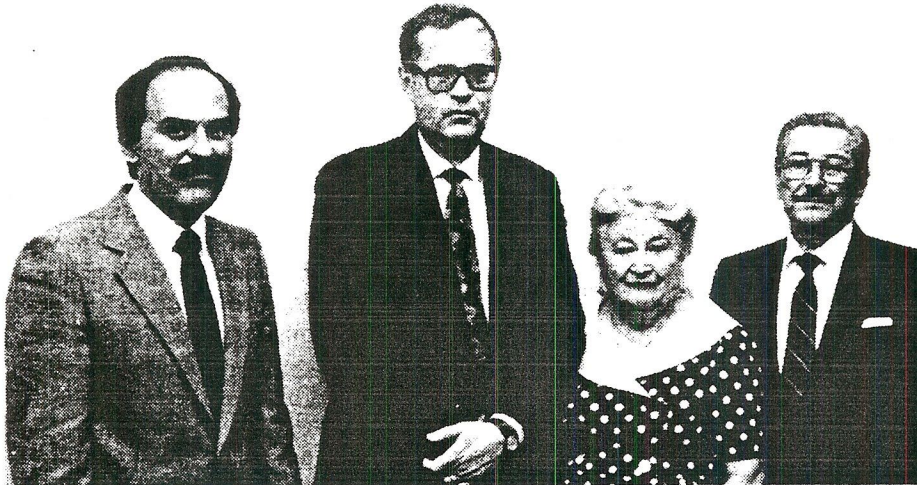
In 1949, he married Meline Babessian, who was born in Tokat. Meline's father was a scholar, teacher, author as well as a talented cartologist.

Kalfayan, who speaks five languages, served in World War II as an interpreter to General George Patton. After the war he earned a B.A. in economics from Fresno State College, an M.S. in agricultural economics from UC-Berkeley and a Master's in Public Administration from USC.

He worked for more than 20 years as a city manager, mostly in Southern California, and has also been employed as an economist and statistician by the Federal Raisin Administration.

Kalfayan, who travelled to Armenia this past November, said: "The most important thing Armenians today should remember is not to forget about their heritage," he said. "If you forget your cultural heritage, then you are losing your past. Without your past you are a nobody."

«Մենք անզաւակ դոյզ մը ըլլալով, հայագիտութեան ուսուցման այս կեդրոնի ուսանողները որդեգրեցինք իբրեւ մեր զաւակները: Այս ուսանողները եւ անոնց ուսուցիչները կրկին ու կրկին պիտի պատմեն հայ ժողովուրդի պատմութիւնը: Անոր՝ մշակոյթը, արուեստները, գրականութիւնն ու լեզուն: Հետախուզութեամբ եւ հրատարակութիւններով, անոնք նոր տեղեկութիւններ պիտի գտնեն եւ զանոնք պիտի փոխանցեն աշխարհին:

«Կ'ուզեմ գիտցուի այսօր, որ թէեւ մենք շատ կու տանք, բայց ատոր փոխարէն մենք այնպիսի բան մը կը ստանանք, որ դրամով կարելի չէ գնել: Եւ կը յուսանք որ մեր այս նախաձեռնութեան լուրը կը տարածուի ամէնուրեք եւ պատճառ կ'ըլլայ նաեւ որ ուրիշներ եւս ներշնչուին ու ոգեւորուին ու հետեւին մեր օրինակին:»

Պրն. Գալֆայեանի զգածուած խօսքերէն ետք, արտայայտուեցաւ հայագիտական ամպիոնի պատասխանատու ուսուցիչ Պրն. Պարլօ Տէր Մկրտիչեան, շնորհակալութիւն յայտնելով համալսարանի նախագահին, որ միշտ քաջալեր հանդիսացած էր հայկական նիւթերու վերաբերեալ դասընթացներու ճոխացման կեդրոնէն ներս, ու ապա իր գնահատանքը արտայայտեց Գալֆայեան ամուլի առատաձեռն նուիրատուութեան մասին, խոստանալով որ հայագիտական կեդրոնը ամէն ջանք պիտի թափէր իր վրայ դրուած յոյսերը աւելիով արդարացնելու:

Կտակին եկամուտը հաւասարապէս պիտի օգտագործուի կրթութեան, հայոց պատմութեան վերաբերեալ ուսումնասիրութիւններու, ինչպէս նաեւ գրականութեան, մշակոյթի եւ լեզուի մարզերուն մէջ ըլլալիք հետազոտութիւններու: Բնականաբար, տարիներ պիտի առնէ մինչեւ որ կտակին պայմանները ամբողջութեամբ իրենց լրումին հասնին, սակայն այս գեղեցիկ առիթը օգտագործուեցաւ նպատակը գէթ հանրութեան սեփականութիւնը դարձնելու:

Սարգիս Գալֆայեան ծնած է 1911-ին, Սամսոն, եւ 1914-ի ջարդերէն փախչելով, ծնողքին հետ մեկնած է Գահիրէ: Ապա՝ հաստատուած է Ռէյսին, Ուիսքոնսն, 1921-ին: Աւելի ետք, 1926-ին, Սարգիս եւ ծնողները՝ Պարսամ եւ Աղաւնի կու գան ու կը հաստատուին Եգիպտոս, Քահիրէ: Պրն. Գալֆայեան 1949-ին կ'ամուսնանայ Մելինէ Պապէսեանի հետ: Մելինէ ծնած է Թոքաս: Անոր հայրը՝ Յովհաննէս Պապէսեան կը նկատուի պատրաստուած մտաւորական մը, հեղինակ՝ բազմաթիւ հայերէն գիրքերու: Երկրորդ Համաշխարհային Պատերազմին, Սարգիս Գալֆայեան թարգմանիչը հանդիսացած է զօրավար Փեթէնին, Եւրոպայի մէջ:

Պրն. Գալֆայեան չրջանաւարտ է Ֆրեզնոյի Համալսարանէն, ինչպէս նաեւ Պրքլիէն, վկայուելով տընտեսագիտութեան եւ Հնդամշակութային գիտութիւններու մէջ: Ան միշտ գործունեայ անդամ մը հանդիսացած է այն համայնքներու մէջ, ուր բնակութիւն հաստատած է գործի բերումով:
