■ Goodwin Field

All Cal State Fullerton home baseball games are played at Goodwin Field on campus. The field is located at the north end of campus. just east of Titan Stadium. Parking is available by:

- Using Lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and A) Associated Road and paying \$3 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday nights and all day on Saturdays and Sundays.
- Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of a news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

■ Media Credentials

Requests should be made by phone (714-278-3081), fax (714-278-3141) or e-mail (rermeling@fullerton.edu) as far in advance as possible and no later than 24 hours before game time. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. Otherwise, credentials can be picked up at the press will call.

■ Photo Credentials

Credentials will be issued on a per-game basis and must be worn in plain sight at all times. All photographers must remain in the camera wells located to the outfield side of each dugout. NCAA regulations regarding photography will be adhered to at all times.

Press Box

The press box is located on the walkway behind the home plate seating area. Limited seating is available with beat writers receiving priority. Radio positions and additional media seating will be allocated in the press box or in the rows immediately in front of the press box, if necessary.

■ Telephones

The press box phone number (for media scoring updates only) is (714) 278-5327. Additional lines are available on a shared basis in the press box or softball press box (located adjacent to the baseball facility).

■ Radio Lines

Up to two telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team. Please make arrangements through the athletic media relations office well in advance.

Network

The press box is equipped with several highspeed data jacks for on-line browsing and transmission. Media members should bring their own network cables.

Interviews

Coaches and players will be available for postgame interviews on the field after a brief cooling down session and team meeting. Midweek interviews can be conducted before practices, which generally start at 1:45 p.m., or by special arrangement. Coach Horton can also be reached in his office at (714) 278-3780 before noon. Special requests should be made through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with visiting coaches or players should be arranged through the visiting team's SID, when available.



▼ Big League Talent

The Big West boasts a sizable number of alumni who have moved on to baseball's highest level and are contributing to the successes of their respective major league clubs.

Some of the Big West's more prominent alumni wearing major league uniforms include Jason Giambi, the 2000 American League Most Valuable Player and 2001 National League All-Star Phil Nevin. Other notable major leaguers who honed their skills in the Big West are Chris Singleton, Mark Kotsay, Steve Trachsel and Brady Anderson.

The list goes on and on. And the supply does not appear to be in danger of shortage. The Big West produces an annual bumper crop of players in the major league baseball amateur draft that ranks the conference among the highest represented in the nation. In the 2001 MLB amateur draft alone, an incredible 38 Big West players were selected, including first-rounder Bobby Crosby of Long Beach State. Cal State Fullerton's Adam Johnson, the second overall pick of the 2000 MLB draft by the Minnesota Twins, made a guick ascent to the parent club with his appearance in the starting pitching rotation in 2001

▼ Key Dates in Big West Conference History

July 1, 1969 - The desire to form a Division I football conference sparks the formation of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members: Fresno State, Long Beach State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Pacific, Cal State Los Angeles and San Diego "State. The conference sponsors 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field, water polo and wrestling. J. Kenneth Fagans is named commissioner on a part-time basis.

June 3, 1976 - The conference approves the split of the PCAA baseball league into two leagues separate from the PCAA. The Southern California Baseball Association (SCBA) and the Northern California Baseball Association (NCBA) consist mostly of members of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference. PCAA Commissioner Jesse Hill agrees to govern the SCBA.

June 8, 1979 - SCBA member Cal State Fullerton wins the NCAA Baseball Championship with a 2-1 victory over Arkansas.

May 17, 1984 - The conference council approves the reformation of PCAA baseball for the 1985 season, thus eliminating the SCBA and the NCBA.

June 10, 1984 - SCBA champion Cal State Fullerton wins its second NCAA Baseball Championship. The Titans prevail over the University of Texas, 3-1.

July 1, 1988 - The conference changes its name from "PCAA" to "Big West Conference."

May 14, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton defeats Long Beach State, 8-4, to claim the title in the inaugural Big West Baseball Tournament in Long Beach, Calif.

June 10, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton claims its third College World Series title with an 11-5 win over USC. The Titans become the first No. 1 seed in College World Series history to win the title. In addition, CSF becomes the 14th team in CWS history to advance through the regionals and series undefeated.

January 8, 1996 - Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge are invited to join the Big West as associate members in softball starting in 1997. Sacramento State's baseball team is invited to join the league as an associate member also in 1997.



▼ Big West Returns to Eight-Team Format

Big West baseball will return to its eight-team format this season, following the departure of Sacramento State. From 1985-91 and 1993-00, the conference played with eight teans in the conference, including a two-division format in 1985 and 1997-98. The teams varied from consistent names such as Cal State Fullerton, UC Santa Barbara, Long Beach State and Pacific to Fresno State, UNLV and New Mexico State.

Through those years, 11 teams have appeared in the College World Series, including 1995 National Champions Cal State Fullerton. Twice the Big West has had two representatives in the College World Series, 1988 and 1991. During that span, Cal State Fullerton won or shared nine conference titles while Long Beach State and former member Fresno State each captured or shared four championships each.

The teams will face each other once this season in a three-game series, which equals 21 total conference games for each team.

















Goodwin Field, formerly known as Titan Field, became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on April 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a doubleheader from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third oncampus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton. which has also played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Santa Ana, and Orange coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of the citrus groves. A new field

was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979, when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno

The most recent facelift to the facility came in the way of a \$3

million project completed just prior to the 2001 season. The stadium's seating capacity has been expanded from 1,750 to nearly 3,500 and for the first time, the stadium boasts an on-site clubhouse-style building, which connects to the adjoining softball stadium. The clubhouse includes locker rooms, coaches offices, umpire quarters and a VIP viewing and entertainment area. The stadium's name was officially changed from Titan Field to Goodwin Field (in honor of benefactors Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin) in a ceremony prior to the Titans' game against Long Beach State on April 14, 2000.

Thanks in part to the extensive renovations

and a commitment by the university to transform the field into a state-of-the-art facility, the NCAA named Goodwin Field as a regional site in 2000 and 2001 and also as a super regional site in 2001. The Titans had been on the road for the first 21 Regional appearances in their history and had qualified for more College World Series appearances (10) by winning on the road than any other school. When Fullerton hosted Mississippi State in its first home super regional in June of 2001, consecutive sellout crowds of 3.412 cheered the Titans on as they swept the Bulldogs to clinch a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time.

Goodwin Field is also home to the prestigious Kia Baseball Bash, which will mark its fourth annual tournament in 2003. The three-day round-robin event is considered one of the best tournaments in the country Of the 12 teams that have competed in the tournament over the last three years, seven have reached the super regionals and three have advanced to the College World Series.

Goodwin Field has had several other renovations over the years. Its playing surface sported a brand new look for the 1996 season, thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turface was added to the warning track. Additional landscaping has been placed on the outside of Goodwin Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.






THIS IS TITAN BASEBALL

Eleven College World Series appearances. Three national titles. Eleven consecutive trips to the NCAA playoffs. Not one losing season in 28 Division I seasons. Cal State Fullerton's baseball program and excellence seem to go hand in hand.

The excellence starts with a coaching staff comprised entirely of former Titans, coaches who understand what it takes to be successful. None of the Cal State Fullerton coaches have ever experienced a losing season. At any school. At any level.

It's passed on to a highly talented and dedicated group of players who are equally successful... Successful on the field – the Titans made their 11th trip to Omaha in 2001. Successful in the classroom – witness Jon Smith's selection as a first-team Academic All-American in 2001. Successful in the community – the Titans continue to sponsor Baseball Buddies, a program that links Titan players with elementary school students in the classroom and on the playeround.

HONORS WATCH: Fullerton returns a trio of players who are bona fide All-American candidates. Junior right-handers Wes Littleton and Chad Cordero and outfielder Shane Costa were all members of Team USA this past summer and all have earned preseason All-American recognition. Littleton turned in a spectacular sophomore campaign, posting a 9-4 record and a Big West-best ERA of 2.40. Cordero paced the conference with 12 saves and has more career saves (26) than any active pitcher in the country. Costa, meanwhile, put together another blistering season with a .365 average, 23 doubles, 40 RBI and 14 stolen bases.

TOP TALENT: The Titans' incoming recruiting class has been hailed the second best group of newcomers in the country by both Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball. Just two years ago, Titan recruiting coordinator Dave Serrano assembled the top class in the country (per Collegiate Baseball). Among the incoming talent are five players who were selected in last June's Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. The most celebrated newcomer is Rio Linda's Shawn Scobee, a power-hitting outfielder selected in the fifth round by the Cubs. Lefthanded pitcher Ricky Romero (East L.A./ Roosevelt H.S.) was 12-1 with a 0.53 ERA and 162 Ks in 80.0 innings as a high school senior and was taken in the 37th round by Boston. Ryan Schreppel (Stockton, Calif./Lincoln H.S.), another talented lefty, was 7-1 with a 1.60 ERA before being selected in the 20th round by Minnesota. Outfielder Bobby Andrews (Vista, Calif./Rancho Buena Vista H.S.) was a second-team All-CIF player and was picked by Texas in the 22nd round. San Francisco used its 23rd-round pick on infielder Neil Walton (Santa Cruz, Calif./ Santa Cruz H.S.), who was named county player of the year as a senior.

RED, WHITE & BLUE: Cal State Fullerton's baseball program ranked third in a recent USA Baseball study that lists the top 50 collegiate baseball programs in terms of representation on USA Baseball National Teams since 1984. The Titans' program tallied 38 points, trailing only Stanford (65 points) and Miami (41 points). Fullerton has had 12 players make 15 appearances in 11 different seasons. Current Titans Wes Littleton, Chad Cordero and Shane Costa all wore the Red, White and Blue last summer as the Americans went 23-7 and earned the silver medal at the 2002 FISU World University Baseball Championship.

▼ Titans' Sights Set on Omaha in 2003

Cal State Fullerton Head Coach **George Horton**, who enters his seventh season in search of his third trip to Omaha, likes what he sees in the 2003 Titans.

"I think a good way to put it is that everybody in our program is excited to get back to work," he said in early January, days before the start of official practice on Jan. 6. "The coaches feel as though the talent level and attitude of this year's group is an exciting combination and one that will give us the opportunity to reestablish our national prominence. I don't think anyone involved in the program enjoyed last year as much as past years."

The disappointment of a season ended had barely set in when Titan pitching coach **Dave Serrano** huddled with his staff in the outfield of Sunken Diamond last June.

"After that last out, I gathered our pitchers together and told them that there were better days ahead," said Serrano. "I told the guys to walk with their heads held high and their chests out and from that moment on, through the summer, until the first day of school, until they walk through gates for the first practice, their thoughts were to be nothing short of being national champions."

An overstatement? Perhaps with some programs, but not at Cal State Fullerton, where the tradition-rich Titans legitimately target Omaha every year and seem to have as good a shot in 2003 as any season.

The Titans, ranked as high as seventh in the preseason polls, will host Stanford in the season opener on Jan. 31. And as usual, it looks like pitching will be very strong and the offens should be much improved.

The Titans lost veteran starter **Jordan DeJong**, but return virtually every other pitcher, including second-team preseason All-Americans **Chad Cordero** (*Chino, Calif.*) and **Wes Littleton** (*Oceanside, Calif.*), both of whom pitched exceptionally well for Team USA last summer.

"We'll have to wait until the dust settles, obviously, but this staff has the numbers, the depth and the quality to be perhaps the best staff we've had in this coaching tenure at Fullerton," said Serrano.

And, just as importantly, the Titans seem to have plugged in some gaps of a disappointing 2002 campaign that saw them finish in a tie for fourth place in the Big West Conference.

An incoming recruiting class that has been ranked second by both *Baseball America* and *Collegiate Baseball* should bolster an offensive arsenal that will be led by preseason All-American outfielder **Shane**

Costa (Visalia, Calif.). Fullerton also has a nice mix of left-handed pitchers and hitters

this season, a luxury missing just a season ago.

■ Junior preseason All-American closer Chad Cordero will anchor a bullpen that should be among the deepest in the nation.

Infield

The Titans might not look much different on the infield this season, though they certainly have more depth, thanks to an influx of talented newcomers.

Junior **Richie Burgos** (Glendora, Calif.), whose left-handed bat was a valuable commodity a year ago, will have to prove his value defensively now that the Titans have more lefties in the store. He'll be pushed by redshirt freshman **Jacob Mendrin** (La Habra Heights, Calif.), whom the coaches compare to former Titan Aaron Rifkin.

"Richie is a proven consistent Division I hitter," said Horton. "But Jake is one of the most improved players on the team and has shown real potential for power, so that's going to be a battle."

Should Burgos be on the losing end of that battle, he'll still see plenty of action, especially after establishing his proficiency in 2002 as a pinch-hitter.

Senior **Jason Corapci** (Orange, Calif.) would seem the logical choice to again start at second base, but he'll need to shake the effects of a frustrating junior offensive performance (he was last among regulars with a .259 average) and offseason shoulder surgery to ward off freshman **Justin Turner** (Lakewood, Calif.).

Ironically, Tuner and Corapci were both bat boys for the Titans and might bleed Titan blue and orange more than anyone on the field. Turner might have had the best fall of any Titan and Horton indicated he wouldn't hesitate to start the true freshman.

Senior shortstop **Justin Smyres** (*Paso Robles, Calif.*), who became steadier as the 2002 season wore on and earned second-team all-conference honors, is apparently completely recovered from a car accident more than a year-and-a-half ago that left him with recurring neck troubles. After Costa, Smyres is the next closest thing to a penciled-in starter.

But Smyres' heir apparent, freshman phenom **Neil Walton** (Santa Cruz, Calif.), is more than willing to challenge the incumbent for playing time...and he's already impressed Horton.

"I'm going to go out on a limb and say that Neil should become one of the best infielders to ever play at Cal State Fullerton," said Horton. "He has been incredibly impressive defensively and he has a 6-5 athletic, Troy Glaus-like body. He is probably 20 pounds of strength away from becoming a real offensive force."

Yet another war for playing time will be waged at third base, with junior college transfer Ronnie Prettyman (Los Alamitos, Calif.) and veteran Mike Martinez (Anaheim, Calif.) vying

for the starting job. Martinez has had a bad-luck string of injuries since a solid freshman year in 2000, but has been healthy so far this year. Prettyman, from Horton's former stomping grounds at Cerritos, is a solid all-around player. Horton admits a possible platoon situation for the two, since they bat from different sides of the plate.

Perhaps a year away from seriously contending for starting jobs are freshmen **Blake Davis** (Fountain Valley, Calif.), who hopes to see some time in the middle infield, and **Brett Pill** (Covina, Calif.), who has worked out at first

and third.

The only no-brainer for Horton is that Costa needs to be an everyday out-fielder. After playing right field as a sophomore, Costa is likely to start in center this year.

While no one expects him to replace the defensive acumen of **Chris Stringfellow**, the expectations from an offensive standpoint are sky-high.

"I hate to put the pressure of a label on him, but Shane is one of the best baseball players in America," said Horton. "We're looking for him not only to build on his statistical offensive output, but also to take more of a leadership role this season."

He'll especially need to serve as somewhat of a field general in the outfield since there's a very real possibility he'll be flanked by a pair of freshmen.

TOURNEY TALK: The Titans have made 24 NCAA Regional appearances in their 28-year Division I history and have not missed the playoffs since 1991. Their 11-year run is the fifth-longest active streak in the nation. Only Miami (30), Florida State (25), Clemson (16) and LSU (14) have longer streaks. Fullerton has advanced to Omaha 11 times, with College World Series titles in 1979, 1984 and 1995.

KIA BASEBALL BASH: Once again, the Titans will host an impressive field at the Kia Baseball Bash. For the second consecutive season, the defending CWS champ will be showcased, with Texas making its inaugural appearance in the tournament. Perhaps the main storyline will be the first return of Longhorns Coach Augie Garrido since he left Fullerton following the 1996 season. Joining Texas and the Titans will be Tulane and UCLA. Of the 12 teams that have participated in the first three Kia Bash tournaments. seven went on to make super regional appearances and three reached the College World Series (USC in 2000, Tennessee and Cal State Fullerton in 2001).

CHAMPS ALREADY: A quartet of Titan rookies have already teamed up for one World Series title. Blake Davis, Justin Turner, Dan Dorn and Ricky Romero helped propel the Long Beach Cardinals to the Connie Mack World Series championship in Farmington, New Mexico last summer. Turner earned the tournament's Golden Glove award for his play at second base. Davis, who tied a Connie Mack World Series record with five doubles in the tournament, earned a spot on the alltourney team from the shortstop position. Romero, a left-handed pitcher, was not named to the all-tournament team, though he allowed only one run in 5.1 innings in the championship game (a 2-1 win over the Bill Hood Broncos) and picked up a win over the West Michigan Elite. The team was managed by Randy Vanderhook, the brother of Titan assistant coach Rick Vanderhook.

ALL IN THE FAMILY: Every member of the Fullerton staff - from head coach to administrative assistant - played baseball for the Titans. Head Coach George Horton was an all-conference first baseman on the Titans' first Division I team in 1975. Assistant coach Dave Serrano made 15 pitching appearances for the Titans in 1986 and Rick Vanderhook was a member of the 1984 national championship team, though he never appeared in a game. Volunteer assistant coach Chad Baum was a captain on the 1998-99 teams and second-vear administrative assistant Sergio Brown was a reserve on the 1995 national champions.





Danny Dorn (Diamond Bar, Calif.) and Shawn Scobee (Rio Linda, Calif.) have shown incredible offensive potential and either one could take after Costa by becoming an every-day outfielder as a freshman. Scobee is perhaps the most high-profile offensive recruit in Coach Horton's tenure, having turned down the Cubs' lucrative fifth-round financial package. The coaches are convinced he's the real deal

"He is extremely powerful and has a classic hitter's mentality," said Horton. "He's got a bright future, not just here at Fullerton, but beyond into the professional ranks as well."

Horton classifies Dorn as the "sleeper" of this year's outstanding recruiting class, because he came in under the radar but might have the most immediate impact of any of the newcomers.

But either Dorn or Scobee will have to take a seat if junior **Kyle Boyer** (*Temecula, Calif.*) can finally come up with a monster season that the coaches have been hoping for since his freshman year. Boyer regularly hits tape-measure shots in batting practice, but he's hit just two career home runs in 159 at bats while striking out 55 times.

"With Kyle, it all comes down to being a consistent offensive player and if that happens, he could have a breakout year for us," said Horton. "He is as strong and as fast as anyone on the team and he has as good of an arm as anyone on the team. If he comes around this season, that could be a key for us."

Sophomores **Joe Turgeon** (*Placentia, Calif.*) and **Trevor Mortensen** (*Chino Hills, Calif.*) – who have similar, scrappy styles of play – are also competing for playing time in the outfield. Mortensen had one of the best falls of any Titan, batting .414 with six extra-base hits in 29 at-bats in intrasquad scrimmages.

Freshman **Bobby Andrews** (*Vista, Calif.*) is a classic speedster in the mold of Stringfellow (who went to the same high school as him), but he has a way to go defensively. Nonetheless, his speed on the basepaths could help the Titans in key situations this year.

John Hanley (Riverside, Calif.) and David Fischer (Anaheim, Calif.) are options in the outfield, though either one is more likely to wind up in the DH role. Fisher was a late-bloomer last year, finishing the season on a tear (he had a 13-game hitting streak snapped in the finale) while batting cleanup for the Titans down the stretch.

Pitching

Serrano is always even-keel when it comes to the prospects for the Titans' pitching staff, but even he admits that the 2003 staff has chance to be "pretty special."

With Littleton and Cordero leading the way and several experienced veterans and talented newcomers in the fold, only injuries can keep the Titans from reaching their lofty expectations.

Littleton is the obvious ace of the staff after a breakout sophomore season that saw him lead the Big West with a 2.40 ERA and claim third-team All-American honors from Baseball America.

"He is such a phenomenal athlete and the big key for Wes last year was gaining command in the strike zone," said Serrano. "Once he established that, he was almost unhittable."

The question is, then: who follows Littleton in the rotation?

Serrano and the staff are still waiting to hear on the status of juniors **Darric Merrell** (*Temecula, Calif.*) and **Travis Ingle** (*Cypress, Calif.*), both of whom have had some injury setbacks during the offseason. More than likely, one of the two will become the Titans' Sunday starter with the other taking on long-relief duties.

If Merrell is healthy and can regain the form that made him a freshman All-American, it becomes an easy decision. But last year, it was Ingle that made the bigger strides of the two, posting a 3.17 ERA in 54 innings of work while holding opponents to a .226 average.

The middle spot in the weekend rotation will likely belong to freshman **Ryan Schreppel** (Stockton, Calif.) or redshirt freshman **Dustin Miller** (Diamond Bar, Calif.). Schreppel's emergence would give the Titans a lefty in the rotation for the first time since **Jon Smith** started in 2001, but Miller might have the edge simply because he's been around the program – and Division I baseball – for a year.

As for the bullpen...well, it's got a chance to be the deepest in all of college baseball. The obvious anchor is Cordero, the active national career saves leader with 26.

Cordero was absolutely dominant with Team USA last summer, throwing 17.1 innings without allowing an earned run. There will be no experimentation with a starting role for Cordero, as the Titans have done with closers in years past, first with **Ted Silva**, then with **Kirk Saarloos**

"He really likes that role and we certainly like him there," said Serrano. "It's always been our philosophy to put one of our best pitchers in that role and Chad has become one of the best in the business at closing out games."

Leading up to Cordero will be a strong, mostly right-handed contingent. Journeyman **Sean Martin** (*Tucson, Ariz.*), a fifth-year senior, was fantastic last year, especially in Big West play, where he posted a 1.65 ERA. He'll continue to work in long relief situations, but may see his role expanded to include more set-up work for Cordero.

And perhaps the most valuable commodity will be freshman lefty **Ricky Romero** (*East Los Angeles, Calif.*), who will land in the pen if he doesn't earn a starting spot. Romero had one of the best senior seasons of any high schooler in the state last year at Roosevelt H.S. and signed late with the Titans.

John Tucker (Costa Mesa, Calif.), John Estes (Sammanish, Wash.), Jason Windsor (Saratoga, Calif.) and Tim Jimenez (Whitter, Calif.) are also making their case for innings out of the pen.

Catching

Sophomore **Kurt Suzuki** (*Wailuku*, *Maui*, *Hawaii*) and junior **P.J. Pilittere** (*Walnut*, *Calif.*) should see almost all of the action behind the plate this season.

Pilittere, now in his fourth year with the program, was the primary starter for the Titans last year, though Suzuki was brilliant before being sidelined with an assortment of injuries.

In fact, the Hawai native didn't show many nerves in his first season as a Titan. He made just his second start of the season against defending national champion Miami in front of a Goodwin Field regular-season record crowd of 2,833 and responded by homering and knocking in all three Titan runs. Suzuki finished the season with a .392 batting average and did not commit an error in 139 chances, though he saw only sporadic playing time due to back, hip and wrist injuries. Off-season wrist surgery was successful and has put him in the driver's seat for the catching job.

John Curtis (Newhall, Calif.) and **Sergio Pedroza** (Covina, Calif.) have also worked out behind the plate and could see action if injuries or situations warrant.

Schedule

As usual, the Titans will play one of the toughest schedules around, though a few of the traditional powers on their schedule – like Nevada and Fresno State – are unranked heading into the sea-


Nonetheless, Fullerton will have its hands full from the getgo. After opening at home against long-time nemesis Stanford – which stands as high as third in the polls – the Titans will head to the San Joaquin Valley to help the Bulldogs open the Mike Batesole era.

Fullerton will also make the American League Championship Series tour this year, playing a three-game set with Minnesota at the Metrodome (home of the Twins) and a Saturday contest against USC at Edison International Field (home of the Angels).

The highlight remains the Kia Baseball Bash, now in its fourth year. For the second time in as many years, the defending College World Series champion (Texas) will play in the Bash, but there's more to the storyline than that. Longhorns skipper Augie Garrido – who literally built the Titans' program from scratch and led them to all three of their national titles – will make his first trip to Goodwin Field as the Texas coach. Tulane, which was in the College World Series with the Titans two seasons ago, and UCLA round out the tournament field.

Fullerton and Long Beach appear to be the class of the Big West this season, though UC Irvine will be right in the mix as well. While it's too early to tell how the rest of the conference might shake up, much attention will be paid to the programs at Cal Poly and Cal State Northridge, both under new coaching regimes.





The Titan baseball tradition is alive and thriving, thanks to seventh-vear Head Coach George Horton.

Since Horton, 49, took over for Augie Garrido on Sept. 4, 1996, after six years as Garrido's associate head coach, the Titans have posted a 259-116-1 record, celebrated a Big West Conference title five times (by way of tournament or regular season crown) and made a pair of trips to Omaha. They have almost always been ranked in the national Top 25 polls and briefly ascended to the top spot in the *Collegiate Baseball* poll in both 1999 and 2001.

Horton's .690 winning percentage is eighth among active Division I coaches (minimum five years). Of the 23 teams – many of which are nationally prominent – that Horton has faced five or more times, only four (USC, Stanford, Long Beach State and Wichita State) have managed winning records against Fullerton. The two-time conference Coach of the Year has been at his best in series play. Heading into 2003, Fullerton owns a 66-19 overall record in three-game regular season series and the Titans have won 44 of 54 (81 percent) Big West Conference series. Fullerton has been sweeps just three times while the Titans have recorded 36 series sweeps. Perhaps an even bigger credit to Coach Horton has been his success on the road: the Titans have won 24 of Horton's 27 conference series away from Goodwin Field.

Horton, who is one of nine men to have appeared in Omaha as a player and a head coach, has seen 35 Titans selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft during his tenure, including nine in 2001. Aaron Rowand was a "sandwich" pick in 1998 and Adam Johnson was the second overall selection in 2000.

Horton's Titans have been to the College World Series twice in the last four seasons, including 2001, when they secured a berth at home for the first time and carried the national No. 1 seed to Rosenblatt Stadium. After holding off local favorite Nebraska in the opener, the Titans lost a pair to Stanford with a win over Tulane sandwiched in between. The Titans finished No. 3 in all three national polls. Under Horton's eye, the 2001 squad posted several memorable moments during the regular season as well. They won 24 of 25 over one stretch and became the first team ever to sweep a three-game series against eventual national champion Miami at Mark Light Stadium.

The 2000 Titans, the unanimous preseason pick to win the conference and the consensus No. 2 team in the country, had a two-game lead on Nevada with three games to go in the Big West race. But the Wolf Pack swept Pacific in the final series and Fullerton lost two of three to Long Beach State, so the Titans had to settle for a co-championship. However, the Titans did host a regional for the first time, which was won by USC.


In 1999, the Titans again went 25-5 to win the BWC by four games. They swept three games at the Notre Dame Regional and then overcame an assortment of disadvantages to triumph in three games in the Super Regional at Ohio State to qualify for the school's tenth College World Series, where they went 1-2.

In 1998, the Titans used a remarkably balanced squad to start strong and then dominate the Big West Conference regular season with a 25-5 record. But they stumbled at home in the Big West Tournament and then ran into a powerful buzz saw in Baton Rouge in the NCAA regionals, placing second at 3-2 with a pair of losses to the host LSU Tigers.

In Horton's debut season in 1997, the Titans struggled to a 23-19-1 start, but then rattled off 15 victories in their final 18 regular season games. They lost the opener of the Big West Conference post-season tournament at home to Pacific ace Dan Reichert, but then came back to win four games in a row at Blair Field. They swept a doubleheader on the final day against host Long Beach State to capture the league championship and the automatic NCAA tournament bid. At Stanford, the Titans went 1-2 to place third, losing to Santa Clara and Fresno State.

Horton fulfilled a lifelong dream of being a Division I head coach when he was promoted to replace Garrido, who left to take over the program at the University of Texas. A 1978 CSF graduate, Horton had returned to the campus in 1991 when Garrido came back after a three-year stint at Illinois. In the next six years the Titans posted a 264-99 record and made three trips to the CWS, winning the 1995 crown with a phenomenal 57-9 season. Horton had input on virtually every aspect of the Fullerton program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff. His organizational skills, patience as a teacher and his attention to detail provided the backbone of the Titan coaching staff.

During the years Horton was responsible for the pitching staff, nine pitchers received All-America honors and James Popoff (1992), Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins. He later earned a World Series ring in 1999 with the Yankees. Another Horton product, Brent Billingsley, made two appearances for the Florida Marlins early in the 1999 season. Eight more of Horton's former pupils – both pitchers and position players – have ascended to the Major League ranks over the last couple of years, including Kirk Saarloos, who took the National League by storm last summer and was named the senior circuit's Rookie of the Month in July.



Horton also worked with Phil Nevin (San Diego Padres), who in 1992 was the Golden Spikes Award winner, Baseball America player of the year, baseball's No. 1 draft pick (by Houston) and the College World Series MVP. Nevin has gone on to a successful pro career as have former Horton pupils Mark Kotsay (San Diego Padres) and Jeremy Giambi (Boston Red Sox).

Kotsay and Nevin along with Brian Loyd and Jason Moler – all tutored in part by Horton – were Olympians and Kotsay was chosen the college player of the decade by Baseball America.

Horton began his head coaching career at Cerritos College in Norwalk, where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years. He compiled a 226-53 record and won the California titles in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).


He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Joel Adamson, Dan Patterson, Luis Medina, Jeff Hearron, Naulty and Olympian and major leaguer Bret Barberie.

Horton was a player on the Cerritos College teams in 1972 and 1973. As the Falcons' team captain in 1973, he won the Dallas Moon Award and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began as an assistant at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with former Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953. The Yorba Linda resident and his wife, Francie, have four daughters: Michele (23), Heather (19), Loyal (14) and Rebecca (12), and two granddaughters: Angelica (3) and Alyssa (1).



Dave Serrano, in his seventh season as Cal State Fullerton's pitching coach and recruiting coordinator, has quickly established himself as one of the top assistant coaches in the country. Baseball America has called Serrano the top assistant coach on the West Coast and tabbed him as a finalist in 2002 for national Assistant Coach of the Year.

His recruiting efforts have played a large part in Fullerton's ongoing success. Twice in the last three years, his recruiting classes have been ranked among the top two in the nation. This year's incoming class was tabbed second by both Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball and the 2001 class was ranked No. 1 by Collegiate Baseball. Since Serrano's arrival, each of the Titans' recruiting classes has ranked among the top 15 nationally.

During his watch at Fullerton, 16 pitchers have been drafted, and, already, four of his Fullerton products (Matt Wise, Adam Johnson, Brandon Duckworth and Kirk Saarloos) have reached the Majors. Serrano also coached a pair of future Major Leaguers on the 1996 Tennessee team in Mike Lincoln and R.A. Dickey.

Saarloos, a budding prospect for Houston, was named the SportsTicker Minor League Pitcher of the Year in 2002 and took the National League by storm, earning league Rookie of the Month honors in July.

Of the 14 Titans to earn All-American honors at Fullerton since Serrano's arrival in 1997, 10 have been pitchers. In 2001 alone, four Titan pitchers earned a total of 14 All-American citations, including Saarloos, who was a finalist for virtually every National Pitcher of the Year award. Serrano has also coached 17 all-conference hurlers, including three of the last five conference Pitchers of the Year (Benito Flores in 1998, Johnson in 2000 and Saarloos in 2001).

Serrano's staffs have led the conference in ERA in every season except 1999 (when Pacific's 4.29 ERA barely clipped Fullerton's 4.44 mark) and last year (when Long Beach was about a half-run better). The Titans have ranked among the nation's top-25 in ERA in each of the last three seasons (17th in 2000, 14th in 2001, 24th in 2002).

Serrano, 38, in eight years of coaching at the Division I level, has been to Omaha three times with two different programs. He was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator in 1995 and 1996 at

the University of Tennessee for Head Coach Rod Delmonico. He helped the Volunteers reach the College World Series in 1995, the first time they had visited Omaha in 44 years. At Fullerton in 1999, Serrano molded an assortment of question mark arms into an exclamation point staff that propelled Fullerton to its 10th Omaha bid.

Serrano has coached more than two dozen pitchers who are currently playing professional baseball. At Tennessee, he coached a pair of first-round draft picks in Dickey and Todd Helton, the latter of whom has blossomed into one of the best hitters in baseball after having also pitched at Tennessee.

This is Serrano's second go-around as an assistant to Horton. He worked with him at Cerritos College for three years (1988-90) before Horton moved to Fullerton in 1991 as an assistant to Augie Garrido.


Serrano remained at Cerritos through the 1994 season. In his seven-year tenure, Cerritos won a state championship (1989) and six conference titles, including 1991, when Serrano was the Falcons' head coach and earned South Coast Conference Coach of the Year honors.

Serrano graduated from Cerritos High School in 1982 and played two seasons at Cerritos College. In 1985, he went 12-1 and earned junior college All-American honors while helping the Falcons go 39-5 and win the state championship. Serrano then pitched for Cal State Fullerton in 1986, posting a 3-4 record with one save in 15 appearances.

He and his wife, Tracy, live in Buena Park with their sons, Kyle (7) and Zachary (5).




THE SERRANO FAMILY - Dave and Tracy with Kyle and Zachary



Rick Vanderhook is in his 17th season as an assistant coach for the Titans. He will again coach the outfielders and hitters, set the defense and handle third-base coaching duties. He is also a key evaluator of talent in the recruiting process and is the director of Titan Baseball Camps.

"Hook" has coached four first-round draft picks (Mike Harkey in 1987, Phil Nevin in 1992, Dante Powell in 1994 and Mark Kotsay in 1996) and a supplemental pick (Aaron Rowand in 1998) as well as 12 All-Americans since 1991.

As camp director, Vanderhook oversees all aspects of the Titan Baseball Academy, which help young players (7 to 17-years-

old) reach their top performance level. Among the graduates of Titan camps are former Titans Steve Chatham and Rowand and current Fullerton players Darric Merrell, Kyle Boyer, Jason Corapci and Dustin Miller.

Vanderhook, 40, first coached at Cal State Fullerton from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and began working with the hitters and defense a year later. In 15 seasons with the Titans as a player and a coach, Vanderhook has been to the College World Series seven times.

Vanderhook spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, the Matadors posted a 39-22 record and were the NCAA Division II runners-up. Vanderhook returned to Fullerton, along with Head Coach Augie Garrido, prior to the 1991

Vanderhook has coached some of the most explosive Titan offenses in the program's history. The 1999 Titans, who made the school's 10th College World Series appearance, set school records for single-season batting average (.338) and runs per game (9.2).

Vanderhook has also coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and helped the Goldpanners finish third in the nation in 1986.

A product of the prominent Cerritos College program where he

played for George Horton, Vanderhook originally came to Cal State Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans before becoming a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood High School under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles.


He currently resides in Yorba Linda with his wife, April, daughters Noelle (7) and Autumn (5), and son R.J., who will turn 3 in April.



THE VANDERHOOK FAMILY: Rick and April with (from left) Noelle, R.J. and Autumn.








Chad Baum is in his third season as the Titans' volunteer assistant coach after serving in a student assistant capacity in 2000.


Baum, who graduated from Cal State Fullerton with a degree in kinesiology in 2000, was a Titan team captain in 1998 and again in 1999, when Fullerton reached the College World Series. Baum appeared in 38 games over the two-year stretch and hit three home runs in just 44 at-bats. He was also reliable behind the plate, turning in a perfect 1.000 career fielding percentage (70 chances).

Prior to his pair of seasons in a Titan uniform, Baum spent a season each at Santa Ana College and Golden West College. Baum batted .306 in 1997 for the Dons, who were ranked No.1 in the country during most of the season. He was selected in the 42nd round of the 1997 draft by the San Francisco Giants.

Baum prepped for Coach Mike Najera at Canyon H.S. in Anaheim Hills and earned honorable-mention All-Century League honors. While at Canyon, Baum hit one of nine home runs that set a one-game CIF record for the Comanches.

Baum, 25, lives in Anaheim Hills.





Sergio Brown is in his first season as administrative assistant for the Titan baseball program.

The former Titan spent the last six seasons as an assistant coach at JC powerhouse Cypress College, where he coached under Scott Pickler. Brown, 29, helped Cypress to a California Community College state championship in 1999, while the Chargers finished as runner-up in 1996 and 1997.

Among Brown's products were infielder Keith Ginter, who earned All-American honors at Texas Tech, and outfielder Cory Sullivan, an All-American at Wake Forest. Brown also worked with several future pros including highly touted catcher Gerald Laird.

Brown played just one season at Cal State Fullerton, helping the Titans to their third national title in 1995. The Los Angeles native prepped at Mountain View H.S., where he earned All-CIF honors.

Brown, who holds a bachelor's degree in English from Fullerton and a masters in education from Azusa Pacific, owns his own valet parking business. He and his wife, Olivia, reside in Whittier with their 2-year-old son, Vincent.



No One's Keeping Quiet About Costa Anymore

The understanding among the Cal State Fullerton baseball team during Shane Costa's 22-game hitting streak last year was simple.

Don't say a word.

Shhhh!

"Everyone was hush-hush about it," teammate Richie Burgos remembers. "We didn't want to jinx it and all that stuff."

The streak reinforced the notion that this 6-1 left-handed hitting outfielder from Visalia was an offensive power. Even Head Coach George Horton remained silent to try and keep the phenomenon going.

"In our sport we're a little bit superstitious," Horton said. "So we didn't talk about it."

Costa put his faith in the powers beyond his control as well, by not changing his sliding pants for over a month while the streak lasted.

But all the silent treatment ended on April 26, 2002, before game one of a three-game battle for first place in the Big West against Cal State Northridge.

Bill Murphy, the Matadors' ace pitcher, confronted Costa during pre-game warm-ups.

"You just worry about going 0-for-4 today," Murphy smirked.

Costa grounded out to first, then flied out to center three times and the streak was dead.

"I was glad it was over," Costa remembers. "I was lucky. Stuff like that happens. Next year it will be something else. Baseball is a weird sport like that, you know. If I could get a hit in every game that would be awesome, but that would be un-human."

Costa's numbers at the end of the year were close to superhuman. He led the team with 85 hits and batted .365 with five home runs, 23 doubles, and 40 RBI's. He also was hit by a pitch more times (26) than he struck out (18).

"I want to do a little better than last year," said Costa who is entering his junior year. "But it's going to be hard to top those numbers. You can't do much better than hit .365."

It's what Horton, his teammates and the fans expect, since he was the team's most valuable player last year and was chosen as a second-team preseason All-American by Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball.

"With a bigger and smarter Shane Costa this year," Horton said, "who knows what levels he can reach."

With all eyes on him, the pressure might make a lesser player wilt, but Costa has proven he's at his best in clutch situations. He was named to the NCAA regional all-tournament teams in each of his first two years.

"Shane has always been able to handle whatever we as a coaching staff have thrown at him," Horton said. "He's an extremely tough kid. His parents did a good job in raising him."

Horton has appointed Costa a team leader this year, but it is a role Costa was reluctant to take at first.

"I try as hard as I can to lead by example and I'm trying a little bit harder to speak up more," Costa said. "But I have no problems taking on that role. It's easier now.

"Last year I felt like I was still only a sophomore, now I feel like it's more in my place to speak up."

With his serious expression and sometimes intimidating look, he might not have to say anything to get his point across.

"Some of the new guys are a little scared of him, but he loves everyone," Burgos said. "If you're on the team he loves you. That's how he is."

Opposing pitchers will never see that side of Costa. In fact, his mentality at the plate could be considered barbaric.

"I feel sorry for the pitcher," Costa said with a growl. "I'm going to hit the ball as hard as I possibly can. I just want to drive the ball down his throat."

Outside the batter's box and off the field, Costa exudes a more mellow personality.

"He likes to sleep a lot," said Burgos, who is also Costa's roommate. "You would think it would drag him but on game days he's the first one ready to go. I guess it gives him energy, whatever works."

It worked enough to earn him a spot on the USA National Team this past summer, along with teammates Chad Cordero and Wes Littleton.

The trip through Europe made him appreciate other cultures and taught him that sometimes what he considers normal may not be the case in other countries.

"In the Netherlands there's no ice," Costa said in amazement. "I don't know if they don't like it or if they haven't caught up with technology, but they don't have ice over there."

Costa didn't need ice to freeze the arms of pitchers he faced from around the world. He batted .275, sixth best on the team, and struck out only once in more than 90 at-bats.

"I like to be aggressive early," Costa said. "I love to swing at first-pitch fastballs. I hate striking out."

That's why he rarely hears the umpire call strike three. What he wants is to watch the same umpire wave his finger in a circular motion – the signal for home run – but that's something Costa knows might not happen much.

"I'm a line-drive hitter," Costa said. "I hit a lot of balls off the wall and in the gap. That's just my swing and how I've always been. I'm a gap hitter."

His current career batting average (.370) ranks with the best to ever put on a Titan uniform. Only Mark Kotsay, Tim Wallach, Andre David and Brent Mayne sit above him.

"He has put himself in a position to have a career after Cal State Fullerton," Horton said. "This is a draft year and it will put extra pressure on him to perform, but I think it will bring out the best in him."

The one thing Costa admits he needs to improve on before he reaches the next level is his defense, especially his throwing arm.

But being tagged the best left fielder during the FISU World University Baseball Championship tournament in Sicily didn't hurt his confidence.

"I'm the best left fielder in the world," Costa said with a laugh.

And that's nothing to keep quiet about.



Littleton Not About to Be Left Behind Again

On an early Wednesday morning in June, 2001, players from the Cal State Fullerton baseball team boarded a plane headed for Omaha and the College World Series.

The team excitedly awaited takeoff to the mecca of every collegiate baseball player.

But right-handed pitcher Wes Littleton, a freshman at the time, wasn't on the flight.

He missed it, but not by accident or because he was late. Littleton missed the flight because he wasn't supposed to be on it.

The team's coaching staff decided he would stay behind. And while teammates Chad Cordero and Darric Merrell enjoyed the feeling of pitching in their first CWS as freshmen, Littleton was at home – sulking.

"I was mad," he said. "But you can't get mad at the coaches' decision."

A decision that made him one of 10 players not selected to the 2001 traveling roster.

And instead of cheering for his team from the bench, he would witness their run for the championship on television, just like he did back in 1995 as a 12-year-old.

At that age, he made up his mind to attend CSF, because he always dreamed about the College World Series, and he knew playing for the Titans would give him the opportunity.

But even as a member of the team, with his dream so close, it was still out of his reach; it was still just a dream. Littleton vowed this wouldn't happen again. He would assure himself that if the Titans made the CWS again, he would not be looked over.

With the whole summer and the fall to prepare, he dug up old tape of his high-school days. He studied his technique and noticed how his mechanics and windup had changed. Littleton realized he had steered away from the form that landed him a spot on the Titans' roster.

He had strayed from the technique that earned him three varsity letters at Vista High School and a selection by the Montreal Expos in the seventh round of the 2000 MLB draft.

So he made an adjustment, a slight fix. He would go back to his old pitching style and try not to tense up.

In his sophomore season, Littleton, without the early recognition his counterparts Cordero and Merrell received, started to win.

"I was surprised how I turned it around," Littleton said. "It was like I was a new person."

It took one game for the "new" person to emerge because his first trip to the mound in 2002 started a little rough. On Feb. 1, at Stanford, the Titans faced the Cardinal in a rivalry that has been recently dominated by the team rom up north.

It was the Cardinal who eliminated the Titans from the World Series in 2001.

Now it was the Cardinal, again, in the first game of the season and Littleton, although with a year of experience, was still virtually a rookie.

Chris O'Riordan and Sam Fuld exposed it when they opened the bottom of the first inning with back-to-back singles off Littleton. Then he gave up a blast to Carlos Quentin that bounced off the scoreboard in left field. After that, Littleton allowed two RBI-singles and an RBI double giving the Cardinal a 7-2 lead and sending him to the showers.

"I was nervous," Littleton recalled. "Real nervous."

But in his very next start, all that nervousness was gone.

His masterful performance in the home opener against Fresno State, which lasted a mere two hours, made some people begin to raise their eyebrows with curiosity and ask "Who is this kid?"

Not even Littleton was prepared for the ride he was about to embark on, and he remained somewhat boggled.

"I was shocked with the success I was having," Littleton said. "I couldn't understand why it hadn't been that way my freshman year."

Maybe it had something to do with the energetic beats of rap artists Busta Rhymes and Jay-Z bouncing off the walls from the locker room sound system before games – something Littleton says he does to get his adrenaline pumping. It's a ritual he probably performed prior to the Long Beach State game on March 22 where his accuracy was deadly.

Littleton said it was the best outing of his career, and the numbers back it up.

He recorded his first career shutout and complete game, in a 6-0 win, that sparked a sweep of the 49ers for the first time since 1998.

Littleton retired the final five batters of the game and recorded the final two outs by way of strikeout.

Catcher P.J. Pilittere knows him best, since he caught Littleton all season long.

"When he's in the zone, his fastball has life to it," he said. "It's fun to catch him. That's why he's our guy."

When all was said and done, Littleton's 2.40 ERA was the best in the conference and among the top 10 in the nation for pitchers with 100 or more innings.

"I'm a control guy, but sometimes I can blow people away," Littleton said.

Using his fastball to get ahead of a batter, Littleton then sets them up for the slider.

"That is my strike-out pitch," he said.

Looking back on the decision to keep Littleton off the CWS roster, pitching coach Dave Serrano wishes he could take it back.

"In retrospect, if I had to do it all over again knowing where he's at today, I would have for sure taken him just for him to get that experience," Serrano said.

Even though no one saw his phenomenal sophomore season coming, Serrano knew Littleton possessed the skill necessary to excel.

"I don't think [Littleton's season] was a surprise," Serrano said. "He has a feel for pitching and is just a winner-type guy. The potential is there not just for now but for the future."

And if Littleton has his way, the future will include a plane ticket to Omaha with his name on it.

BEST IN THE WES(T): Sophomore righthander Wes Littleton developed into one of the top starting pitchers in the nation with a turnaround sophomore campaign. After posting a 7.68 ERA in 36.1 innings as a true freshman, the sophomore was 9-4 with a 2.40 ERA that ranked first in the Big West Conference and among the top 10 in the nation for pitchers with 100-plus innings. While he wasn't overpowering (his strikeouts per nine innings average was down from 8.7 in 2001 to 5.9 last year), opponents batted just .237 against Littleton. He was the sole Titan to earn All-American honors with Baseball America tabbing him to its third team.

STREAKING: Shane Costa's 22-game hitting streak (the longest since Spencer Oborn hit safely in 37 consecutive games in 1999) was snapped against Cal State Northridge on Apr. 26 when he went 0-for-4, but he still hit safely in 35 of his last 40 games. Costa, who had 27 multi-hit games (including 11 with three or more), finished among the top 10 in the Big West Conference in 10 offensive categories. He was a three-time Big West Player of the Week and earned NCBWA National Hitter of the Week accolades after a dominant weekend performance against Long Beach State in March. Costa also became just the fourth Titan to hit 20 doubles and five triples in one season (the others are Kirk Bates in 1984, Mark Kotsay in 1995 and Spencer Oborn in

THE OLD COLLEGE TRY: Senior righthander Jordan DeJong (11-3, 4.00 ERA) was stellar for the Titans, but it almost never came to be. DeJong pitched in 1998-99 for the Titans before transferring to Tennessee for the 2000 season. After a somewhat disappointing year with the Volunteers, DeJong returned to Fullerton...but only as a student. It wasn't until a chance encounter with pitching coach Dave Serrano that DeJong decided to give the diamond one more try. All parties involved were glad he did: DeJong was among the Big West leaders in wins, ERA and opponents' batting average (.250). DeJong, who finished with a 16-4 record in a Titan uniform, was at his best against the Pac-10. He was 3-0 (with two wins over USC and another over ASU) and also earned Big West Pitcher of the Week honors after two exceptional outings at Stanford in the season-opening series.

BETTER SCORE EARLY: Fullerton had won 84 consecutive games when it took the lead into the ninth inning before succumbing to Stanford in a 13-inning affair in the regional opener. The impressive streak could be largely attributed to All-American closer Chad Cordero, who paced the Big West Conference in saves (12) for the second consecutive season. Cordero struck out 81 and walked just 20 in 55.2 innings. His strikeouts per nine innings ratio of 13.1 would have tied him for

▼ Titans' Season a Tale of Unexpected Performances

If you had told **Coach Horton** that one of his returning All-American pitchers would post an ERA of 6.16 and his two most-tenured position players would be last on the Titans in hitting, he might have scheduled a vacation for the first week in June. But the emergence of some new– and not so new faces – fueled the Titans' run to their 11th consecutive NCAA appearance.

By Titan standards, the 2002 campaign was less than successful (fourth place finish and one postseason win), but Fullerton still rolled to a 37-22 record and did extend its string of postseason appearances.

As usual, the season opened with the Titans squaring off against nemesis Stanford. **Wes Littleton's** first-inning jitters – he gave up a two-out three-run homer to Carlos Quentin – helped Stanford build an early lead it would not relinquish in the season opener. Less than 24 hours later, the consensus No. 1 Cardinal dealt the Titans a 17-1 thrashing, Fullerton's worst-ever loss. But **Darric Merrell**, **Jordan DeJong** and **Chad Cordero** pitched the Titans to a 6-3 win in the finale to avert the sweep.

The Titans returned home from Palo Alto to welcome former Big West mate Fresno State for the season-opening series at Goodwin Field. Littleton gave the Titans their first glimpse at what was to come when he beat the Bulldogs, 3-0, in the opener, coming one out away from the shutout. But with Littleton's fortunes heading north, Merrell's began taking a turn for the worse. He was hit hard in his second start of the season, and was saved only because **Mike Martinez's** career day (two-homers, eight RBI day) sent the Titans to a 17-11 win. The Titans' six errors in the finale translated into a 10-4 loss and sent the Titans back to 500.

A dominating sweep of UNLV (the Titans outscored the Rebels, 41-4) and an exciting win at LMU – with the Titans coming up with three ninth-inning runs for a 7-6 victory – gave the Titans a four-game winning streak heading into a key series against Arizona State at Mesa's Hohokam Stadium. Littleton's dominance in the opener led to the Sun Devils' first home loss in eight games. Arizona State rebounded for a 9-4 win in a Saturday game that saw both Coach Horton and **Kyle Boyer** ejected, but the Titans overcame an early 4-0 deficit on Sunday to capture the series. Cordero would earn Big West Pitcher of the Week honors for notching a pair of saves against ASU after picking up the win in the LMU game.

The Titans joined defending CWS champ Miami, Houston and USC – all ranked in the top 25 – for the third annual Kia Bash in early March. The Cougars surprised just about everyone, sweeping through the field while each of the other teams lost two of three. Fullerton's only win came in the fashion of an 8-1 win over a slumping Trojan team, thanks to DeJong's second career complete game which earned him tournament co-Most Outstanding Pitcher honors.

▼ Titans Take a Tour in Winter Wonderland

Fullerton, now ranked 13th, packed the cold-weather gear for its first trip to No. 9 Wichita State since the 1996 NCAA Midwest Regional. The series opener proved to be perhaps the Titans' most disappointing regular-season loss of the season. Fullerton got another stellar outing from Littleton, but couldn't capitalize on six Wichita State errors, stranded 17 runners, and had a bases-loaded inning-ending double play and a botched suicide squeeze – both in extra innings – as the Shockers ended the 15-inning affair on Drew Moffitt's mammoth blast off **Travis Esquibel**. The Titans arrived at Eck Stadium Saturday morning to find temperatures in the mid-20s, but **Nick Fitzgerald** was red-hot, lifting the Titans to a convincing win with a pair of homers. The Shockers won the rubber match on Sunday, however, lighting up DeJong for his first loss of the season.

The wintry weather tour continued for the Titans a week later when they journeyed to Reno to take on their former Big West foes. Fullerton held a narrow lead in the fifth inning of the series opener when snow forced suspension of the game. When the teams suited up a



Fullerton finally returned to sunshine and promptly began playing its best baseball of the season,

winning 16 of its next 19 games. The streak was kickstarted by a nonconference sweep at Goodwin Field of archrival Long Beach State, the first home sweep of the 49ers in 11 years. Littleton notched

his first shutout in the opener and the Titans held on for a couple of one-run wins to finish the job. **Shane Costa's** 8for-12 showing over the weekend, which included a double, triple, homer and five RBI, was enough for NCBWA National Hitter of the Week accolades.

As usual, the Titans opened the Big West schedule with

a flurry, winning 10 of their first 12 conference games. The Titans held a one-game lead over Cal State Northridge when the Matadors came into town for a pivotal series in mid-April.

Littleton and Northridge's Bill Murphy put on an exciting duel in the opener. The game's only runs came in the first inning: each team hit a home run, but the Matadors' came with a runner on and propelled Northridge to a 2-1 win and into a first-place tie with the Titans. Murphy not only got the win, but also snapped Costa's 22-game hitting streak, the longest by a Titan in three years. On Saturday, Jason Allec's three-run homer off Cordero highlighted a four-run 10th inning for the Matadors, who held on for an 8-6 win. And on Sunday, the Matadors took all the drama out early when they grabbed a 7-1 lead through two innings, coasting to a 12-3 win, and more surprisingly, the first sweep of the Titans at Goodwin Field since

Now playing catch-up to the Matadors, the Titans traveled to Irvine to visit their revived Orange County rivals at brand new Anteater Ballpark. The Titans were hoping for a sweep to keep ground with Northridge, but John Savage's squad took the middle game of the set to push the Titans three games back of the Matadors with just six Big West games left on their

Fullerton took two out of three again the next weekend, at home against UC Riverside, and for a while on Sunday it looked like the Titans might move back into a first-place tie. But Cordero blew his third save of the season and Northridge came from behind to avert a Long Beach sweep and all of a sudden, Fullerton was two games back again with just the series at Blair Field remaining.

With a bye weekend ahead, the Titans focused on a pair of Pac-10 teams. First Fullerton traveled to USC for what turned out to be another close contest between the two powers. Littleton got his first midweek start and was in line for his 10th win before Cordero's blown save forced extra innings. Instead, it was DeJong getting his 10th win when David Fischer's 11th-inning home run lifted the Titans to a 2-1 win.

A week late, Fullerton dispatched of UCLA...twice. After replaying the ninth inning of a Apr. 23 Titan win successfully protested by UCLA and winning, 7-6, the Titans beat the Bruins, 11-4, in the regularly scheduled game.

With a decent bit of momentum - and some needed rest - on their side, the Titans headed to Long Beach with hopes for a strong finish to sway the NCAA Baseball Committee into granting Fullerton a home regional. As it turned out, the Titans would need help getting into the tournament after a debacle at Blair Field. The 49ers answered the Titans' midseason sweep with one of their own...but this one with far more important conference and NCAA tournament implications. In fact, when the dust settled, the Titans - who blew late leads in the last two games of the Long Beach series - found themselves tied for fourth with UC Irvine and hoping their overall record (36-20) and strength of schedule would keep alive their streak of 10 consecutive postseason berths.

Monday morning's seeding announcements provided some bitter, albeit relieving, news: the Titans were in the tournament, but they were headed back to Stanford as the No. 4 seed, prompting Baseball America's John Manuel to label the Titans the best fourth-seed in NCAA history. The bracket, which also included conference foe Long Beach State and nationally ranked San Jose State, became the "poster regional" for the national controversy surrounding the NCAA's new policies: the committee was instructed to keep teams within 400 miles of their home base and award national seeds and host sites not on the merit of the teams, but on the geography of their location.

In any case, Coach Horton's troops knew their hopes of a second consecutive College World Series appearance ran through postseason nemesis Stanford and red-hot Long Beach

State. The Cardinal and Titans put on a show for the ages in the regional opener. Littleton actually outdueled Jeremy Guthrie - a first-round draft pick following the season - and nursed a 1-0 lead through seven innings and a 2-1 lead through eight. But Stanford rallied to tie the score in the ninth and Guthrie threw 144 pitches and lasted all 13 innings as the Cardinal finally scored on a Scott Dragicevich single in the bottom of the frame

The Titans came back on short rest to stave off elimination and beat San Jose State, 9-1. This time, it was DeJong who went the distance to keep some ammunition in the Titans' bullpen. But as it turned out, the bullpen never became a factor. Merrell, who started the Titans' second game of the day against Long Beach, gave up a three-run homer to Jeremy Reed and freshman Jered Weaver was brilliant as the 49ers beat the Titans for the fourth time in nine days, handing them their first shutout in 118 games and ending their sea-

second in the nation if he had enough innings to qualify (he was just 3.1 innings shy). Cordero was named one of 40 semifinalists for the Dick Howser Trophy, presented annually by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association to the best collegiate baseball player.

OUT OF THE GATES: Fullerton was the early aggressor in 2002, scoring 73 runs in the first inning (17 more than any other inning). Eleven times, the Titans tallied four runs or more in the first inning and they were retired in order in the first only eight times. Collectively, the Titans batted .365 in the first inning. The importance? Fullerton was 24-7 when it scored first.

POWER OUTAGE: Fullerton finished the season with just 40 home runs - the program's lowest power output since 1976. The Titans also did not have a player hit more than five home runs (Geoff Comfort, Chris Stringfellow and David Fischer hit five apiece). Prior to last year, the Titans have had at least one player with nine home runs every season since 1976.

NEW LEATHER?: The Titans' defense which looked to be a major concern early on - turned things around down the stretch. Over their final 14 games, the Titans made more than one error just once while fielding at a .984 clip. During one stretch in May, Fullerton went 42 consecutive innings without an error. Overall, the Titans finished with a fielding percentage of .966, the 32nd-best mark in the country.

RED, WHITE & BLUE: Chad Cordero, Shane Costa and Wes Littleton were all selected to play for the US National Team in the summer of 2002 after stellar sophomore seasons. Their success continued over the summer...Cordero did not allow an earned run in 17.1 innings, Littleton had a 2.70 ERA and Costa was named the best left fielder in the FISU World University Baseball Championship tournament.

ALUMS SPEAK OUT: It was an exciting, though literally sobering moment for the Titans before their Feb. 23 game against Arizona State at Mesa's Hohokam Stadium. Former Titan Golden Spikes Award winners Phil Nevin and Mark Kotsay and their San Diego Padre teammates Kevin Jarvis and Trevor Hoffman stopped by to talk to the Titans about the dangers of drunken driving. They recently had to bury a teammate — Mike Darr — who died in an at-fault drunken driving accident in early February. Each of the athletes seemed shaken, especially Nevin, who told the team, "Every time I see a highlight tape, every time I walk into our clubhouse, every time I take the field, I will see Mike Darr." Sadly enough, one of Darr's passengers who also died was Duane Johnson. the son of former Titan football assistant coach Don Johnson.

IS THAT A MISPRINT?: The Titans' thirdplace regional showing left them unranked in the final Baseball America poll, marking the first time since March 9, 1998 that the North Carolina-based publication left them out of a poll. Fullerton also dropped out of the final Baseball Weekly/ESPN Coaches poll, though the Titans did check in at 28th in Collegiate Baseball's season-ending poll.




▼ In the Beginning

1964 thru 1974

Titan baseball began in the most modest of fashions as a club team in 1964. The founding father was University physical plant employee Beryl Kempton, who carved a diamond out of an orange grove, literally establishing the foundation for what has become arguably the most successful facet of a University now in its fifth decade and educating more than 30,000 students each semester.

Home plate of the first diamond was located near an old orchard residence, the John Hetebrink House built in 1886, which has served a variety of functions for the campus and now houses athletic department offices. The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive.

The first coach was Warren Beck, a physical education faculty member who gave way to Bill Fulton when the team assumed intercollegiate status in 1965. The Titans played at the College Division as members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association along with Cal Poly SLO, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona. The Titans had limited resources and were competitive at best until the arrival for the 1973 season of Coach Augie Garrido from Cal Poly SLO.

Garrido's Titans made an instant splash in 1975 as a little fish in the biggest pond. They captured the Pacific Coast Athletic Association championship and then served notice by snapping USC's string of five consecutive national titles by winning their first NCAA regional tournament at Dedeaux Field. They earned their first trip to the College World Series where they were quickly eliminated by losses to Arizona State and Oklahoma. Pitcher Dan Boone, catcher Andy Pasillas and first baseman George Horton were key players that year and initiated a pipeline into the fertile California junior college ranks.

The Titans were dominant in the regular season for nine more years, running their string of conference championships to 11 in a row. They won the PCAA in 1976 and won every Southern California Baseball Association pennant through its 1977 to 1984 run. And in the postseason they proved their mettle against regional and national competition despite always playing on the road.



In 1976 they took Washington State to a final Tim Wallach game in Pullman and in 1977 they lost to the Cougars again in Tempe. USC and Arizona were their nemesis in 1978 in Los Angeles but the Titans struck paydirt in 1979 in Fresno. After an opening loss to UCLA, they came back to beat Portland and Fresno State before sweeping a Sunday doubleheader with the Bruins to earn a return trip to Omaha. There they repeated the championship formula, falling immediately into the losers' bracket with a loss to Mississippi State before rolling through Connecticut, Arizona, Arkansas, Pepperdine

and Arkansas again to win the first NCAA Div. I men's championship in school history. First baseman Tim Wallach was the College Player of the Year, pitcher Tony Hudson was the MVP of the CWS and Dave Weatherman hurled a complete-game 2-1 victory in the championship game on no day's rest.

The Titans would return to Omaha twice more in the next five years and it would have been more but for the strength of the western region in that era. In 1980 they went to the Tucson regional and Arizona went on to win the national title. In 1981 they went to Tempe and were ousted by the Sun Devils, the eventual national champs. Behind the play of Mike Rubel, Mark Pirruccello and freshman John Fishel, the Titans went through powerful Arizona State in Packard Stadium in 1982 to get back to the World Series, which was now being televised nationwide on the new ESPN network. Unfortunately, the Titans left their game in Tempe and became the first CWS team to go scoreless in losses to Wichita State and Maine.

In 1983 the Titans were sent to Tempe for the third consecutive year and they were eliminated by Fresno State. But the Bulldogs had to sit and watch the next year as Fullerton won the 1984 regional over Mark McGwire's USC team and Chris Gwynn's San Diego State squad

in well over 100-degree weather in Fresno. John Bryant's single in the 11th inning of the finale scored Bob Caffrey and the 8-7 win over the Aztecs sent Fullerton to Omaha for the fourth time in its 10 years of Div. I competition.

Bryant was a hero again in Omaha. After beating Michigan, Miami, Arizona State and Oklahoma State, the Titans used Bryant's triple for a 2-run rally that was the difference in a memorable 3-1 victory over Texas and gave the Titans their second NCAA championship. The Titans won 37 of their last 42 games. Fishel was the series MVP but 5-foot-7, 133-pound lefthander Eddie Delzer captured the headlines in Sports Illustrated with his courageous 7-inning mound effort to get the win that was preserved by Scott Wright with his NCAA record 22nd save. Caffrey would go on to become the first Titan Olympian and join Wallach as a first-round draft choice, also by Montreal.

A Couple of Blips on the Radar

1985 thru 1987

The Titans returned a solid nucleus for **1985** and ended up with a roster that featured seven players who would eventually play in the major leagues. But they failed to win the conference championship and the string of consecutive NCAA playoff appearances was snapped at 10 when they lost a PCAA playoff series at Fresno State and did not get an at-large berth with a 36-32-1 record.

The **1986** team wasn't much better, posting a 36-21 record that again left Fullerton out of the top spot in the standings and out of the NCAA Tourney. The **1987** team restored order with a 42-15 regular season record and an 18-3 PCAA championship mark. But the Titans stumbled in the post-season when sent out of the West for the first time. In New Orleans, they lost an improbable opening game to Southern and converted reliever Allan Ratliff in a 1-0 game in which the defensively-suspect Southern infielders had no chances. Mike Harkey and Larry Casian tossed shutouts to give Longo Garcia another start, vs. LSU. But the unlucky Garcia lost again, this time victimized by his fielder's mitt coming apart on what should have been a routine comebacker.

When Garrido left to accept a lucrative offer from University of Illinois Athletic Director Neale Stoner, who had hired him at Fullerton 15 years earlier, it appeared the Titans' national prominence was waning.

▼ Cochell Does Even Better

1988 thru 1990

Well-traveled Larry Cochell replaced Garrido and a different style and approach still produced success similar to what Garrido had manufactured. The Titans won a pair of regional tournaments in unlikely spots - Mississippi State and Texas - to earn Fullerton its fifth and sixth trips to Omaha in Cochell's 3-year term.

The **1988** team looked like it might be a team of destiny. After a 5-6 start, Garrido's players adapted to the Cochell style. Despite a late-season slump after a 30-5 run, they ventured to Starkville for the NCAA playoffs. With reliever Paul Johnson turning in a clutch performance, the Titans twice beat the host Bulldogs and then posted a 5-run ninth inning capped by a two-out, three-run home run by Mike

Ross to beat top-seeded Texas A&M. In Omaha, they took control of the revamped format with wins over Miami and Stanford behind Garcia and Mark Beck. But the Cardinal came back to beat both Titan aces on their way to the NCAA title.

Despite the presence of a pair of All-Americans in Brent Mayne and David Staton, the **1989** Titans struggled all year and finished at 30-27 for their worst Division I record ever. They finished in the second division of the standings at 10-11.

The **1990** team was picked to finish fifth in the renamed Big West Conference. When they began the year 9-9 there were stories printed that the Titan dynasty was over. It was still only a 18-16 team until back-to-back sweeps of Fresno State and UNLV sparked a 14-5 finish and a 13-5 record good enough to win the Big West and an NCAA berth. Behind two solid starts by righthander James Popoff, the Titans went 4-0 at the Austin regional, beating Texas twice. In Omaha, the Titans were stunned twice. They lost to Oklahoma State in a game that saw outfielder Rich Gonzales carried off the field after crashing into the steel wall in left field. And they lost in extra innings to The Citadel when a catcher took the mound and shut down a Titan rally.

▼ If You Build It, He Will Come...Back 1991 thru 1996

Cochell accepted a lucrative financial offer to go to Oklahoma and, with construction of a new field underway, Garrido returned from Illinois to launch the Titans' most successful decade yet. *Baseball America* would rank the program No. 3 for the decade behind only LSU and Miami.

It started in bitter disappointment. The **1991** team won 10 of its last 12 games to post a 34-22 record that the Titans thought was sufficient to earn an at-large NCAA berth considering the circumstances of Garrido's late return, the strength of schedule, playing at Amerige Park downtown and the strong finish. The team would have gotten the Big West's automatic bid as a Big West tri-champion, but Long Beach State lost its season finale to Pacific, leaving a 2-way tie with Fresno State that worked to the Bulldogs' advantage. An at-large berth was not forthcoming (the third-place 49ers got one) and Fullerton was left to focus its frustration on the **1992** oppositon.

Led by juniors Phil Nevin and Jason Moler, the Titans christened their long-awaited new stadium with a return to the national championship game. An overpowering performance at Baton Rouge – they outscored the opposition 35-3 – earned the Titans their seventh trip to Omaha. They beat Florida State twice and Miami two out of three times, the last time in a heavy rain shower, to get a shot at unbeaten and well-rested Pepperdine. Two schools located about 50 miles apart put on a classic show almost 2,000 miles away for a national CBS televison audience with the Waves winning, 3-2, thanks to the pitch-

ing of Patrick Ahearne, a home run by light-hitting shortstop Eric Ekdahl and a brilliant eighth-inning play by second baseman Steve Rodriguez. Nevin nevertheless earned MVP honors after being selected college Player of the Year. His also was the first name selected in the prodraft a week earlier. Both he and Moler were selected to the U.S. Olympic team and Nevin joined Wallach as a Golden Spikes Award winner.

The **1993** team couldn't overcome the losses to graduation and the pro draft. The Titans placed second in the Big West and twice lost to USC, whom they had beaten twice in the regular season, to be eliminated from the NCAA Regional in Austin and finish 35-19. It would turn out to be the only year Fullerton High School product D. C. Olsen would miss a trip to Omaha in four years in a Titan uniform.

In 1994, Fullerton staged an early season Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic and it would be a preview of that season's College World Series. The Titans beat San Diego, Oklahoma and Georgia Tech in February and all but USD would be reunited in Omaha. Fullerton

Georgia Tech, with a quartet of future major leaguers – Brad Rigby, Nomar Garciaparra, Jason Varitek and Jay Payton – beat the weary Titans and Mike Parisi in the CWS opener, 2-0. Fullerton then pounded LSU for 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory and freshman Mark Kotsay drove in seven runs in a 10-3 win that eliminated Florida State and set up a rematch with the Yellowjackets. This one went extra innings with Garciaparra's home run the difference when the Titans couldn't score Dante Powell from third base with no outs in the bottom of the 12th and had to settle for third place.

A year later, the Titans were not denied as they compiled perhaps the best college season of all time. With Olympians Kotsay and Brian Loyd and future major leaguer Jeremy Giambi pacing the offense and Ted Silva and Kotsay anchoring the pitching staff, Fullerton went virtually wire to wire as the No. 1 team in the nation. They won everything in their reach - the Hilton Classic with Olsen the MVP; the Big West regular season; the Big West Tournament with Loyd the MVP; the regional at LSU with Jack Jones the MVP and the CWS behind MVP Kotsay. They won their final 18 games to

finish 57-9 and become the first No. 1 seed at Omaha to win the title. Kotsay won Fullerton's third Golden Spikes Award after batting a then school-record .422 with 21 homers and 90 RBI. To this day, Kotsay holds College World Series career records for batting average and slugging percentage.

The momentum continued into 1996. The Titans opened the year with a 38-4 record before hitting an inexplicable slump where they lost 12 of their final 19 games. Fullerton tumbled to fourth place in the Big West and was eliminated from the BWC tourney at home by UNLV, but still got an NCAA berth at Wichita State. Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine RBI in a rout of Delaware and a victory over Rice set up a showdown with the host Shockers. Wichita State got a great pitching performance from tourney MVP Brandon Baird and Rice ended the Titans' season and Kotsav and Loyd's collegiate careers with a come-frombehind 13-10 decision. As part of its millenium edition, Baseball America selected Kotsay the college player of the decade.

earned its eighth trip with a dramatic regional victory at Oklahoma State. The Titans had to beat Memphis in oppressive afternoon heat and humidity and then come back at night and beat a rested Cowboy team on its home field. A ninth-inning, 2-out pinch-hit single by Brian King tied the game and Robert Matos was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to win it in the tenth.

▼ And the Beat Goes On

1997 thru 2002

Garrido left again for greener pastures, this time the historical program at Texas. His former

first baseman and associate head coach for six years, George Horton, took over. Again, the program marched forward.

The **1997** team won 11 of its last 13 regular season games and then bounced back from an opening game loss to win the Big West Tournament, sweeping Long Beach State at Blair Field for an automatic NCAA bid. Good pitching and an aborted ninth-inning rally

2001

knocked the Titans out of the regional at Stanford. The 1998 squad reversed the pattern, winning the Big West regular season title but losing the tournament at home to Long Beach. They got sent to

Baton Rouge for the third time in the decade and won two games before taking a big lead over the host Tigers behind pitching ace Benito Flores. But LSU flexed its muscles and came back to beat Fullerton twice.

The most productive Titan offense ever - .338 batting average and 9.2 runs per game - carried Cal State Fullerton back to Omaha in 1999. Again, the Titans advanced via the road, winning the regional at Notre Dame and capturing the super regional at Ohio State. But the

bats went quiet in Fullerton's 10th trip to Omaha, where they shared in the 50th Anniversary celebration. The Titans sandwiched a win over Texas A&M between losses to Stanford and Florida State en route to a fifth-place finish.

The Titans' 38 wins in 2000 marked their fewest since the 1993 campaign, but they still captured a share of the BWC championship. The season also marked the start of a \$3 million renovation to the Titans' facility, which saw its official name changed to Goodwin Field. With the complex's increased seating capacity, Fullerton finally was named to host an NCAA regional after 22 on the road, but the second-seeded Titans couldn't get by red-hot USC. Adam Johnson was named BWC Pitcher of the Year after leading the nation in strikeouts and he was selected second overall in the MLB Draft.

After a sluggish start, the 2001 Titans traveled to Miami and became the first team ever to sweep the eventual national champion Hurricanes on their home turf at Mark Light Stadium. The sweep was the highlight in a stretch that saw the Titans go 24-1 and claim the No. 1 spot in the nation in one poll. Fullerton, seeded first in the nation for postseason play, won a regional and super regional at Goodwin Field to clinch a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time. After beating sentimental favorite Nebraska in the CWS opener, Fullerton ran into Stanford, which beat the Titans twice, though Fullerton was able to sandwich in a win over Tulane. Senior Kirk Saarloos, who pitched the third no-hitter in Titan history, led a quartet of All-American pitchers.

The 2002 Titans thrived on pitching as usual, but Fullerton's offense was anemic more often than not. No Titan hit more than five home runs and the team total of 40 was the fewest since 1976. Despite fading down the stretch to finish tied for fourth in the conference, Fullerton earned its 11th consecutive NCAA berth. The Titans lost to Stanford and All-American Jeremy Guthrie - who earned a 13-inning complete-game win - in the regional opener, came back to beat San Jose State, but were ousted by Long Beach State, whom they met for the first time in NCAA postseason play. Wes Littleton was the only Titan to earn All-American honors, though Chad Cordero was again brilliant in the closer role, pacing the conference with 12 saves.

- Cal State Fullerton won national championships in 1979, 1984 and 1995. Its most recent championship capped off a 57-9 season where the Titans finished the 1995 campaign with an 18-game winning streak. They became the first No, 1 seed to win the national title since seeding began in 1988 and the 14th team to advance through the NCAA Regionals and College World Series without a loss.
- Cal State Fullerton is one of only three schools (Arizona State and Florida State are the others) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given annually by USA Baseball to the top amateur player in the nation. The Titans who won the award were Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995).
- Cal State Fullerton was recently named as the No. 3 collegiate supplier to Team USA, behind only Stanford and Miami. Wes Littleton, Shane Costa and Chad Cordero were all members of Team USA last summer. Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd joined three other Titans who have been members of Olympic teams (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992).
- Thirty-six Titans have gone on to play Major League Baseball. The most recent rookie was Kirk Saarloos, who was named the 2002 Minor League Pitcher of the Year and also earned National League Rookie of the Month honors last July for Houston.
- Cal State Fullerton is 90-50 (.643) in NCAA postseason play and is ranked in the top five all-time in winning percentage for teams that have played more than 100 postseason games.
- No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won 10 Regional titles and one Super Regional title on the road. In 2001, the Titans clinched a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time.
- In 28 years at the Division I level, the Titans have made it to the NCAA Tournament 24 times. Their current streak of 11 consecutive NCAA appearances is the fifth longest active streak in the nation.
- Adam Johnson became the eighth Titan to be selected in the first round of the Major League Baseball draft when Minnesota selected him second overall in June, 2000. Other Titans selected in the first round: Mark Kotsay (Florida, 1996), Tim Wallach (Montreal, 1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal, 1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs, 1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City, 1988), Phil Nevin (Houston, 1992) and Dante Powell (San Francisco, 1994).
- Cal State Fullerton has had 51 All-Americans and 129 first-team allconference selections in its 28-year Division I history. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.

■ The Titans have never had a losing season in the 28-year history of the program at the Division I level and have never gone winless NCAA postseason tournament appearances.







Cal State Fullerton's baseball program ranked third in a recent USA Baseball study that indentified the top 50 collegiate baseball programs in terms of representation on USA Baseball National Teams since 1984.

The Titans' program tallied 38 points, trailing only Stanford (65 points) and Miami (41 points). Points were awarded in three categories: total number of players to play for Team USA, number of years participated by those players and number of years with a representative on the team.

Fullerton has had 12 players make 15 appearances in 11 different seasons. Current Titans Wes Littleton, Chad Cordero and Shane Costa all wore the Red, White and Blue last summer, making up nearly one-seventh of the national team.

Other Titans to play for Team USA since 1984 were Bob Caffrey, Longo Garcia, Phil Nevin, Mark Kotsay, Brian Loyd, Dante Powell, Ted Silva, Ryan Owens and Kirk Saarloos.

- Phil Nevin was one of just five players in the National League in 2001 to hit .300 or better with at least 40 homers and 100 RBI. The others were Barry Bonds, Sammy Sosa, Todd Helton and Luis Gonzalez.
- Adam Johnson, the second pick in the 2000 draft, was also the second player from that draft class to appear in the Majors. He struck out Mark McGwire in his debut against St. Louis on July 16, 2001.
- Kirk Saarloos, the 2002 SportsTicker Minor League Pitcher of the Year, was named the National League Rookie of the Month in July, 2002 when he went 3-0 with a 1.77 ERA for Houston.





▼ One for the ages...

Mike Rouse banged out five hits - including two homers - and scored five runs in a 28-0 win over Pacific on April 8, 2001, but his feats almost went unnoticed. Instead, the spotlight was on Kirk Saarloos, who threw the third no-hitter in Cal State Fullerton history. The Titans' 28 runs marked their third highest total ever and their most in the 10-year history of Goodwin Field. It also surpassed the Titans' 19-0 win over UNLV in 2000 as the most lopsided shutout in program history. In fact, the Titan coaching staff had thoughts about lifting Saarloos after the Titans grabbed a 24-0 lead in the fifth inning. But perhaps the staff saw destiny at work and Saarloos certainly took advantage of the opportunity. He allowed just two base runners, retired 22 batters over one stretch and wrapped things up in 2:41, despite the Titans' offensive onslaught.







- Dan Boone...No. 12...LHP...1975-76...A member of Fullerton's first Division I team, Boone became the first Titan to pitch in the majors when he debuted for San Diego on April 11, 1981...Earned a pair of first-team all-conference bids while going a combined 22-6 with a 2.29 ERA over his two seasons...His career ERA is still the third lowest in Titan history and his single-season marks of 2.26 (1976) and 2.32 (1975) are among the nine best...Drafted by California in the second round of the secondary phase in 1976

Titan Athletics...A Proud History

From modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 11 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career and is now a veteran NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Miller still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks of the WNBA as Eugenia Rycraw.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in 1975. The Titans won the national title in 1979 behind Tim Wallach, who would play 17 major league seasons. They won the College World Series again in 1984 and John Fishel was the MVP of the CWS. They were national runners-up in 1992 with another MVP in third baseman Phil Nevin, who also was the first pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros.

The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, going 57-9 en route to their third national championship. Leading the way was Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, now with the San Diego Padres, and one of 36 former Titans to have played in the majors. Fullerton had made two more trips to Omaha under Coach George Horton.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous coach. The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 21 regional appearances. They brought home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. Il beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New

York Giants in 1987). Titans have had remarkable success in the Canadian Football League. Allen Pitts is the CFL's all-time leading receiver and Damon Allen, who was still active this season, is the all-time leading passer. Mike Pringle is the No. 2 all-time rusher and could become No. 1 if he stays healthy for two more seasons.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto - now an assistant coach with the program - and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been three subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. On the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. The Titans have a multiple-sport star in Brandon Campbell. He completed his track and field career in 2002 with six school records while placing sixth in the high jump and 16th in the long jump at the NCAA championships. He still has one more season of basketball, where he was the team's No. 2 scorer last year.

What about the nickname?

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.

NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills

Cal State Fullerton is a participating institution in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program, which is aimed at enhancing the



quality of the studentathlete experience within the university setting. Throughout their career, Cal State Fullerton studentathletes are provided with resources that will assist their development in five primary

areas: academics, athletics, personal development, career development and community service.

Headed by Dr. June Kearney, the Athletic Academic Services department, tabbed as Titan Scholars, provides effective support services to help student-athletes reach their academic goals. The academic services staff takes a proactive role by coordinating study plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study halls, faculty and peer mentoring and campus services referrals. Staff members also monitor progress toward graduation, assist student-athletes in selecting and registering for classes and teach a Life Skills 100 class.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "early warning" system in place, which utilizes periodic grade checks and clear communication with faculty members when student-athletes may require additional academic support.

The department also provides a re-entry program for former student-athletes who return to Cal State Fullerton to complete their degree.

ATHLETIC TRAINING

The athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes. Team physicians, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours. Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).



Julie Max, MeD, ATC Head Athletic Trainer

Julie Max, Cal State Fullerton's Head Athletic Trainer, has been the driving force behind the development of an athletic training program that has received national acclaim. Max is in her 24th year at her alma mater since replacing her mentor, the late Jerry Lloyd. Recently, Max was elected to a second two-year term as president of the 25,000-member National Association of Athletic Trainers (NATA). Max, the first female president in the organization's history, previously served a six-year stint on the organization's board of directors and a one-year term as its vice president. In 1997, Max was honored with the NATA Service Award, which recognizes outstanding service to the athletic training profession at the state and district level.

ATHLETIC FACILITIES

Titan Gymnasium

Titan Gym currently is undergoing major renovations. In the past few years, chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the playing surface has been redone. Scheduled for completion by the end of the academic year is an expansion which will feature numerous classrooms, physical testing laboratories and a new practice facility upstairs. Budgeted and due for installation soon are the balance of the chairback seats, new lighting and a new "drop down" scoreboard over center court. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

Goodwin Field

Goodwin Field was the host site for Cal State Fullerton's first NCAA Baseball Regional in the spring of 2000 and also played host to a Regional and Super Regional in 2001. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse – which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches – and the Doubek VIP Room.

Titan Softball Complex

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top regular-season tournament in the nation.

Titan Stadium

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Cal State Fullerton student-athletes have year-round access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of **Mike Nagler**. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Nagler to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.

Located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 square-foot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

Mike Nagler was named Cal State Fullerton's first full-time strength and conditioning coach on Jan. 4, 2000. Nagler had spent the previous 17 months as assistant strength coach at the University of Iowa. At Iowa, Nagler was in charge of developing and implementing weight lifting programs for women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, men's and women's track, gymnastics, softball and men's and women's golf. He also assisted with the men's basketball program.

He also previously worked as an assistant at Baylor University, the University of Washington, UNLV and Washington State and served as an intern with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks.

Nagler, 31, earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Washington State in 1993 and picked up a master's degree in kinesiology from UNLV in 1996.

Dr. Milton Gordon University President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon is a lifelong educator who, since becoming president in August 1990, has led California State University, Fullerton into prominence as one of the nation's largest and most inclusive senior institutions of higher learning. Currently, Dr. Gordon is overseeing a university planning process that has established missions and goals for the university into the 21st century.

Dr. Gordon holds a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, and M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit, and a B.S. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

His academic background includes serving as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Professor of Mathematics, Sonoma State University for four years; Dean, College of Arts and Sciences, Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years. He also served as an instructor of mathematics at the Illinois Institute of Technology, was a mathematician in the Laboratory of Applied Sciences at the University of Chicago, and served as an elementary and secondary teacher in the Chicago public schools.

President Gordon serves on the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and currently is a member of the NCAA presidential search committee to select a replacement for retiring NCAA President Cedric Dempsey. Dr. Gordon is a member of the Governing Board of Directors of the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities and is a member of the National ROTC Program Subcommittee: U.S. Army. President Gordon is active in civic affairs and currently serves on the boards of the Orange County Business Council. the Orange County Workforce Investment Board, and the Pacific Symphony Orchestra.



Brian Quinn Athletics Director

Brian Quinn assumed the post of director of athletics at Cal State Fullerton on Jan. 14, 2002.

Quinn, 60, was assistant dean and AD at Loyola Marymount University from 1985 through 1998. During his tenure the Lions won nine West Coast Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times. Both the baseball team and the women's volleyball team made five trips to the NCAA Playoffs with the baseball team reaching the College World Series in 1986. Among his accomplishments away from competition were bringing the department into full Title IX compliance and earning a 10-year

NCAA accreditation without conditions in 1997.

In June of 1998, Quinn was appointed executive director of athletic development and promotion. He was responsible for major gift solicitation to build new recreation and health facilities, new athletic offices and auxiliary services as well as improved playing facilities.

Quinn graduated from Loyola in 1963 with a degree in business. He was a starter for the Lions in both baseball and basketball and was captain and most valuable player of the latter for the 1962-63 season. He was inducted into the LMU Athletics Hall of Fame as both a player and admin-

Quinn began a teaching and coaching career at St. Anthony H.S. in Long Beach in 1968 and earned a master's degree at Long Beach State in 1973. He moved on to St. Bernard H.S. in Playa Del Rey, where he coached the basketball team; University H.S. in Irvine and Irvine H.S., where he was the athletic director.

He was a part-time physical education instructor at Saddleback College (North campus) and assistant principal at Woodbridge H.S. in Irvine from

Quinn and his wife, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, who lives in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, New York; and two recent LMU graduates in daughters Suzanne and Maureen. The Quinns have three grandchildren — Brendan, Ryan and Dylan.

Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah is in her 11th year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator for the Titans.

Dr. Jeremiah is primarily responsible for overseeing athletic department academics. assisting with departmental planning and financial forecasting and supervising volleyball, gymnastics, women's basketball and softball.

Dr. Jeremiah, the chairperson of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee, is also a member of the Big West Conference Athletics Council and serves on Cal State Fullerton's Academic Senate executive committee and university planning committee.

In her seven years as the Titan's

women's basketball coach, Jeremiah compiled a 112-93 record and in 1990-91, she guided the team to a 25-9 season (most wins in school history) and the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Following the season, Jeremiah was recognized with both District 8 and Big West coachof-the-year honors.

She also was the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award, given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association to the coach who best represents sportsmanship and ethics in the coaching profession. Jeremiah finished her 23-year coaching career with a 375-236 record.

She has a Ph.D. and a master's degree in physical education from The Ohio State University, as well as undergraduate degrees from Cedarville College and Central State University.

Wild Rivers



Cal State Fullerton is nestled in sun-drenched Orange County, with its mountains, amusement parks, professional sports, cultural showcases and seashores among the top attractions. Students can reach ski slopes in 45 minutes and the beach in less than a half hour. Los Angeles, with its never-ending cultural and entertainment opportunities, lies just 30 miles northwest of the campus and San Diego is 100 miles to the south. The city of Fullerton itself, which has a fascinating history dating back to the late 19th century, boasts a beautiful historic downtown area that features dozens of restaurants, museums and shops.

The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and attractions such as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Edison International Field and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer.
