Vehicle Decaling Comes in May

Annual re-decaling of motor vehicles of Village homeowners will begin on Tuesday, May 16 in front of the Recreation Center. beginning at 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. On Wednesday, May 17 the hours will be the same. On Thursday, May 18, the hours will be from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. On Friday, May 19, decaling will be done in the RV Lot (near the West Gate) for all RVs and all other motorized vehicles. The hours will be 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. only.

All drivers will be required to present to the attendant their unexpired driver's license and current certificate of registration.

proof of unexpired registration, the rear license plate of every California vehicle has on it two small square tabs. The one in the upper left hand corner of the plate shows the month in which the registration expires. The tab in the right corner of the plate shows the year in which the registration expires. For example, if the left tab say SEPT and the right tab say 95, the registration is in effect through September 1995. After that date the vehicle registration is delinquent. If the attendant on Decal Day observes a delinquency, he must make note of the information to be forward to the California Department of Motor Vehicles and he will not decal the vehicle. Last month, when "Inside Leisure Village" questioned the quality of the Board of Directors' relationships with Leisure Village personnel, there was no intention to diminish the other accomplishments of the Board. In "business" activities the past several Boards have demonstrated great energy, intelligence and diligence.

Herb Warneke listed these accomplishments at length at the April Open Board Meeting. The Village committees also must be commended heartily for their work, research and time expended for the benefit of the Village. Leisure Village has a great many special and talented people working as volunteers for all of us.

Yes, "business" has been going very well. But there is more to life than just "business." A good relationship between the Board and LVA employees is essential to maintain morale, provide satisfactory production, and to reduce employee turnover. "People skills" also are important as a measure of overall success.

Because it is so very important to elect the "right" persons to the Board of Directors in the forthcoming June 1995 election, I feel compelled to offer my thoughts regarding criteria for selection.

I firmly believe that voting solely on the basis of a personal friendship is one of the worst things that one can do in this election. You can surely do many things for your friends to express your affection, respect, or gratitude, or whatever you wish, but picking them to represent you in this most important function of a Board member should not be one of such things.

I submit that the following criteria are the impor-

tant ones:

1 Intellect: Make sure that the person you vote for has an acceptable, demonstrated level of intelligence and ability.

Common sense: Make sure that the person can judge what can realistically be done, and what makes sense, as opposed to what one would just wish for. Idealists and dreamers are certainly good to have in life, but not in day-to-day activities of the Board.

3. Broad vision: Beware of "one issue" or "tunnel vision" people. Make sure that the person you select is capable of seeing the entire picture, and not just the part that he or she is interested in. In my experience, this has been the most frequent cause of failures in programs or operations.

4. Motivation: Make sure that your candidate is not just running for reasons of self-promotion, that he or she has no "hidden agenda." Make sure that he or she is truly interested in doing what is best for Leisure Village.

This (last but not least) is not just a matter of not ate. cheating or not lying. Board members must be truthful in dealing with you and with the staff, and must be willing to face and answer questions, and not dodge them, even if the answers include "no" or "I don't know."

I believe that if we follow these guidelines we will all be better off.

Communication

On its 16th anniversary Inside Leisure Village and its dedicated staff are to be commended and treasured as an invaluable asset for promoting information, openness and democracy within Leisure Village. There are too few opportunities for information within L. V. Most all avenues are controlled by the authority structure. Information published through the Voice is accessible only to Board members and ministration.

In my experience with the issue of the aerial spraying of malathion, it was only through Inside Leisure Village that we could discuss the possible risks of aerial spraying of malathion or could announce meetings in Camarillo Springs or by Your Neighbors Care Group. The village bulletin boards are tightly controlled. The Leisure Village Board President rejected our attempts to place an 8x11 sized notice about a meeting concerning the health effects of the aerial spraying because she decided: "That event already has had enough publicity.'

Literature by medical experts about malathion, placed in the Leisure Village library, initially was repeatedly removed by a librarian who decided she did not want any materials that would upset anyone.

The leadership of Channel 12 would not respond

Letters.....from pg2 to my letter that they air the Camarillo Springs meeting, even though Channel 12 already had broadcast a pro-malathion spraying propaganda film.

Homeowners ments at the conclusion of the once a month meeting can be compromised, as we recently witnessed. And when allowed 3 minutes, speakers can be rebutted by Board Members who can respond for as long as they like, saying whatever they like without any opportunity for the homeowner to re-answer for yet another month.

The Current Issues Forum leadership refused any discussion of the malathion spraying, saying they had enough forums "on health."

When those in authority do not want controversial lutely unarmed as they topics discussed, Leisure Village can be a very controlled place. Real dialogue, discussion and democracy can become quite limited, especially upon uncomfortable topics. Much that goes on within the Village is kept secret. We have no influential ombudsmen, as do many organizations and newspapers. Inside Leisure Village remains a bulwark; treasure and support it and resist any attempt to censor it.

Security

I am writing this letter in order to complete my commentary which I began at the general meeting of April 3. I was addressing a very serious subject but was unable to finish when the three minute clock cut me off. I was speaking about the necessity of arming our Security Department patrolmen with non-lethal weapons so they may protect themselves and the residents of Leisure Village.

The Security and Safety Committee, after sufficient research, recommended to the Board the arming of patrolmen with non-lethal weapons. The

use of a baton would help protect the patrolman as he approached an intruder who has illegally entered the Village. The Board forwarded this recommendation to the Insurance Committee for further evaluation. The Insurance Committee returned the recommendation with a negative reaction stating that providing batons to Security would result in a much higher insurance premium. At this point the Board agreed with the Insurance Committee and voted "no" on the Security Committee recommendation.

Our Security Department personnel constitute the first line of defense against intruders attempting to gain unlawful entry to the Village. Meanwhile our patrolmen are absoapproach these intruders who may be carrying a pistol or a knife. If one of our security personnel is shot, stabbed, disabled for life, or killed, Leisure Village Association would probably be sued by the family because we had not provided the patrolmen with adequate protection. The cost of such a lawsuit would cost the village far more than the increased insurance premium.

Our CC&Rs state very clearly under Articles of Incorporation of Leisure Village Association, Inc., Article IV, the end of paragraph 1: "and to promote the health, safety and welfare of the residents within said residential development.'

To not adequately equip our patrolmen with the means to protect themselves and our community, I consider to be unconscionable.

As you know, malathion turns into malaoxin on the ground and in the air. found out that after the spraying the second day, the air and ground are more polluted as this pesticide gets stronger and stronger.

Be extra careful with

your pets. Some get very sick and our vets have seen dogs and cats with high fever, vomiting and dull looking fur.

Those of you who do see doctors for your condition, ask him/her to be sure to make out a health report and send it to the Health Department if there could be the slightest possibility that malathion contributed to your worsening condition.

Remember we are being sprayed by industrial strength of malathion, which is impure and results in uneven droplets. We are facing spraying to the beginning of May. Be careful and get well.
