A STATEMENT OF EDITORIAL POLICY

Part One

This is a statement of editorial policy. I realize now that this article should have come first in my series of projected essays. I have, therefore, shoved MACHETE's #2 and #3 aside to introduce it now before we go on. I might state, right off the bat, that this space, granted by El Excentrico through its own good graces, is far too valuable for futile arguments. I do not intend to engage in a senseless chain of petty squabbles and rebuttals with anyone. My plans for the column require deeper thought and harder work. I am, of course, totally responsible for my own opinion, but I am not adverse to discussion or criticism. My articles carry a byline, and anyone wishing to discuss particular points with me will find my name in the phonebook.

Last issue, EL EXCENTRICO carried an article by Sr. Daniel Saldaña in which he objects to my use of the word cabron. The señor is generally vague in his criticism, but the following is one of his strongest arguments:

para el publico, no puede usar el lexico florido propio de una taberna a pesar de ese modernismo ramplon y malcriado que usa palabras inmundas y con el cual se quiere dar una impresion de realismo de vulgaridad soes...."

He obviously has a point. It is, however, not unquestionable. I feel that his attack on "modernismo" only represents his side of the question. I am totally in favor of "modernismo" and I intend to use "palabras inmundas" again and again precisely because of it. The señor was somehow led to believe that I am a "periodista" and so should follow only the most polite of editorial styles. He is mistaken. I am not a newspaperman.

FL MACHETE represents a search for expression. As a Mexican, I have felt the sting of life among the gringos since the day I was born, some twenty-four years ago in a classic example of the American "small town." It had a main street, called Main Street, a cotton gin, a Greyhound bus depot, a Purity Store, a high school, a few churches, and a proverbial length of railroad tracks, separating the White Protestant elite from the "minority groups."

There was an Eastside of town and a Westside. The Mexicans, Chinese and the Fi-

lipinos lived on the westside, if we knew what was good for us. But compared to the Negroes, we were pretty lucky, even though we lived "across the tracks". The Negroes lived out by the dump.

For about twenty years, nothing changed much in the town, except that the Negroes started to move up in life - to the westside. Highway 99 was expanded into a freeway, and it too went to the Westside. The State of California hurriedly bought up all the meager lots in the way, tore their houses down, (one was the shack in which I was born) and rammed the freeway through. Little losses. Today millions of shiny cars using the freeway don't even take notice of the town.

Life sometimes poses difficult questions. Once they are asked, there is no effective way a man can ignore them. He can prod at them like live scorpions. He can suppress them till they turn to acid in his gut. He can drink beer or cheap wine and sing dirty songs or sad corridos til he's drunk and he forgets. But they always come back. The shame, the pride, the hate, the love - a fierce mosaic of paradoxical emotions; and always, under them, the same basic question: "Why do they treat me this way?"

I don't know when I first felt the need for some answers. I do know I was born poor, as dark as baked beans, and that I spoke fluent Spanish before I knew a word of English. This sorrowful combination of qualities brought me a lot of early enemies I never sought. I tried to fight back for a while, but I soon discovered beatings were not the answer. I thought of becoming rich and changing the color of my skin, but these were not answers either. It was a simple movie that shocked me into the first vestiges of self-knowledge. It was a Hollywood film about an American Indian in the 1880's who returned to his tribe after having been educated in the schools of the civilized white man.

Amid the blazing fires of the camp, the educated Indian began calmly and quietly: "My blood brothers," he said, "some time past I left the land of my people to walk the ways of the White-Eyes. I rode on their Iron Horse and went to their great cities. I learned to speak their language and to study at their schools. I learned to eat their food and to wear their clothes; to live with them. But in all this time, "he added a little fiercely, "where-ever I have gone, whatever I have done, I have never forgotten my people!" At this point he tore off his silly hat with a feather in it, and shouted: "I did not cut my hair!"

A thousand approving braves whooped out in unison. The next day, with the educated Indian beside the Chief, they all went on the warpath. They lost, of course, but I still remember feeling a great identity with the Indian. His struggle was my struggle. We were blood brothers.

Ironically enough, I feel closer to that mystical Indian now than I did as a boy. One obvious reason is that I have spent most of my life in American schools, only to learn that the white rich Americans are among the sickest people on the face of the earth. But I have studied and learned and read, and I am now writing - in English. The gringo schools have taken away my Spanish. They have not, however, changed my basic feelings. If I only felt it

once, I know now for a fact that the raza must MAKE its place in American society. I know this as well as I know my own life. We must look at ourselves first, in order to find answers to our problems. We must understand our situation completely - what has made us, what we are, and what we shall become. And I don't mean just plain facts - I mean the "way-down-deep-inside" truths - the feelings, the emotions, the very soul of the raza.

Part Two

A literary critic once said that no ethnic group in America has ever made it until it has developed novelists, poets and playwrights. And no wonder: they are the only ones who fully understand, who fully express what most of us cannot distill into words. American democracy was not created nor is it sustained by the voiceless. If American Congressmen display a vital literacy, it is only to express the needs of the people they represent. We shall never have a representative who looks and thinks more like a Mexican than a gringo, until we have writers who are not afraid to tell what it means to be a Mexican-American.

EL MACHETE is an attempt to discuss and understand what our future novelists have not yet written. It is an attempt at a personal - and, it is hoped, almost familial - examination of our deeper motives. A column, of course, does not have the privacy of a novel. But this should not prevent us from considering our more essential stumbling blocks. For instance, one of the greatest obstacles to our self-understanding, as individuals, as an ethnic group, and as Americans, is a bitter inferiority complex. It is not a direct result of our life in the United States, because our grandfathers brought it with them from Mexico. It has, nevertheless, grown here and influenced our behavior that much more. The fact that many Mexican Americans prefer to be called "Spanish" rather than Mexican is a case in point. Our inability to stomach strong criticism is another. We scan the newspapers reading this article or that, glad that someone is interested in our problems but usually dismayed by the facts revealed. And it can't be helped. As far as sociological reports go, the record of the raza is not inspiring.

It will never be inspiring so long as we allow OTHER people to write about OUR problems. All other people can write about us is "factual accounts."

Margaret Clark's book Health in the Mexican American Culture, based on a study of San Jose's Sal si Puedes is an example. Generally, such a book is kinder to us than the newspapers. Still, no sociological report or newspaper can tell the whole story. They cannot tell what we feel or what we think. The real truth about the raza lies in its emotions. A hate-ridden pachuco was killed in Korea in 1952, defending "his country." Who can tell the truth about him? Or what about the prosperous Mexican Americans who slip away into better neighborhoods and discard the raza, under the pretext of becoming Americans? Sociological reports cannot reveal the underside of their story; and how their deliberate silent alienation is painful to those left behind.

Our editorial policy, then, shall spring from an anticipation of the Mexican American novelists. (Jose Villareal's POCHO stands alone.) Because of this, I intend to make full use of their fallow poetic license. If I should lapse into dialogue, using a cabron or two to stress a point, it shall only be because this is the way the raza speaks. I have no doubt that our novelists shall use the word frequently. (American life has not only made certain "malas palabras" good ones; it has made them damn near necessary.) Criticis will notice that, in Machete #1, I was making a rough attempt at characterizing the grandfather. The grandson asks him, "What's wrong, abuelito?"

And the old man answers, "Nada, cabron, nada." It is a difficult emotion I was trying to portray. The grandfather had been sitting in the corner watching his grandson, because there is nothing else for him to do. He is too old to work in the fields anymore, and he is now living in his son's house, waiting for death to overtake him.

Considering that he rode with Pancho Villa to better his life; and that the revolution failed; and that he came to the United States in order that his grandsons might have the good life he could not; considering all these things, it is not surprising the old man feels bitterness. The word cabron synthesizes that bitterness. When his grandson speaks to him in the language of the gringos, all the viejo can do is swear and then go outside and spit. He is probably thinking, "For this I left Mexico!"

There is no denying we owe our grandfathers a great debt. But what can we do to ease their broken lives? All we can do is understand.

The raza as we know it is an entity in itself. If its story is to be told, the Mexican American himself is the only one who can write it - in his own way and in his own words.



CONFERENCE ON DELINQUENCY PREVENTION AND YOUTH WELFARE

On Tuesday, March 31, 1964, a conference on Delinquency Prevention and Youth Welfare will be held at the First Methodist Church and St. Martin's Catholic Church on the old San Francisco Road, Sunnyvale, California, from 8 am to 4 pm. This conference is being sponsored by the Juvenile Justice Commission and the Juvenile Probation Department of Santa Clara County.

Mr. Willie S. Ellison, Delinquency Prevention officer of the Santa Clara County Probation Department, is cooordinator of the conference.

The following is the Statement of Purpose of the conference, "To provide the community with an opportunity to familiarize itself with youth problems and needs in Santa Clara County; to discuss these problems and their effects on the community, and the community's responsibility for youth welfare and delinquency prevention."

Every person who is interested in learning about the ever growing problem of juvenile delinquency on the county should make it a point to attend this conference. Several workshops will be conducted dealing with school drop-outs, housing, family life and recreation, just to name a few. Well qualified professional people will conduct these workshops and will make a conscientious effort to inform the participants of the existing problems. This conference will afford an excellent opportunity for those attending to ask questions regarding the various aspects of the problems that are presented. Of the many statistics that are presented by the Juvenile Probation Department in regards to delinquency, the following should be the most significant to the Mexican American in this community:

Approximately 100,000 of the 833,000 population in Santa Clara County are persons with Spanish surnames; that this group comprises approximately 38% of the Juvenile Probation Department caseload, 45% of the Welfare Department A.F.D.C. caseload, and 38% of their General Relief caseload. Two of the principal speakers will be Doctor E. K. Nelson, Assistant to Director, Youth & Adult Corrections Agency, State of California; and Carl Belser, Director of Santa Clara County Planning Department.

SANTA CLARA FORUM HOSTS REGION IV MEET

On Sunday, January 26, 1964, the Santa Clara G! Forum hosted the regional meeting of Region No. 4, consisting of the following Forum Chapters: San Jose, Santa Clara, Union City, Oakland and Tulare. Dr. Hector P. Garcia, founder of the American GI Forum, will be on hand to install the Oakland Chapter. A state board meeting of the Forum will be held the following day, Sunday, March 1st, at the Oakland Inn.

Next Regional meeting will be held in Tulare on May 17, 1964.



At the Santa Clara Library Saturday, sixty five persons turned out to pay tribute to those brave men who fought and died fighting for the defense of our great country. Among these great men who have been awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, there were 17 Mexican American heroes, including 9 that killed in action. The Santa Clara GI Forum brought Raul Morin of Los Angeles, author of the book "AMONG THE VALIANT" to Santa Clara so that he would be present at the presentation of books to all school and public libraries.

Present also were Col. Mitchell Paige, USMC Ret. and Carlos Ogden who are holders of the Medal of Honor.

The Congressional Medal of Honor is the highest military award for bravery that can be given to any individual in the United States of America. There is only one way to win it and that is by a deed of bravery or self-sacrifice, above and beyond the call of duty, while a member of the American Armed Forces, in actual combat with an enemy of the nation.

Raul spoke of Mexican American heroes like Silvestre Herrera of Phoenix, Arizona, who after stepping on a land mine and having both feet blown off, he sat down and kept firing his rifle into German positions until he was rescued and the battle won.

Stories of all these men are in the book "Among The Valiant".

Carlos Ogden was made an Honorary Member of the Santa Clara Chapter for his work in the community, his willing to help all organizations, and his heroic deed in earning the Medal of Honor. He was given a GI Forum pin by Chairman Mario R. Vazquez.

UNITED WE STAND! UNITED WE WORK! UNITED WE HELP! Sixteen years ago, the United Food Drive started with the hope of helping families who needed food to survive. Today, the UFD is still striving for the same principles in a never ending battle to fight hunger. UFD is now principally composed of organizations belonging to the United Latin American Council. Last week, on a stormy night that flooded areas in San Jose and Santa Clara, the meeting took its course and elected officers for the coming year.

Richard Gomez was elected President. He is also the outgoing Commander of the Regular Veterans Association Post No. 1775, after being at the helm for two years.

Yancy L. Williams, General Chairman of the Citizens Volunteer Committee for School Bonds, announced today, February 7, the 138-member committee is actively campaigning for passage of San Jose Unified School District's proposed \$15.75 million bond issue.

Dr. John deHeras, 1259 Park Avenue, a member of the executive committee, is playing a key role in the campaign to enlist voter support for the bond program which goes before the people in a special

election February 25.

We are short-changing many children in San Jose schools through lack of critically needed class-rooms and facilities. A YES vote on Feb. 25 on the \$15.75 million bond issue will insure equal opportunity in school for every San Jose child, deHeras stated.

If approved, the \$15,750,000 bond issue will be used over a five-year period for the construction of nine new schools, purchase of five building sites, and the addition of 64 classrooms to existing schools.

"For pennies a day we can provide our children with necessary classrooms and adequate facilities for learning," Williams said. Cost to the average San Jose homeowner will be \$10.80 a year or less than three cents a day.

Also scheduled in the bond program are replacement of outmoded facilities, support of new educational techniques, and improvement of school playgrounds and streets.


