Fire Station Opens in Fall

The long awaited Fire Station 52 in Santa Rosa Valley, directly across from Leisure Village, will open in the late Fall of this year, as reported by the Ventura County Fire Department.

This will solve two critical problems that have been a concern to East Camarillo residents: first, having to go on or around the freeway to get to fires or victims of accidents or medical emergencies; second, the threat of disasters such as earthquake, flood, or military which would totally lock in the whole area.

Now, with the Fire Station soon to be established nearby. immediate assistance will be available. We can also patiently look forward to the completion of Adolfo Road giving us easier access to the Pleasant Valley Hospital.

On June 2nd, there will be a city-wide vote on two important ballot measures: Proposition A. to limit the pace of Camarillo growth by limiting housing construction; and Proposition B, to enable the city to facilitate the development of low-income housing. It is incumbent upon each of us to get the facts, weigh the arguments pro and con, and exercise our franchise at the ballot box.

A COMMUNITY NOT A RETREAT

There are few places in the United States where one may walk the streets day or night without fear of being assaulted, robbed, raped, or even murdered by unknown assailants.

One such haven is Leisure Village.

This is less a commentary on the effectiveness of our Security Patrol (which is not to be denied) as it is a critique of the present condition of "the outside world." Beyond the security gates there is a society racked by an uncontrolled proliferation of handguns, a drug culture that has penetrated every class and every age group, a nagging unemployment problemespeciallty affecting minority youth, jails filled to capacity and over-flowing with "recidivists" -- repeat criminal offenders, a public school system graduating almost as many drop-outs as well-educated teen-agers, a simmering cauldron of race hatred infecting much of the population, for all too many families a crisis in housing, and, not least, ever-mounting inflation.

An intemperate correspondent recently wrote the Daily News that "Leisure Village is a morgue." Had he visited this "morgue" on any day,he would have found some very active "bodies" on the tennis and bocce courts, or swimming in the pool, or improving their scores on the golf course, or swinging their partners on the dance floor, or engaging in serious debate at a forum discussion, or getting on the bus for a trip to the Music Center in Los Angeles.

As the ad says, this is "an active adult community."

It is also a community of neighbors who care. Although it is true that we are active for ourselves both for fun and for health, we are also very much aware of the world about us. The interest shown in belonging to current issues groups and in attending informative lectures on many subjects attests to such concern by many of us.

Leisure Villagers enjoy "dual citizenship." As owner-residents we participate in self-government through the Leisure Village Association. As citizens of Camarillo, we vote in local, state and national elections, and in many ways, join other Camarillans in the conduct of civic affairs.

In return for the extensive facilities available to us, we have an obligation to participate as actively as personal circumstances permit in volunteer service on committees of the Association and the many clubs that function here.

As we approach the Annual Meeting of Association Members on June 24th, we must give careful consideration to the views of the candidates for the Board of Directors, three of whom are to be elected. It is important that those residents unable to attend the meeting arrange in advance to assign a proxy.

This is very important in helping us to obtain a quorum without which no voting is possible.

County Honors Blood Pressure Volunteers

At the second annual Your Neighbors Care Group dinner held for members of the Blood Pressure Screening Program and their spouses on May 4th in the A.R., the Ventura County Public Health Services presented Certificates of Appreciation to twenty-three volunteers. Special guests included Bill Miley, Director of the County Wide High Blood Pressure Screening, Detection and Education Program, and Mrs. Harlene L. Smith, Program Coordinator. It has been Bill and Harlene who have personally trained the volunteers in proper techniques in taking pressures according to the recommendations of the Heart Association. Miley, in his short talk, emphasized the importance of the program throughout the nation, and its success in combatting hypertension. Mrs. Smith, who with Miley, set up the program with Sandy Okum in the village over four years ago, praised the work of Y.N.C.G. Some of the original volunteers are still active. "We use Leisure Village as a role model," Harlene said, "in setting up other clinics in the county." She paid special tribute to Okum and Alvie Rasmussen who furnishes the county with monthly statistics. There were over 1,500 persons screened at our Clinic during 1980 and of these 24 per cent were found to have elevated pressures.



Tony Lamb Addresses Forum

"There are millions of senior citizens in this country. If they were organized, they could be as powerful as a union."

This was the message delivered to a packed Assembly Room on Friday, April 24, by Tony Lamb, senior citizen coordinator and director of the Senior Survival Services Program of Ventura County. Lamb was speaking to 250 members and guests of the Current Issues Forum.

Concentrating his fire on the inadequacy of Social Security checks -- even with the 11.2 per cent cost-of-living increase coming in July -- Lamb attacked the Reagan Administration's budget-cutting efforts aimed at certain of the benefits now included in the Social Security program, namely the lump-sum death benefit and aid to handicapped students.

Lamb expressed appreciation for the cash contribution made by the Women's

Club of Leisure Village to his emergency fund, used to help senior citizens whose Social Security checks are delayed or go astray.

This 78-year-old senior advocate, a retired engineer and holder of many U.S. patents, and author of the best-seller entitled "The Retirement Threat", is now devoting his energies toward building the "Tony Lamb Senior Advocate Union," which will "educate, inform, motivate and stimulate seniors into action...on their own behalf."

Current Issues Forum

Low Cost Housing in Camarillo (Proposition B on the June 2nd Ballot) was the subject of a special meeting of the Current Issues Forum on May 11th. Rod Moore, former Camarillo Mayor and current Councilman, spoke in favor of the measure which enables the City of Camarillo to acquire, develop and construct, with available public financial assistance, low-cost housing

projects.

Mr. Moore spoke of the urgent need for low-cost, subsidized housing. He said that the city would probably let private enterprise build the housing, but would authorize and supervise the projects. He favors small units and emphasized that standards would be imposed to maintain the quality of the housing. In order to qualify a family of four must have less than \$17,450 income a year and a family of three less than \$15,700 per year.

Lois Arnold, V. 28, asserted that there should have been a spokesman for the negative position and was invited to give the arguments against the Proposition. She cited the poor

Housing Major Issue at Conference

L.V. resident Joe Gaynes has been appointed by the City of Camarillo to serve on the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging (A.A.A.) and has become a member of its Board of Directors. This is part of a larger organization with branches throughout the State. Early in May, Joe attended a four day conference in Sacramento where items discussed in his article were deliberated.

Responsibility during his one year term includes conveying information to the community of the recommendations of the council. Basic issues under study are hot meals, senior centers, transportation, long term care, plus many others.

The recent four day State White House Conference on Aging and fully staffed with specialists and resource personnel, covered 17 major issues affecting not only the seniors but also all age groups in our state.

At the suggestion of our local newspaper "Inside Leisure Village," I am extremely grateful to present these issues and the positions the State Conference took on them. These courses of action will be advocated by senior organizations throughout this country until the White House Conference to be held in Washington the end of this year.

Since the City of Camarillo is now in the midst of a critical housing shortage because of extremely inflated prices with loans impossible to get or pay for, I will report the Convention's concern and action on this vital matter. This issue is a primary one in the southwestern part of the United States. The climate, the style of living, employment opportunities, and many other qualities have been attracting a steady population shift from the eastern and midwestern states to the southwest.

Now, with the government's tight money policy, increasing labor and material costs, and land and property values going up at a \$2000 rate each month for the last 3 and a half years, we find families young, old and those needing to relocate are forced out of the housing market by all these economic circumstances.

The following resolutions on housing were narrowed down from twelve to be taken to Washington for more critical refinement:

There's a touch of the theatre in the way he dresses - always impeccably groomed, he appears ready to go on stage at a moment's notice.

He has a friendly personality and presents to the public a warm, outgoing personality, evincing a willingness to share all his fascinating experiences in the world of the theatre, both here and abroad. And this is the Marcel Lerner who added a continental sparkle to the bits he played in the recent Variety Guild's "The Village Folly". He has also done some interesting readings at L.V. Players' meetings, so has become wellknown here as a performer.

Marcel was born in Vienna, Austria, (which accounts in no small measure for his charm), the son of an opera singer mother and a father sought after as a public speaker. He was a law student who turned to his greater love, the theatre, when he entered the Max Reinhardt Seminary of Drama

and Directing, where he received a scholarship and in Marcel Lerner his second year, was cast in a part on the legitimate Max Reinhardt stage.

> After graduation from this prestigious seminary, he played on stages in Austria, Czechoslovakia and Switzerland, in roles like lago, in "Othello", Mephistopheles, in "Faust", Jacque, in "As You Like It", etc. etc.

He had the good fortune to be in Switzerland when Austria was invaded. He left for France where, in a coffee shop, he was recognized by the famous actor - producer Maurice Schwartz, who has seen him perform in Vienna. Schwartz took him to London, where they played in the Phoenix and Garrick theatres. Later, with the help of the High Commissioner for Refugees, Marcel received a temporary passport, which finally enabled him to come to the United States. He performed on radio in New York in "Address Unknown" and also in a serial about the







life of Anna Held, the famous actress, and he played parts on stage on "Second Avenue" with Maurice Schwartz. Then he came to California, where he acted in the Pasadena Playhouse.

Following this, according to Marcel in his own words, a greater Director called on him to play his part as a citizen, putting him into an olive drab suit with gold buttons, and thus, in Jan. 1944, he became a member of the BIG BIG SHOW called the U.S. Army.

During his training period with the Armored Force at Fort Knox, he played weekly the comedy part of "A French Soldier in the American Army", on stage as well as on radio. For this, he received a Certificate of Merit for entertaining the troops. When he was transferred to the 10th Armored Division in Camp Gordon, Georgia, he became an instructor of German and French. In Dec. 1944, his outfit arrived in Bastogne, the center of the Battle of the Bulge, that tragic episode in which so

many thousands were killed or Saturday Night wounded. Then, in May, 1945, when the war in Europe ended for the 10th Armored Division, Marcel became part of the Military Government Munich, Germany. Here he was given the rare opportunity to recite poetry by Heinrich Heine and Erich Kaestner to a German audience and his listeners received the performance of this American soldier with great enthusiasm.

Marcel was discharged from the army in 1946, with a Purple Heart and a Bronze Star, and returned to Los Angeles, where he met his beloved Esther, to whom he was married in 1947.

New obligations brought on realization that the theatrical life was too insecure, so he became a travelling salesman and stayed with the same company for 30 years. Three years ago, he became Vice-President in Charge of Sales for Stratton of London and just retired in February of this year. He and Esther are entranced with life in Leisure Village, where Marcel is, by degrees, returning to his old love,

We have developed the system and provided the equipment which allows all groups and clubs the means to play taped music of their choice without the need for an expensive orchestra. From the proceeds, we have purchased 3 cassette decks, 2 amplifiers, a cabinet, a turntable and 2 loudspeakers, all high quality equipment with a value of approximately \$3,000; we are also providing several coat racks, for the auditorium, \$1,000 worth of folding chairs, \$400 donation to the Recreation Department other smaller items. These purchases were made from the 50 cents admissions, after expenditures for refreshments, ice, supplies, cleanup girl, decorations and minor equipment needs.

We are rightfully proud of our achievements and of the fine people who make it possible.







elderly from displacement due to (1) the demolition of mobile home parks and rental housing, and (b) the conversion of rental units to condominiums or cooperatives. This includes the creation of life estates and limited equity cooperatives with necessary safeguards.

- 2. Government must provide tax incentive bond programs, seed money and creative financing to assure subsidized senior housing and alternatives such as shared housing and "granny cottages," and require the funding, coordination and delivery of health and social services.

Leisure Village will be paying more for its water beginning July 1st.

As the representative on the Board of Directors of Camrosa for the district in which Leisure Village is located, I want to advise that this inrease primarily "passes through" a rate increase made by the Metropolitan Water District, Los Angeles. Metropolitan supplies Northern California and Colorado River water to local water districts in Southern California.

The increase, the first in two years, will be slightly less than 5 per cent, or about 30 cents a month for each home in L.V. This increase will not change your monthly assessment fee.

With the heavy use season just ahead, we can go a long way to offset this increase by practicing good water conservation. Don't let your taps run, and you should report broken sprinkler heads and sprinklers turned on when they should be off.





Board Highlights

The L.V. Association Board held its monthly meeting on May 4. All Board members were present. Anita West-Brooks was secretary. Mr. Bill Parness was introduced as the Association's new General Manager. Mr. Parness expressed his pleasure in being with us and described his interesting background previous to accepting the L.V. position.

Committee Reports:

Archi. Comm. Received 33 applications for service, approving 25, with 20 completed. Committee of seven meets each first and third Thursday. An extra Thursday in a month understandably results in longer waits for service at times.

Educ. and REc. Travel Comm. report (a) Request that tickets be refused to people suffering physical incapacities for liability purposes. It is recommended that the matter be referred to our attorney for legal interpretation. (b) Recommends dissussion of the subject of villagers planning travel on bus tours sponsored by outside tour carriers, that they be required to notify Recreation Office of the name of the carrier for reasons of liability.

Finance. Comm. (a) Subcommittee on Audit has found all bills and invoices correctly processed. (b) Bids are still being received from insurance companies. (c) Data Process Committee has submitted its report to the Finance Committee and the Board of Directors regarding a possible contract with Bank of A. Levy to handle processing financial matters for L.V. awaiting decision of the Board. (d) Met with Educ. and Rec. Committee to review charges made regarding the use of recreation facilities by certain outside organizations. (e) An ad hoc committee formed to study control of inventory of parts and supplies used by the Resident Services Department.

Info. to New Res. Thirty-four visits made by comm. members to new residents in April. Eighteen homes were occupied in the new area; also seven resales and nine leases were noted. Twenty-five attended the Meet Your Neighbor meeting on April 24. The last Thursday of each month is "Meet Your Neighbor" Day; both new and old residents are urged to attend to become acquainted and to acquire useful information relating to Village life.

Comm. Relat. A survey continues to learn how many Villagers are actively involved in matters concerning the entire community. When complete, the plan is to publicize the degree to which L.V. is a viable, active participant in the Community of Camarillo.

Nom. Comm. No petitions were received; thus the four candidates for the three positions open on the Board of Directors remain: Milton Sherman, Donald Moore, Robert Karlin and Karl Cannon. Candidates Night meeting will take place on Wednesday, June 10. All are urged to attend. Elections will take place on June 24. Further information will be published in the Voice of the Village.

Special Appeal Following the election, the Board's first function is to appoint Standing Committees. Villagers are urged to come forward and offer their services. Importance of the committees cannot be over-emphasized. A total of 125 persons needed to fill all committees. So far only 35 have responded.

Old Business:

Insurance Bids. Letters had been sent to 13 companies, Eight responded, six made bids. Bids to be opened that afternoon in presence of Board Finance Committee and Mr. Parness. Finance subcommittee and Mr. Parness will analyze the bids and report back to Board.

Proxy Committee. Moved and carried that Henry Malkin, Tom O'Brien and Gerry Kikendall serve as the Proxy Committee in the coming Board election. Residents who plan to be gone on the election day, June 24, are urged to fill out forms and either leave them with a

homeowner of their choice, or turn them in at the office.

Posters. It was moved and carried that posters no larger than 18x24 inches may be placed in the atrium or on the board in rear of building. A second board to be erected in rear should it become necessary. These are for announcing Educ. and Rec. and club events.

Annual Meeting - Election Day, June 24 A day for reports on Association's past fiscal year; also election of three members to the Association Board. All villagers urged to attend. All recreation facilities, inside and outside, will be closed for that day until noon.

Board Action. (a) Decision against Association purchasing extra nets for tennis and paddle tennis, due to needed care in dispensing funds. Spare nets will be added to a growing list of needs that various organizations could purchase from their own excess funds (b) Request by Educ. and Rec. Committee that they give permission for future bake sales was refused. Since Association facilities are used for such events, Board retains authority for such permits. (c) Approved classes on Tuesday mornings from eleven to twelve in the AR for conditioning in ballet and modern dance. 



In answer to the part on input, I am certain quite a bit of input was generated by the varied approaches toward informing residents of the forthcoming decisions to be made. 1. Obviously for the Board to be in contact with 5000 people is a big problem. That is 1000 opinions per Board member per month, not very practical. If elected, I would like to press for an ombudsman type person from each Village. These would be elected along with an alternate, chosen by popular consent once a year. They would meet once a month with their villagers, then, prior to a special board meeting these 40 or so people could represent

1. One of the Board's functions is to listen. Residents should be urged and encouraged to read the agenda, attend Board meetings, speak on new business and ask relevant questions. There are too many residents of the Village who do not take the time to attend meetings that have a direct effect on their lives.

1. In our society there is increasing alienation of the citizenry from the electoral process. Witness: Reagan's receiving about 27 per cent of the eligible vote and the media's reference to it as a "landslide". We have a continuing problem of involving our Villagers in the decision process. The responsibilities of the General Manager are many, carrying the full work load through his

2. Yes, of course, furthermore individual board members should only contact the G.M. on instruction from the board as a whole. We cannot have 5 "bosses" and at the same time have a good General Manager. I believe our present board operates on this Unity System.

2. Within the framework of the CC&R's and the By-Laws, the Board should attempt to function as a policy making body, delegating, where appropriate, the day-to-day operations of the Village to the General Manager. The General Manager, under guide lines established by the Board, should be qualified to do what his title implies: manage.

2. Your 2nd question puzzles me. I don't want to speculate on what you mean by encouraging the "General Manager to function...in aflexible manner....reducing (the Board's) work load..'. I believe in utilizing everyone's talent and ability, delegating as much responsibility and authority as possible, always keeping in mind that in the final analysis the Board members are the elected officials responsible to the electorate.

3. In many instances renters are affected almost as much by Board decisions as owners. Certainly they must abide by them. Do you believe it necessary or wise to bar them from AUDITING board meetings?		3. I think they should be allowed to attend public board meetings only, not to participate or hold office.	3. If a renter obtains knowledge of the result of a Board meeting from the published minutes, there appears to be no reason why he shouldn't be permitted to hear it first hand at the meeting.	3. The voting franchise is limited by the CC&R's to owners of record. However I do not see why our tenant neighbor Villagers should not be wholeheartedly welcomed as participants in all other activities including club, committee, and Board meetings.
4. Traditionally the Board has presented a unanimous front on all questions at its monthly Monday morning Association meetings. How do you feel about a roll call vote which might give a more accurate picture?	We do not have this type of situation here where Board decisions are made within Roberts Rules of Orders, calling	4. This would be all right. They do this now. Important decisions are hammered out by the board, hard and heavy. They are perfectly able to vote, opposed "no", if they wish to emphasize where they stand, or a vote for or against could be included in the minutes.	4. My past experience with public meetings indicates that a roll call vote has no effect on unanimity, or the lack of it. I do not believe it would change the picture.	4. I do not think a roll call vote would get at the root cause of the so called "unanimous front on all questions." I am of the opinion that frank open discussions showing the reasoning behind decisions would be the better solution. I intend to cast my vote to reflect my best judgment on a given issue. If I disagree with the majority, it is my privilege to have the record so indicate. I would hope that the Board would be able to adopt a unanimous view but I do not think that unanimity is a virtue in itself.
5. In a sentence, what do you consider the most important question facing the Village today?	Question 5. To answer this in one sentence is a monumental order, but here is a sample of my thinking. With inflation running wild we will have to face squarely our money problems and search out ways to stretch our dollars in order to live within our budget. As a preface to my answers to your questions, I would like it known that none of my remarks are to be interpreted as criticism of the present or past Boards of Directors. If I differ with the past practices of the Board it is ony because I firmly believe that we must have new thinking and new approaches when they are required. Progress is not made by following a hard line of precedence. Also, it must be said that the act of becoming a Candidate or the acquisition of the title "Director" has not in the past, and will not now or in the future, endow anyone with an immediate all-knowing and all-wise brilliance. Having said that, let me go on with my answer to the first question.


At the May meeting, Don Holmes demonstrated the new

HEALTH TALKS

Q. My condition has been diagnosed as osteoarthritis. What type of treatment could I expect from medical practitioners and chiropractors?


Osteoarthritis is better known as degenerative joint disease. It has been estimated that about 40 million American adults have this disease. It usually involves the breaking down of the cartilage covering the bone surfaces in the joint followed by alteration of the bone surfaces, such as the growth of bone spurs, which could eventually fuse the joint together. Many factors are considered instrumental in the development of the condition, such as wear & tear, injury, metabolic disturbances & genetic predisposition. Medical treatment typically involved includes: (1) Pain suppression by drugs, (2) Surgical repair & replacement of damaged joints, (3) Physiotherapy, (4) Orthopedic support & taking weight or load off joint. Chiropractors may treat the problem by: (1) Manipulation of joints calculated to correct nerve disorders & correct joint geometry, (2) Nutritional guidance to correct metabolic disturbances & remove biochemical irritants, (3) Muscle balancing techniques to correct the forces of muscles on the involved joint, (4) Physiotherapy for improved blood flow & pain relief.

Q. What is Applied Kinesiology?

A. This is a method of evaluating normal & abnormal body function by using simple muscle strength tests: The principle includes the evaluation of nerve, vascular & lymphatic systems, nutrition, acupuncture and cerebral spinal fluid function.




The music-mix provided by Ed Abdelnour via his fine tapes was excellent. The Swing-Disco-Dance Committee is credited with another delightful evening of dance.
