ANNOUNCEMENTS

ADDITIONAL LIBRARY HOURS FOR EXAM WEEK - In addition to its usual hours of opening, the Library will be open Friday evening, March 12, and Sunday evening, March 14, until 9:00 p.m. During the recess between quarters, the Library will not be open Saturdays and Sundays, but will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The regular Library schedule will be resumed on March 31.

BOOKSTORE STAYS OPEN - The bookstore will be open during the quarter break from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

CAFETERIA CLOSURES - The cafeteria will be closed from March 22 to March 26. It will re-open during registration on March 29.

PARKING DECALS - Third quarter parking decals may be purchased by all campus personnel during the week of March 29 through April 4, 1971.

PLACEMENT NEWS - Information received from the College Placement Council indicates that positions offered to Bachelor's degree candidates are down 61% from those offered a year ago in March, 1970, which was considered a bad year for candidates. The down turn in the nation's economy, resulting in substantially reduced employer needs, is a primary reason for the sizeable drop in the number of offers recorded thus far. It also appears that candidates have been rapidly accepting offers and therefore, employers are also holding back on making offers until late Spring when the economic picture may be more promising.

The local job market also appears critical as few companies have indicated an interest in interviewing on the Cal State Bakersfield campus and the local school districts do not anticipate many openings for the coming year. Seniors and graduate students interested in pursuing job opportunities are urged to contact the Counseling and Placement Center, Student Services Building, Room 112, as soon as possible.

SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION - The Scottish Rite Bodies is offering twelve scholarships of \$300 each for the coming academic year. The deadline for filing an application is April 23. Please contact the Financial Aids Office in Student Services Building, Room 110, if you are interested in applying.

DEGREE CANDIDATES - Candidates for degrees to be awarded at the end of the Spring, 1971, quarter must file an Application for Degree no later than April 6 in the Office of Admissions and Records. Candidates will have to obtain special permission from the Director or Assistant Director of Admissions and Records to file an Application of Degree later than April 6.

Candidates for degrees to be awarded in August, 1971, must file an Application for Degree no later than the end of the Spring, 1971, quarter.

All students are urged to apply for graduation the quarter before they plan to graduate so that they may be notified prior to the advising and registration period for their last quarter of any deficiencies in graduation requirements.

Students who have questions about their Application for Degree or about degree requirements are urged to contact Mrs. Whitaker in the Office of Admissions and Records (833-2147).

Registration

Due to Spring Vacation, the Roadrunner will not be published on March 22. Look for it again on March 29.

REGISTRATION

All students are reminded that registration for the Spring Quarter will begin at 9 a.m. on Monday, March 29 for Seniors (please see the registration priority schedule). Classes will begin March 31. Late registration runs from March 31 through April 6. More complete information is outlined in the class schedule which can be purchased in the bookstore.

Registration Procedure

1. All students must meet with a faculty advisor to plan their academic program. If this is not completed during the regular pre-enrollment period, appointments may be made at the School/Division office during registration.
2. A Program Request Card must be completed by each student with the assistance of his advisor. This card must be signed by the advisor.
3. If you completed and filed a Program Request Card during pre-registration, report to Station 1, Northeast Door, Science Building on March 29 (according to registration priority schedule) and pick up registration packet.
4. Students should check the accuracy of all forms and make corrections if necessary. The corrected Student Personal Data Form is left at Station II.
5. Students proceed to Station III, East door of Lecture Building 100 to obtain class cards.
6. Station IV is the check point for all students who are planning to complete requirements for a teaching credential.
7. Station V is the final check point before leaving the building. All forms will be checked for accuracy.

Note: Students planning to complete graduation requirements at the end of the current quarter must report to Station VI, Office of Admissions and Records, to obtain an Application for Graduation unless they have already been approved for June graduation by the Office of Admissions and Records.

8. Students complete registration by taking the Registration Packet to Station VII, Business Office, to pay fees, file Registration Packet and obtain I.D. Card.
