



Unfortunately the Examiner Treasurer, who was told to give me the money to forward, has been for several months on a vacation in Europe, and until he returns no one else has the needed authority.

I thank you very much personally for the things you have sent, which will fit well into a building of the Alhambra type which will be built probably next year.

On June 2nd I send the following cable to you; OPTION ON CEILINGS EXPIRES JUNE FIFTEENTH, BYNE. Yesterday I received your letter of May 17th describing the growth of your project but in which you say nothing definite about the ceilings for which I take it for granted that they have been dropped.

To tell the plain truth, Miss Morgan, I cannot do business with Mr.Hearst. Since my first disastrous dealings with him I have found out a great deal about him from dealers in Paris. He makes a business (and incidentally considerable gain) of holding people off for years and then settling on his own terms. Now, of course that is all right when you are dealing with Duveen or Seligmann because their prices cover all eventualities. But I quoted prices to Mr.Hearst for one quarter of what he would have to pay in either New York or Paris, but of course on a strictly cash basis. I have no wish to handle his money and have explained on several occasions how the payment can be made.

When I say all this I don't mean that I am not willing to cooperate with you and Mr.Hearst; in fact nothing would give me greater pleasure. But my first experience (that of the little house in Granada) proved to me that I must above all protect myself first in dealings with Mr.Hearst. I have never had a word from him though I have written innumerable letters. There is no use in sending me a cable "BUY ETC. ETC." when the amount involves thousands and thousands of dollars; I have not the money and there is no reason why I should employ it if I had. Furthermore Mr.Hearst is utterly unknown in Spain for which reason he can't buy here on credit as elsewhere.

If however you wish me to ppurchase anything in particular I should be pleased to cooperate on the same basis as when I bought the Toledo ceiling and the Calatayud cornice.

Hoping that you understand my point of view in this matter and that you don't consider me ungrateful believe me,

Dear Mr. Byne: At last you have convinced Mr. Hearst that you mean what you say as to cash business !. for yesterday after looking up at your ceiling, just placed, he expressed his liking for it. disappeared, and a few minutes later came back with the enclosed check, saying to please send it to you to use as opportunity offered. He did not mention the ceiling fiasco -- but I i imagine from other information that he could not provide that amount of actual cash, however much he may have wanted to -- and I know he did want those ceilings. The things you have sent are excellent for our purposes. We have plenty of rejas -unless extra fine -- but doors, trims, "motifs" we can repeat or inspire from, columns, mantels. ceilings, etc. -- would be welcome. If you do not want to, it will not hurt my feelings in the least if you return the check. With kindest regards to Mrs. Byne and yourself always, Sincerely yours. JM-deM

Your letter of August 1st with its enclosure of a cheque for \$5000 to be spent at my discretion for Mr.Hearst has been duly received. Thank you very much for your intervention in the matter; I have faith in you but I confess that at times my confidence in your client is somewhat shaken. You will always find us ready to collaborate enthusiastically once affairs are put on a ressonably sound basis.

I have noted carefully the things you are most interested in and shall buy accordingly., sending you detailed bills as on former occasions.

It may interest you to know that our antique business has grown into a really important enterprise. I have taken over a well-equipped shop where I do all my own restoration and where I make special reproductions. This became quite necessary as now we undertake to completely furnish houses in the Spanish manner and obviously there are not enough antiques for all modern requirements.

I regret too Mr. Hearst's inability to purchase the collection of ceilings and other architectural fragments. The owner now feels rather bitter toward me and I fear I can never approach him again.

On September 18th I sent you the following telegram;

SEVEN CEILINGS REDUCED TO SIXTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS CASH NET - GREAT BARGAIN - BYNE

This information I obtained some days after writing my letter of August 28th in which the ceilings in question were described and in which I enclosed photographs. At that time I could only quote you prices per ceiling.

By "net" I meant that my commission of ten percent, likewise the cost of boxing (which generally runs three of four percent of cost of shipment) were included. This would mean that the actual cost of the ceilings would be less than \$14,000.

Once I have your approval (and I must add, the money) I am not sure that I still can't reduce the amount slightly. I know the owner is in need of money and if I approach him with the bills in hand I haveuaefeeling that perhaps \$500 more could be knocked off. However this last I venture on my own responsibility and in your clients interest.

I have succeeded in getting some excellent things with the \$5000 sent but will write you in reference to that later.

It was some days after receiving your cable regarding the ceilings before I was able to get in touch with Mr. Hearst and make him understand just what they were and how we could use them. I hope it was not too late as I have place for them all. Enclosed is a check for \$16000 for the seven.

The ceilings I knew of, as the photographs were sent me last year by Mr. Francis Howard -- so I recognized them at once.

If you can find a few large mantels it would be appreciated. We have a refectory thirty feet high by twenty-six wide by seventy-six feet long with an eleven foot high by sixteen foot wide mantel, but on account of the fineness of the carving it is not effective and something very striking is wanted.

Fountain pieces are needed, some large old statuary groups - big - for out doors, a section of cloister arches if fine, -- 1 have developed an absorptive capacity that seems ungodly when I stop to reflect.

as regards Mr. Hearst's relations with dealers, I imagine there are two sides to it, judging from the material he has bought that I have handled these past six years. He very much appreciates your knowledge and "differentness", and I hope by acting as a sort of clearing house between you two, you will come to appreciate his other side as I do.

By the way, Mrs. Hearst is bound for Spain with your address and if she has not already called, is due to look you up. Should you have anything very strikingly fine in mind to show her, it would be good, as while she would not purchase probably, she



Dear Miss Morgan;

I was naturally delighted when I received your cable stating that the cheque for \$16,000 had been mailed; to-day I have just received the cheque. Thank you for your cooperation and alacrity in the matter.

I am not in the least surprised that you had previously received photographs of the ceilings in question for the owner has been trying hard to dispose of them for two years. In true Spanish fashion he started off with a perfectly outrageous asking price. He has gradually come down off his high horse and hearing a month or so ago that he was really "hard-up" (he is a former politician hit by the new regime in Spain) I made him a low offer which he reluctantly accepted.

I first saw the ceilings 8 years ago (then in situ) when we were gathering material for our ceiling book. It was a famous old palace at Guadix, in the Province of Granada, now a God-forsaken town. The oldest portion was built by Zagal (which name the palace bore), uncle of Boabdil, the last of the Moorish Kings of Granada. It was lived in after the Conquest by the Catholic Kings and added to subsequently. Three of the ceilings, of Moorish influence, date from the end of the 15th century; the remainder are late 16th. I am sending a little magazine article which briefly describes the palace.

Four years ago I heard that the Palace of Zagal was being torn down. The next day I was on the train; but I was not the first to arrive. A syndicate of Granada antiquarians had bought all the ceilings. I did manage to get a number of smaller things, however, doors, shutters, etc. and a of smaller things, however, doors, shutters, etc. and a fine well head. While the ceilings were held by a group the price was impossible. Later one member, the aforementoned politician, bought out all the others and he has been holding them ever since.

The minute I received your table accepting the price I went to Granada to complete the sale and arrange the packing. Only a portion of each ceiling was in Granada, the remainder still in Gaudix. I spent several days there directing the reesembing of the ceilings into bays. Each bay will be boxed separately and carefully marked so that you will have the minimum of work when the ceilings arrive (which was not the case with the Toledo example, I know). This boxing is going now at Guadix and Granada. Once this is terminated they will be shipped to Gibraltar and put in the hands of the American Express Co's agent there.

As hinted in my last letter I was able to drive a better bargain but instead of witholding the gain I put it into a number of fragments lying around the now half-dismantled palace. These consist of

4 groups of enormous wooden corbels, three corbels to a group (which rested on the corner columns of the principal patio; the principal iron balcony over the entrance, about ten feet long; 4 pairs of fine old doors.

I value the above things at about \$750. The boxing of everything (which as I said was included in the price) is a big item for wood is very expensive in Spain, comes to nearly \$1200; my commission of ten percent is approximately \$1500. So you may say that the ceilings come to about \$12,500, which I think is very reasonable. Furthermore such mouldings as were broken, particularly bed-moulds, I have had recarved and replaced; in other words everything put in "apple-pie" order.

I have noted your instructions about sending shipping papers to Mr.McGregor, New York City.

I am not going to burden you here with my investing of the separate fund of \$5000; it is spent and the things are now being packed. I will make out the usual list and bill in a few days.

My wife and I have been asked to undertake a trip to Egypt to supervise some recent excavations and do a little writing. Obviously we are not Egyptologists but our host, who is a wealthy amateur archaeologists seems to have confidence is a wealthy amateur archaeologists seems to have confidence in us. Dear Miss Morgan:

This letter concerns itself wholly with the \$5000 sent by you in August. When you see the things purchased I am sure you will have to agree with me that the money was well invested; whether I have been able to devine your necessities is, of course, another matter. Everything is thoroughly genuine - quite unlike the mountains of stuff sent to New York for auction which is for the most part entirely made up.

I am enclosing herewith an itemized statement of the purchases, with their approximate sizes, their century, and their cost (including my commission) in dollars. I thought it better to recast the account in dollars for you would then be better able to visualize the values.

Just a brief description of the objects in detail;

No.1 In the less important churches where the cost of an iron reja was often prohibitive, wooden ones were substituted. To-day these are successfully employed between arcades or to divide up large rooms. This is the one item somewhat delapidated but as I knew you would have to make it over I didn't bother to restore it. (Most of the remaining woodwork has gone through my shop).

No.2 Very fine iron gate with decoratively wrought cresting. This may be considered as typical of the best period of Spanish ironwork - pure Castilian, from the province of Segovia.

No.3 Rather a superior window grille; you said you would like to have a few pieces of ironwork if they were of distinctive quality.

No4. Small pair of Plateresque columns; formerly forming part of a retable. These are effectively used to-day in connection with mantles.

No.5 Three richly carved and polychromed wooden panels Spanish Renaissance carving at its best. These once formed part of the frieze of a salon in a Castilian palace. Two are of the size given, the third is 4 feet long.

No. 6 and 7 Two pairs of remarkably fine paneled doors, each of the four leaves with their postern openings. The hardware is all intact and particularly good; as you are probably well aware the problem of hardware is always a trying one.

No.8 In your last letter you spoke of the need of some fountains. Marble or stone fountains are rare in Spain. The traditional was the low basin and spout. The one I am sending came from the old Royal Palace at La Granja. I can't say that there is anything particularly Spanish about it, in fact it might pass for Italian, but it is attractive.

No.9 Pair of small window shutters with posterns. These came from the town of Ecija in Andalusia famed for its doors and shutters which are characterized always by a broken silhouette

No.10 Fair of narrow doors with carved panels from Ronda in Southern Spain; the Andalusian door often has carved panels in contrast to the more severe cabinet work of Castile.

No.11 One of the most beautiful wooden portals that has come to my attention in years. Grape-vine columns free-standing front of the jamb, rich entablature, and broken pediment. All elaborately treated in polychrome and gilt.

No.12 Pair of fluted wooden cloumns with Corinthian caps gilded and decorated in color.

No. 13 Remarkably fine closely paneled door from the Convent of La Madre de Dios in Toledo. Spanish cabinet work at its best. To be used indoors.

No. 14 This is the piece de resistance and the only instance where perhaps I can be accused of having been extravagant. On the other hand there is nothing like

Julia Morgan (3) these ceiling panels left in Spain to-day. These formed one of the three painted ceilings in the famous 14th-century House of the Jew in Teruel, province of Aragon. One of the three went to Paris 20 years ago, a second was bought by the Count of Almenas and forms a valuable unit in his very valuable collection) photos of which I once sent you; in his catalog this ceiling is listed at 80,000 pesetas - \$12,000). The third example has been hidden away for years and was brought to my attention several years ago. The minute I received your cheque I went after it. The beams were for the most part rotted away or broken in the dismantling but this is of no importance as they are very simple to duplicate. I shall make a drawing of just how this ceiling was originally put together. Half the panels consists of medieval figures and the remainder of arabesques. This is really a treasure, Miss Morgan, and one which I envy you the pleasure of putting together (and Mr. Hearst the honor of owning). No.15 Pair of simple paneled doors, wide. My experience with sending material to California and Florida is that one needs doors, and then more doors; in fact one may say that doors make the Spanish interior Fireplaces, important or otherwise, are difficult to secure in Spain. At present I know of only one, a Gothic chimneypiece, now taken down, but still in the old castle of which it once formed part. Its noble owner insists that the mantle is complete; I insist that it is not. And as 25,000 pesetas (\$3500) is the least he will consider, the question of its being intact is rather important. I will enclose a little sketch of it with approximate dimensions. For big chimneypieces I generally look for an old sarcophagus and then pick up some columns and on top of these build a hood, perhaps working in an eschtcheon. Mrs. Hearst finally abandoned her trip to Spain, I understand. We were out of town last year when she was in Madrid. Thank you for thinking of us. Yes it would be a great pleasure to have a chat with you above all here at our house. Do you never get away? You know all work makes Jack a dull boy (I must be extremely dull for I have never stopped a moment for years). However I shall do all I can; who knows, stranger things than this have happened in Spain.

We are having a most delightful trip on the Nile. Our host who is a most enthusiastic amateur archaeologist depends a great deal on us to assist him in his endeavors, and while we are far from being Egyptologists we do our best. Once we reach the Valley of the Kings (Tut-amhk-amen's resting place) we hope to do a little investigation and perhaps

excavating. In any case whether or not we find anything worth while it is all a delightful experience for us. I find myself growing very keen over Egyptian art, particularly the smaller household furnishings. Also the sculpture is magnificent, far more inspiring to the modern than the material and perfect work of classic Greece and Rome.

Just as soon as I receive any information pertaining to the material you are interested in I shall communicate with you. We shall return to Spain about the first of March, if not sooner.
