But in last month's profile of Chuck Gooley, we failed to identify the author of the article, our most prolific staff writer, Patty Ecker. ## Newest LV board member jumps right in

He's a nationally known expert on employee health insurance, a native Hoosier who learned his work ethic in an Indiana town named Rushville, population 5,900, an enthusiastic performer in musical theater, and a golfer whose scores often are neck-and-neck with his wife's on the Leisure Village course. Now add this: Chuck Kiskaden is the newest member of the Leisure Village Board of Directors.

Chuck and his wife Judi moved here three years ago from a large, two-story house in Wood Ranch.

"My bad knees love it here," he laughs. And he jumped right into Village life, figuratively speaking. He worked on a proposal for a permanent box office in the Rec Center. He became a member of the Ed & Rec Committee. He joined a theatrical workshop with musical director and Villager Richard Weiss. "The last play I was in was "Brigadoon," in high school," he says. "I always wanted to learn more about performing in musical theatre." Chuck must have been a good student. He got the lead in the Village production of "Pajama Game." He calls the experience "thrilling."

His professional life in insurance began after his service in the Air Force as a

young man. He enrolled at Indiana University and took a part-time job at Blue Cross-Blue Shield. After graduation, that became a full-time position and his 40-year career in health insurance continues. "I know how employers should cover their workers; I know how to guide them to be fiscally smart. I feel good about that," Chuck explains. As the long-time owner of his business, he sets his own schedule (usually about three days a week). That brings us back to Leisure Village. "I have lots of time to volunteer; I've always done it. I like hearing people say "Thank you."

As an LV Board Member, Chuck wants to focus on "connections." He calls the work of Village volunteers "so vibrant and strong." But he believes that there is a need to better connect the larger community with the Board. "Do residents know that the Board cares? Are discussions about issues shared?" he asks. Increased communication between homeowners and the Association is one of his goals.

Chuck likes to read ("Two to three books a week," he says) and play golf in his spare time, often with his wife Judi whom he describes as a "hell of a golfer." Mostly, he stays busy. "Energy keeps me going. It's a thrill to help people."

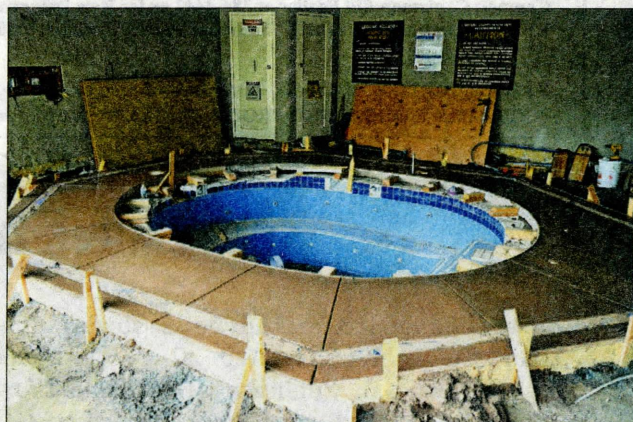

## Progress is being made on aging fitness center

One of the most extensive reconstruction projects in the history of the Village is about to give new life to much of the 42-year-old Rec Center. Nearly three years after the first planning conversations were held, Villagers will be able to enjoy 21st century opportunities for swimming and sunning, fitness and exercise, relaxation and chatting in facilities

built over the past few months.

The list of "new" places is long: a stand-alone Fitness Center, the swimming pool replastered and the deck reconstructed from the gravel up with new tile, the upgraded spa, enlarged men's and women's shower rooms, plus restrooms built from the studs out

# Does solar make sense?

When my son asked me to help install solar panels on his home last year, I did some research into the technology and the costs. The options were varied: from purchase and installation costs of more than \$45,000 minus a 30 percent government rebate to a deal of zero down for solar panels installed and owned by the solar company which then gets the rebate. The latter plan also required that if we sold our house, the purchasers would have to sign a new solar contract or pay a large cancellation fee.

At that time, our monthly SoCal Edison bills varied between \$200 to \$400 a month. "Going solar" was worth consideration for us. One day I noticed solar panels being installed in Leisure Village. I asked the contractor to give me an estimate. His quote for a system we would own was \$22,000; the 30 percent rebate would be ours, and the panels would cover at least 90 percent of our electric bill. We made the deal and paid in cash from our savings.

A few months later, we bought an electric car. An electrical charge for the vehicle

is about 10KW, which would have cost more than we previously paid for gas for our car. Now we have no gasoline costs or electric bills. The money that would have gone to pay for them now goes back into our savings at a rate of about \$500 a month. We estimate we will pay ourselves back in approximately four years.

After our first complete year of using solar power, we have zeroed out our utility costs. And unless we drive more than 40 miles a day, we have no gasoline costs either. We are much more aware of conservation and power usage now. We pay SoCal Edison less than \$2 a month to be connected to the grid should our solar panels not produce enough power to cover our usage. If we were to sell our house, our panels will be an asset.

I know that solar power is not for everyone. But it makes sense for us.

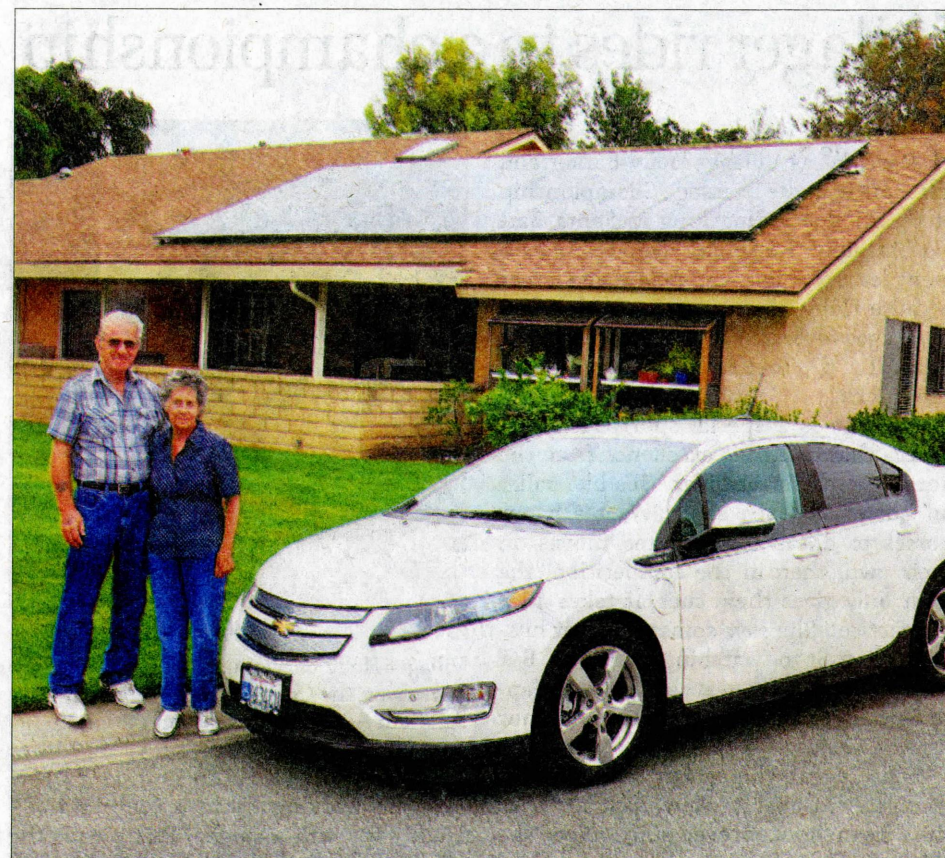

Ron and Marg Quick go electric with the Chevy Volt and the solar panels.

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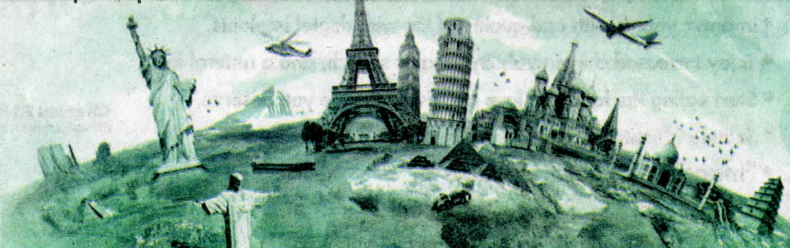
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# Villager rides to a championship

Her horse was appropriately named "Watch Me" as Villager Holly Barker and her mare won the Dressage Championship at the Modoc Riding Ring in Santa Barbara in June. An impressive accomplishment for any equestrian made even larger because Holly was competing with riders of all ages (over 21), and she earned First Prize. "I'm 63. They call us vintage riders," she laughs.

Dressage is a special sport, Holly explains, that demands excellence from the horse as well as the rider. "It's like ballet on horseback," she says. "We teach our horses to do all the required moves on their own; then in the competition, the rider only gives them cues. It takes a lot of practice." She says sometimes her husband likens it to "watching paint dry." But she has loved it for years and goes to Santa Barbara to ride and train three to four times a week.

Holly began horseback riding as a youngster in upstate New York and says she's been hooked ever since. Now she rides with her granddaughter and daughter regularly. Her daughter practices jumping, while 15-year-old "Watch Me" and Holly fine-tune their dressage routines.

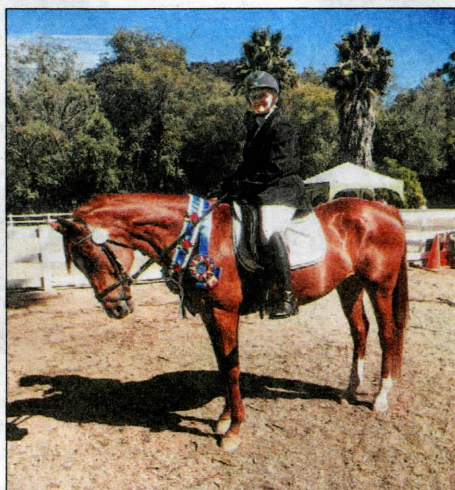

"We are working up to a century ride," Holly says with a laugh. "That means the combined years of horse and rider is 100. We have a long way to go." It's likely more championship ribbons will come first.

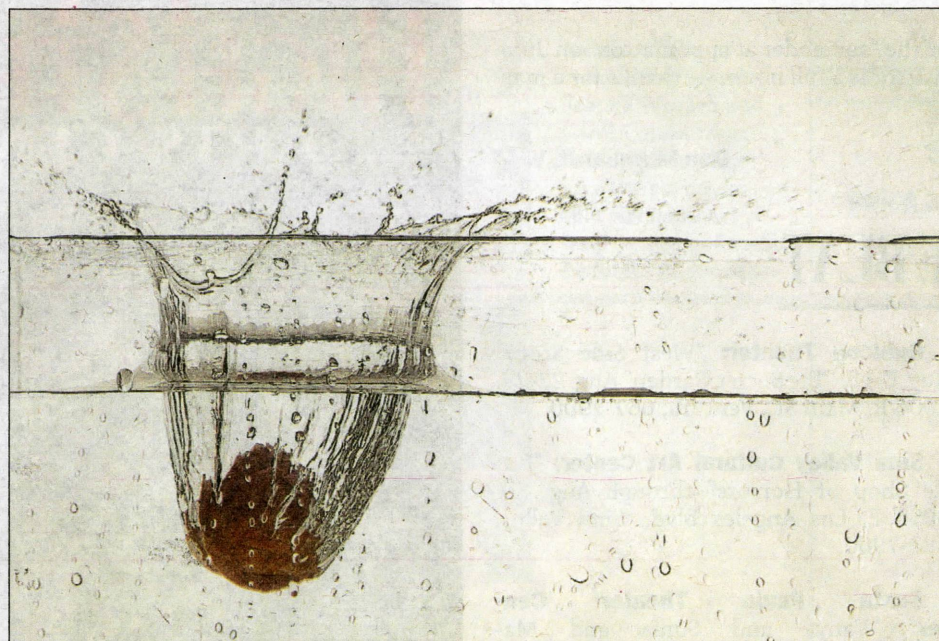
The next season will commence on Friday, Sept. 4—the Friday before Labor Day—and will continue until May 13.

Camera club winner, 1st place Assigned; WHAT A NUTTY CATEGORY, Don Treadwell

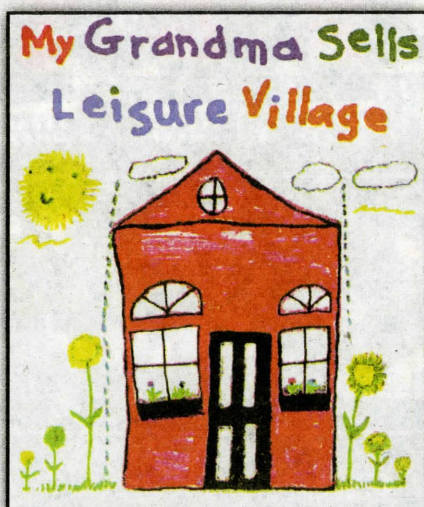
of these shows, where possible. Too many of these great entertainers are no longer with us, but the Players Guild has been blessed with new talent that will replace those that are gone.

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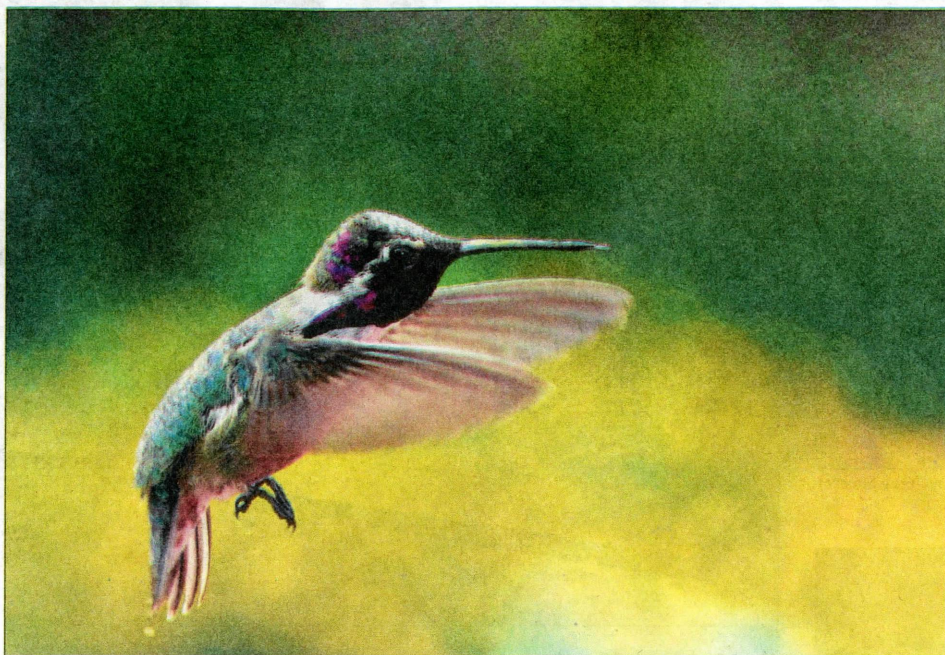

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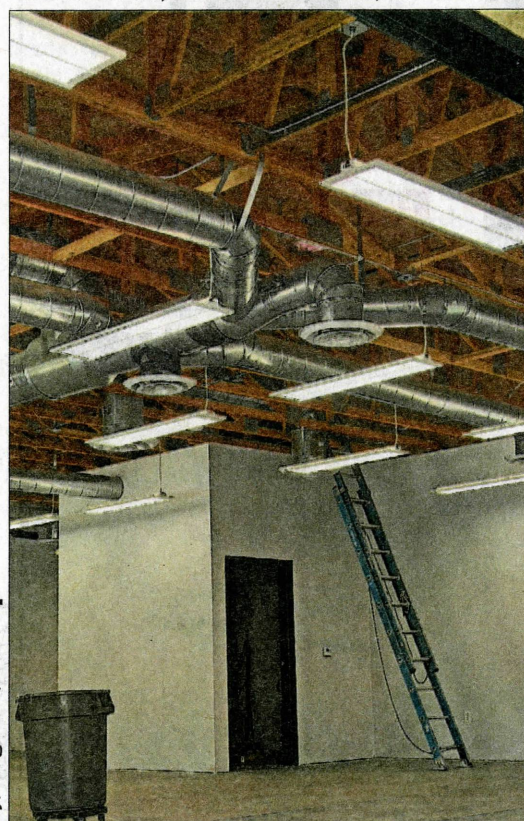
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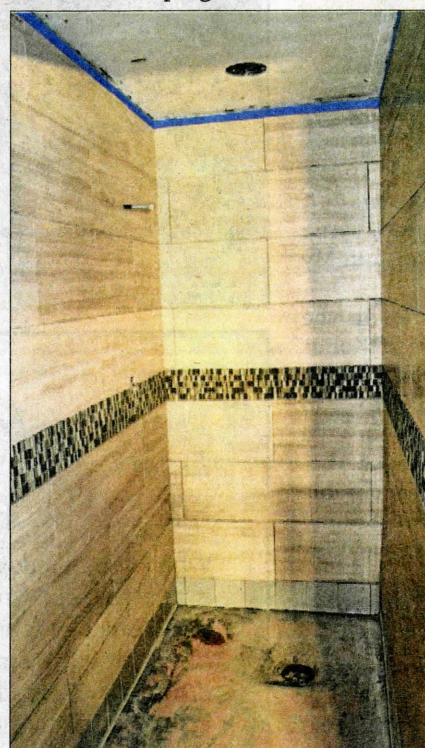

which are totally compliant with ADA standards. The cost, estimated at over \$500,000, was kept low because many Village employees have worked on the project.

Nothing has been merely remodeled; these projects represent modernization from scratch. The Fitness Center, for example, has all new state-of-the-art equipment made specifically for seniors' range of exercise, from weight machines constructed to accommodate people who use wheel chairs to treadmills and

free weights fit for the most rigorous workout. The new building is more than twice as big as the old room, has large windows, special soft flooring, and new lighting. One new addition is a stretching table (nearly the size of a double bed) for those who used to be relegated to a mat on the floor for their leg lifts.

The swimming pool deck was strengthened and constructed in layers of gravel, then sand, concrete and pavers. "It's going to be gorgeous," observed General Manager Bob Scheaffer a few weeks ago, as dozens of workers fanned out across the area with materials to create a safe and attractive center for hundreds of

swimmers, walkers, volleyball players and aerobics fans.

Perhaps the most total renovation was required in the shower rooms and restrooms in the Rec Center. The designs and plumbing were original, which means vintage 1970's. "It was awful," said one worker "We had to get rid of everything right down to the studs." Now regulars to these rooms might not recognize them. Each shower stall has a privacy door, individual lights and fans, even fold-down chairs for clothes and towel. There's new tile over the walls and new plumbing with glass accent tiles throughout. Clothing lockers are

built in; no more clanging metal ones like we had in high school.

The project was slow to begin, due to what seemed like endless delays and requests for revisions by various government agencies. Things shifted into high gear in early June when the pool was closed and an army of construction workers arrived. At press time, one more government certificate had to be obtained. But then it's "Everyone into the pool... or the Fitness Center ... or onto a new lounge chair on the new deck."

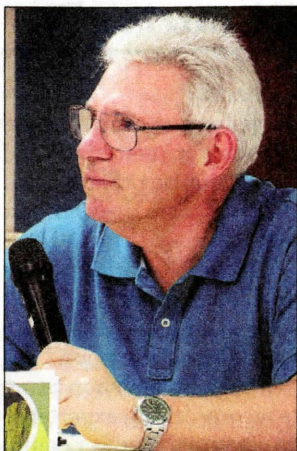
