



If you need a refresher, let's get together and discuss taking care of ourselves. As you know, during each session, we


discuss improving our breathing patterns so that shortness of breath does not become a problem.







time and unique expertise to improving Village life.

Though he made many contributions, the major one was the most visible: Most of the lighting and electronics in the AR relied greatly on his experience, and he personally arranged the stage lighting. For countless shows and events, Art was up in the little booth directing the lighting.

For years, he was also the main TV camera operator for our Board meetings, and he spent thousands of hours installing and monitoring the announcements on the Village television channel.

Any Villager could phone Art at any time and he would go to their homes to install, arrange or troubleshoot their VCRs and TVs, never charging for what added

up to possibly thousands of hours of personal effort.

Art also is part of a record that may never again occur in the Village. He was one of five siblings who, with his four sisters, all lived in their own homes here at the same time. With his death, only his youngest sister, Rosalie Volan, the original Villager, now lives here.

Art and his devoted wife, Miriam, came to the Village after his distinguished career in the motion picture industry. Starting as a movie set electrician, he rose swiftly to the top of his craft to become a gaffer — the lighting director, responsible for lighting all that appears on all movie and TV screens. In his time, he worked with some of the most respected directors and cameraman in the motion picture and television industries. including the late Henry

Koster, also a longtime Village resident.

After service in the Merchant Marine, Art served honorably in World War II as a first mate, second-in-command of a naval minesweeper and troop carrier, handling ships' cargo and navigation. He was a wizard in mathematics, and he was the trigonometry and geometry tutor for his many nieces and nephews.

He loved motorcycles, and when the day of traveling on his "big hog" was over, Art got himself a little green motorbike, on which he could be seen traveling the Village streets, almost to the end, helmet on his head, heading for the Rec Center or

someone's home to fix or install a VCR or TV.

Following his wife's death, it was increasingly difficult for Art to endure the lonely days without

He was an original free thinker like his father George, an immigrant from Lodz, Poland. Though fiercely independent, personally courageous and self-sufficient to a fault (like his mother, Sarah), Art would always willingly help anyone with anything but seldom if ever asked for help for himself.

He will be deeply missed by all who knew and loved him - and by the Village he loved and served.





Like a big small town. Leisure Village has big and small problems, most easily handled by the professional staff. Some problems are ongoing, and some involve the infighting and personality clashes that cause many to decide they will not volunteer for anything.

As for serving on the Board, many residents see it as too demanding and dislike the delicate balance required of successful Board members as they oversee professional management while also setting policies that involve change — change that threatens the status quo and leads to resistance and opposition that sometimes comes with anger and personal attacks. When that happens, a non-paying Board position seems like more trouble than it is worth.

Then there are the "hot button" issues, like the ongoing budget process and the recent multi-year landscaping and water projects that provoke strong advocacy and equally strong and determined resistance, often resulting in unwarranted suspicions on either side of an issue. All can lead to sometimes deep and lasting hostilities affecting even friends and neighbors.

And residents who led active, hectic lives in pursuit of complicated careers before their welldeserved and welcome

retirement cannot be blamed for avoiding volunteer activities that they feel might threaten their health and well-being.

All that aside, with a population of more than 2,000 homeowners, there are still many who possess excellent credentials and records of prior achievement who would make perfect Board members, in spite of the rare rough

times that occur.

The Village's problem is how to overcome the resistance that is often summed up in dismissive questions that reveal the negative feelings many of us have when asked to get involved in overseeing anything beyond our own residences, families and personal finances.

Generally, those who turn down offers to volunteer ask questions along these lines: "Are you crazy? Why would I want that? Why get involved in all that bickering and disagreement? Why give my time and effort for little more than a big pain?"

Since in so much of modern life, "perception is reality," the attitudes

mean fewer qualified homeowners will run for the Board.

By choosing not to serve, some positive things that new ideas would bring to the Village, plans to change the future, will not be realized — and some things that we might not like to see happen to the Village could happen because enough of us do not volunteer, do not run for the Board.

A few months ago, I noted some things that the Board might consider for the future, programs or changes that require involvement.

Here is an updated list of ideas:

- Consider adding more walkways off the two main roads, through greenbelts accessible to most if not all of the villages.
- Plant even more drought-resistant vegetation to further reduce costly water usage.
- Work harder to convince homeowners that potable water is expensive and in increasingly threatened supply.
- Consider more color schemes and innovative

architectural changes.

- Engage in more dialogue with homeowners about the Village's future, like the recycled water projects.
- Call on talented and experienced residents to investigate ways we can exploit energy alternatives, such as solar power on all Village buildings.
- Find more effective ways to enforce our simple speed limits.
- Make greater use of our TV facilities to increase the flow of information between Villagers and the Board and, perhaps, as some suggest, there

Many homeowners have ideas that they would


