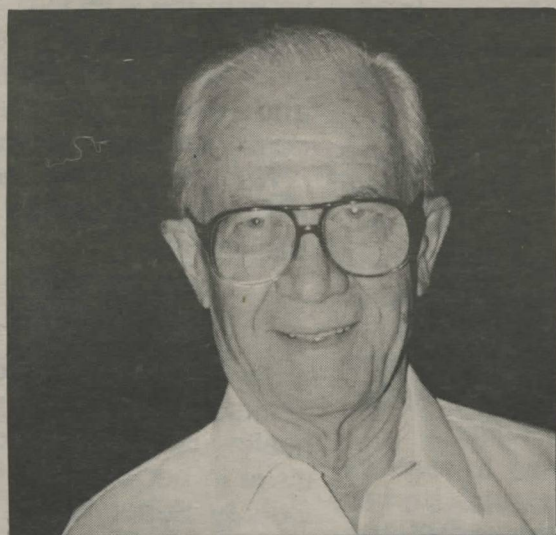

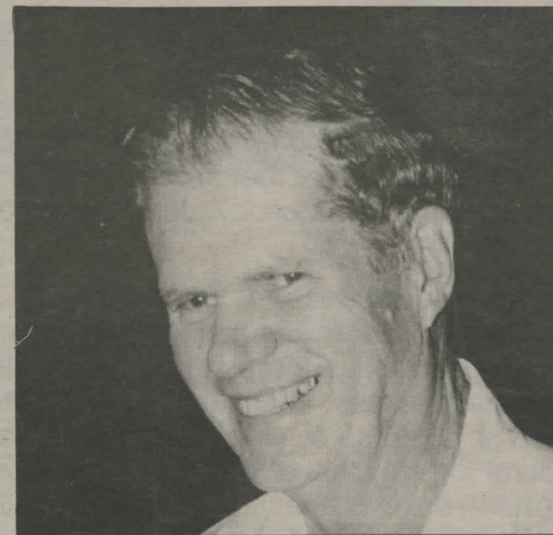

Current Issues Forum: Media's Role In Society

The next meeting of the Current Issues Forum will be held on Fri. June 5 in the AR at 7:30 p.m.

The subject will be "The Media's Role in Society." In the aftermath of the Los Angeles riots, the press has been criticized on several points. The Forum will focus on these points: A. Was it in the public interest to print the jurors' names and possibly expose them to threats to their safety? B. Coverage of the riots by TV stations and possibly inciting more people to come into the streets to loot and burn. If the media begins to distort or omit news, what kind of trend does that set? What kind of forums exist for people and their leaders to discuss what course of action should be taken to address problems in the inner cities?

Speaking on this subject will be Julie Doll, editor and publisher of the Camarillo Daily News.

Village Painting Procedures

During the next six months the wood trim and fences on certain Villages will be painted. As their dates come up residents will be instructed to remove all plants, pots and window boxes from fences and shelves. The removal and replacement is the responsibility of the resident.

Should the painters have to remove plants in order to proceed with their painting they WILL NOT be responsible for replacing them.

Painting of the inside of

patio fences remains the responsibility of the homeowners. Surfaces of the divider fences between patios will be painted by the Association, however. These areas must be accessible to the painters.

Villagers may purchase approved paints in one-quart and in one-gallon cans at the Association office.

Villages to be painted and the approximate dates are Village 16 between June 1-19, and Village 34 between June 17-30.

Voting Rights

This issue of *INSIDE LEISURE VILLAGE* features information on candidates currently running for the Board of Directors. These three homeowners will also appear Monday, June 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the AR when Villagers will have an opportunity to "Meet Your Candidates."

This program will be telecast live on Channel 12 and the tape will repeat the program on Tuesday, June 16 on Channel 12 at 7:00 p.m. All this coverage is intended to give homeowners a chance to cast informed votes on or before the Annual Meeting which is set for Wednesday, June 24 at 10:00 a.m. in the AR.

Residents will receive the CALL TO ANNUAL MEETING by first class mail at their homes about June 1. Enclosed is a green ballot listing the Board candidates' names. Homeowners can vote early if they wish to do so or vote in person at the meeting on June 24. Whichever method voters choose, the important point is that they should VOTE!

This is YOUR chance to select the two new Board members, who, along with the three continuing Board members, make policy decisions affecting all Village residents. Voting is therefore a right and a responsibility.

In order for the Annual Meeting to proceed a majority of the eligible voters must be represented by either having cast their votes or filed their proxies.

Two years ago a quorum was not reached by the time the Annual Meeting was convened. This resulted in a one week delay in holding the Annual Meeting while a get-out-the-vote campaign was conducted.

The lack of a quorum was disgraceful.

The delay cost each homeowner money since several procedures had to be repeated resulting in additional costs for preparing notifications, postage, attorney fees, etc. Many additional hours of volunteer time were also spent to prepare for this second meeting.

Also on the green ballot is Measure G the question of financing a roof for the shuffleboard court building. This project was not included in this year's LVA budget. If homeowners want the project done now, they must approve the transfer of funds from the one-month assessment fund for this purpose. If Measure G fails to pass, no action can be taken on the shuffleboard court building this year.

Homeowners may vote their ballots early by marking their choices and depositing them in the locked ballot boxes located in the Recreation Center or the Association Office. Homeowners may also give their proxies to a Village friend or to the Board directly. Whichever method is chosen, the important word is VOTE!

YET, in the same issue of the paper, Mr. Greene will NOT give an opinion on the Ahmanson Ranch which will trade 3,100 new homes for 10,000 acres of public parkland, because "the EIR is due out and an answer must be deferred until it's evaluation."

Am I missing some subtle difference here?

Frankly, Maggie has never flip-flopped to my recollection.

I'll trust Maggie. She doesn't make me laugh. She makes me think.

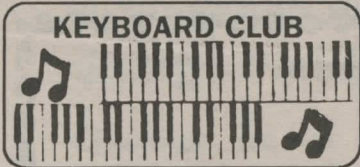

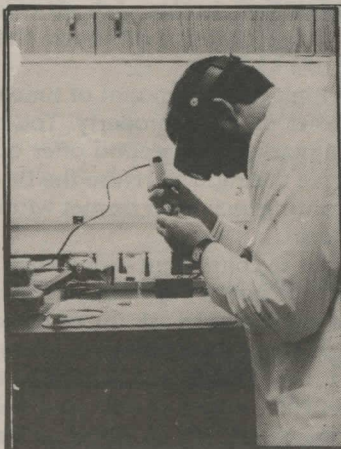

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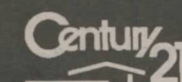
WHEN YOUR BUYER HAS A HOME TO SELL

Over 100 cornea transplants have been made possible by the club's activities. She has also worked with a group helping mentally disturbed children, and with the Brandeis book program which provides scholarships for needy students.

Their home reflects her travels. She has an outstanding collection of antique dolls, iron toys, eggs, netsukes from Japan, and a beautiful silver samovar.

Lillian is an exuberant lady with a great joy in life, a sense of fun, and has the philosophy that we are here to love each other, and to help one another. She practises what she preaches.

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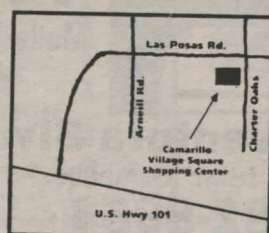
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New Hours For Trash Collection Set By Board

Approved hours for garbage, trash or recyclable material to be set out on LV curbs for collection were changed in a revision passed by the LV Board of Directors at the April 6 open meeting in the AR.

Previously trash was not to be put out until 6:00 p.m. or later, on the night prior to collection. Due to homeowner requests, this was changed to 4:00 p.m. by the Board.

If, for some reason, Harrison Rubbish Co. does not pick up the material on the regularly scheduled day, residents are asked to return the still full containers to their garage for storage by 8:00 pm. on that same day. At times the recycling truck does not complete its rounds in the Village on Fridays, and no one

wants to see trash sitting out on the curb, especially over a weekend.

Residents who do not collect their empty (or full) barrels or containers by 8:00 p.m. may be cited by the LV Security patrol for the eyesore.

New Law On Emergency Medical Response

Do you have a Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care in force? A new law may help you to communicate your wishes in an emergency situation.

Up to now a Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care has not been considered to apply to field Emergency Medical Personnel (EMS). When called upon they have been legally compelled to attempt resuscitation and render other forms of care to patients even when they have expressed through a Living Will or other means, a desire not to have such intervention undertaken. Recent changes in state guidelines have allowed county EMS agencies to establish "DO NOT RESUSCITATE" (DNR) policies for field EMS personnel.

Contact your doctor for the forms needed for this new regulation. If he does not have the forms, he can obtain them from the Ventura County EMS office at 3210 Foothill Road, Ventura, Ca 93003, phone (805) 652-6284.

The completed form will be given an ID number, and duplicates will be sent back to your doctor, you the patient, and the local base hospital. You will also be sent a hospital-type I D bracelet bearing your name, the I D number, the abbreviation DNR and if appropriate, COMFORT ONLY (CO).

Wearing the bracelet is optional, but strongly recommended. Wearing it will greatly reduce the chance of unwanted intervention occurring.

You will have two choices to make: 1. DNR, a wish NOT to be resuscitated or 2. DNR -CO a wish NOT to be resuscitated but given comfort only-- this could mean giving pain medication, etc.

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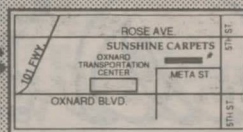
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Nearby Grocery Store Wishes To Thank Villagers For Support

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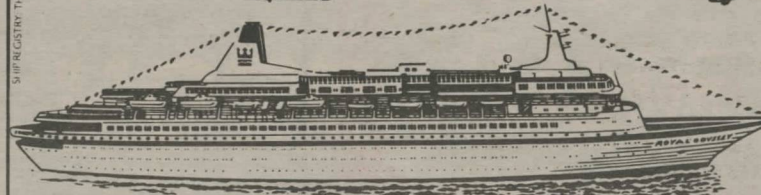


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Book Donation

Birds Of Leisure Village

Many times in this column we have talked about the changing patterns of birds in Leisure Village. When it was new there were no birds here, but because almost all those early residents put out humming bird feeders, these came quickly and stayed. Meadow larks returned to those areas still unbuilt, but as housing developed, they retreated.

By the summer of 1975 there were hundreds of blackbirds with a few of their cousins the orioles and red-wings marching up and down the green-swards of Villages 11, 9, and 8, and of course the golf area.

By another year there were fewer blackbirds but there were linnets, warblers, robins, and mocking birds, song birds that delighted everyone.

In the Fall and Spring, migrant birds were coming in large flocks—espe-

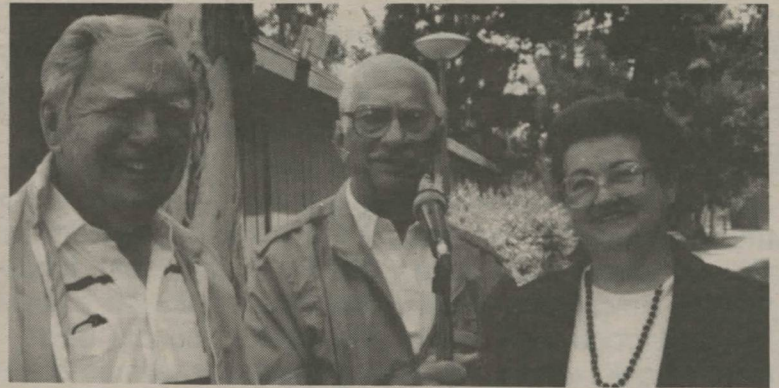

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cially cedar waxwings. Occasional varieties called accidentals came too. Near our southern perimeters by the creek, water birds, especially ducks and killdeer, could be seen and heard. There was a pair of hawks that flew over almost regularly enough by which to set a watch. Often an owl could be heard at night. This was a good ecological mix, which sounds idyllic, doesn't it? It was.

Lately, however, a Spirit of Malevolence has appeared among us.

Sometime about a year ago crows discovered this Eden. These great big, glossy beautiful but very messy birds came—a few at first—but they have proliferated. Especially in the Villages along Santa Rosa Road, 11, 9, 13, and 15 they have settled and driven out practically all the song birds. In Village 11, I have seen only one robin and one mocking bird even looking for a nesting site within the last month.

Crows eat anything, insects, rodents, and grain, but they also eat other

birds' eggs and nestlings. There are only large, healthy, (and cannibalistic) birds carrying sticks and grasses to build their nests to be seen.

L.V. Association Board has been warning people not to feed any birds, except hummers in their special feeders, but it is not unusual to see bread or cake scattered on the lawns. Pet food left outside which is not all consumed immediately may draw both crows and rodents. Increasing the rodent population is another way of feeding the crows.

Crows are 17 to 26 inches long, much larger than the common blackbird, and therefore much more messy. They certainly are undesirable in Leisure Village, but our only way to discourage them is to be careful not to attract them with food.

This article was written about April 1. Since then there have been more song birds, but no fewer crows. I only hope that nature can balance herself.

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Movie-TV Executive Felix Jackson Celebrates 90th Birthday Next Week

Village 41's Felix Jackson, whose stage, movie and TV skills span some 70 years, will reach age 90, a week from today, June 5.

Starting as an author and producer of plays in Berlin in the early 20's, he continued his career in the United States, writing movie scripts for names such as Jimmy Stewart, Deanna Durbin, Margaret Sullivan and Charles Boyer.

One of his outstanding writings was "Destry Rides Again," starring the legendary Marlene Dietrich.

In the early 40's he turned to producing feature films at Universal Studios and later went to New York to write for the new medium: television. Soon after he was back in Hollywood, producing specials for TV.

From 1960 until 1965 he was NBC's VP for Programming and Television for the West Coast. In later years he returned to one of his great loves: writing novels.

His wife Ilka, a graduate of the Vienna Conservatory of Theater Arts, has a long list of credits in theater, cabarets as well as in movies and radio.

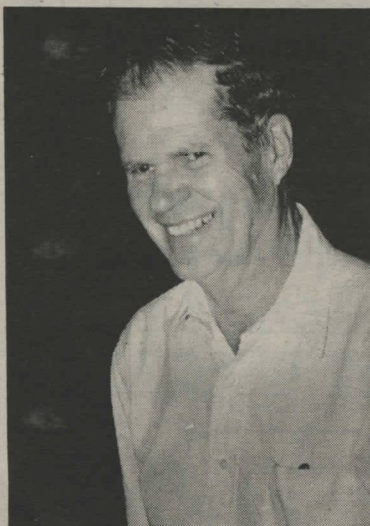
PRIORITIES FOR LEISURE VILLAGE:

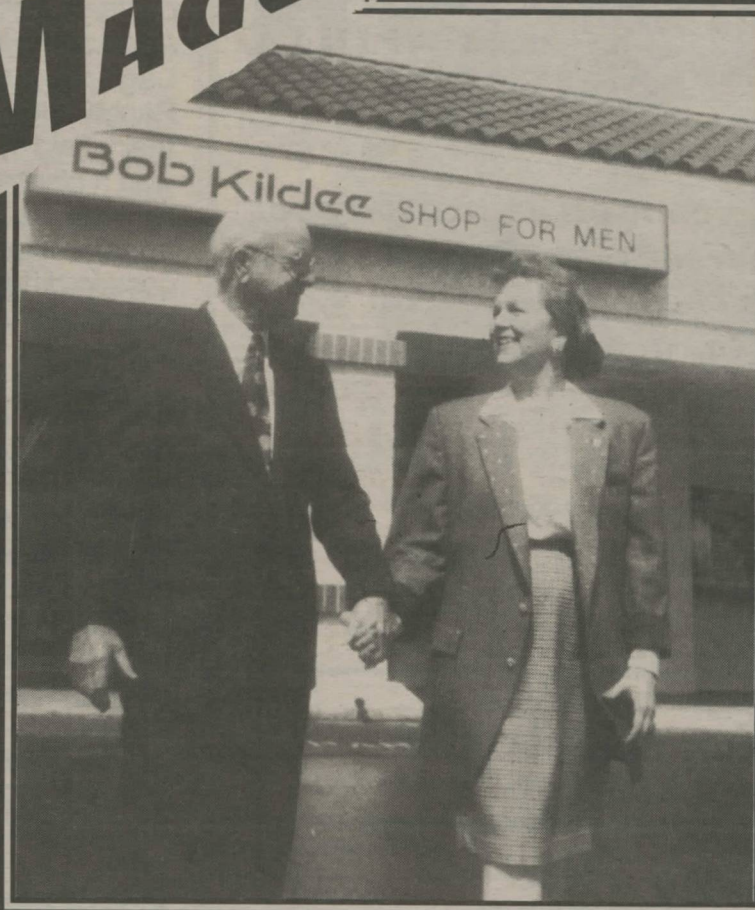
"Show and Tell" brought forth four inter-

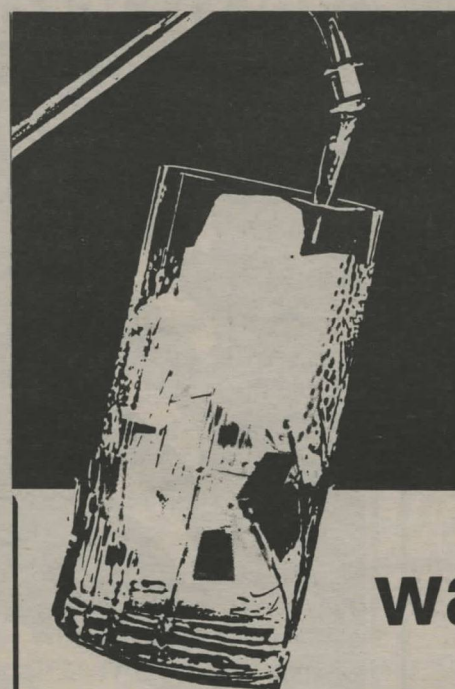
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BINGO

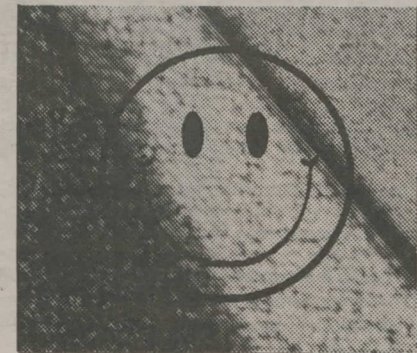
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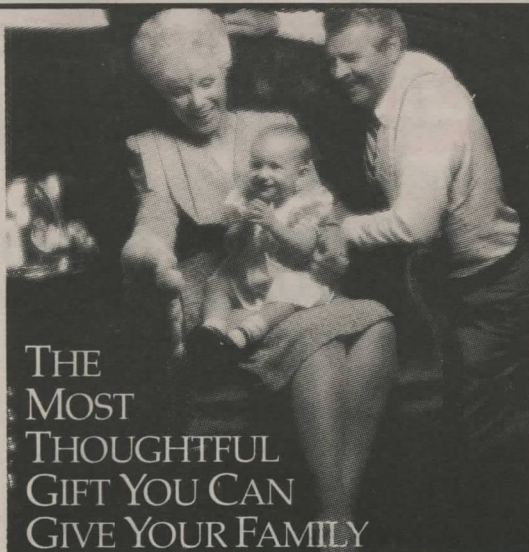
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**AMATEUR

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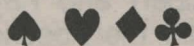

Our thoughts have power and energy. When they are directed in a positive channel, that power and energy is unlimited in strength. Just by simply choosing!

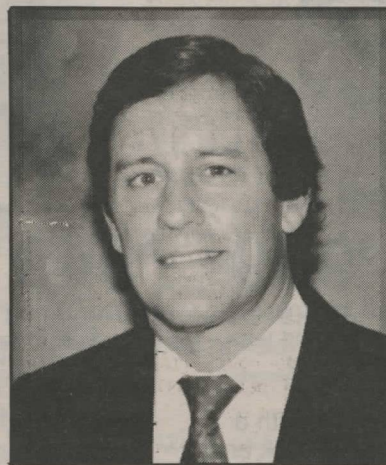
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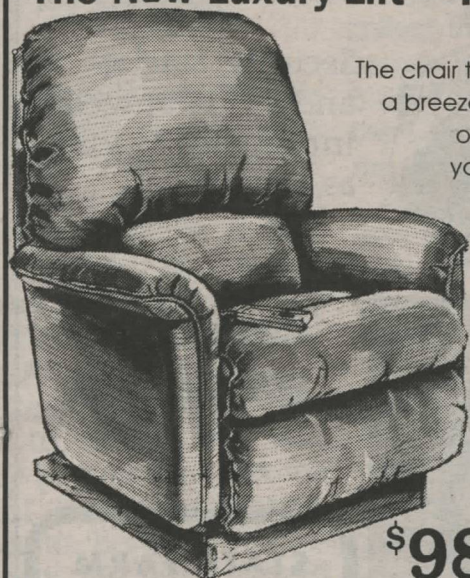
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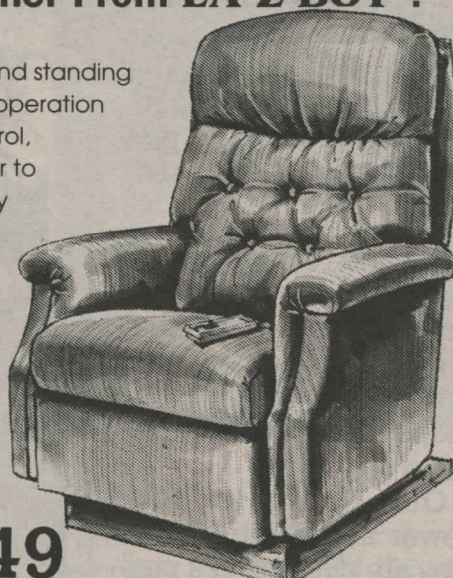
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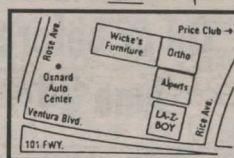

The Happy Hoofers performed May 14 for the Somis Womens' Club and May 21 for the Volunteers from Pleasant Valley Hospital.

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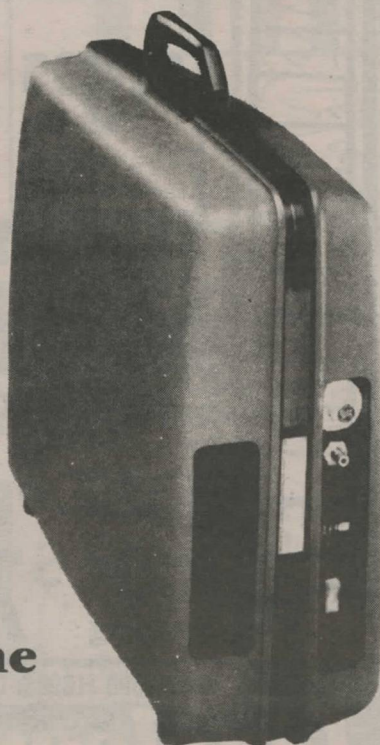
