

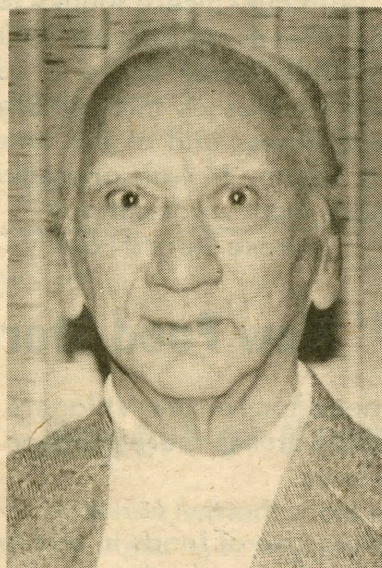

Candidates for Board of Directors

The Nominating Committee has announced the names of candidates for the Board of Directors to succeed members whose terms expire this June. The committee screened and interviewed people to find candidates who have no conflict of interest, have high moral standards, a good knowledge of Village activities and procedures, and useful career of business experience.

The three candidates are Lou Okun, V. 41, David Corwin, V. 30, and Phillip LaPorte, V. 23.

Villagers will have an opportunity to meet and hear the candidates at a special presentation on June 8th.

Election will take place at the Annual Meeting on June 22nd. According to the CC&R's, it will be necessary to have a quorum of Village owners in attendance, or sufficient previously filed absentee ballots to make up the required representation. The Board of Directors will provide absentee ballots in ample time for Villagers who are planning to be away.

Lou Okun was a business man in Los Angeles for most of his active years, but since retirement has extended his interests to other fields, including being an elementary school classroom aide. In LV, his work with the Security and Safety Committee and as its chairman, has given him a broad picture of the Village.

David R. Corwin has had extensive experience in the financial world, with investments and budgets. In LV he has been on the Finance Committee, treasurer of the Bocce Club and host of the Tuesday Night Party Bridge.

Phil LaPorte spent many years in police work, Children's Court, Security Coordinator at Marquette University, Milwaukee. Locally, he has worked for the better ambulance service in Camarillo and on the Committee Against Airport Expansion. He has served on the Public Relations and Buildings and Grounds Committees. Was president of the Bocce Club.

All Resident vehicles must be re-registered and have the new decal applied.

Time—May 9th thru May 14th (Monday thru Saturday)

Place—Bus turn-around in front of Rec. Center (Monday thru Friday) Rec Vehicle Lot on Saturday May 14th.

Hours—9 a.m. to 1 p.m. (Lunch Break 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.) 2 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Rules—Same as last year. Bring your California Registration Slip (White). All vehicles must be registered in the name of a legal owner in Leisure Village and with an LV address. Two decals per house only. Extra vehicles must carry a six-month pass.

Affirmative

Most, if not all, of us purchased (or are leasing) homes in Leisure Village to enjoy our "retirement" years.

Have our expectations been met?

Without fear of successful contradiction, it may be said that the quality of life in the Village is equalled by few other communities.

The Camarillo climate is one of the best in the world--recent rains to the contrary notwithstanding.

Our security system, while not perfect, is adequate enough to insure a general feeling of safety. There are no street crimes. No murders. No rapes. No robbery. Reported burglaries are rare.

Under the direction of our elected officers, who voluntarily devote an enormous amount of personal time to managing the affairs of our homeowners association, the greenbelts are reasonably well-maintained; likewise the Recreation Center and its related facilities.

Best of all, moreover, are the available opportunities for residents to come out of their isolation to join their neighbors on various official committees which advise the Board of Directors and/or take part in the numerous club activities and socials announced in the VOICE and in ILV.

Yet, even a Greta Garbo would find the environment compatible with her well-publicized desire to be "left alone," if that is her choice.

Homeowners, however, have a once-a-year obligation to attend the annual meeting of the Leisure Village Association, to hear committee reports, examine and comment on the LVA financial statement, and to participate in the election of Board members.

This year the meeting will occur on Wednesday, June 22nd. If it is not possible to attend, a proxy ballot may be obtained at the Association Office. For it is necessary that better than 50 percent of the units be represented by attendance or proxy voting; otherwise a second meeting is required.

In a very real sense the success of a condominium homeowners association rests on the input of each member. In sports, the term is teamwork. In a political democracy the driving force is citizenship. In the Village it is the policy of the good neighbor.

Best Wishes to "Our" New Food Store

Last month, ILV talked about the need for Leisure Villagers to shop in Santa Rosa Plaza in order to help stores there prosper so that they can remain easily available to us.

Since that issue there is a new food store there.

"Hope 'n Hagens will carry a complete line of foods in addition to health foods that are necessary for those who have special requirements," says Barclay Hope, co-owner with James Hagen. "This should be especially right for Leisure Villagers."

A trip through the aisles confirms this. The familiar supermarket brand labels are not always there but the staple foods themselves are. There is much more as well. There are the low-sodium (even unsalted potato chips), sugar-free and low-sugar products and many, many no-preservatives, no-artificial-colorings-or-flavorings offered.

Organically-grown produce is attractively displayed as is hormone-free beef to be custom-packaged. What a boon for the cook for a one or two person family sometimes to buy only the small amount needed for one meal with no leftovers.

This holds as well for the long row of bins that contain pastas, legumes, and grains, each with its own scoop so that you serve yourself with what you need. Goodbye to those big boxes with little dabs of leftovers that are not enough for another meal but were too much for the last recipe.

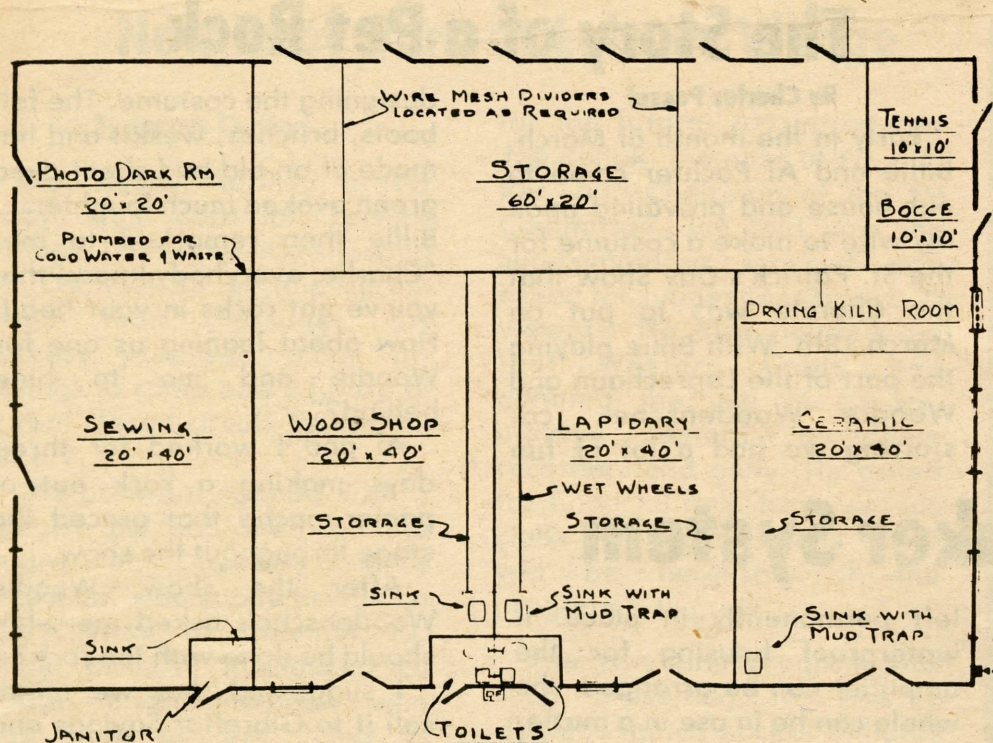
And for us adventurous ones there are some unfamiliar items that need only wait for us to search through back numbers of Cuisine magazine to find that recipe we meant to clip.

Building Plans

Report of Proposed New Facilities

At the April meeting of the L.V. Homeowners Board of Directors, Don Holmes, Chairman of the Facilities Survey Committee, made a detailed report on the recommendations for the need of additional recreational facilities.

Such a proposal would include replacing the ceramic, lapidary and wood shops, the sewing room and bocce storeroom, and provide additional storage space and a tennis storeroom.

Holmes stated that the committee feels that it is possible to go on without changes, but the village is still growing, and that the complaints about inadequate space, safety, ventilation, etc. have been many, and that such changes would improve the quality of life here.

It would be expensive, and method of financing would have to be worked out, but, "We feel this project is important and that it should be done as soon as possible, simply from the fact that costs are going up every day and it can never be built at any less cost than it can today," Holmes said.

The complete proposal was attached to the agenda of the meeting and is available in the office or library for those interested.

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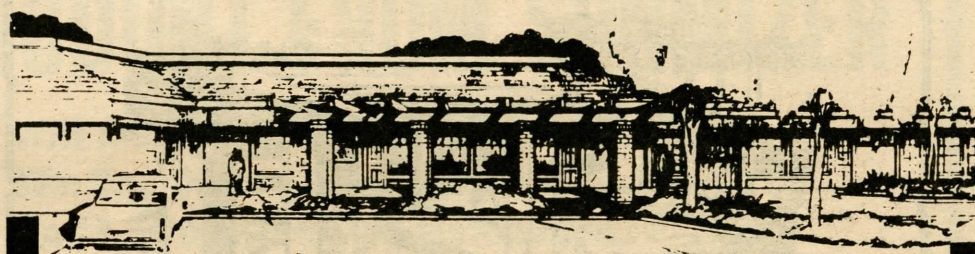
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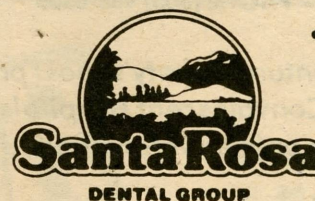

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Ventura Concert Band in Encore Performance

L.V. will again host the Ventura Community Concert Band in a performance on Sunday, May 22nd, 7:00 p.m. on the A.R. stage. After its initial performance last year, residents who heard it have been looking forward eagerly to a return of the group, which is directed by Larry Weiss. Numbering over fifty musicians, the Band presents a lively, truly fine musical experience.

Director Weiss introduces each number by telling a bit about the composer and the music itself. Variety, as well as a few surprises, can be anticipated.

The Happy Hoofers are sponsoring the concert in the Village and will be selling tickets for \$2.00 each. Refreshments will be offered at intermission.

Four L.V. residents are members of the Band that plays under the sponsorship of the Adult Education Department of

the Ventura School System. Since the (in)famous Proposition 13 passed, the professional caliber Concert Band has had to become largely self-supporting to survive. This concert, while sharing revenue with The Happy Hoofers, will also benefit the Band.

The Swing-Disco-Jazz Dance Group has presented Leisure Village with an outdoor speaker system that will add a new dimension to outdoor entertainment of all types. It was inaugurated at a party in the picnic area Friday, April 15.

The new set-up, which consists of two University Speakers, a TOA amplifier, a cassette deck, and two hundred feet of wire cost \$700.00 and is a great improvement over the former components since the greater part can be

Al and I worked for three days making a rock out of papier-mache that graced the stage throughout the show.

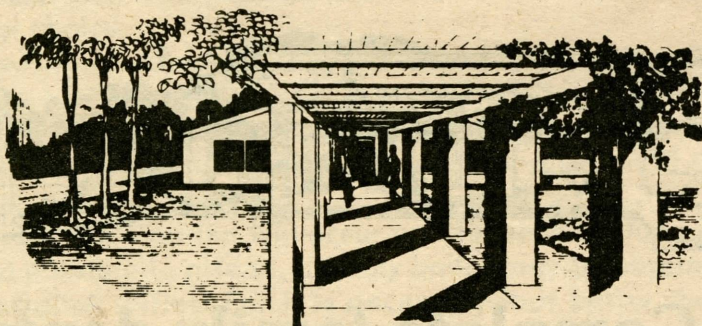
After the show, Woodie Woodenschek asked me what should be done with the rock?

Well, it is Spring, the season for silliness.

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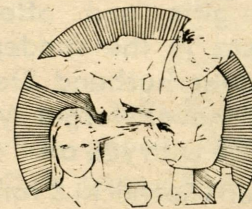
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New Baby Born at Leisure Village

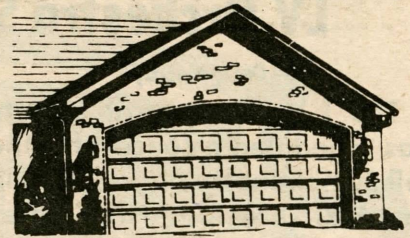

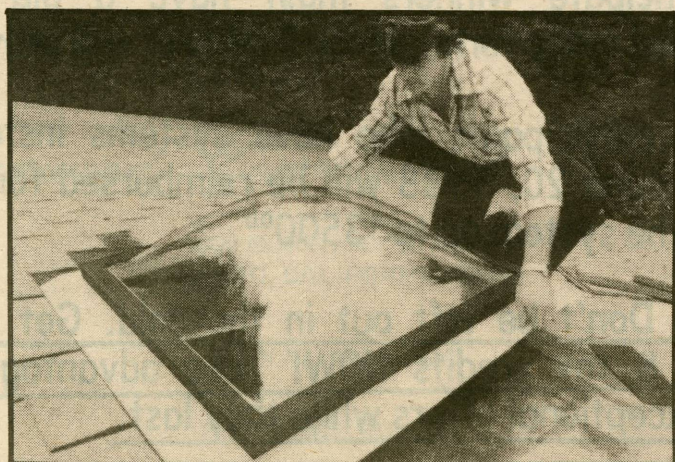

to disappear when an emergency ends.

Mexico faces the problem of competing in international markets and creating jobs. We need a problem solving approach to Mexico, including the hiring of lower cost Mexican labor to expand production and help us compete in international markets. The U.S. is Latin America's favorite trading partner and he suggested that American and Mexican companies enter into business partnerships for our mutual self-interest.

Dr. Nava criticized the U.S. policy in Nicaragua. He said that the Reagan administration has taken a "hands off" policy toward the Nicaraguan revolution which has driven the moderates out of the ruling coalition. He also feels that it is time that we resumed trade and diplomatic relations with Cuba. "Castro is sick and tired of the Russians and the Russians are sick and tired of Castro". We should take advantage of the situation.

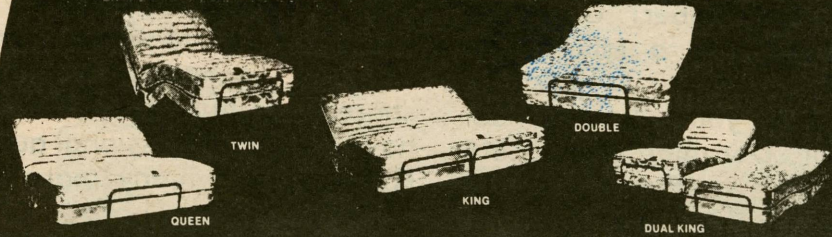
FORUM CALENDAR

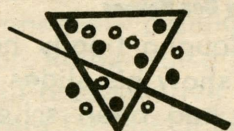
Ruth and Al Siegel, Chairmen for the event, worked hard toward its success, but credit also goes to those who worked behind the scenes. You know who you are.

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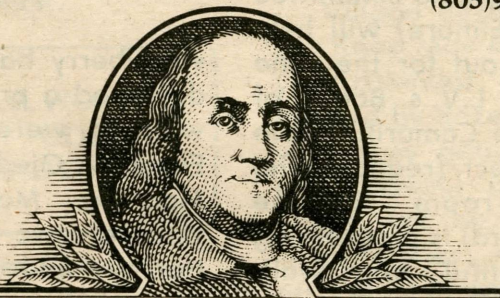
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L.V. WOMENS CLUB

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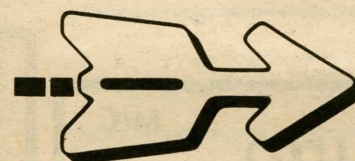
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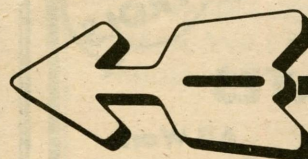
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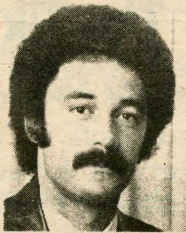
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RUSSELL WALKER

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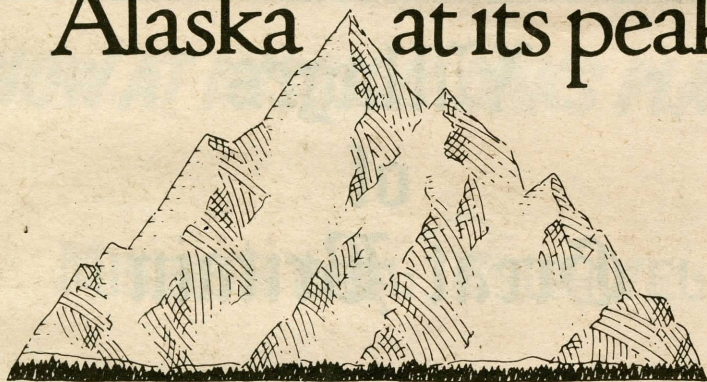
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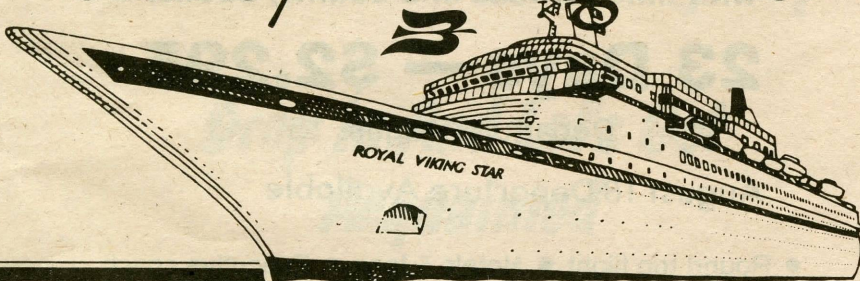

This year our Chorale has added some new combinations of singing groups, with the Quintette and Ensemble being formed from within the regular 70-member Chorale Group.

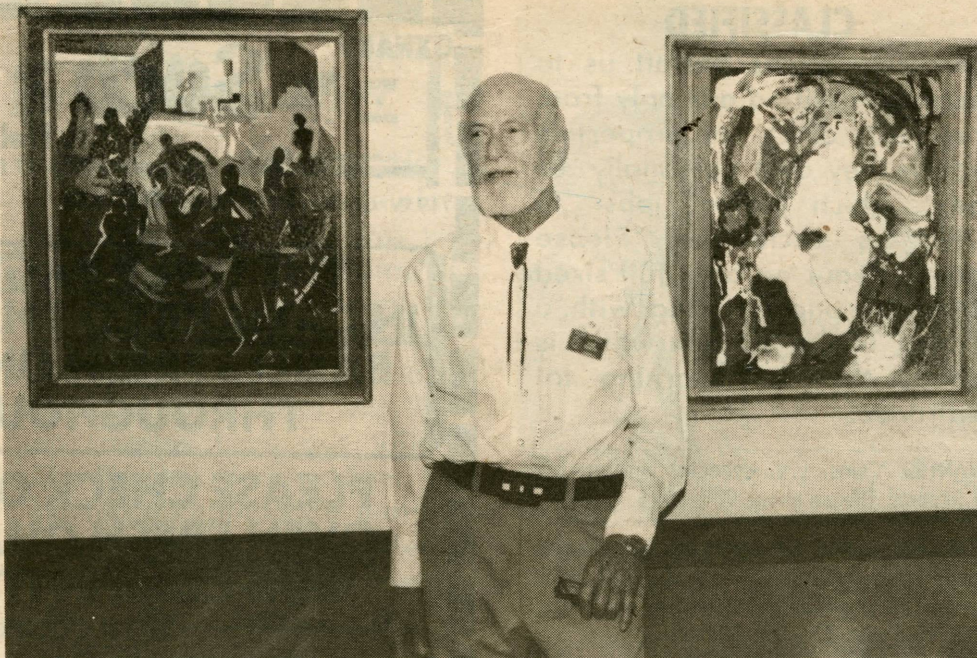

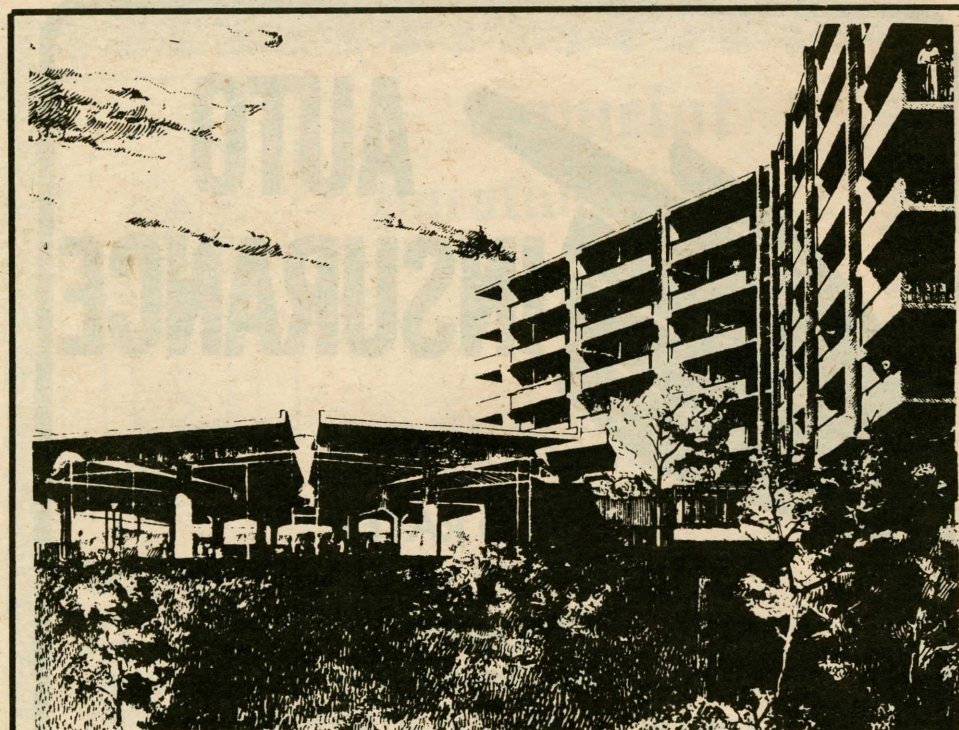

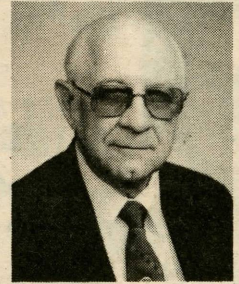
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Reflections on Memorial Day

When Leisure Village residents celebrate Memorial Day, they can take pride in the fact that they have in their

midst someone who can be considered a heroine of World War Two; a nurse who, while serving on Bataan and Corregedor, was finally captured by the enemy when her plane, which was heading for Australia, cracked up in Mininao, and she subsequently wound up as a POW for the duration.

Her name is Evelyn Greenfield, of Village 8. Her memories of those days are still etched deeply enough to often shadow her peace-time calm. Memorabilia displayed in our atrium showcase stir up these recollections, especially on Memorial Day, the time Americans have set aside to honor all our fighting men and women who participated in all our wars.

Evelyn was recently seen on television when, she among other women veterans, was honored at a reception in Washington, D.C. by Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger and was greeted by President Reagan. In an interview with a

Daily News reporter, she stated matter-of-factly that it was high time that her group was honored.

During her three years in POW camp every day was a crisis.

"You just sort of lived day by day. You never knew when you were going to get killed or beheaded."

Conditions were terrible with poor and scant food. Guards sometimes forced the prisoners to stand at attention for hours at a time.

The best thing that happened was the fact that she met her husband-to-be, Morris Greenfield. They were liberated from the camp in 1945.

On July 4th, we will celebrate the independence won by a small hand of colonies seeking liberation from the giant that was England. Then, on Nov. 11th, we will glorify the dawn of peace, when the war to end all wars was finally over and we include also our secession of activities in

Vietnam. As a related matter of interest, in April, (1983), a convention held in Washington, D.C., gathered together the remaining veterans of our wars, and there the president of the United States, Ronald Reagan, clasped the trembling hand of our Village heroine, Evelyn Greenfield, in profound appreciation of her war-time heroism. While in Washington, she was honored, along with others like her, at a reception given by Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger.

Once in a great while, our remaining veterans are honored appropriately, but not often enough. Their ranks are dwindling fast so, lest we forget, we must do honor to all those who earned the honors, on Memorial Day, which we have set aside for that hallowing purpose, the day that you should show your colors proudly, because the Stars and Stripes represent all those who fought and died for us since this nation was founded.



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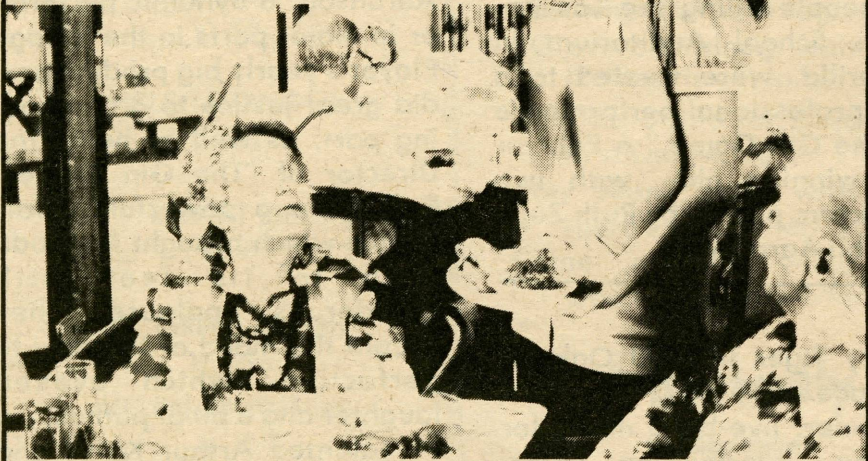
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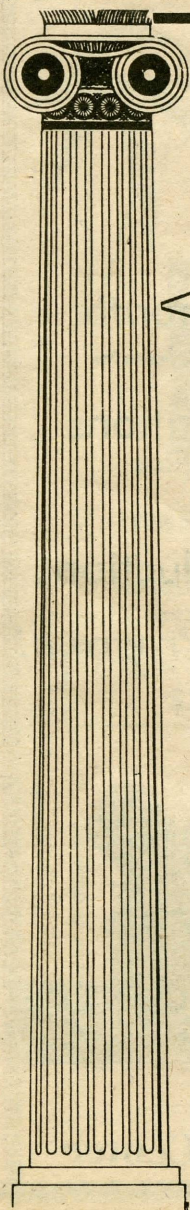
