the right of way but it is rumored that the LEOPARD could not turn off because of the proximity of another ship with a tow.

Assisting in the rescue operations were the LEOPARD, the freighter JOHN B. WATERMAN, a tug, an Associated Oil tanker FLYING A, and two coast guard cutters. There were three known dead, two missing, and twenty-three were rescued.

The accident occurred in clear weather and in a well-traveled seaway. It will result in considerable investigation.

MARINE LEOPARD SINKS OLSEN LUMBER SCHOONER

The ten thousand ton freighter MARINE LEOPARD collided with and sunk the 2,500 ton lumber schooner HOWARD OLSEN at 0255, May 15, about 2-1/2 miles off Point Sur.

The Luckenbach MARINE LEOPARD struck the OLSEN amidships or slightly forward on the starboard side. She broke in half, the stern sinking almost immediately. The OLSEN had

From H. S. Olcott comes this letter regarding the Late Study situation:

To the Editor: I believe this letter is in order as I am stating the opinions of quite a few individuals. It is in regard to the Commandant's order concerning late study.

It is my opinion that the restricting of late study to the classrooms is unnecessary. If all the occupants of a Barracks room request late study, the light restricted to the room by the use of blinds, and the noise kept to a minimum as it should be during study, it does not appear that any other persons would be inconvenienced or disturbed.

A classroom full of people, all studying various subjects, is not as conducive to study as would be a small room with only two or three people studying the same thing. The necessary materials are also readily available in the room.

Apparently, the thought behind the order was to discourage staying up after taps. With 0600 reveille, most people are more inclined to "wrap up" the subject and turn in than to waste that extra "sack time" in making noise.

Studying in the room has been practiced in the past, and to my knowledge with no serious consequences.

On this idea, it is suggested that late study in the rooms be tried on an experimental basis, to determine whether such a system would be acceptable to all parties concerned.

George Coppo has been putting the water polo team through numerous hard workouts and things are beginning to shape up for the team. More about the water polo team in a later issue.


Tennis
