## Let's All Get Stones

#### ■ Lapidary art fashions semi-precious rocks and minerals

Technically, truth be known and if one were to look it up in Hoyle, lapidary is not a Leisure Village club. But it is a genuine offered activity enjoyed by Village folk.

Situated in the Recreation Center, right next door to the Ceramics Room, the LV Lap studio provides Villagers with the opportunity to learn lapidary art, the fashioning of semi-precious rocks and minerals into shapes suitable for use in crafting jewelry and other useful aesthetic items.

Fred Ervast, shop instructor, said there are no fees or other costs associated with the lapidary studio; even the beautiful rock and mineral material is free to those interested in learning the art.

Classes are typically small, one

or two students at a time. Participants are taught how to operate machines necessary to accomplish the steps needed to make four oval shaped cabochons, two each of the primary, 30X40 millimeters & 30X20 millimeters, cab sizes. The ultimate goal being to earn any-time access to the lap studio by obtaining keys that unlock power to the shop's machines.

Ervast said students saw each cab from a rock slab (a sheet of cut rock), grind it to shape, sand it smooth, and polish to a high shine. Some lap students will also receive training on how to manage the shop's large slab saw. "Safety-wise, the only critical thing is eye protection. It's very hard to hurt yourself using the grinding/polishing) machines," Ervast said. Students can use eye goggles provided at the studio, or provide their

own eye protection.

Students typically require 4-5, one-hour lessons to learn the craft well enough to earn a set of keys. Training with Fred can then continue to acquire additional techniques, the crafting of alternative shapes like round, square, heart, cross, etc.

Lapidary instruction takes place at the studio each Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 1:00 p.m., and at 6:30 on Thursday evenings, Ervast said. Telephone 805-387-0787 for additional information.

LV lapidary artists work in conjunction with the Stoners Rock Group to create jewelry using items created at the lap studio. In addition, rock-hounders' field trips are periodically planned, with a trek to the desert seeking colorful cabbing material set for next May, Ervast said.

And the Club donated \$1000 to the task.

A large "Thank You!!!" has arrived from Santa Cruz. The Village Face Mask project will continue, with distribution closer to home.



#### **PET CLUB**

COMING UP: Due to the corona virus, the Pet Club will not meet in April. We will next meet May 11 from 7-8:00 p.m. in the Rec Center MPR where all are welcome!

WHAT YOU MISSED at March 9 meeting: The Pet Club heard from Ventura County Field Officer Eric Lozano and LV Chief Manny Segovia about coyotes. Officer Lozano said covotes are attracted to LV for food, not shelter. By video, we were convinced of a coyote's speed in snagging an off leash pet and ability to jump a six foot fence. So, Officer Lozano recommended not letting pets outside off leash and unsupervised, even in patios; not walking pets on longer than 6-foot leashes; not leaving food or water outside for pets or other animals like squirrels. He recommended picking pets up if a coyote is nearby while using pepper or bear spray (longer spray, bigger container, more expensive) to scare coyotes away.

LV Manny Segovia spoke about current coyotes in LV. A few 2020 sightings have been reported, unlike the 2015 influx of coyotes into LV when 45 sightings were reported in two months. Then and now, Chief Segovia reported no coyote attacks on LV residents or pets.
