Report on Drainage

By John Lauten

Editors' Note: Mr. Lauten gave an extensive report on drainage problems in the area at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors on February 1. He has kindly furnished ILV with the following recap for the benefit of those who did not attend that meeting.

1. On Jan. 28th the Soil Conservation Service held a meeting at the Laguna Vista Elementary School on alternative ways to pass flood waters from the Revolon Slough watershed from its point of intersection with Calleguas Creek, under Highway 1, past the Naval installation and through the Mugu Lagoon and marsh to the ocean. Engineers stated that the current volume of sediment carried to the marsh by Calleguas Creek will cause elimination of open water areas within 50 years and the entire marsh Continued to page 6


Firehouse Gift Fund

Sound Equipment Ordered

The Editors of ILV are pleased to report that the Assembly Room will soon be equipped with a Personal PA Broadcasting System, manufactured by Williams Sound Corporation of Eden Prairie, Minnesota, that will enable those with hearing difficulties to listen to our public address system.

Responding to a proposal spelled out by Harry Becker, on behalf of the editors and a committee of volunteers, the Board has instructed the General Manager, Dave Houghton, to place an order on a trial basis.

The system employs batterypowered small radio receivers, to which miniature earphones are attached. This will enable Villagers to sit anywhere in the AR and receive the broadcast from a small radio transmitter connected to the public address system.

During a six-week trial period Villagers will be encouraged to try out these receivers and determine whether they are of benefit. Not all hearing impairments can be corrected in this manner.

It will be recalled that the survey sponsored by ILV showed that about 45% of respondents stay away from meetings and entertainment in the AR because of hearing problems. Coincidentally, a "Health Fair" sponsored by Your Neighbors Care Group tested 108 Villagers, of whom 79, or 73%, showed some hearing loss.

"The Board's enthusiastic response to our proposal was very gratifying," said Becker.



QUERY: A QUARRY

The Ventura County Planning Commission has recommended that the Board of Supervisors grant a Conditional Use Permit to a construction company to develop a quarry--a strip mining and rock crushing operation--to be located south of Pleasant Valley Road, about 1,200 feet from Woodside Greens in the Wittenberg housing tract.

Area residents, organized as Camarillo Residents Against the Quarry (CRAQ), have been circulating petitions against the project, running ads in the Daily News, and appearing before various groups of Camarillans explaining their concerns. An official appeal has been filed with the Supervisors, requesting the Board to reject the permit.

Arguments against the quarry may be summed up as follows:

- 1) The operation is too close to private residences and would therefore cause excessive noise, vibration, and dust problems.
- 2) Added truck traffic on Pleasant Valley Road not only would add to the noise levels and street dust, but would endanger children walking to Camarillo High School.
- 3) Individuals with respiratory problems would be harmed by the dust and minute particle emissions. This is of great concern, because for 300 days a year the winds blow from the southwest to the northeast.
- 4) Such a quarry, located near a residential area, "will lend a stigma to the whole of eastern Camarillo." In plain talk:: "There goes the neighborhood."

On the other side of the argument, the Planning Commission feels that objections to the quarry can be met, but only if 41 conditions are satisfied by the applicant for the permit, notably these:

- 12--The applicant must keep the intersection of any public roadway and access road clear of dirt, sand, gravel, rocks and other debris.
 - 13--The processing plant site must be landscaped.
- 17--Light levels directed at surrounding residences must be controlled.
- 22--The ultimate responsibility for reclamation (restoring the soil) rests with the permittee.
- 23--"That all operations authorized by this permit (including truck trips) shall be conducted between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. during weekdays, except in an emergency as determined by the Planning Director." (Parenthetically, this requirement was demanded by the City of Camarillo; the applicant had wanted to start the trucks at 6:30 a.m., so that they could be at the job sites with their loads of sand and rock by 7:a.m.)

24--There must be no blasting.

Other conditions spelled out maximum noise levels, the disposal of hazardous wastes, conformity with Ventura County Air Pollution Control requirements, submission of a Flood Control Plan, and Erosion Control Plan, preservation of archaeological or historical artifacts, if uncovered, and management of stockpiles and excavated materials to prevent water and wind erosion.

To guarantee compliance, a \$25,000 bond would be required.

How would this quarry impact Leisure Villagers?

If any rock dust reaches the area adjacent to the intersection of Pancho and Pleasant Valley Roads, the prevailing southwesterly winds would waft the dust particles in our direction.

According to Villager Lad Rodriguez, a former quarry operator, "That dust travels, and the noise of the crusher is terrific."

Since the permit, if granted, is for a period of 20 years, for the next two decades traffic on Pleasant Valley and Santa Rosa Roads would be be confronted by trucks bearing crushed rock, sand, and gravel (at least 24 round trips a day are contemplated)--hardly a pleasant sight in Pleasant Valley. With left turns on Adolfo road, to deliver the loads to the Adolfo Road extension project, we may anticipate close encounters of the worst kind.

Finally, the policy of the good neighbor should prevail. So long as the residents of Woodside Greens, situated only 1,200 feet away from the proposed quarry, appeal to all east Camarillans for help in opposing this development, the editors of ILV feel that the least we can do is support them in their effort.

If you agree, let the Board of Supervisors know where you stand. Your letter to the Board will be copied and given to all five Supervisors.

If there are any remaining doubts, just ask yourself one question: "How would I feel if a rock quarry were established 1,200 feet from Leisure Village?"

TIMBER!

For the record, ILV endorses the DAILY NEWS editorial of February 5th, calling for the removal of the "dangerous, costly" eucalyptus trees lining a portion of Highway 101.

Not only will such action by Caltrans and the appropriate agencies of the City of Camarillo and Ventura County eliminate to motorists the proven danger of falling trees, but it will open up the possibility of saving \$1.5 million--which would be the cost of moving the freeway in order to save the trees.

Leisure Village autos travel this section of the freeway daily; likewise our neighbors in the Santa Rosa Valley and in Mission Oaks. Certainly, we ought not let sentimental and nostalgic feelings about Camarillo "the way it was" force us "up a tree", or more to the point "under one."





Current Issues Forum

Dr. J. Howard Craven, Senior Vice-President and economist of the Union Bank, told members of the Current Issues Forum on Jan. 29th that he belongs to the group of mainstream economists who feel that the fiscal policies of the Reagan administration just "don't add up."

"The Administration has cut taxes too soon and by too much," he said. "There will be a deficit of \$109 billion this year and \$400 billion in three years' time and there aren't sufficient funds to finance that big a deficit", he feels.

Dr. Craven was speaking on "Reaganomics". He holds a Ph. D. degree from Harvard University and has had a distinguished career in government and banking. He is Chairman of the Research Division of the California Bankers' Association and has served as senior vice-president of the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco.

Dr. Craven said that the main goals of "Reaganomics" were to reduce inflation and unemployment. The methods to be used to achieve these goals were to reduce the growth of government spending, cut tax rates, get rid of excessive regulation, to hold tight control of the money supply and to move toward a balanced budget. Reagan's additional goal was to increase military spending.

Dr. Craven and other mainstream economists foresee huge deficits in place of a balanced budget, which will inevitably lead to high interest rates and renewed recession. Business men and the financial markets are frightened by the projected deficits, and he thinks Congress will consequently increase taxes.

On the bright side, Dr. Craven thinks that the economy is ready to turn around, since he feels that the bottom has been reached in the housing and auto industries.

Approximately 225 interested Villagers attended the meeting.

and lagoon will disappear and become a part of the coastal plain in 100 years. The lagoon and marsh is prized by environmentalists for its wildlife habitat and they want maximum protection for the area. Of the alternatives presented, the one calling for a new bridge over Highway 1, capable of passing a 50 year level storm on the Revolon-Calleguas watershed appeared to be preferred.

2. Caltrans is studying Coneio Creek upstream and downstream of U.S. 101 (Ventura Freeway) to determine the size and location of the new freeway bridges to be constructed. The size required depends in part on the ability of the channel downstream to carry flood flows. Developers south of the freeway are also interested in improvement of the channel in connection with their developments. A decision should be reached in the next few months.

3. A recent article in ILV quoted Supervisor Erickson as saying that the Flood Control District had cleaned out Conejo Creek adjacent to the Village. The reeds and willows were

knocked down twice in 1981 but the tens of thousands of yards of silt deposited in the bottom of the Creek in 1980, which reduces the capacity of the creek, has not been removed. Removal will be costly and the Flood Control District doesn't have adequate funds to undertake removal at the present time.

- 4. During the past few weeks, the Flood Control District has completed final acceptance of the Conejo Creek Channel and Upland Drain adjacent to the villages easterly of Village 38. This year, when the reeds and willows are knocked down, the bulldozers should clean the channel east of V. 38 which they haven't done for the last two years.
- 5. Leisure Tech completed during the past week the drainage facilities it was required to construct at the northeasterly corner of Leisure Village near the intersection of Upland Road

and Santa Rosa Road. The developer on the easterly side of Upland Road has installed the huge drainage pipe which will carry the drainage under Santa Rosa Road, but water cannot get into the pipe until street inprovements and catch basins are installed later this year in that subdivision.

- 6. A City contractor is installing improvements to the drainage facilities at Santa Rosa Road and Oak Canyon Road to overcome problems of the type which occurred Jan. 29, 1981 when storm waters flooded the shopping center and entered Leisure Village.
- 7. Pardee Construction has completed paving of all streets north of Mission Oaks Blvd. All drainage water will now flow into the streets and through drainage pipes to a central drain. As a result, the silt runoff should be reduced up to 90%. The remaining 10% won't be controlled until homes are built and landscaping developed.







work they've done, the county would not have been able to afford it," Mrs. Erickson said.

Dr. Sara L. Miller, Director of Health Care Agency, gave the keynote address, pointing out the importance of controlling the "silent" disease of hypertension. The county program has conducted more than 15,000 screenings and of those more than 2,500 were found to be elevated. The incidence of high blood pressure appears to be decreasing, not increasing, Dr. Miller said.

Bill Miley, Director of the High Blood Pressure Program, and Harlene Smith, Coordinator, presented the awards. When it came time for Leisure Village to stand up and be counted, Mrs. Smith reminded the audience that the Village's clinic was the first to be started in the county, and it was through the efforts of Sandy Okum and his Your Neighbor's Care Group which brought it about and kept it going. It has operated for 59 months, missing only once because of a holiday. It has conducted over 1,700 screenings. Statistics are furnished to the county each month, and Mrs. Smith expressed her personal appreciation to Alvie Rasmussen who keeps the records and reports

to the county office.





There has been no follow-up article, but I have received a number of phone calls from Seniors who have had the same experience and who were with me: they would gladly give blood if anyone would take it, but they had been refused, as I had. One call was from a Villager who is apparently experienced in the blood bank, and who told me that the ban on "over 65" was a State Law and and it would have to be changed if we wanted to give. He told me of an alternative which I'll discuss later.

Following the appearance of my letter in the Daily News, the Executive Director of the United Blood Services in Ventura wrote to the Daily News, and stated that the ban on Seniors was their (the United Blood Services) own policy, which he stated as: "Healthy persons over 66 years of age with a note from their physician indicating lack of contra-indication in blood donation are eligible to donate". There

seems to be some confusion as to whether the ban is State Law or the policy of the blood collection agency, but this is not really important at this time, as there is an "out", whereby we Seniors can give blood, as stated in the United Blood Services' letter; The approval of your physician. I urge all Villagers to secure this on their next visit to their doctor.

I doubt very much if there would be enough Villagers at any one time to warrant having a blood collection here in the Village, but I am told that the bloodmobiles visit Camarillo at intervals, and that (1) the dates of these visits are publicized in the Camarillo Daily News, and (2) that I will be informed in advance. So when you have your doctor's permission to give blood, watch the Daily News and go to Camarillo, or wherever else it may be that's handy, and donate your blood. If I get the information in time it will be in Inside Leisure Village, also.



A leak in the roof or a tire going flat are usually easy to correct but other hazards of the aging process which we cannot see can get expensive and are accelerated by sitting too long.



With all of this, remember to stay in the pink for that mystery bus trip on May 30th.









addition to that, only about 10% of diamonds are gem quality, suitable to become faceted stones in jewelry. The rest are industrial grade, and some are even crushed to be used in nail files and similar applications.

Another reason diamonds are expensive is that the market is strictly controlled all over the world. Diamonds have a grain, similar to wood, and cleaving a diamond in the back seat of a small car is not particularly risky if the stone has been well studied and properly prepared.

Lee also brought a case full of finished gems of all kinds, which kept the audience busy admiring and touching long after the meeting was officially over. After the meeting we showed our Lapidary Shop to Lee, which he admired and offered several suggestions for improvement.



PROFILE: Byron Williams, Violinist Unique

After a career that spanned nearly fifty years, involved a lifetime love affair with the violin, and an amazing association/comparison with the violinist Fritz Kreisler, Byron Williams came home to Ventura County when he and his wife Mildred moved to L.V. in 1978.


The comparison to Kreisler started when Byron was still a teenager attending Moorpark High School. Williams had attended a concert by Kreisler in L.A. just a few months after he started playing the violin, and became so enthralled with Kriesler's music that in a moment of premonition or inspiration, he felt determined that some day he would make beautiful music like his idol. He developed skill playing doublestops (two notes at the same time) and a fingertip vibrato which contributed to the singing quality of his instrument. As he matured, he grew to resemble Kreisler physically, in face and physique, as his mastery of the violin increased.

At the same time young Williams had an early ambition to become the best runner in the country, having won track events in high school. After observing, however, that the 1928 U.S. Olympic sprint winner Eddie Toland could not find job, he decided to focus his life completely on music which would give him lifelong pleasure, as well as the means to support himself.

Byron's parents were farmers in the Blue Ridge Mts. of Virginia, where Byron was born. His mother had such a hunger for music that as a girl she had to pretend illness in order to sneak upstairs to learn to play her brother's five-string banjo, a skill not considered proper for a southern girl.

The family moved to an apricot ranch in Moorpark, California, (Williams Ranch) where Byron and his brothers grew up. Both parents played banjo and harmonica, and at the age of ten Byron played the banjo well enough to perform in public





When Byron was in junior high school, music teacher Thomas Caldwell offered free violin class lessons to children who could buy a violin, bow, and case outfit costing \$24. By ron's mother drove to Camarillo to work in a tomato packing plant for \$14.00 a week to earn enough to buy a violin for him. Within a few months he was playing the fiddle well. He studied constantly, moving his music stand out to the deserted apricot packing shed to practice. After fourteen months, Caldwell told Byron that he could teach him no more, and helped arrange for him to take lessons from Roderick White in Santa Barbara. Byron drove the 120 mile roundtrip each week for the training offered by White.

Byron went to the little community church in Moorpark in order to practice, and was invited to play along with the pianist while the congregation sang, and also to play solos. As he was accompanying the hymns, he learned to play harmony, developing the doublestops which were to be his forte.

When he needed a better violin, he borrowed \$200 from the local bank. He repaid the loan, and paid for all his lessons with White by working on the ranch.

At 16, Byron won the Ventura County Eisteddfod contest, (named from an ancient Welsh competition, for poets and minstrels), the first of numerous contests and auditions by which his professional career was launched and promoted.

Byron's first professional jobs came easily to him in Santa Barbara: playing at the Albert Sheetz restaurant, on Station KDB as the "Viennese Fiddler," in a trio playing dinner music at the Biltmore Hotel, in a small community symphony orchestra, and later in a private ensemble for Stanley McCormick at Rivenrock Estate. In the middle of the Great Depression when music was a luxury, Williams became the highest paid musician in Santa Barbara earning the munificent sum of \$52.00 a week.

An audition in 1942 for the

Los Angeles Philharmonic Orunder Alfred chestra Wallenstein earned him a position in the first violin section where he played for four seasons. Next, he played in Hollywood studio orchestras at Columbia for two years, and MGM for twelve years. While playing at the El Capitan Theater production of "Blossom Time," his violin was heard in the orchestra and selected by the conductor who cast him as the Gypsy violinist playing Schubert's "Serenade" on stage a piece which became the 'show-stopper.'

During WWII, Byron drove buses on a part time basis, transporting service men to their stations. Having a pre-Pearl Harbor baby at home postponed his draft call.

Study in harmony and composition at LACC night school gave Williams a technical foundation. Later, when he moved to New York for advanced study, teachers who listened to him told him that his style was so original, he was his own teacher.

Mildred Kiesler came into his

life through a night school French class at Hollywood High School. They sat across the aisle from each other, and soon became attuned to one another. Their marriage in 1957 was the start of a new phase in the Williams career travel.

In 1961, Mildred and Byron arranged his first solo European concert tour. Byron treasures the reviews by music critics, who time after time sang praises of his musicianship, the sweetness and purity of his tone, and the impeccable double and triplestops of his violin, with frequent allusions to Fritz Kreisler, the inescapable comparison.

One year before Kreisler's death, Byron finally managed to meet the master and to play for him in New York. Kreisler was genuinely moved, and wrote "Mr. Williams is a unique violinist. He has a definite style and feeling for my music. I wish him great success in his career, which I am sure he deserves."



A coat of snow flakes resting on her wing.


I sense the crunching snow beneath my feet And feel the quiet cold upon the air I cast a sly glance at embarrassed trees That stand so tall, so stark and bare.

Has made a coverlet to help bed down the night.


The frost has started tightening her embrace
