### HOMES, SWEET HOMES

The way Al and Cindy Fox look at it, they don't sell houses, they sell homes - more than 1000 in Leisure Village where Fox Realty has been in business since 1976 and where Al and Cindy have lived for nearly 20 years.

It was the Navy that brought the Foxes to Camarillo and the Village. After a two-decade military career that required several moves (Cindy taught school on Guam, and their daughter Nancy was born there), Al retired from the Antarctic Squadron stationed at Point Mugu. He began his second career selling real estate, and they moved to Camarillo. Business was good, he soon earned his Brokers license, and, in 1979, Al Fox Realty opened. The Foxes bought their home in the Village in 2000.

"California was (and is) beautiful to us - me, an Idaho boy and Cindy from North Dakota. And we saw the unique opportunity called Leisure Village," Al explains. "There were only two other complexes like it in the U.S. There was no place safer, no place with so many things to do, and no place as

beautiful. I knew that we wanted to live here and work here."

Their new company took off. "It was easy to sell the Village; it was a new way of life," recalls Cindy who became an agent, too. Fox Realty employed 50 agents and was the largest agency in Ventura County. "There were – and are – so many amenities here," says Al. "It's like living in Club Med year-round. We can do what we want or do nothing," Cindy adds with a smile.

Near the end of the '80's, the Foxes decided to slow down and sold most of the company. They



### **COMMUNITY NEWS**

Paint Project – The original whole house stucco and trim paint project is now underway in Villages 6, 8 and 17. The trim only paint project in Villages 4, 7, 9, 11, 13, 18 and 22 was sent out for bid. The bids were very high. At the last Board meeting the decision was made to hire temporary employees to stucco and trim paint the six Villages in the original "trim" paint project. The project is being organized and schedules will be announced.

LV Web Site – The Communications Committee continues to work on new features for the LV website. The latest feature is if one accesses the directory from a smart phone and finds a number they want, they can then initiate the call from the directory. A proposal for making the Village Voice an on-line document is under development for presentation to the Board. The proposal will improve increased content, con-

tent can be updated daily when necessary and therefore be more current, and it will save significant costs in preparation, printing and mailing. For those who do not have on-line access, on demand printed versions will be available.

Village Trees - The Level 1 inspection of the over 5,700 trees in the Village has been completed. Several trees in the Village were identified as immediate threats to residences and the Village is in the process of removing all these trees.

The Village is awaiting the full Level 1 written report and a Level 2 proposal. We can expect that more trees will be removed, and there will be a lot of pruning and removal of dangerous tree limbs within the Village.

Roofing – The roofing contract from last fiscal year is about to be completed. A new roofing contract is going out for competitive bidding.

Streets – The Phase 1 Engineering and Management contract for this year's street maintenance work has been issued. Bids for the paving contract will be opened at the next board meeting. This year Leisure Village Drive from Village 40/41 to Santa Rosa Road plus specific village roads will be repaved.

Concrete – The Village maintains the concrete in the common areas, driveways, sidewalks, street gutters, etc. Village staff are in the process of inspecting the concrete areas they maintain in preparation for a contract bidding cycle. Note – slabs, patios, garage floors, and other concrete areas within residences are the individual homeowner's responsibility to maintain.

LV 50th Anniversary – Save the Date: Leisure Village Celebrates 50 years! Join the celebration on Sunday, October 1, 2-5 pm in the AR and recreation center.

Health Fair – The Health Fair was a major success with many vendors and a very good turn-

out. The Water Committee held a Water Fair at the same time, which was well attended and informative.

Water – "All Water Matters" was the subject of Councilman Tony Trembley's June monthly meeting. He was joined by Andy Nelson (LV resident and Camrosa Board member), Tony Stafford (Camrosa General Manager) and Carol Dietz (LV Water Committee Chair) in discussing Village water issues.

Finance – The formal audit of last fiscal year's financial results is underway. This is the first year of working with a new auditor.

AT&T Cell Tower – the AT&T proposal for a cell tower in Leisure Village was referred to the Long-Range Planning Committee for evaluation and recommendation. The committee's recommendation will be given to the Board at the next Board Meeting.

### Village Duo Shares Love for the Art of Photography

Bob and Sherry Pinchak share a common interest in photography. Members of the Leisure Village Photo Club, they have won prizes for their photos. Through their art they demonstrate the different ways of looking at photographic subjects.

"My husband is more artsy, creative — I just like to take travel shots," Sherry says.

"As I get older I've gotten away from the landscapes — that's been done so many times," Bob said. "I try to be more creative so it's more unique — architecture, angles, shadows, shapes, close ups of things. I like black and white photography a lot and action photos of sports subjects."

Bob's love of photography began in his early 20s.

"In 1973 I took a one-month trip

to Europe and saw all the European sights which piqued my interest in photography," he said. He took a picture of the Eiffel Tower with a cheap instamatic camera he had at the time and it still hangs on the wall in their home.

It wasn't until three or four years later that he bought a more sophisticated camera with changeable lenses.

"I started getting photo magazines and learned about all the great photographers of the 20th century: Ansel Adams, Edward Weston, Walker Evans, street photographer (Henri) Cartier-Bresson. A challenge he overcame was finding his own vision while still being inspired by the great photographers," he said.

The first award Bob won back in

the '70s was for a black and white photo of his brother's cat, entered in a contest through the Broadway department store.

"I think the prize was a \$25 gift certificate," he said.

He now has a collection of cameras: a Canon DSLR, a Lumix DSLR and a Fixed Lens Fujifilm camera — "good for street photography - small, but a very good camera," he said.

By contrast, Sherry uses a Panasonic point and shoot camera. "And I use my phone a lot," she said.

It was through Bob and some of the trips they took that Sherry got into photography. Although she says she just takes travel photography, some of her photos show a talent for abstract: close-ups of fossil exhibits at the Houston Museum of Natural History near her son's home in Texas, a composition of colored pencils and paint that won an award through the LV Photo Club.

"I got on the floor and arranged it and I just shot it," she said. Another one of a narrow sidewalk, photoshopped and cropped, looked like the Yellow Brick Road in black and white, she said.

Sherry and her first husband were New Yorkers. They moved to California when she was 28 and she was widowed five years later with a four-year-old son and infant daughter. She worked to support her family as a medical biller and human resource specialist.

"It was a difficult time," she said. She didn't date until her children were older.





### A WORD ON WINE

# SLO County, a Tale of Two Regions

San Luis Obispo County has was founded in 1983 by Claiborne two distinct regions for wine grapes, both influenced by daily temperature swings caused by the cool maritime air rolling in after a warm day. The Edna Valley American Viticultural Area, or AVA, south of San Luis Obispo, is well known for producing excellent Chardonnay and Pinot Noir. The other region is Paso Robles, further north on the 101, having a hotter and dryer climate and further inland, with 11 AVAs. Paso got its start specializing in Zinfandel but has now expanded to many other varietals, especially those from the Rhône area of France.

San Luis Obispo is only 10 miles from the coast, and there are many vineyards and wineries in Edna Valley AVA along Route 227. Claiborne and Churchill was one of the early wineries on Route 227. It

Thompson and Frederika Churchill, leaving Michigan for California to begin a new life in the wine industry. From the start, Claiborne &

Churchill wines had a special focus, producing only Dry Riesling and Dry Gewürztraminer, inspired by the fruity but dry wines of the

French province of Alsace. At the time, Clay joked that he made wine that no one would buy, but that was hardly the case. Many acres of Chardonnay and Pinot Noir are planted in the SLO area.

Winding up the steep Cuesta Grade on the 101 brings you to the Paso Robles area, with 200+ wineries to choose from. Originally

cattle ranches, Dr. Stanley Hoffman of Los Angeles was convinced that the climate and soils of the area were perfect for the Burgundian


> wine grapes of France. He planted the first Pinot Noir vineyard on Hoffman

was acquired by Adelaida Cellars in 1994. It's worthy of a visit to taste wine from those venerable grapes. Within the last twenty years, Paso has seen Rhône varietals overtake Zinfandel as the area's major focus.

In Paso, many of our favorite

known for its walnut orchards and wineries are in the Adelaida AVA District. The turn onto Adelaida Road is at the edge of town, yet you're soon worlds away. The Adelaida District is mountainous and less than ten miles from the ocean. At the southern end of the coastal Santa Lucia Mountain Range, the slopes are covered with live oak and vineyards are planted on steep rocky hillsides at elevations up to 2200 feet. This AVA gets more rain than other Paso areas, and, during summer, diurnal temperature shifts of up to 45°F provide ideal growing conditions. Our favorite is Tablas Creek Vineyard, growing only Rhône varietals and a leader in environmental viticulture.

> We are so lucky to have so many interesting wine regions so close to home. Be it a day trip or a few days, you can only marvel at the quality of California wines.

### **Eye Care and Your Health**

As we age, there are physiological changes that can occur in our eyes. Our eyesight is precious and taking care of our eye health is essential so we can see our environment, participate in social interactions and be able to drive as long as possible.

Some of the conditions in our eyes that tend to appear as we age include Presbyopia which happens when the natural lens in the eye gets less flexible. It is a refractive error that makes it hard for middleaged and older adults to see things up close. Floaters are tiny spots or specks that drift across your field of vision and in most cases are normal and they tend to disappear. If you see them with flashes of light, contact your eye surgeon immediately.

Dry eyes are more common as we age and after cataract surgery. Use eye drops that are sterile and preservative free to ease dry eyes and save your vision. Excessive tearing can happen if you are sensitive to wind, light or temperature changes. Shield your eyes and wear sunglasses. Cataracts will develop in most people at different ages usually after 50 years old. Cataract surgery will replace your lens with an artificial version and improve your vision, enabling you to see bright beautiful colors clearly again.

Glaucoma is a disease that affects the eye's optic nerve. It results in increasing the pressure inside your eye. Under doctor's care prescription eye drops can control glaucoma when caught early. Retinal disorders affect the thin lining on the back of the eye. Retinal issues include age-related macular degeneration, diabetic retinopathy, retinal vessel occlusions and detached retina. Early diagnosis and treatment will help preserve your vision. Our eye lids also can change as we age, and Blepharitis (red, swollen, irritated eyelids with possible crust on eyelashes) is more common. You can use water and baby shampoo to clean your eyelids to remove crusts on your eyes daily.

There are many ways we can protect our eyes as we age. Eating healthy food, especially foods that contain vitamin C and antioxidants can help reduce the risk of agerelated macular degeneration. Concentrate on foods such as carrots, spinach, broccoli, kale, sweet potatoes, squash, papayas, and oranges. Protect your eyes from the sun by wearing dark sunglasses whenever you are outside. Wear your prescription glasses whether you are inside or outside to minimize eve strain, and have your vision checked yearly. The National Eye Institute recommends a dilated eve exam annually after age 60 as this gives the doctor a better look at the retina and optic nerve so they can identify any potential problems and intervene early.

So, check in yearly with your Optometrist and/or Ophthalmologist for an eye exam, dilation and check on your prescription. Enjoy.





### **Camarillo's Own Aviation Museum**

Every woman who has had brothers and/or a husband - knows that inside every man is a little Boy. There is a saying: "Men may grow older, but they never grow up."

During all the wars that our United States has fought - many thousands of young men (and women) never got the chance to grow older, or to "never grow up." They gave the last full measure of devotion to their country, so that their fellow Americans could continue to live in peace and under a free and democratic government.

Some of these "boy/men," expilots from WWII, got together in Harlingen, Texas in 1957 and decided to buy some surplus U.S. military aircraft. They purchased a P-51 Mustang fighter and some AT-6 trainers from Canada. They started a group they called the Confederate Air Force.

From that small beginning so long ago, the CAF - now renamed the Commemorative Air Force, has gone through major changes and is now headquartered in Dallas, Texas.

It has 180 aircraft and 13,000 members in 85 units throughout the U.S. and abroad.

Our local CAF unit - the Southern California Wing, started with one airplane, a twin-engine Curtiss C-46 "Commando" transport - at Van Nuys Airport in 1981. The Wing moved to Camarillo Airport in 1982 – and now has 200 members and 12 aircraft.

We have a wonderful Aviation Museum at 455 Aviation Drive, Camarillo. The museum is open on Fridays and Saturdays, from 10 am to 4 pm; and on Sundays from noon to 4pm.

Our mission Is to "Educate, Inspire and Honor Through Flight and Living History Experiences." Our members, all volunteers, are dedicated to keeping alive the memory of the many men and women who served in our mili-


tary air services – along with the memory of the planes they flew and maintained.

Visitors to our Aviation Museum can tour our facility with the help of a private Docent. They will not only see many aviation military artifacts and displays, but will also get up close to our military aircraft, including: a Navy F6F-5 Hellcat fighter plane;

a Marine Corps PBJ bomber; two Navy SNJ training planes; an RAF Spitfire fighter; a Japanese Mitsubishi Zero fighter; and many more military aircraft.

Three residents of Leisure Village are active members of our CAF - So Cal Wing: Paul Kleinbaum, who resides at Village 42; Bill O'Neil, at Village 37; and

### **Camarillo Gets a Hospital**

in Camarillo, but don't take it for granted. Establishing a community hospital in Camarillo was a long contentious story of finance, mergers and changing names.

Our first hospital was a 6-room building established in Oxnard in 1912 by the Sisters of Mercy on land given by farmer John Borchard. Dr. W.R. Livingston grew up in Hueneme and went to the University of Chicago. In 1914, while in Germany as a delegate to the American Clinical Congress, he learned about "twilight sleep" anesthesia. Using this for child birth was very popular. He brought the process back to Oxnard where he became the chief of surgical staff. Dr. Livingston married Ruth Daily who founded the Livingston Memorial Visiting Nurses Association and Hospice.

Skipping ahead to the 1960s, a lot

We have good medical care here of improvements were being made in the community. This included establishing a Parks District in 1961, incorporation of the city in 1964, and forming a Water District in 1966. Community leaders, physicians and local officials wanted to build a community hospital in Camarillo. Planning started with a committee of concerned citizens who met at the Camarillo Lanes bowling alley in 1963. The committee was formally organized as the Pleasant Valley Hospital Association. This was before Camarillo was incorporated, so they asked the County Board of Supervisors to consider a proposal for a non-profit community hospital. They were advised that the best way to do this was to create a hospital District that could collect taxes.

> Five acres of land was designated for a hospital site by the late Richard Bard, president of the Old





Berylwood Investment Company. When the Kaiser Aetna Corporation bought the land holdings, the donation remained intact and the District was allowed to buy seven additional acres.

Formation of the Pleasant Valley Hospital District was approved in 1969 by an overwhelming 76% of the voters. The new District nearly was dissolved in 1970 with a controversy over how the new hospital would be funded. Some wanted

it to be paid for by the sale of tax supported bonds, others thought a private hospital would be best. Construction was delayed when a petition for dissolution of the District was presented to the County local agency formation commission. Fortunately, LAFCO decided that the petition was without merit and the Hospital District survived.

The non-profit Pleasant Valley Hospital Building Corporation was

formed to secure the bonds and construct the hospital. Bond measures were defeated in the polls twice, but then finally got enough votes to authorize an issue of \$5.2 million in bonds. In a "lendbuyback" financing arrangement, the completed building would be leased by the District.

Investment bankers Miller and Schroeder Municipals Inc. of Minneapolis agreed to advance \$5.2 million in District bonds to build and equip the hospital. As a demonstration of their faith in the project, they put \$900,000 into a "sinking fund", a junior lien bond. The 3M Corporation had a new facility in Camarillo with about 700 employees and was interested in having a local hospital, so may have facilitated this approach to get construction started as soon as possible. The hospital board agreed to accept the advance and work began.

The California comprehensive health planning council gave the District a deadline to begin construction. Ground breaking came one day before the deadline. After 10 years of struggle the new \$3.2 million Pleasant Valley Hospital finally opened its doors in July 1974 with 46 beds and 92 employees. There were only 20 physicians in Camarillo before it opened, but by the end of the first year 53 physicians were listed on the medical staff and in 1979 there were 159. During the first year, 1560 patients were admitted for 7,773 patient-days, and 248 babies were born. In 1976 the hospital reached full occupancy.

The 80 bed hospital was designed as a hexagon, modeled after a successful hospital in Visalia. The hexagonal construction minimizes weight bearing walls and provides for the close proximity of nurses stations to the patients rooms.

In 1983, the Hospital District ceded ownership to a new non-profit corporation. The elected members of the District board resigned and were appointed to the board of the non-profit. The old hospital District was renamed to become the Camarillo Health Care District as we know it today.

The hospital expanded in 1992 with construction of a 99 bed skilled nursing facility with residential patients. This was expected to improve revenue, but with mounting debt discussions began on merging and consolidating services with the larger St. John's Regional Medical Center in Oxnard.

The proposed merger was controversial and people asked the Health Care District to stop the merger. Many felt the District board had a duty and obligation to take a hard look at the proposed merger and would need to give its consent to make it legal. Nevertheless, the merger agreement was finalized later that year and it became St. John's Pleasant Valley Hospital. Under the agreement, St. John's assumed \$20 million in debt and committed to \$4 million in upgrades.

In 2012, it became part of Dignity Health. In 2018, a new patient wing with 50 private rooms was built to meet earthquake standards. The name changed again in 2021 to St. John's Hospital Camarillo.

They have been busy with more than real estate, too. Al was elected a director of Camrosa Water District for more than 20 years. He also was the driving force leading to the passage of the campaign within Leisure Village which led to the conversion of the outdoor irrigation system to one using non-potable water, saving the Village over \$400,000 a year.

Even after almost 50 years, it is still easy for the Foxes to sell

> Leisure Village and even easier to live there. "We are blessed to have made so many friends here," Al says. To them, the safety of the Village is better than ever. They love the Village entertainment. They regularly visit their daughter and granddaughter who live in Nebraska. But they say together, "We are always so happy to come home to the Village."
