#### **Question The Candidates**

In recent years the LVA Board of Directors was dominated by individuals who chose to micromanage the Village. These people did cut costs, held down homeowner assessments, directed the staff and some even physically occupied the Association Office.

What was the result? Employee morale plummeted under such constant scrutiny as Board members worked practically full time at their jobs. Some good employees and two general managers left. The Board made policy AND carried it out.

The general appearance of the Village deteriorated as landscape wages were frozen for three years and attrition cut the number of landscape workers. Yes, Association monthly fees stayed low, but the appearance of the Village suffered greatly, along with employee morale.

Take a look at the candidates who have filed to run for the Board this June. Are some of them the same type of micromanagers who want to enjoy the positions of power and haunt the Association office to oversee everything? Is that what we homeowners want—-a return to micromanagement?

Is it the role of Board members to spend all their time on Village matters? Or do Board members establish policy for the Village structure and have time free to work on their computers or play a round of golf? Do they have time to enjoy their own retirement? They will IF they establish policy and then turn over the operational details to the employees hired just for this purpose. The Board CAN maintain contact without direct daily intervention.

Candidates Night is Thursday, June 3 at 7 p.m. in the Assembly Room. Take advantage of this opportunity to question all candidates on their theories and ideas of management and finance.

Learn what you can by discussing the candidates with your neighbors. Ask pointed questions of all the candidates at the meeting. Do any of them have a personal agenda? Do they seem willing to cooperate and compromise? Can they discuss conflicts without angry confrontations?

Take time to become an informed voter **BEFORE** June 17, the final election day, and then **VOTE**.

### **Election Day Schedule June 17**

All Village meetings and events (pool, all sports, library and club meetings are CLOSED until 12 noon on Thursday, June 17 to encourage homeowners to vote and attend the Annual meeting in the AR at 10 a.m.

Ballots and voting instructions will go into the mail about June I to homeowners. Voted ballots may be dropped into ballot boxes in the Recreation Lobby or Association lobby starting June 4, after the Candidates' Night presentation. The boxes will close at 5 p.m. on June 16.

Late voting will be accepted between 8:30-10 a.m. June 17 in the MPR. At 10 a.m. they close and the action moves to the AR for the Annual Meeting.

**Plea For Civility** 

(Max Heller, LV Board member, made these comments at the end of the Open Board meeting of Monday, May 3. Selma Lich paraphrased them and ILV felt they were pertinent enough to merit printing to share more widely.)

"I'm disturbed by the tone of what I heard this morning. I hope that as mature adults we can approach controversial subjects in an open, friendly and constructive manner and not resort to speaking about personalities.

"There is no superior method of becoming a nominee, but my own response when I made myself a candidate for the Board was to be prepared to subject myself to questioning.

"We can disagree without becoming disagreeable. We must be civil in our observations. Light will illuminate. Heat will burn."

#### **Notice To Club Members**

This is the first issue of Inside Leisure Village which was printed WITHOUT carrying club news. With limited time and help, the staff is casting about for ways to reduce its load in preparing the monthly newspaper. Residents' constructive suggestions are welcomed.

Omitting general coverage of the clubs may not be popular with club people, but that segment of ILV copy usually submitted requires an inordinate amount of staff time to process. This issue does still carry news about official standing committees and sub-committees, such as Channel 8 and the Library, and news on all Village events, such as Chorale and Keyboard concerts, Showtyme attractions, Players Guild play and musicals, and Arts and Crafts shows, but no general meeting news from these groups.

One ILV staff recommendation is to formulate a club directory to be printed each month. This would give each group about one column inch of space to announce club name, purpose, meeting time, meeting place, and name and phone of a contact person.

But to print even this much material for 50 groups would require a club Directory editor to compile and maintain accurate information. For this ILV needs a Directory Editor, a new post. Madelyn McKean has offered to begin this job.

Our Nominating Committee plays a vital role in our Association and we should be grateful for their work in seeking qualified candidates for election to our Board of Directors. But, wisely, there is also another approved way in which homeowners may wish to offer their candidacy and that is by Petition. This alternate way reflects the very meaning of our democracy.

Most certainly, candidates by Petition are not to be considered any less worthy of election than the candidates of the Nominating Committee. It might even be argued that Petition nominees have a broader mandate for the nomination from 50 to 100 signatories than those approved by the six members of the Nominating Commit-

Regrettably, what happened recently in the process of announcing and promoting candidates for our forthcoming election is deplorable. The Nominating Committee presented its candidates to the Board several weeks before the legal deadline for candidates by Petition. For the past two decades, in the spirit of justice and fairness, every Board correctly waited for this deadline before making all the candidacies known -- all at the same time. Except this time. For the first time ever, the Nominating Committee selections were announced way in advance, giving them an unfair publicity advantage.

Worse yet, the Nominating Committee selectees were given enthusiastic official endorsement on Channel 8, while the candidates by Petition, much later (when their names became known) received only a terse, cold, "second billing" notice on a separate

All this could not have possibly occurred without the expressed approval of our Board. Arguably, this double standard of announcement of candidates is not even justifiable on legal basis, when we note that two of the candidates of the Nominating Committee are also Members of the current and of the last Board . This must never happen again. All candidates must be given equal billing in all future elections.

Basically, the election format will be the same with one exception --- the use of proxies has been deleted. In place of the proxy you will receive an absentee Ballot. The absentee ballot will function in the same capacity as absentee ballots you have cast in both federal and state elections. In other words, it will enable you to cast your vote in advance if you are going to be out-of-town or unable to cast your vote in person the day of the election.

Please remember that this absentee ballot --- as with all official absentee ballots -- once completed. sealed in the official envelope, and received by the Election Committee, is irrevocable and non-retriev

able. The last date for filing your absentee ballot is Wednesday, June 16 by 5:00 p.m.

This election, as always, will be in compliance with LV CC&Rs and by-laws. There shall be one vote for each lot. The term lot refers to the parcel of land on which our homes are located. In a home owned by two persons, there can be only one ballot cast. Therefore, the two persons will have to agree which candidates for whom they will cast their votes. There will be only one ballot and this ballot will be cast as a unit. This ballot will contain the names of all the candidates.

In this instance, as there will be three Board positions available, voters will indicate which three candidates they wish to elect. Only one vote is allowed for each candidate. In no in-

your name. If this envelope is not properly signed, the ballot will not be valid and the envelope will be counted only for quorum purposes. Remember to seal your envelopes.

For those who prefer to vote on Election Day (June 17) the polls will be open from 8-10 a.m. in the MPR. As usual ballot boxes will next line be sure to write be in the lobby of the Rec-

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#### SENIOR-To-SENIOR PEER COUNSELING PROGRAM By Lillian Hawthorne

This article describes another program in this community which offers special services to seniors. Once again, it is intended as a source of information, not as a recommendation

or advertisement.

The Senior-to-Senior Peer Counseling Program is a free, non-sectarian, confidential service that offers counseling assistance in their own home to seniors who are experiencing personal problems or life crisis situations. This assistance is provided by specially trained counselors who are seniors themselves and who are supervised by a licensed professional. The program is administered by Jewish Family Service without regard to race, religion, gender or financial status; it is available upon direct request to all seniors residing in Ventura County.

The individual who requests this service will be assigned an appropriate peer counselor who will make home calls and will continue these contacts until the situation has been sufficiently improved or re-

solved.

Pauline Auerbach, a resident of Leisure Village, has been serving as counseling supervisor for this program for the past year. She currently supervises 11 on-going counselors and is also training 5 more. New counselors must complete a 10 week training

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program before being assigned any clients. All peer counselors must meet every other week for group supervision which includes case reviews, on-going instruction, suggestions and support.

According to Auerbach, the most frequent requests for counseling are related to loneliness, depression, isolation due to being homebound, and family estrangement. Situations

which involve mental illness, chemical dependency or diagnosis of Alzheimer's are referred to professional resources, i.e. physicians, psychiatrists or appropriate county departments

Auerbach earned an MFCC (Marriage Family Child Counseling) license in 1984. Since then, she has conducted her own private clinical practice, supervised other counseling

interns, and also served as a Los Angeles County Social Worker. She stated that she was extremely impressed by the commitment and quality of the peer counselors who bring such life experience and caring to their role in the program. It was her observation that this program is effective on two levels: for the clients, it helps resolve crisis situations and provides needed information and support;

and for the counselors, it offers the satisfaction of helping others plus opportunity for personal growth.



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#### Fleecing Of Senior Taxpavers

Property taxes which senior citizens pay are supposed to be an equal burden on everyone. Unfortunately this is not always the case. Some seniors, not only in Leisure Village but other seniors in the whole of Ventura County, are paying as much as 400% more than the norm because of a technical point on a part of the Ventura County property tax relief provision rules.

This is in reference to the reciprocity of the tax base in home property that could have been transferred from another county to Ventura.

Proposition 90 that was accepted by the voters of California in 1988 gave all the counties of the state the option of this Property Tax

Relief. Unfortunately, the Supervisors of Ventura did not accept this opportunity until May, 1992 so that all seniors after that date were able to carry forward from other counties their low tax base when they moved to Ventura.

Seniors that bought homes in Ventura County at the peak of the real estate boom between 1988 and 1992 are paying a very high price for their homes, even higher than today's prices, and were unable to benefit from this tax relief reciprocity.

This inequity and financial burden was brought to the attention of State Assemblyman Nao Takasugi when he was in office, but nothing was ever done. The County Supervisors

recognized that an adjust- investigate the problem. situation was made to the ment had to be made in the tax structure so therefore made a temporary adjustment by sending out Tax Modification Forms for those persons caught in the 1988-1992 period. But this is temporary and can be revoked at any time.

Percy Silver, V.17, Al Fox, V.33 and Ben Perry, V.17 as an ad hoc committee, also brought this to the attention of the Tax Assessor's office, who were very sympathetic to the situation but couldn't do anything about it. Percy Silver again made arrangement for the trio to meet with Kathy Long, our County Supervisor. 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
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#### Y2K Scam Happens To Senior Over Phone By Jack Whalen

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

**Emergency Services** Organization By Nancy Kuebel

The Emergency Service Organization conducted one of three annual Disaster Preparation Exercises (DPXs). Over 200 volunteers, as well as Leisure Village residents in general, participate in these exercises, which are designed to acquaint ESO members, and Villagers with the procedures to be followed in time of emergency.

The process starts when the Chair alerts the Chief Coordinator that a DPX is scheduled. The Chief Coordinator calls the four Deputy Coordinators who then contact the Village Coordinators who call their assistants and phone helpers. The phone helpers contact all of the villagers to put out their white "flags." Simulating emergencies, the Chair also puts six 1st Aid and six Fire icons at random locations throughout the Village. Those homes do not display white flags.

The above process changes during the real thing only by eliminating the need to alert everyone, that is to say, unless it's a toxic spill or flood situation, where there would be phone notification. We are asked to display white "flags" to indicate that everyone in the house is okay if that's the case. This allows the Coordinators to focus their efforts where there is a problem. During the DPX, the coordinators count the white flags in order to measure the response.

In a real disaster, the Village Coordinators and their assistants check immediately to determine what kind of assistance is needed and report this to the closest Ham Radio Car. (Eleven radio cars are deployed along mountain View and Leisure Village drives.) The radio operators notify the Central Command Post so that 1 st Aid and Search and Rescue groups can be deployed to help as needed.

Also called into play are the RVs, which would be especially useful when the power is out, since they are able to generate their own power to provide cooking facilities and other necessities.

This is where the buddy system becomes an important factor too, especially if your buddy or a household

member needs help. If it is safe to move about, you may be asked to assist the coordinators by calling for help or by doing anything else that is needed.

The hub of the operation is the Command Center, usually in the area near the radio shack. All information is radioed to this area where assistance efforts are tracked.

An important need for all of us is a portable (battery operated) radio, which should be tuned to either KVEN 1450 am or KAJY 1007 fm. These are emergency frequencies, which provide us with instructions about what we should do.

The ESO is doing everything necessary to prepare for possible emergencies in LV. We hope that none of these preparations will ever be needed, but we will be ready if ever they are.
