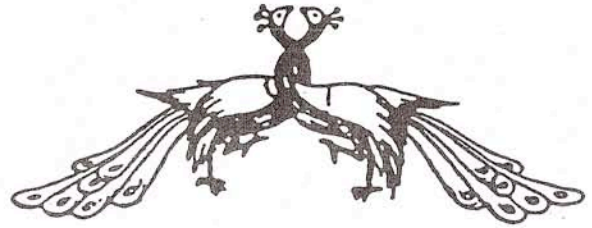

## 5th UCLA Series Features Pokr Hayk/ Armenia Minor-Sebastia/Sivas

The fifth in the UCLA international conference series on historic Armenian cities and provinces will feature Pokr Hayk/Armenia Minor-- encompassing the region of Sebastia/Sivas, with Marsovan, Amasia, Tokat, Shabin-Karahisar, Divrig, Gurun, and Gemerek.

The day-long conference will be held on Saturday, May 15, from 9:15 a.m. to 6:15 p.m. in Dickson Auditorium on the UCLA campus. The conference has been organized by Professor Richard Hovannisian, Holder of the Armenian Educational Foundation Chair in Modern Armenian History, in cooperation with the Grigor Narekatsi Chair in Armenian Studies, UCLA. There is no charge for admission.

All sessions took place in the Industrial Technology Building, on Barstow near Cedar on the CSU Fresno campus. On Friday, March 19 at 7 PM a special dinner was held in honor of the invited speakers and guests at the Downtown Club, Fresno. Keynote speakers were Hank Saroyan and Aram Kevorkian.

### Conference on New England Armenians

The first conference ever held on the subject of Armenian communities of the New World took place on Friday and Saturday, April 9-10, 1999 at Bentley College in Waltham, Massachusetts.

The regional conference on "The Armenians of New England: Celebrating a Culture and Preserving a Heritage" featured panels on a wide range of subjects, with distinguished scholars and researchers from all over the United States participating.

The opening session of the Conference took place on Friday, April 9 with a keynote address by Boston College Professor Emeritus, Thomas H. O'Connor on "The Armenian Experience: Roots of the Past: Realities of the Present." A panel discussion among Armenian-American women writers and scholars on the topic of "Who Are We Now and Who Are We Becoming?" followed the keynote address.

On Saturday, the following panels were organized: *Establishing the Community* with presentations by Linda A. Avakian, Hartwell Community College, California; Marc Mamigonian, NAASR; Rubina Perroomian, UCLA; and Robert Krikorian, Harvard University. The panel *Noted Individuals* included presentations by Rev. Arten Ashjian, Diocese of the Armenian Church; Lucy Der Manuelian, Tufts University; Sonia Ketchian, Harvard University; and Suzanne Moranian, Wellesley College.

Afternoon sessions were *Cultural Institutions* with Robert Mirak, Armenian Cultural Foundation; Joan Bamberger, Wellesley College; and Varoujan Karentz, Armenian Historical Association of Rhode Island; *Architecture and Visual Arts* with Ruth Thomasian, Project SAVE Armenian Photographical Archives; Christina Maranci, Princeton University; and Arshag Merguerian, American Institute of Architecture, *Language and Music* with Bert Vaux, Harvard University; March Nishanian, Columbia University; David Calonne, Siena Heights College, Michigan; and Leon Janikian, Northwestern University; *Changing Communities* with Stella Rustigian, Wethersfield, Connecticut; Eden Naby, Harvard University; and Isabel Kaprielian, California State University, Fresno.

The conference was organized for the purpose of furthering knowledge of the oldest and one of the largest Armenian communities in North America. The conference was sponsored and organized by: Armenian Cultural Foundation, Armenian International Women's Association, Armenian Library and Museum of America, Armenian Women's Information Center, Friends of Armenian Culture Society, Mayreni Publishing, National Association of Armenian Studies and Research, New England Board of Higher Education, New England Heritage Center, and the office of State Senator Steven A. Tolman. Dr. Robert Mirak of Winchester and Manoog S. Young of Boston were co-chairmen of the organizing committee.



## First Conference on Genocide, Buenos Aires, November 4-5, 1998

The Conference on Genocide was held in Buenos Aires, Argentina, on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the Declaration of Human Rights, under the auspices of the Armenian Diocese and the Armenian Center of Argentina, the National Human Rights Office, the Information Center of the United Nations, and the Armenian Embassy.

The inaugural panel was held by Archbishop Kissag Mouradian (Armenian Apostolic Church), Dr. Vahan Ter Ghevondian (former ambassador in Argentina), Professor Hebe Clementi (University of Buenos Aires), Professor Inés Pérez Suárez (National Human Rights Office), and Dr. Angel Escudero de Paz (Information Center of the United Nations).

Scholars and writers presented papers on different subjects: *The Unpunished Armenian Genocide and Shoa* (Daniel Bargman, Memory of Holocaust Foundation); *A Nazi at Chascomús, in the province of Buenos Aires* (Martín Cremonte, University of Buenos Aires); *Argentine Archives and Armenian Genocide* (Nélida Boulgourdjian-Toufeksian, University of Buenos Aires); *Etiology of Genocide and Solutions* (Bishop Néstor Daniel Villa); *Meaning of Genocide* (Narciso Binayan Carmona); *Genocide and Memory* (Libertad Telecemian, psychiatrist); *Concept of Genocide* (Celina Lértora Mendoza, University of Buenos Aires); and *Genocide and Omission* (Sergio D. Leoni, Principal of an Armenian School).

## Upcoming Conferences

### "Armenian Studies 2000" Workshops Planned by Association Internationale des Études Arméniennes (AIEA)

The study of Armenian culture, its rich heritage and its contemporary achievements has made remarkable advances over the past two centuries. There has been signal progress both by Western and by Armenian scholars. The turn of millennium offers a favorable occasion to assess achievements to date and to outline new perspectives both for research and for suitable publication. Moreover, such an assessment will enable us to reach a general perspective on most urgent tasks waiting Armenologists in the early decades of the dawning century.

Association Internationale des Études Arméniennes (AIEA) plans, therefore, to promote and coordinate a program among scholars devoted to Armenian studies. Scholars both Armenian and non-Armenian, active either in Armenia or in diaspora, will participate in a series of workshops from 1999 to 2004, the 1600th anniversary of the in-

vention of the Armenian alphabet. Leading scholars will contribute to the Workshops which will also be open to the interested public. Workshops will be devoted to Linguistics (1999), Philology (2000), Literature (2001), History and Geography (2002), Art and Archeology (2003), and Religion and History of Ideas (2004).

Obviously the organization of such workshops will demand a considerable financial effort. The AIEA looks towards the generosity of all Armenians and Armenian Institutions, with their filial devotion to their cultural heritage. Their support will enable it to do its best for the word-wide promotion and diffusion and the deeper study of Armenian culture. The culture of the Armenians is certainly, as the outstanding scholar Anatoly Jacobson once said of the Armenian art, one of the most distinguished achievements of world civilization.

### Celebrations of 30 Years of Armenian Studies at the Hebrew University

The first of a series of public events to celebrate 30 Years of Armenian Studies at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem will be held in Washington on Tuesday, May 4, 1999.

Under the Auspices of H.E. Ambassador Ruben Shugarian, the American and Armenian Friends of the Hebrew University, Annie Totah and Aris Mardirossian, invite you to a buffet reception to be held at 6 pm at the Armenian Embassy, 2225 R Street Northwest, Washington, DC. The reception marks the achievements of the Armenian Studies program and its contributions to scholarship, to the Armenian community and to bringing knowledge of Armenian things to the society.

The reception honours special friends and supporters of the Armenian Studies Program, including the Steven P. Mugar Family, represented by Carolyn Mugar; Mr. Leon Levi, President of the American Sefardi Celebration; The Knights of Vartan; Mr. Garnik Nanagouljian, former Minister of Trade and Industry of the Republic of Armenia; and Professor Michael E. Stone, Director of the Armenian Studies Program, Jerusalem.

Forthcoming events of the 30th Year Celebration include the following:

In Jerusalem on May 24-26 there will be an International Symposium on "The Armenians in the Holy Land and Jerusalem." Scholars and students from all over the world will attend, including alumni and affiliates of the Armenian Studies Program. The proceedings will be published. A special session will be held jointly with the Jewish National and University Library on "Armenian Libraries in Jerusalem." A visit to the Cathedral of the Sts. James is included and a meeting with the Armenian Community.

In Jerusalem on May 25 there will be the 30th Anniversary Banquet with distinguished guests and friends. Honoured speakers will include H.B. Archbishop Torkom Manoogian,



Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem; Professor Menahem Magidor, President of the Hebrew University and Academician Georg Brutian, Vice-President of the Academy of Sciences of Armenia.

In Jerusalem on June 6 a half-day Symposium will be held on "The Armenian Community of Jerusalem." The lectures will be in Hebrew and directed to the general Israeli public.

In Jerusalem on November 9 a full-day Symposium will be held on "Armenian Pilgrimage to the Holy Land." Guest of Honour will be H.B. Mesrob II, Armenian Patriarch of Constantinople, who is an alumnus of our program.

## New Books

### *Remembrance and Denial: The Case of the Armenian Genocide*

Edited by Richard G. Hovannisian

The Armenian Genocide that began in World War I, during the drive to transform the plural Ottoman Empire into a monoethnic Turkey, removed a people from its homeland and erased most evidence of their three-thousand-year-old material and spiritual culture.

For the rest of this century, changing world events, calculated silence, and active suppression of memory have overshadowed the initial global outrage over the genocide and have threatened to make this calamity "the forgotten genocide" of world history.

This volume squarely confronts the denial of the Armenian Genocide by the Turkish government, which has expended considerable political and financial resources to suppress the facts surrounding this event and has even enlisted American and European pseudo-academics to rationalize this issue.

Fourteen leading scholars from the United States, Canada, France, England, Germany, and Israel here examine the Armenian Genocide from a variety of perspectives to refute those efforts and to show how remembrance and denial have shaped perceptions of the event.

### Ceremony to Honor Henry Morgenthau

Washington, DC - The Armenian National Institute (ANI) announces a dedication ceremony honoring the memory of Henry Morgenthau, the late US Ambassador to the Ottoman Empire, to be held in Armenia April 23. The ceremony, which will follow the International Conference on the Armenian Genocide, also dedicated to Henry Morgenthau, is hosted jointly with the Union of Armenians of Italy and the Armenian Genocide Museum. US Ambassador to Armenia Michael Lemmon and members of the Morgenthau family, led by grandson and namesake, Henry Morgenthau III, will be among those attending the ceremony, to be held in the Armenian Genocide Museum's Great Hall.

Held in high regard by Armenians around the world, Ambassador Morgenthau was among the first and

most persistent to alert the world to the Armenian Genocide of 1915. He also spearheaded humanitarian efforts to aid survivors.

During the April 23 ceremony, an urn containing a handful of earth from Ambassador Morgenthau's gravesite will be interred in the Genocide Memorial's wall of honor. Marked by a plaque, the urn will rest alongside similar acknowledgments of other prominent humanitarians who assisted Armenians during the 1915 deportations and massacres.

### Ceremony

The dedication ceremony will be held at the Armenian Genocide Museum.

Among those speaking during the ceremony are: Henry Morgenthau III, US Ambassador to Armenia Michael Lemmon, ANI representative Carolyn Mugar, Union of Armenians of Italy representative Pietro Kuciukian, and US Holocaust Memorial Council representatives Kitty Dukakis and Diane Asadorian.

Following the honor guard's presentation of US and Armenian flags, the procession will walk from the museum hall to the Memorial Wall for placement of the urn. Armenian and Jewish clergy will conduct a brief religious service. The Director of the Museum Lavrenti Barseghian and Pietro Kuciukian will formally seal the urn in the Wall. Guests will then place flowers at the eternal flame.

The ceremony will conclude with the planting of a tree in the nearby Memorial Grove by the Morgenthau family.
