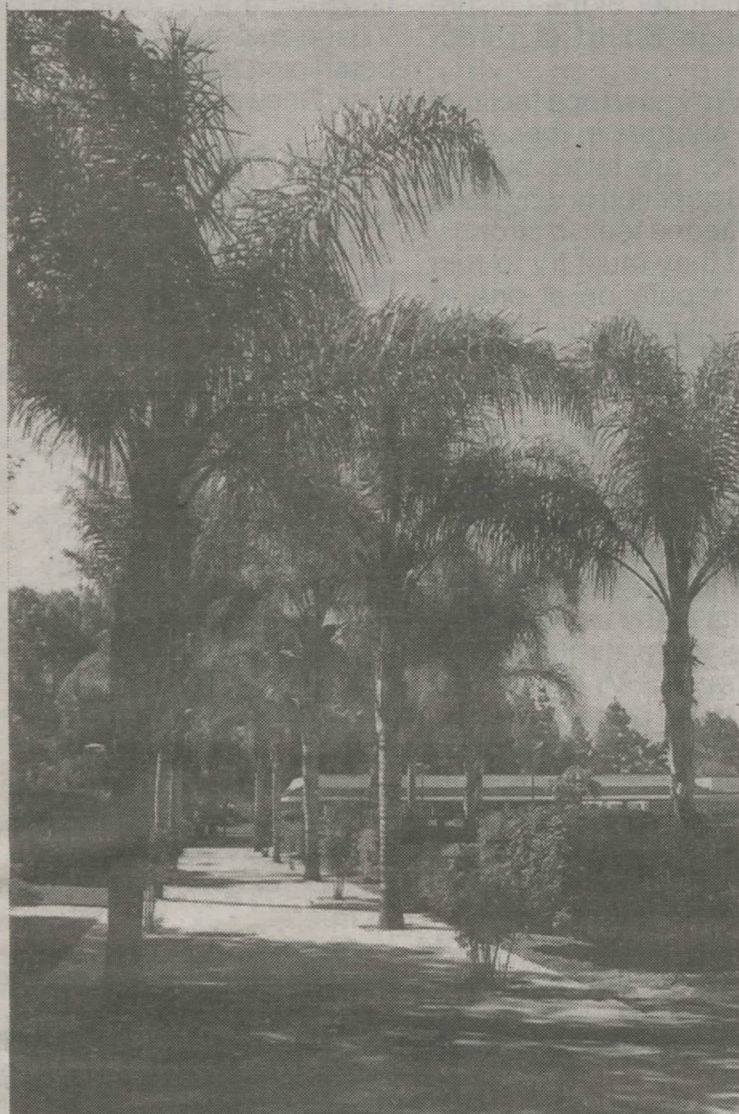

HEALTH CARE INFORMATION

The Camarillo Health Care District will present a special health care information forum in Leisure Village, on Tuesday, June 6, from 10 a.m. to noon in the Assembly Room.

The Camarillo Health Care District is a public, not-for-profit, local government agency established by the State of California. Its mission is to serve the health needs of the Camarillo area through a range of direct and indirect programs, which include education, prevention, treatment and support.

The main purpose of the upcoming Forum is to present information to Leisure Village residents about many services and programs that may be of help or interest to seniors. These include the following: 1) available transportation resources, especially for handicapped persons; 2) Lifeline, a 24 hour medical alert system; 3) foot care clinics; 4) assistance and information about in-home care or companions; 5) updates about Medicare regulations; 6) health and memory loss screenings; 7) support groups, i.e. bereavement, caretaking, illness; 8) counseling groups; 9) classes and lectures on health, safety, nutrition

and other subjects; and 10) adult day care.

A second purpose of this Forum is to hear from Leisure Village residents about their health care needs that are not being met, or are not sufficiently met, and their ideas and suggestions for new or improved services. The Forum will provide information and literature, discussions by program coordinators at the Health Care District, and opportunity for questions and answers. The overall goal is to strengthen the communication and relationship between Leisure Village and the Camarillo Health Care District so that the agency's services can best be used and the needs of seniors can best be met.

On a lighter note, the Forum will offer refreshments and also drawings for special prizes. In addition, arrangements will be made for the "Care-a-Van" bus to make several circuits around Leisure Village on that morning to transport residents to the Recreation Center to attend this program. Further information about time schedules and "pick-up" points will be presented on Channel 8. Please be sure to watch for future announcements and to attend this special Forum.

QUESTION THE CANDIDATES

Years ago the LV Board of Directors was dominated by individuals who chose to micromanage the Village. These people did cut costs, held down homeowner assessments, directed the staff and some even physically occupied the Association Office.

What was the result? Employee morale plummeted under such constant scrutiny as Board members worked full time at their jobs. Some good employees and two general managers left. The Board made policy AND carried it out.

The general appearance of the Village deteriorated as landscape wages were frozen for three years and attrition cut the number of landscape workers. Yes, association month fees stayed low, but the appearance of the Village suffered greatly, along with employee morale.

Take a look at the candidates who have filed to run for the Board this June. Are some of them the same type of micromanagers who want to enjoy the positions of power and haunt the Association office to oversee everything? Is that what we homeowners want—a return to micromanagement?

Is it the role of board members to spend all their time on Village matters? Or do Board members establish policy for the Village structure and have time free to work on their computers or play a round of golf? They will IF they establish policy and then turn over the operational details to the employees hired just for this purpose. The Board CAN maintain contact without direct daily intervention.

Do the candidates have goals that are in accord with the beautification and continuing upgrading of the Village? Are their priorities going to attract active people with diverse interests willing and able to participate in and contribute to the Leisure Village lifestyle?

Candidate's Night is Thursday, June 1 at 7 p.m. in the Assembly Room. Take advantage of this opportunity to question all candidates on their theories and ideas of management, finance and quality of Leisure Village life.

This is an Open Letter to the residents of Leisure

Village from Georgia & Dick Griswold.

Attorney, General Manager, consultants, employee department heads are running our Village. Our General Manager is finally attending classes to obtain his "certification" as a G.M. A small group of people have made decisions without regard to the majority of the residents such annex, exercise room, color of trim on our homes, vehicles, swimming pool, consultants, employee contracts. Annex & exercise rooms should have been budgeted over time. What

was total cost of these projects? Residents should choose colors for their own home! *Why are we in competition with Camarillo Police Department? The added attachments on our patrol vehicles are not needed. Bumper guards are for high-speed chases. 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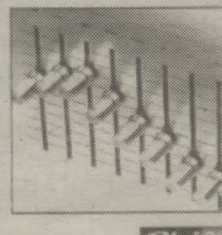
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Looking at Channel 8

LAWNS

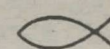
One of the many fea-
tures that makes the Vil-
lage such an attractive
place to live are the
swaths of green that sur-
round our homes. These
greenbelts that are also
known as "common ar-
eas" are mowed,
trimmed and watered by
the LV staff on a year-
round basis. Such value
is placed on these green
areas that the golf course
is maintained by a spe-
cial crew using reel-type
mowers to ensure a
proper playing space.

Maintenance of lawns
is a high priority item be-
cause the appearance of
the Village is so affected
by the condition of the
grass. A significant por-
tion of this maintenance
effort involves proper
watering. If the amount of
watering is too small the
grass responds by turn-
ing brown (ugh!). If too
much water is used then
we see runoff (waste!) or
have soft, muddy areas.
Also, if the water is ap-
plied improperly, such as
on sidewalks, driveways
or streets we see more
waste.

Over the years the
cost of water has been a
significant part of the
budget. The LV budget
for this Fiscal Year is
\$555,504. For the past
three years the Board
Directors has been work-
ing with a consultant to

get guidance in finding
ways to reduce the
amount of water used for
irrigating our lawns. The
Board has also directed
the EAC to review the
watering practices and
make recommendations
for reducing the amount
of water consumed for ir-

rigation and provide sug-
gestions for improving
watering efficiency. Stud-
ies made to date show
that by reducing water
consumption by 25% we
can save approximately
\$75,000 per year on our
water bill.



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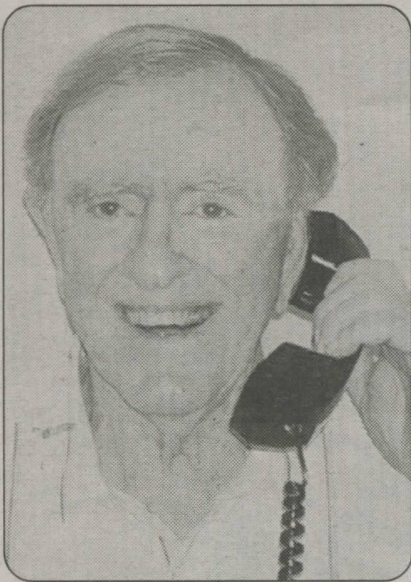
