## New Condo Law Goes Into Effect

The State of California enacted a new law (AB 46) called the Common Interest Development Open Meeting Act, which became effective January 1, 1996. This law requires

all meetings of the boards of directors of associations to be open to all members of the associations. There are specific exceptions to this requirement when the board considers litigation,

contracts, discipline and personnel matters. The LVA Board of Directors is reviewing this law to assess its impact on the conduct of Association affairs.

### Cumulative Voting?

A long time ago, the California Department of Real Estate required that a provision for cumulative voting be included in the governing documents of each common interest development such as Leisure Village. This requirement was to enable the developer (Leisure Technology, in our case) to have adequate control of the Board of Directors of the homeowners association while the developer was still completing construction. Once the developer has finished the project and turned the administration over to the homeowners, the owners then had the right to amend the By-Laws (governing documents) to delete the requirements for cumulative voting.

In odd years, when three members are elected to the LVA Board of Directors, three votes are allotted to each residence, and in even years when two candidates are elected, two votes are allotted to each residence. Cumulative voting means that a homeowner may cast all his votes for any one candidate for the Board of Directors instead of giving one vote for each candidate of his choice.

Association By-Laws may be amended at a regular or special meeting of the association by a vote of a majority of the homeowners in the association. Article VI, Section 2 contains the sentence, "Directors shall be elected or removed by cumulative vote of the members." Changing the wording of that section to delete the cumulative provision, but preserving the power to remove a director for cause, is the intention of the current effort by L.V. residents.

After twenty years, Leisure Village homeowners should elect their directors democratically, one vote per vacancy on the Board, with the candidates receiving a plurality, winning. It takes little imagination to conclude that a small clique of determined residents can influence an election by "stacking" their votes to favor one individual over others.

All candidates are important, because each member of the Board has an equal vote. Thoughtful residents should be concerned about each seat on the Board, not just one "favorite."

When the Board of Directors presents a ballot for homeowners to vote on the cumulative voting issue, ILV suggests voters respond with a vote for democratic elections--eliminate the cumulative voting practice. It will take only a simple majority of homeowners to make this change.




Better yet, if you play an instrument, come and join the orchestra. Practice time is Thursday evenings, 7 to 9:00 p.m. in the MPR.


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## California State Senior Legislation Agenda for 1996

Health care in various forms dominated the California Senior Legislature's 15th annual session held recently in Sacramento. HMO's, geriatric training, mental health and other concerns were subjected to CSL's scrutiny as the 120-member body debated and prioritized the more than 60 proposals which they had drafted and submitted prior to the session.

The "top ten" state and "top four" federal priorities will be given special advocacy attention when the new California Legislature and congressional sessions convene in 1996.

The top ten state priorities are:

1. A proposal to adequately fund the major state senior organizations including the California Commission on Aging, the California Senior Legislature, the Triple-A Council of California and the Cali-

fornia Department of Aging. Volunteer contributions made by the "check off" system on California's income tax return, which have been the main source of funding those vital agencies, have fallen off, imperiling the ability to carry out their functions. The CSL proposal would suspend the inflation adjustment to the annual tax credit granted to those over 65 years, and direct the revenues saved to those agencies named. This would be less than \$2.00 per person over 65, a small amount as an annual contribution to those vital senior groups.

2. This proposal would authorize recipients of SSI/SSP benefits to apply for food stamps and to obtain any necessary waivers of federal law for that purpose.

3. CSL's third priority would establish community-based mental health facilities in rural areas, and a coordinator of those facilities, under the direction of existing local mental

health and public health programs.

4. Geriatric training for physicians and others. This proposal would encourage the medical schools deans' council to modify the curricula of medical schools in the University of California system to include adequate training in geriatrics and related pharmacology.

5. This proposal concerns public transportation for rural and non-urbanized areas. It would define fare box rations for rural and non-urbanized areas based on population densities, revise the method of acquiring information concerning transportation needs, including requiring public hearings, and changing the percentage of annual allocated transportation funds.

6. This priority would require gerontological training for administrators of senior centers, senior residences and paratransit providers.

7. Cognizant of the

many problems and complaints which HMO's have created with their increasing popularity, the California Senior Legislature's priority would impose certain requirements on health maintenance organizations with respect to the rights and privileges and would provide for regular specified audits


8. This proposal addresses the billing procedures of health care facilities and would require that patients be provided with a reasonably understandable itemized billing within three days of release from an acute care facility and prior to the billing of the insurer in order to determine the accuracy of the billing.

9. This priority proposal is concerned with offenses against elders and dependent adults. This proposal would give priority to the disposition of criminal actions involving witnesses or victims who are 65 years of age or older to strengthen the protection of older adults.

10. Mental health of older adults is a concern and would require County Mental Health offices to have a coordinator for older adult mental health needs.

The four federal priority proposals which CSL will advocate to the Congress of the United States deal with private pension portability, increased funding for the Medicare and Medicaid programs, a cap on governmental official's salary increases and a proposal to ensure that present inequities in the price of pharmaceutical drugs be eliminated.

In seeking legislative authors for the above proposals and lobbying for their adoption in the State Legislature and in Congress, the California Senior Legislature has its work cut out for the ensuing year.




### Your Neighbors Care Equipment Loan Program

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

Leisure Village is a residential village for active people who want to maintain their independence and continue to live here.


The availability of bus service helps sell our units.

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## Guidelines For Contributors To ILV

Reporters and publicity people submitting material to be used in Inside Leisure Village will help out the staff (and may enhance the reception of their material) if they will follow basic guidelines. These include:

1. Type all material, or we must take time to type it, a delay. If handwritten copy is absolutely necessary, submit it early.
2. Use full size 8" x 11" sheets of paper. Odd size sheets can get lost.
3. DO NOT TYPE IN ALL CAPS: stories in all caps must be retyped.
4. Put writer's name and phone number in upper left corner.
5. Leave 2" of space at top of page for our notations.
6. Type group's name and writer's byline.
7. Double space each line and indent each paragraph.
8. Put the name of your

group into the FIRST sentence of your story. This makes it easier to match with the right logo, if you have one.

9. Be sure your copy can be easily read. Do you need a new typewriter ribbon? Do the keys need cleaning? No red ribbons, script type or Xerox copies, please. Clean copy prevents misunderstandings.

10. Submit your story on time. Deadline is Monday at 5:00 p.m., usually the first Monday of the month. Deadlines for the next paper are listed on page 2 of each issue. Please check the exact deadline and meet it. All material should be placed in the ILV mailbox in the east hall of the Rec Center.

11. If your story must be late, call the coordinator and tell her when you can get it in and why it must be late. Coordinator has the OPTION to accept or

refuse the copy.

12. Call the coordinator to arrange in advance for a photographer to cover your event. Do not call the photographer directly; he works on assignment from the coordinator only. Planning for each issue, including pictures, starts the first week of each month, so if you want pictures, we need notice.

13. A news story is not minutes of your meeting. Reading about events two months old is dull. What is coming up for your group? Feature future events.

14. If ILV must cut your article because of space, the cutting generally starts at the end, so put your important information at the top, and then give the details.

There are about 70 items submitted to ILV for each issue. If writers used these standard rules, the job of the coordinator and the staff is made easier.

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
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## Profile: Larry Sawyer

For the past three years, Leisure Village's Channel 12 has presented on-going interviews titled "Shared Experiences." The program moderator, Larry Sawyer of Village 16, conducts stimulating talks with residents whose activities in the Village are related to their pre-village interests and vocations.

As an example, Larry has interviewed Bob Vanderhaven, V.I, who showed his photographs of Yosemite Valley in different seasons. As background for these photos, Bob read selections from the diary of John Muir, the famous naturalist who first publicized the beauty and grandeur of Yosemite. Vanderhaven is also a cameraman for Channel 12.

Interviewing individuals for "Shared Experiences" is a natural extension of Larry's professional activities as an Internal Auditor. During many years in this field, he conducted many extensive interviews with business managers throughout the world. The object of these meetings was to "make the person interviewed a better manager and to make each establishment audited a better place," in Larry's words. For those unfamiliar with modern business terminology, Internal Auditing consists of in-depth evaluations of people and systems as opposed to the numerical type of auditing which is sometimes called "bean counting."

Larry applied his professional expertise here in Leisure Village when he and fellow villager Irv Anekstein V.39 set up a stock inventory system for the Association.

Larry started his professional life in the Legal Accounting Dept. of the General Accounting Office in Washington, D.C. At this time he was a public accountant and member of

District of Columbia bar. Due to the adverse effect of Washington weather on his children's health, Larry applied for a transfer to the sunnier climate of Southern California. The only employment with the G.A.O. in California, however, was as an Internal Auditor, a vocation in which he had no experience. He decided to accept the new challenge. It was, according to Larry, a strictly on-the-job learning experience. From checking figures and accounts, his work evolved into evaluation of systems and operations.

His professional curriculum vitae is both varied and extensive. In addition to his experience in the U.S. G.A.O., he has been a consultant to business and education. He has delivered many speeches, conducted many seminars throughout the world, and published articles and books. The textbook "Sawyer's Internal Auditing" is used currently by schools and practitioners. He has served as chairman of several professional associations.

In L.V., Larry's interests go well beyond Internal Auditing. He has acted in thirteen plays and two musicals in the Village. He has also participated in two video and audio training tapes. He also acted in a movie, but his cinema career was cut short when all his scenes were cut out.

Larry, a computer aficionado, communicates with his grandchildren via E-mail. His grandson Randy has worked in a computer related field for many years and set up a program for neurological testing which is considered the foremost product in its field.

When Randy was much younger, Larry published a dialogue between the two entitled "Modern Internal Auditing—What It's All About—The Grandfather Dialogues." This was published in a professional journal.

Larry's other interests include bridge, writing poetry, square dancing (until physical problems prevented the Sawyers from participating). He is currently in the process of printing a second book of poems dedicated to his spouse of 60 years, Esther.

The Sawyers' immedi-

ate family consists of two daughters and four grandchildren, none of whom is involved in Internal Auditing.

According to Larry, his 16 years in the Village have been a "kaleidoscope of meeting interesting people and making good friends." As one who has traveled throughout the world (usually with Esther), Larry emphatically states that he "would rather live in Leisure Village than anywhere else in the world."
