PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located at the will call/player pass table located on the third base concourse.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted via the right field stairway. Due to the limited foul territory behind home plate, all photographers must remain to the outfield side of the coaching boxes at first and third bases.

PRESS BOX: A temporary facility is located on the walkway behind the seats directly behind home plate. Limited seating is available. Radio positions and additional seating for the media will be made in the rows immediately in front of the press box.

TELEPHONES: The press box number is (714) 449-5327. Additional phones are available in the Sports Media Relations Office, located about 200 yards to the south of Titan Field. A public pay phone is located directly behind the electrical house behind the press box.

RADIO LINES: Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team(s). The charge is \$35 per game or \$100 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements with Mel Franks well in advance.

PARKING: Parking is available by:

- a) Using lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday night and all day Saturday and Sunday.
- b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

THE HISTORY OF TITAN BASEBALL

The Cal State Fullerton baseball tradition had a most humble beginning, starting out as a club team and playing on a field literally scratched out of an orange grove. Only the wildest dreamer would have foreseen a program that now features three national championships, nine regional titles, 16 conference crowns and 22 alumni with major league playing experience.

It's been a memorable three decades since Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world. Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball developed into a national power. Larry Cochell kept the tradition alive with two College World Series appearances in his three-year tenure at Fullerton and Garrido has not missed a beat since he returned in 1991 after three seasons at Illinois.

Kempton was the university employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Titan House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing structure in the city and is currently being renovated to host athletic offices.

The first-base line ran north and the thirdbase line went to the west, paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pickup" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full fledged intercollegiate sport with Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing a second field farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their successful tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division

I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans did not miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional, depriving the Trojans of a shot at a sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief, to say the least. They lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience would pay benefits.

Fullerton repeated as PCAA champions in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games over San Diego State. But then came realignment of the league. The seven-team Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title in 1977 with Cal State Los Angeles. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship, but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno, but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

Pitcher Tony Hudson was the College World Series Most Outstanding Player. Tim Wallach became the first Titan to win the Golden Spikes Award, given to the top amateur baseball player in the nation by the United States Baseball Federation. The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional tournament, so Fullerton began a frustrating streak of post-season play in 1980. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, Arizona, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regional in Tempe, Arizona, to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the automatic NCAA tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth and another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. But a realignment of the infielders seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see the Titans win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA championship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a "Murderers' Row" field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of Fresno State and won the regional in 100+degree heat.

At Omaha, venerable institutions Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State, and finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way of a second NCAA title. In a World Series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life and beat Texas, 3-1, in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel set a CWS record for hits and won the Most

Outstanding Player trophy. Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single to help beat ASU. The Titans outslugged Oklahoma State behind a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns, where John Bryant stole a base to set up the tying run and tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning.

The 5-foot-7, 133-pound Delzer allowed a couple of infield hits in the first inning for a Texas run, but that was to be all. He pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door for his 22nd save.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league championship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

By standards of most schools, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans posted a 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoffs as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth inning at home against UNLV and Matt Williams on April 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road, Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its 13 games on its way to a 18-3 PCAA mark and a five-game margin over surprise runners-up UC Irvine.

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them to the NCAA playoffs with a berth in the South II Regional in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a conference that never had won an NCAA playoff game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern. Ratliff handled a bunt and a comebacker and all the other outs were via fly balls or strikeouts.

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep ptiching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, could not handle the Tigers as the Titans had to settle for a 44-17 season.

The 1988 season brought a changing of the guard, but no deviation in the Titans' success story. Garrido resigned and headed for the University of Illinois where a lucrative financial offer and the challenge to build a winner in a cold weather location proved irresistible. Cochell left the cold of Evanston at Northwestern University and headed west.

After an inconsistent start, the new combination clicked and the Titans won 30 out of 35 games before losing a home series and the conference championship to Fresno State. But an at-large bid was tendered and Fullerton parlayed it into a return trip to Omaha by winning the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi. Mike Ross hit a three-run homer with two outs in the bottom of the ninth for a 6-3 win over Texas A&M after the Titans had beaten the host Bulldogs twice in their own stadium.

Fullerton continued its winning ways in a revised CWS format in Omaha with well-pitched victories over Stanford and Miami. But Longo Garcia and Mark Beck could not repeat their feat and Stanford came back through the losers' bracket to drop the Titans to third place with a pair of Cardinal victories.

Despite the presence of All-Americans Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans endured Fullerton's worst season since 1973. The Titans finished in the second division of the Big West at 10-11 and the overall record was 30-27.

The end of a dynasty? Rival coaches thought so and picked the Titans to finish fifth in the Big West in 1990. Instead, the team romped to its first conference title since 1987 and rode that momentum to an impressive sweep of the Central Regional in Austin, Texas. Twice the Titans beat the host Longhorns on their own turf to earn a sixth trip to Omaha.

They crashed at the CWS, literally. Outfielder Rich Gonzales collided with the left field wall and concern for his health distracted the Titans in losses to Oklahoma State and The Citadel

Cochell accepted a lucrative offer to coach at Oklahoma which created an opening for Garrido's return in 1991, a year the Titans would use Amerige Park in downtown Fullerton for games and practice with construction underway on a new stadium.

Fullerton started slowly, but ended the season on a high note winning 10 of its final 12 games and clinching a share of the conference championship, the second title in as many years.

By virtue of head-to-head competition, Fresno State gained the automatic berth to post-season play. The NCAA Selection Committee did not look upon Fullerton's strong finish as being good enough to earn an at-large bid to tournament play. The snub left the Titans at home, but provided motivation for the 1992 squad.

The Titans had a dream season in 1992, one that seemed destined to result in a third national title. They opened the long awaited and revamped Titan Field in April, saw Fullerton alumnus Kevin Costner throw out the first pitch at the dedication game in May and blew through an NCAA

Regional tournament at defending national champion LSU. But they came up one run short to longtime rival Pepperdine in the national title game televised by CBS.

Phil Nevin, who was an outstanding kicker and punter for the football team for three years, was selected *Baseball America's* Player of the Year, the College World Series Most Outstanding Player (the first player from a non-championship team to win the award since Dave Winfield did so in 1973), Big West Conference Player of the Year, was the first player picked in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros, started at third base in the 1992 Olympics for Team USA and became the second Titan to win the Golden Spikes Award.

For 1993, the Titans had beaten USC twice during the regular season for the first time since 1987, but the Trojans would get their revenge by beating Cal State Fullerton both times in the Central II Regional in Austin, Texas.

In 1994, the Titans fought their way through the Midwest I Regional at Oklahoma State and beat the host Cowboys in extra innings to make their eighth appearance at the College World Series.

A highlight of the 1994 CWS came against LSU when Fullerton tied a tournament record, scoring 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory over the Tigers. Georgia Tech, which was shut out for the first time in several seasons in a February game in the Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic by the Titans in Fullerton, had returned the favor in the opening game of the CWS. The Titans fought back through the loser's bracket, routing LSU and overpowering Florida State behind Mark Kotsay's 7-RBI performance and the gutty relief pitching of Dan Ricabal, who shut out the Seminoles over the final 8.1 innings. That earned Fullerton another shot at Georgia Tech and another pitching duel developed between the Yellowjackets' Brad Rigby and Fullerton's Mike Parisi. The game was decided in the 12th inning when Nomar Garciaparra homered for Georgia Tech in the top of the inning and the Titans stranded Dante Powell at third base with no outs in the bottom of the frame, ending the Titans'

Teamwork played a major role in the 1995 season. Thanks to an unselfish work ethic, the Titans put together the best season in Fullerton history in absorbing only nine losses. Led by Kotsay, who won the Smith Award and was named Collegiate Baseball's Co-Player of the Year; All-Americans pitcher Ted Silva and catcher Brian Loyd, Cal State Fullerton earned its third national championship. Fullerton had to play with the pressure of being the No. 1 ranked team in the nation through most of the season, but used a blue-collar attitude to accomplish its goal to win it all. The Titans put together an 18game win streak to finish the season as they steamrolled through the postseason, scoring 39 runs in four games at the College World Series.

COACHING STAFF



Augie Garrido, Head Coach

The "second time around" at Cal State Fullerton has been even more successful for Coach Augie Garrido than his initial 15-year relationship with the Titans. Since returning from a 3-year fling at the University of Illinois (1988-90), Garrido has taken Fullerton to the College World Series on three occasions and finished in the money each time --

capturing a first, a second and a third-place finish.

Fullerton's 1995 national championship was the third (1979 and 1984) for the school and Garrido.

who has joined USC Coach Rod Dedeaux as the only men to have won titles in three different decades. The Titans were runnersup to Pepperdine in 1992 and tied for third in 1994 behind Oklahoma and Georgia Tech.

In what is now a 20-year tenure in Fullerton, Garrido also has logged seven regional titles and 15 conference crowns. His 1,107 career victories in 27 seasons place him fourth among active Div. I head coaches and ninth all-time. His career record is 1,107-508-7 (.685) and his Fullerton mark is 886-375-6 (.719). He celebrated career win No. 1,000 on May 7, 1993, a 12-1 victory over San Jose State.

At Illinois, Garrido built the Illini into a national power and led them to their first Big Ten Championship in 26 years. He compiled a record of 111-57 and twice advanced to the NCAA playoffs.

Garrido's return to Fullerton coincided with the beginning of construction of a long-awaited on-campus stadium. The "Field of Dreams" facility was utilized for the first time on Apr. 18, 1992, in a doubleheader victory over Loyola Marymount. It was formally dedicated on May 4, 1992, as CSUF alumnus Kevin Costner threw out the first pitch before a crowd of 2,054 that overflowed the 1,520 theater-style chairs.

Garrido, 57, has served with equal professionalism his studentathletes, his institution and his sport while developing a nationally prominent program at a university which has existed for less than 40 years. Fullerton has sent scores of players into the professional ranks (22 to the major leagues through 1995) while bringing CSF its first men's Division I national title. Garrido has been an articulate and respected voice in the promotion of collegiate and amateur baseball.

Selected National Coach of the Year on four occasions -- 1975, 1979, 1984 and 1995 -- Garrido has averaged more than 40 victories per season. In a survey of major league directors of player development, Coach Garrido was rated one of the nation's top three teachers.

The Titans have strung together 22 consecutive winning seasons while typically playing a nationally competitive schedule. For 11 years in a row (1974-84), Fullerton won or shared its league championship and went on to post-season play. In 1985, Fullerton won the Southern Division championship of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association but lost a playoff series at Fresno State. The Garrido-coached Titans have missed the NCAA tournament on only two other occasions -- in 1986 when they placed third and in 1991 when they were the Big West co-champs but did not earn the automatic tourney berth.

A native of the San Francisco Bay town of Vallejo, Garrido attended Fresno State University (1959-61) and was an all-conference performer for Coach Pete Beiden. He played in the 1959 College World Series and was inducted into the Fresno State Hall of

Fame in the fall of 1993. He signed a contract with the Cleveland Indians and played six years in their minor league system before retiring in 1966 to accept a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhouse, California.

Garrido moved up to the collegiate ranks in 1969 as head coach at San Francisco State (25-14) and spent three seasons at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo (85-62-1), where he earned a master's degree in 1968.

Despite being situated in the heart of baseball-rich southern California, Fullerton had enjoyed only limited success in the infant years of its intercollegiate baseball program. But that began to change in 1973 when Garrido arrived. After one losing (19-33-1) season, he began producing nothing but winners. And in 1975, the Titans asserted their new prowess by winning the NCAA regional tournament at USC and advancing to the College World Series in Omaha in their first year of Division I play.

It took until 1979 for a repeat Fullerton performance in the CWS, but the Titans didn't waste the second opportunity. The Titans came though the consolation bracket to beat Arkansas, 2-1, for the NCAA championship. They repeated as national champions in 1984, beating Texas, 3-1, in the title game. In 1995, they were as dominant as any college team ever. Ranked No. 1 most of the season, the Titans climaxed a 57-9 season with an 18-game winning streak capped by an 11-5 decision over USC in the national title game.

Garrido's baseball interests carry beyond the college schedule. His 1979 team took a goodwill mission to Taiwan, he managed in Alaska summer leagues, he operates a successful instructional camp for youth and is in great demand as a speaker. Garrido also spent the summer of 1990 as an assistant coach with Team USA.

Garrido also is active spearheading fund-raising efforts for the baseball program and facility. He is single, resides in Newport Beach and has a daughter, Lisa, 30.

Rick Vanderhook

Rick Vanderhook is in his ninth season with the Titans as a coach. "Hook" will coach the outfielders and hitters, set the defense and handle third base coaching duties in 1996. His main contribution to the program is as its recruiting coordinator. Hook's aggressive style can be seen as a reason for the continued river of talent that flows through the Cal State Fullerton baseball program.

Vanderhook, 34, first coached the Titans from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third base coaching box in 1987 and worked with the hitters and defense in 1988. In his 10 years with the Titans, they have made it to the College World Series five times.

He spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, Northridge was the Division II national runners-up. Vanderhook returned to Fullerton prior to the 1991 season.

Vanderhook has coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and the Goldpanners finished third in the nation in 1986.

He originally came to Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans. He was also a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team. He also played at Cerritos College for Coach Horton.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood HS under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles.

He currently resides in Placentia with his wife, April, and daughter, Noelle.



Rick Stassi Strength and Conditioning Advisor

Rick Stassi begins his fifth season as the strength and conditioning advisor for the baseball program. Among his accomplishments, Stassi has trained 80 professional baseball players, including six No. 1 draft picks. In the strength and conditioning field, he was formerly responsible for minor league player development for the Seattle Mariners.

He also assists the baseball programs at Cypress College, Orange Coast College and Southern California College.

Stassi earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Cal State Fullerton in 1993 and will receive his master's degree this spring.



Jason Gill Facilities/Equipment Manager

Jason Gill begins his second season as baseball facilities and equipment manager for the Cal State Fullerton baseball program.

Gill played one season with the Titans in 1994, starting in 43 games at third base. He hit .345 for the Titans as they made their way to the College World Series.

Gill, a transfer from Cal State Dominguez Hills, also played at Cuesta College. He grew up in Santa Ana and graduated from Mater Dei High School.

1996 CAL STATE FULLERTON BASEBALL

The word "repeat" may be on the minds of many Titan fans and players, but Head Coach **Augie Garrido** will bring up two years to put a damper on any overconfidence.

1980 and 1985.

In those two seasons after a Fullerton national championship, the Titans failed to return to Omaha. The 1980 team (49-18-1) won the SCBA championship but lost two games to Gonzaga at the regional tournament hosted by eventual national champion Arizona in Tucson. The 1985 team, despite the presence of seven players who would see major league action, did not even win the PCAA championship and missed the NCAA tournament with a 36-32-1 record.

"This season brings a responsibility to overcome adversity of our play," said Garrido. "Winning the national championship and thoughts of repeating this season provide a serious distraction. We must use this environment to learn and have the results take care of themselves."

Reasons for confidence, though, focus on the offensive side of the 1996 Titans. The Titans lost only three starters from last year and have added some newcomers who could make opposing pitchers nervous.

The top two returners are outfielder/pitcher **Mark Kotsay** (.422, 21 HR, 90 RBI) and All-American catcher **Brian Loyd** (.360, 10 HR, 73 RBI). Kotsay, the 1995 Golden Spikes Award winner, will look to have another banner season.

Other returning position players include outfielder **Jeremy Giambi** (.349, 4 HR, 37 RBI), outfielder/first baseman **C.J. Ankrum** (.352, 1 HR, 29 RBI), shortstop **Jack Jones** (.280, 3 HR, 41 RBI) and third baseman **Tony Martinez** (.291, 7 HR, 42 RBI).

Two other members of last year's 25-man national championship squad, outfielders **Skip Kiil** and **Steve Chatham**, will see increased shares of playing time in 1996.

A top transfer from the JC ranks is infielder **Jerome Alviso** (Livermore—Canada College). Alviso was invited, along with Kotsay and Loyd, to the 1995 Team USA Baseball Fall Trials.

Players that have a great chance of breaking into the lineup include redshirt freshman **Nakia Hill** (San Diego—Crawford HS), redshirt catcher **Mike Brambilla** (Brea—Brea HS) and outfielder **Scott Seal** (UCLA).

Right-handers **Mark Chavez** (4-2, 2.45 ERA, 6 saves), **Scott Hild** (2-0, 3.23 ERA) and Kotsay (2-1, 0.31 ERA, 11 saves) are the only returning pitchers in 1996 for the Titans.

Top additions include two transfers from Rancho Santiago College, 1995 California Community College Champions. **Kirk Irvine** (Irvine) and **Luis Estrella** (Santa Ana) will see plenty of innings. Another probable starter in the rotation will be transfer **Matt Wise** (Pepperdine). Junior **Brent Billingsley** (East Carolina) had a great January and may also break into the rotation.

As was the case last year at this time, Associate Head Coach George Horton, who is in charge of pitching, will have to deal with an almost brandnew pitching staff. The Titans lost all four of their starters.

"It's always been our goal to have the pitching staff do what they are capable of doing which is to simply throw strikes," said Horton. "With our strong offense, that's going to take some pressure off us.

"We feel that we have enough ability to be a competent staff. If they stay in character, instead of trying to pitch over their heads because they are facing a tough opponent or a hitter, then we will be okay."

As has been the case over the past couple of years, Cal State Fullerton will face a difficult schedule. Tough competition, though, is important to Garrido in order to have an opportunity to compete in post-season play. Along with an always difficult Big West Conference schedule, the Titans will have some challenges at home and on the road. The prize weekend for collegiate baseball will be the third annual Anaheim Hilton & Towers Baseball Classic, which features four teams who played in last year's College World Series. Cal State Fullerton will host Florida State, Oklahoma and USC.

The game with USC, of course, will be a rematch of last year's national championship game.

The Titans will start the 1996 season on the road at Stanford, who many feel is one of the teams to beat this season. CSF will go to Texas to face the Longhorns in what is almost an annual tradition. Before the trip to Texas, the Titans will make a one-day stop in Tempe, Arizona, for an exhibition against the California Angels. After the Big West Conference Tournament, which CSF will host, the Titans travel to Miami to face the Hurricanes in a three-game series to end the regular season.

Titan Field will see the likes of Fresno State, Arizona and BYU, along with local teams.

POSITION OUTLOOK

CATCHER: Loyd is the go-to-guy behind the plate. Besides the numbers he generates offensively and on defense, he has an inate ability to handle a pitching staff. His instincts make him one of the top catchers in the nation. Loyd will once again be backed up by **Mike Wright** and **Mike Lamb**.

FIRST BASE: Ankrum will be the starter for the Titans after playing in the outfield and being utilized as a designated hitter last year. Being left-handed will be a benefit at this position and his ability to do the "splits" in order to beat the runner on a close play will surely be entertaining. Seal may also see some action at first base.

SECOND BASE: The Titans lost a solid second baseman in Joe Fraser, but they have appeared to fill the spot quite nicely as Hill and Alviso will battle at this position. Hill has good speed and a year with the program under his belt. Alviso's strength is his defense.

SHORTSTOP: Putting up better numbers offensively makes Jones one of the top all-around shortstops in the nation. His glove is one of the keys to the Titans' strong defense and will more than likely be among one of the best double-play combinations.

THIRD BASE: Martinez came into the program at the last minute last season and played steady. Not well known for his bat during the regular season, he exploded for four home runs in the postseason. He has the ability to put up double digit numbers this season in the home run category. **Kirk Bolling** (Torrance—West Torrance HS) and Lamb can back up Martinez.

OUTFIELD: Kotsay and Giambi are set in the Titan outfield. Chatham, Kiil and Seal will fill the remaining spots. The alignment will switch slightly when Kotsay pitches.

STARTING PITCHERS: It's a new starting rotation, but look for more balance compared to last year's rotation. As of press time, probable starters are Wise, Irvine, Hild, Billingsley and Chavez. Both Wise and Chavez have above average ability. Hild got some Division I experience as a starter last year on the road at Wichita State and at the NCAA South Regional and can mix it up to find the strike out. Billingsley is the only left-hander and has good control. Chavez will throw a variety of pitches to be successful.

RELIEF PITCHERS: Kotsay will continue his role as closer and will be helped by junior **Luis Estrella** (Rancho Santiago College). Estrella will also be counted on in a set-up role.

ADDITIONAL PITCHING: Three freshmen, Tim Baron (Thousand Oaks—Thousand Oaks HS), Steve Lawson (LaVerne—Damien HS) and Bolling, will try to get some work with some developmental innings, as long as the team goals are not sacrificed. Also look for some innings from junior Dustin Spencer (Santa Barbara—Cuesta College).

CAL STATE FULLERTON CAMPUS



California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies, such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959, and the first commencement (for five students) was in 1960.

The University's 22,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and nations. Most students commute daily to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in residence halls opened in 1988.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 700-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University is fully accredited and enjoys national recognition for both its array of traditional academic programs and a wide list of independently accredited professional programs, including art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, teacher education and theater. All told, there are 94 degree programs - 44 of them at the graduate level -

plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program, which provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. Besides student productions, it includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to Cal State Fullerton for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members, is another highlight, as


is a growing network of support groups including the Alumni Association, which represents the university's 100,000 graduates, and the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Further examples of community outreach are the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group. The center is the first building at Cal State Fullerton to be funded solely by private funds.

Other organizations serving as support groups include the President's Associates, Art Alliance, the Emeriti, Friends of the Fullerton Arboretum, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library, Patrons of the Museum of Anthropology, Reading Educators Guild and Tucker Wildlife Society.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State Fullerton has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great institution.

Graduation ceremonies are among the many events that take place in the Titan Sports Complex. The complex features a 10,000-seat multi-purpose stadium, 1,750-seat baseball stadium, two lighted softball fields, an all-weather eight-lane track and 12 tennis courts.

Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on August 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at

Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the Big West Conference representative to the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and he serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

John Easterbrook, Athletics Director

John Easterbrook is in his second year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department, riding the momentum of a most noteworthy inaugural 12 months. Under his leadership in 1994-95, the Titans came out in the black budgetarily and had three teams to the NCAA quarterfinals led by the cham-

pionship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on September 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 56, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and chief executive officer of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree in commerce and law and attended law school for two years before entering coaching.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children and three granddaughters. John and his two sons are avid golfers.

Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim 11 national championships in seven different sports, a perennial All-Star major league third baseman, baseball players and men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl, a Miss America candidate, the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film and the first player selected in the major league draft?

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton, which seemingly specialized in last-second wins in 1988-89 behind 1995 NBA All-Star forward Cedric Ceballos of the Los Angeles Lakers, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and NCAA fields. In 1991, Genia Miller was selected a Kodak All-America after ranking No. 2 in the nation in scoring and blocked shots and No. 7 in rebounding. In 1993-94, Autumn Hollyfield was the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter and last year, Koko Lahanas led the nation in scoring.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

With the arrival of Coach Augie Garrido, baseball exploded on the national scene. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, most recently of the Los Angeles Dodgers. He won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. Garrido directed a national second-place finish in the 1992 College World Series and a key member of that team, third baseman Phil Nevin, was selected as the No. 1 pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros. The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, posting a 57-9 mark en route to their third national championship, led by player of the year Mark Kotsay.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making eight trips to the College World Series and 16 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country. Garman and the Titans made their first appearance since 1987 at the Women's College World Series last year and placed fifth.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994 and then won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships. She was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Division II beginnings. Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runnerup finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by single-season receiving record holder Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen, the younger brother of the Kansas City Chiefs' Marcus Allen.

With the loss of the football program, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has tried to fill the void in Titan Stadium. A new women's program was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans move as high as No. 3 in the national rankings behind All-American forward Eddie Soto and compete at the NCAA Final Four in Davidson, North Carolina. The 1994 team advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals after hosting and winning in the first two rounds.

TITANIC TRIUMP

CSF beats USC, 11-5, for CWS crown

COLLEGES: Kotsay homers twice and pitches the final 12 innings to lead the Titans to their third title.

OMAHA, Neb. — How does a guy who concedes he doesn't like to work too much, gets a little tired of baseball after a while and initially didn't think his team was that good, lead them to a national championship?

Simple. Augie Garrido doesn't play. He just talks a good game.

"The players deserve all the credit, so I'm glad they won," the Cal State Fullerton coach said Saturday after the Titans' 11-5 championship-game victory over sixth-seeded USC (49-21) in front of a record crowd of 22,027 at Rosenblatt Stadium. "I'm going to call whomever I know. Bill Clinton needs us, we're going to the White House."

It was the third College World.



Titans Capture National Title on Kotsay's Day

■ College World Series:

Sophomore center fielder hits two home runs in first two innings, then pitches the final 11/3 in Fullerton's 11-5 victory.

OMAHA—The College World Series championship game was a home run derby for a while Saturday.
When it was all over, Cal State Fullerton celebrated its third national title under Coach Augie Garrido, and its best record ever at 57-9, with an 11-5 victory over USC in the second all-California final in the last four years.

USC in the second all-California final in the last four years.

Sophomore Mark Kotsay hit two home runs in the first two innings, tying a championship-game record, in a do-everything day in which he drove in five runs, made a big catch in center field and closed out the game as a relief pitcher.

To no one's surprise, Kotsay was chosen the tournament's outstanding player after hitting a Series-high .363 in four games. His two-year average of .517 is a Series career record.



The Athletic Academic Services department was established at Cal State Fullerton to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletics

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide academic and effective support services to help each student reach his or her academic goals.

"We want all of our student-athletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Cal State Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advisement, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services avail-

The office is staffed by three full-time personnel in McCarthy, Academic Counselor Pam Vazquez and Administrative Assistant Barbara Kempton and four half-time graduate assistants -- Heather Killeen, Dona Bruner, Kim Bradley and Dan Michael, who serve as academic counselors and peer mentors. Kempton has been at CSUF for 29 years, and her knowledge of the campus and the athletics department is immensely valuable to student-athletes who may need help with adminstrative paperwork.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "Early Warning" system -- periodic grade checks -- in place which encourages faculty members to notify the office if a student is having problems with coursework and may require academic support.

Student-athletes at CSUF take an average of 4 1/2 to 5 years to graduate, and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist with selecting and registering for classes, referring student to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.

"Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments," said McCarthy. "We developed a re-entry program for former student-athletes who wish to complete their studies, offering them the same services which were available to them when they competed for us."

The office of Athletic Academic Services helps student-athletes feel comfortable in the CSUF environment and McCarthy's experience before coming to the department in July, 1992, helps the orientation process.

McCarthy received her masters degree in social science from Cal State Fullerton in 1987 and has been working in education since 1984. Previous to her appointment in athletics, McCarthy worked for three years as the Assistant Director of the Learning Assistance Resource Center at CSUF before budget cuts eliminated the department. At the LARC, she supervised 80 student employees who were responsible for the various tutorial, strategies classes, computer skills and study skill programs which were available for the university students.

Before coming to Cal State Fullerton, McCarthy was the director of student services at Western State University, College of Law, and before that was the director of student services at the University of Phoenix.

What is a Titan?

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the student's decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories where named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became know that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was inititated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, furthered by former athletic director Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

Finally, there is the matter of the school's name. The name originally for CSUF was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard.

To out-of-staters, the school's name causes confusion because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state - the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens or commas, which is what most of the more than 100,000 graduates recognize. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

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"They will have to rip these jerseys off us."

A simple quote from Head Coach Augie Garrido made in mid-May, but those nine words represented the essence of a true team effort as the 1995 Titans won the national championship, the third title for Cal State Fullerton.

The Titans returned only three position players and three pitchers from the 1994 squad that was two games away from playing for the national championship. Success for Cal State Fullerton would have to come from an almost rebuilt infield and an almost brandnew pitching staff. The Titans were listed, though, in the top 20 of all three pre-season polls. Challenges for the team would be many and frequent.

Leading the way for Cal State Fullerton were sophomore outfielder/pitcher Mark Kotsay and junior pitcher Ted Silva. Kotsay, who won the Golden Spikes Award and the Smith Award, put up phenomenal numbers at that plate and on the mound as a relief specialist. His ability to dominate the game in all aspects was short of remarkable in 1995.

Silva also faced a challenge. The Titans' short reliever in his first two seasons, Silva was bumped up to the starting rotation and instantly grabbed the No. 1 spot by the reins. He put up All-America numbers as a starter and in relief appearances, allowing him to be considered one of the best pitchers ever to put on a Titan uniform.

Catching duties fell on sophomore Brian Loyd. Loyd, who broke his foot in his first season, was the backup as a redshirt freshman in 1994 to Bret Hemphill. Ready to assume a leadership position, Loyd's handling of the pitching staff would be a factor.

The first test came in the first three-game series against preseason No. 1 Stanford. Despite the presence of All-America candidates A.J. Hinch and Jason Middlebrook, Fullerton took two of three from the Cardinal and the magic for the Titans began.

A road win at UCLA, a three-game sweep at Arizona and a home win against the University of San Diego gave Fullerton a sixgame winning streak going to Beiden Field and a tough three-game series against the Fresno State Bulldogs. Garrido, who graduated from Fresno State in 1961, gave the Fresno fans what they wanted by being ejected in the first game. The 6-3 win by the Bulldogs would be a wake-up call to the Titans.

The next day, Kotsay held off a late Bulldog rally as he pitched in the ninth and got the save as the Titans evened the series with a 4-3 win.

For the series finale in front of 5,220 fans, Fresno State had a 3-1 lead going into the top of the eighth. Freshman C.J. Ankrum hit a two-out triple down the left field line to tie the game. Garrido then sent up senior Ruben Hernandez in a pinch-hitting role. With ace reliever Shorty Farfan on the mound for Fresno State, Hernandez promptly drilled a two-run homer to center field. Brian Loyd would add a home run in the ninth in the 7-3 win as the Titans took two of three from Fresno State.

As the end of February approached, Fullerton hosted the Anaheim Hilton & Towers Baseball Classic that featured Pepperdine, Notre Dame and a team that made a rare appearance to the West Coast, the University of Texas.

The Titans opened the Classic with a 7-3 win over Pepperdine, breaking an eight-game losing streak to the Waves. Fullerton bats broke loose the next evening with a 20-3 romp over Notre Dame. Senior D.C. Olsen, who would eventually win MVP honors for the tournament, hit a grand slam to pace the Titans' 15-hit attack.

The Classic finale featured two coaching legends in Garrido and Texas' Cliff Gustafson. What was expected to be a pitchers' duel between the Longhorns' J.D. Smart and Fullerton's Ted Silva turned into a slugfest. For the second game in a row, the Titans used a grand slam (this time by second baseman Joe Fraser) to open up the floodgates. The 14-6 win over the Longhorns would provide only brief pleasure as the Titans would turn around and head into Austin, Texas, for a three-game series against the Longhorns.

Smart exacted some revenge as he shut down the Titans' highoctane offense. An opening 2-1 Texas win, as in the case of the Fresno State series, seemed to wake up Fullerton to the dismay of the Longhorns.

The following game, Kotsay took charge by hitting not one, but two inside-the-park home runs. Add a triple and Kotsay cooked up a 4-for-6 recipe with 4 RBI to lead the Titans in another rout of Texas, 17-3.

Longhorn fans turned out 6,652 strong for the series finale and would once again experience heartbreak thanks to No. 7. Kotsay went 3-for-4 at the plate and pitched the final 2.1 innings to pick up the save in the 6-4 win, giving Fullerton a 3-for-4 performance against Texas in only eight days.

The strong showing in Austin gave the Titans a needed spark as Fullerton would rattle off 11 straight wins during the month of March. During that streak, Fullerton scored 125 runs for an average of over 11 per game.

Fullerton's hot play was doused despite a tremendous performance by Silva. Silva threw a complete game, striking out 15 San Jose State batters, but Fullerton could not muster the offense and made five errors in a 6-3 loss to the Spartans to cap the opening series of Big West Conference play.

As the Titans had lived by the grand slam, they died by one in the following game. USC's Greg Walbridge slammed one home to give the Trojans a 7-4 win and the Titans' first back-to-back losses of the season. But as had been the case before, the Titans bounced back.

Paced by a pinch-hit, two-run homer in the top of the tenth by Robert Matos, the Titans' 10-8 win on April 1 at UC Santa Barbara highlighted the Titan sweep of the Gauchos. The midweek game at Loyola Marymount gave Kotsay another opportunity to shine at the plate.

An opposite-field grand slam was the core of Kotsay's 3-for-6 performance. The box score read a 14-5 Fullerton victory and 7 RBI for Kotsay, but he and the rest of the Titans were already looking towards the weekend and a fierce three-game series against conference rival Long Beach State.

To say that the Cal State Fullerton-Long Beach State baseball rivalry is big would be an understatement. With Dave Snow, a former Titan assistant to Garrido, at the helm of the 49ers, the atmosphere in recent years between these two teams has created the best matchup in southern California. Fullerton had won only one of the last six meetings against Long Beach State, including a 49er sweep in 1993 at Titan Field.

Snow penciled in No. 1 starter Scott Rivette while the Titans countered with No. 3 starter Jon Ward in the series opener. Building on the previous two seasons, Long Beach kept the roll going with a decisive 8-1 win over Fullerton. 49er fans were ready to get their brooms out, but they forgot to check their calendars. This was the year of the Titan and the heroic form once again took form in Matos.

Down to the Titans' last-at-bat on Saturday, April 8, Matos belted a one-out, solo home run to left center to send the game into extra innings. Long Beach's All-America reliever Gabe Gonzalez worked to keep the Titans off the scoreboard while Kotsay did the same on the mound for Fullerton.

Olsen sent the majority of the 2,456 fans, a record crowd at Titan Field, home happy with an RBI double down the left field line in the bottom of the 12th, giving Fullerton a 6-5 win. Kotsay picked up his second win of the season in his longest stint on the mound as he pitched four innings without allowing a hit.

Sunday brought more excitement for Fullerton and more heartache for Long Beach's Gonzalez. Matos hit a double into center field in the bottom of the ninth, scoring Skip Kiil and Tony Miranda, to give Fullerton a 5-4 win and the second loss for Gonzalez in as

Sweeps of UNLV and Pacific were punctuated by a historical game on Sunday, April 23.

On a beautiful day in Orange County, Silva pitched the first 9inning no-hitter in the 31-year history of Cal State Fullerton baseball in the 5-0 shutout of Pacific. Silva had a perfect game working into the top of the eighth with two outs before he walked his only batter. He promptly came back to strike out the side in the ninth and to earn his place in the Titan record books.

The excitement of a no-hitter would not last as Fullerton would immediately hop on a plane and start a five-game, six-day road trip starting at Wichita State. The focus of the trip was a crucial series at Nevada for first place in the Big West Conference and Wichita State took advantage. Facing the top two Wichita State pitchers, the Titans could not overcome the test in two tough one-run losses to the Shockers.

Nevada's series-opening 10-8 win, thanks to a two-run homer in the eighth off Silva in relief, gave Fullerton its only three-game losing streak in 1995. As was the case throughout the season, the Titans gave up the first game only to come back and win the final two games of the series. With that momentum, Fullerton rattled off a 7-game winning streak leading up to post-season play.

A sweep of New Mexico State at home gave Cal State Fullerton its fourth regular season Big West Conference title in six years, as the Titans finished with an 18-3 conference record. During the final home series, the Titans had their best production with a 24-hit attack of the Aggies in a 25-7 win on Saturday, May 6. Kotsay had another stellar day, going 5-for-5 with 4 RBI, six runs scored and two solo home runs.

On the following day, Silva and Mark Chavez combined for Fullerton's second shutout of the season in a 7-0 victory.

The final games prior to NCAA play gave Cal State Fullerton an opportunity to experience a regional atmosphere with the inaugural Big West Conference Tournament at Blair Field in Long Beach, California. Fullerton was assured of an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament, but pride was on the line, along with the conference's automatic bid.

Fullerton had its work cut out as the No. 1 seed as the Titans faced UNLV and Rebel ace Nate Yeskie in the opening game. Despite the presence of UNLV's No. 1 pitcher, Fullerton came with big bats in hand. Homers by Kotsay, Olsen and Loyd provided the offense while Jon Ward shut down the Rebels, allowing only four hits. The Titans' 12-1 win set up a game with Nevada.

A three-spot in the first inning by Fullerton set the tone as Titan pitching once again stymied the Wolf Pack offense. Fullerton's 6-4 decision sent the Titans into the championship game for another bout with Long Beach State.

Long Beach looked for the win on its home turf, but Titan bats slammed 49er pitchers in grand fashion. Olsen hit his second grand slam of the season, giving Fullerton an 8-0 lead late in the game. Long Beach tried to rally, but it was too late. The 8-4 win gave Fullerton the Big West tournament title and Loyd the MVP trophy. More importantly, Fullerton had confidence and momentum with a 10-game winning streak.

The Titans received the No. 1 seed at the South Regional in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and used three come-from-behind wins to earn their ninth trip to Omaha. Most Outstanding Player Jack Jones reached first base on an error by Northeast Louisiana's Tommy Smith, scoring Joe Fraser with two outs in the bottom of the ninth for an opening 7-6 victory. Fullerton breezed to a 9-1 win the next day over James Madison, thanks to another strong performance by Ward.

On May 27, Rice opened up the game with five runs off Silva, but Fullerton stormed back with 17 unanswered runs in a 17-7 rout of the Owls. Rice would work its way back with a 16-9 win over LSU, eliminating the host Tigers and setting up another showdown with Cal State Fullerton.

This time, Rice had a 6-2 lead going into the seventh. Fullerton showed why it was the No. 1 seed with two runs in the top of the seventh and three in the eighth before Rice's David Brooks tied the game, 7-7, with a solo home run in the bottom of the eighth. The deciding run, though, came on a simple sacrifice fly in the top of

Reserve freshman Mike Lamb hit a fly ball to center field, scoring Olsen from third for the go-ahead run. Kotsay came in to retire three of the four batters he faced to earn his 10th save of the season, giving Fullerton the regional title.

To the surprise of no one, Fullerton took the ominous No. 1 seed at Omaha. Since the College World Series changed its format in 1988, no top-seeded team had won. In fact, no No. 1, 2 or 3 seed had won a national championship. But that was before Omaha witnessed what Tennessee Head Coach Rod Delmonico called a "juggernaut" in describing the Cal State Fullerton baseball team.

Thanks to a win by Stanford over Texas Tech at the Midwest I Regional, Fullerton did not have to play until Saturday as the Cardinal would be the opening-game foe for the Titans.

In the game televised by CBS, the Cardinal sought to exact some revenge for their two losses earlier in the season against Fullerton when Stanford was the top-ranked team in the nation. Fullerton put ace Silva on the mound while the Cardinal countered

with lefty Mike Robbins.

The game boiled down to a contest between catchers Loyd and Hinch. Hinch started off with a a two-run homer and Steve Carver followed with a solo shot for a 3-0 lead. Fullerton bounced back with solo shots by Miranda and Loyd in the third.

Hinch and Loyd both smacked doubles in the fifth, but Loyd's scored a run to tie the game.

Fullerton scored three in the bottom of the seventh, followed by two for Stanford in the eighth. The Stanford ninth proved eventful with a late rally, but with two outs and runners on first and second, Kotsay got Stanford's Dusty Allen to chase a 3-0 pitch which he popped up to Martinez. Fullerton had the narrow 6-5 victory and it would be the closest game the Titans would deal with in Omaha.

Tennessee, whose last appearance in the CWS was more than 40 years earlier, was the next opponent for Fullerton. The Volunteers' lineup featured Todd Helton, who received College Co-Player of the Year honors from <u>Baseball America</u>. The matchup was built as Kotsay vs. Helton, but the focus soon became Cal State Fullerton vs. the scoreboard. The Vols threw their No. 1 starter in R.A. Dickey against the Titans with Ward getting the call for Fullerton.

Fullerton had a 3-1 lead in the second when Kotsay broke the game open with his third grand slam of the season. Home runs by Olsen and Fraser completed the Titans' 11-1 manhandling of Tennessee. The victory gave the Titans a chance to rest and face a team that was one step from elimination.

The Vols worked their way back through the bracket for the unenviable task of facing Fullerton again. And after the first inning, it was easy to see why Fullerton was on a roll.

On an overcast day, with winds of up to 20 miles-per-hour blowing in from left field at Rosenblatt Stadium, Loyd hit a grand slam and Martinez added a three-run shot, both into the wind, as Fullerton put up seven runs in the first. Senior Tim Dixon threw eight shutout innings to finish his brief one-year stint with Fullerton in style with a perfect 13-0 record. The 11-0 whitewashing of Tennessee gave Fullerton a sense of ease heading into the national championship game.

A record crowd of 22,027 filled Rosenblatt Stadium to witness the second title game in four years that featured two teams from southern California. In 1992, an upstart Pepperdine squad went undefeated through bracket play and gained a day of rest while Fullerton had to topple top-seeded Miami in a rain-soaked game the night before to advance to what became a second-place finish. However, the role was reversed in 1995 for Fullerton.

The Titans entered the national championship with a perfect 3-0 record through their bracket while USC had to beat Miami in a lengthy rain-soaked game to reach the title game the next day.

National championship games are usually the events where legends are born and Cal State Fullerton looked towards its go-to-guy who had performed all season long. On June 10, 1995, in front of the large crowd and a national television audience, Mark Kotsay made an indelible mark in the history books of the College World Series.

With two runners on in the bottom of the first, Kotsay drilled a Brian Cooper pitch over the 20-foot fence in center field, giving Fullerton a 3-0 lead. The Trojans, who set a CWS record for most

home runs by a team (14), used the long ball to get back into the game.

Ernie Diaz tied the game with one swing in the top of the second. His three-run homer off Silva gave fans a hint that this would be an unforgettable game.

The Titans quickly scored two runs in the bottom of the second before Kotsay came up for his second at-bat. With Ankrum on first, Kotsay promptly ripped another Cooper pitch to deep right field for his second homer of the game and a 7-3 Titan lead.

Before the buzz in Rosenblatt could calm down, USC added solo shots by Walter Dawkins and Geoff Jenkins to close the gap, 7-5. After Seth Etherton replaced Cooper, both he and Silva settled down as goose eggs prevailed through the middle innings.

Every game has a turning point and it came in the top of the seventh. With Chad Moeller on first for USC, Greg Walbridge ripped a shot down the first base line for what appeared to be an extra-base hit. But Olsen snared the drive, touched first base and threw to Jones to complete the double play. The play effectively stopped the Trojans' rally and gave a boost to the Titans, who opened the floodgates in the bottom of the inning.

Tony Martinez continued his torrid post-season with a threerun blast to right field, followed by a mammoth solo shot by Miranda for the 11-5 lead.

Kotsay came in to relieve Silva in the eighth and retired the first three batters he faced, including Jenkins in the top of the ninth.

The faces in the dugout could tell the story. Fullerton was two outs away from its third national championship, but USC was not going to quit. Jacque Jones singled to center, but Moeller followed by flying out to right field. Glen Carson got a pinch-hit single and a USC rally could be felt as Diaz walked to the plate.

Diaz drilled a Kotsay pitch to left field, but on this day, it was not hard enough. Miranda floated underneath the ball and as he clutched it in his glove, the Titans had completed the unthinkable. Fullerton had steamrolled through the competition with an 11-0 record in the post-season for a season-ending 18-game winning streak. Fullerton had become the first No. 1 seed to win the College World Series.

Kotsay was selected as the Outstanding Player of the College World Series with Loyd, Martinez and Silva being named to the All-Tournament Team. Kotsay set CWS career marks in batting average (.517), slugging percentage (1.107) and grand slams (2). The Titans set CWS records for batting average (.372) and slugging percentage (.648).

To show the totality of the Titan offense in the championship game, Fullerton set records for most home runs (4) and sacrifice bunts (4).

The third national title for Cal State Fullerton truly was a team effort. It would be easy to point out a few individuals, but the 1995 team had a common goal at the start of the season despite tremendous odds. The 1995 baseball season represented one that will probably never be seen again at Fullerton.

Perhaps a season that will never be seen anywhere.



BIG WEST CONFERENCE

Founded in 1969, the Big West Conference consists of nine state-supported institutions and one private university in California, Nevada, Utah and New Mexico.

Members Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, UC Irvine (no baseball), UNLV, New Mexico State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Hawaii (women's sports only), Utah State (no baseball), Nevada and Pacific have a total enrollment exceeding 200,000.

Following this year's competition, the conference will undergo a transition heading into the second half of the 1990s. Beginning in the fall of 1996, the league will welcome Boise State, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Idaho and North Texas as full conference members. San Jose State, UNLV and Hawaii will be departing the conference for the Western Athletic Conference.

If birth certificates were give to conferences, the one issued to the then Pacific Coast Athletic Association would be dated July 1, 1969. However, the unofficial history of the conference pre-dates that point of time, extending back to 1967.

Cal State Los Angeles, Fresno State, Long Beach State and San Diego State were members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, long recognized as the nation's premier college circuit.

That conference was classified college division and therein lay a major source of dissatisfaction. Beginning in 1963, the four institutions had captured 16 national titles. The number swelled to 21 if the mythical football championships were included.

With no more territory to conquer at the college division, a step up to university ranks had to be considered.

At the time, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara and Pacific were members of the West Coast Athletic Conference but were enduring a strained relationship due to the limit of conference sports sponsored. That, plus the fact that national football figures UOP and SJSU were already competing as independents, led the schools to pursue a more broad-based conference alignment.

Therefore, officials of the seven colleges and universites assembled as a body in May of 1969, tied up loose ends and less than two months later the PCAA was born.

Direction in the early days of the conference came from such men as Dr. Stephen Goodspeed, vice-chancellor at UC Santa Barbara, the first president and chairman of the founders committee. J. Kenneth Fagans provided guidance as the league's first commissioner. Jesse T. Hill, one of the nation's most successful directors of athletics at USC, followed Fagans as the conferences's first full-time commissioner.

SJSU was already labeled a university division school in all sports when the PCAA emerged. San Diego State and UOP were granted university division status in the summer of 1970 and the remaining conference members shed the college division by 1972.

The conference's first 20 years were characterized by expansion and change.

The original PCAA lineup changed in the early years and by 1975, charter members UCSB and CSLA had dropped football and SDSU bolted the conference in football only. In 1974, Cal State Fullerton moved into the conference. By 1977, UC Irvine joined the

Big West and UCSB was back in -- both as non-football playing institutions -- while Utah State became the first non-California member of the circuit, transforming the PCAA into a regional conference.

Nevada-Las Vegas (1981) and New Mexico State (1984) soon followed suit, bringing the league's membership to 10 universities.

In the fall of 1983, the PCAA became the first western conference to incorporate women's athletic programs into the conference. Charter women's members UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara and UNLV competed in five championships.

By the end of 1985, Pacific, Hawaii, Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, San Diego State, Fresno State and San Jose State had joined the women's conference. The PCAA upped its women's sponsorship to eight championships.

The PCAA began its 20th year of existence by changing its name to the Big West Conference in 1988. With the inclusion of the states of Utah, Nevada, and New Mexico into the loop, the term "Big West" more accurately represented the conference. In addition, Fresno State left the conference and was replaced by the University of Nevada, Reno, in the fall of 1992.

The Big West Conference has had baseball teams advance to the College World Series in each of the past eight years and two Big West teams appeared in the 1988 and 1991 tournaments. In addition, college baseball's Player of the Year has come from the Big West in three of the past five seasons.

Numerous major league players have come out of the PCAA and Big West. The most notable are: Cal State Fullerton - Tim Wallach, Brent Mayne and Mike Schooler; UNLV - Matt Williams, Cecil Fielder and Todd Stottlemyre; San Jose State - Mark Langston and Ken Caminiti; Long Beach State - Steve Trachsel and Randy Moffitt; Pacific -Joe Ferguson; UC Santa Barbara - Chris Speier; and UC Irvine - Brady Anderson.

The 1996 season marks the second year of the Big West postseason tournament. The top four teams in the regular season standings meet in a double-elimination format to determine the conference's automatic berth into the NCAA tournament. The 1995 event was hosted by Long Beach State and included champion Cal State Fullerton, Nevada and UNLV. The 1996 event will be hosted by Cal State Fullerton on May 10-12.







TITANS IN THE MAJOR LEAGUES

Twenty-two products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into major league box scores with several more stars of recent Titan teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was left-handed pitcher **Dan Boone**, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping Fullerton into the 1975 College World Series and then made a dramatic comeback with Baltimore in 1990. He was followed by **Dan Whitmer** at Toronto (1976) and California.

The biggest name came next as **Tim Wallach**, the 1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos. He has played in several All-Star Games for the National League including the 1989 Classic in Anaheim. He goes to 1996 spring training with the California Angels.

Arriving at the 'Show' in the mid-80s were right-handed pitcher **Jeff Robinson** with the San Francisco Giants, Pittsburgh Pirates, New York Yankees, California Angels and Chicago Cubs; outfielder **Andre David**, who hit a home run in his first at bat for the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder **John Christensen** with the New York Mets, Boston Red Sox, Seattle Mariners and the Twins.

Left-handed pitcher **Greg Mathews** burst upon the scene in St. Louis in 1986 to become a valued member of the Cardinals' starting rotation. He started in the Championship Series for the Cardinals. Recurring arm problems have plagued his career and he is now playing in triple A.

Getting his debut in 1987 was **Bill Moore** with Montreal before the Titan Alumni Club exploded in 1988 with five additions. The most heralded was pitcher **Mike Harkey**, who was starting at Wrigley Field for the Chicago Cubs 16 months after his last Titan appearance. He was selected *USA Today's* Minor League Player of the Year in 1988 but suffered a knee injury during spring training and missed the Cubs' 1989 divisional title team. In 1990, he was the Cubs' No. 2 winner and placed fifth in Rookie of the Year balloting. He spent the 1991 season rehabilitating a shoulder injury and returned to the Chi-

cago rotation in 1992. The Cubs released him before the 1994 season and he was signed by the Colorado Rockies before having success with the Angels.

Earlier in the 1988 season, former Titan reliever Mike Schooler surfaced with the Mariners and was their top stopper and one of the best in baseball before being released and signing on with the Texas Rangers. In Philadelphia, Shane Turner was one of the players who tried to fill the shoes of Hall of Famer Mike Schmidt at third base and he is currently trying to make the Cleveland Indians' roster. In Houston, John Fishel, the MVP of the 1984 College World Series, was part of the Astros' futile run at the NL West before being traded to the Yankees. Kevin Reimer started in more than 100 games in right field for the Texas Rangers in 1991, DH in 1992 and signed with the Milwaukee Brewers in 1993.

Arrivals in 1990 were outfielder **Dann Howitt** with the Oakland A's, catcher **Brent Mayne**, who was Kansas City's first-round draft choice in 1988, and lefthander **Larry Casian**, a 1987 draft by Minnesota. All three made starting appearances in nearby Anaheim Stadium. Howitt will be remembered as being the last player to get a hit (a home run) off of future Hall-of-Famer Nolan Ryan.

Two other familiar names made their first appearances in 1991. **Andy Mota** was called up by the Astros and his brother **Jose** played in more than 30 games at second base for the Padres.

Among former Titans jumping to the majors in 1993 were third baseman **David Staton**, a triple crown winner in the Padres' system in 1990, and left-handed pitcher **Huck Flener**, who helped the Toronto Blue Jays pitching staff during the season-ending stretch drive to the 1993 World Series.

Righthander **Gary Buckels** resurrected his professional career at a tryout camp and made his way to the St. Louis Cardinals' pitching staff during the middle part of the abbreviated 1994 season.

Phil Nevin, the 1992 College Player of the Year and No. 1 pick in the '92 amateur baseball draft played for Houston during the 1995 season before being traded to the Detroit Tigers.


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TITAN FIELD





The current Titan Field became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on Apr. 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a double-header from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third on-campus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which also has played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Rancho Santiago and Orange Coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979 when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

The current stadium boasts 1,540 permanent chairback seats with another 200 spots available on the concrete steps above each dugout. There is ample standing room around the concourse.

The first stage of the press box pavilion has been completed with the addition of permanent restrooms. The second stage involves the concession stands located in the pavilion with the final stage involving the building of the press box on top of the restrooms and concession stands.

No timetable has been set for the completion of the pavilion, along with additional seating to fit with plans for Cal State Fullerton to eventually host a regional.

Titan Field will also sport a brand-new look for the 1996 season thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turface has been added to the warning track.

Grass was also planted on the berms where future seating is to be located. Bushes were planted that will spell out "CSF" on the first base side and "Titans" on the third base side. Additional land-scaping has been placed on the outside of Titan Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.

1996 ANAHEIM HILTON & TOWERS BASEBALL CLASSIC

This is the third year for the Anaheim Hilton & Towers Baseball Classic and, if the past two years are any indication, one of these teams will win the national championship.

The inaugural AH&T Classic in 1994 featured three teams that eventually placed in the top four at the College World Series. Oklahoma and Georgia Tech would play for the national title, while Cal State Fullerton was one step away before being eliminated in Omaha by Georgia Tech.

Fullerton won last year's Classic, a prelude to the Titans' third national title.

This year's tournament, again sponsored by the Orange County Sports Association, will be the toughest since all four teams played at the College World Series last year.

Mike Gillespie brings his USC Trojans to the Classic after falling one game short of adding another national championship to an already numerous collection. USC has 11 national championships in its trophy case.

USC finished the 1995 season with a 49-21 record. The Trojans won the Pac-10 (Southern Division) and West Regional titles to qualify to the CWS.

The first AH&T Baseball Classic repeat opponent, Oklahoma, brings a familiar face in Larry Cochell to Titan Field. Titan fans will remember Cochell as the head coach for Cal State Fullerton from 1988-90. Cochell led the Titans to two CWS appearances before making his way to Oklahoma and winning the national championship in 1994.

Cochell is just behind Fullerton's Augie Garrido with 1,002 career wins and is the only head coach in history to take three different teams to Omaha (Oral Roberts, CSF and Oklahoma).

Oklahoma had a 42-16 record in 1995, finishing first in the Big Eight. The Sooners won the Midwest II Regional and made their ninth appearance in Omaha.

Making a rare appearance on the West Coast are the Florida State Seminoles. Mike Martin finished the 1995 regular season with a 53-16 record. Florida State has reached the NCAA Tournament in 20 of the past 21 years.

Martin has the best winning percentage (.747) of the four head coaches present at this year's Classic. Martin is 866-293-3 in his coaching career.

Sixteen national championships and 50 trips to the College World Series are the combined achievements of these four excellent baseball programs. The numbers and storied history of these four schools seem destined to make the 1996 Anaheim Hilton & Towers Baseball Classic the best yet.
