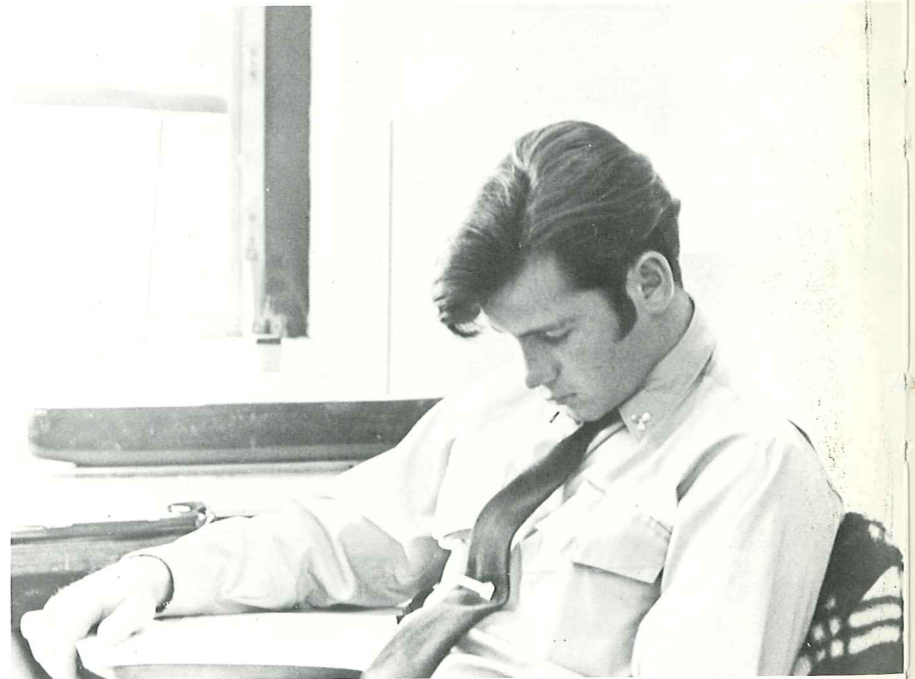
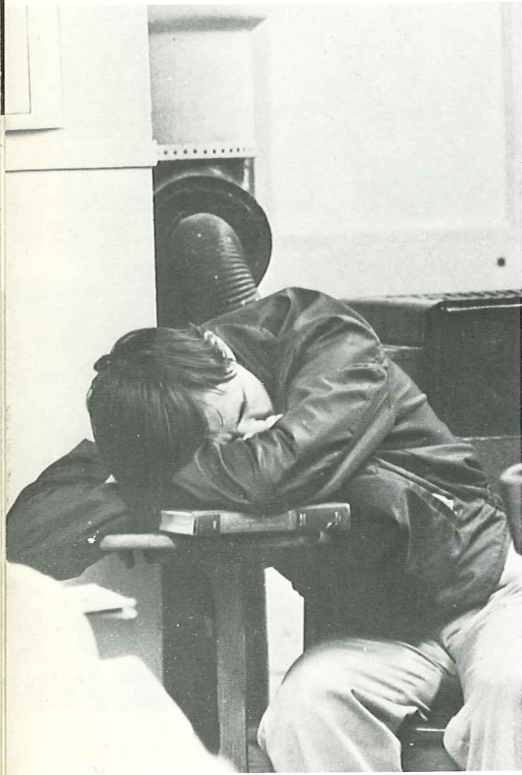




CURRICULUM

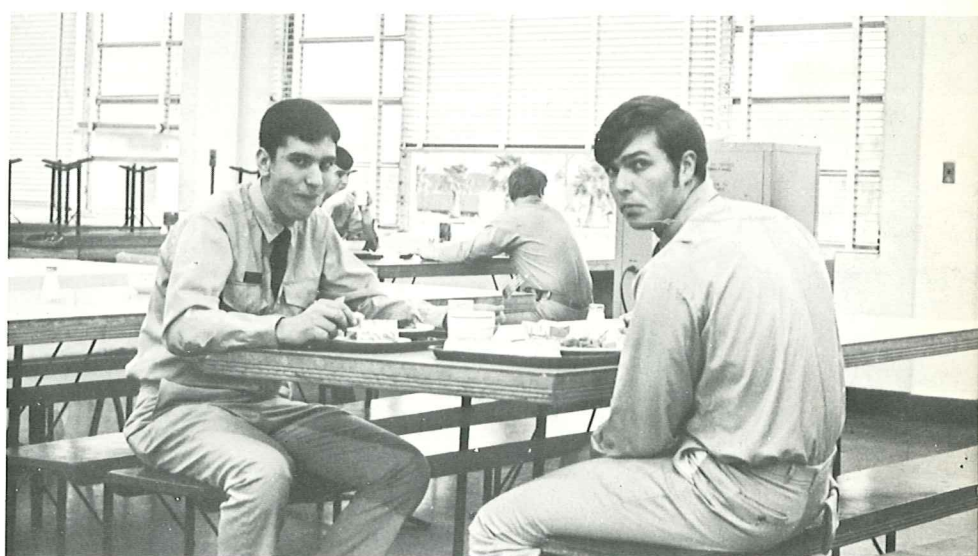


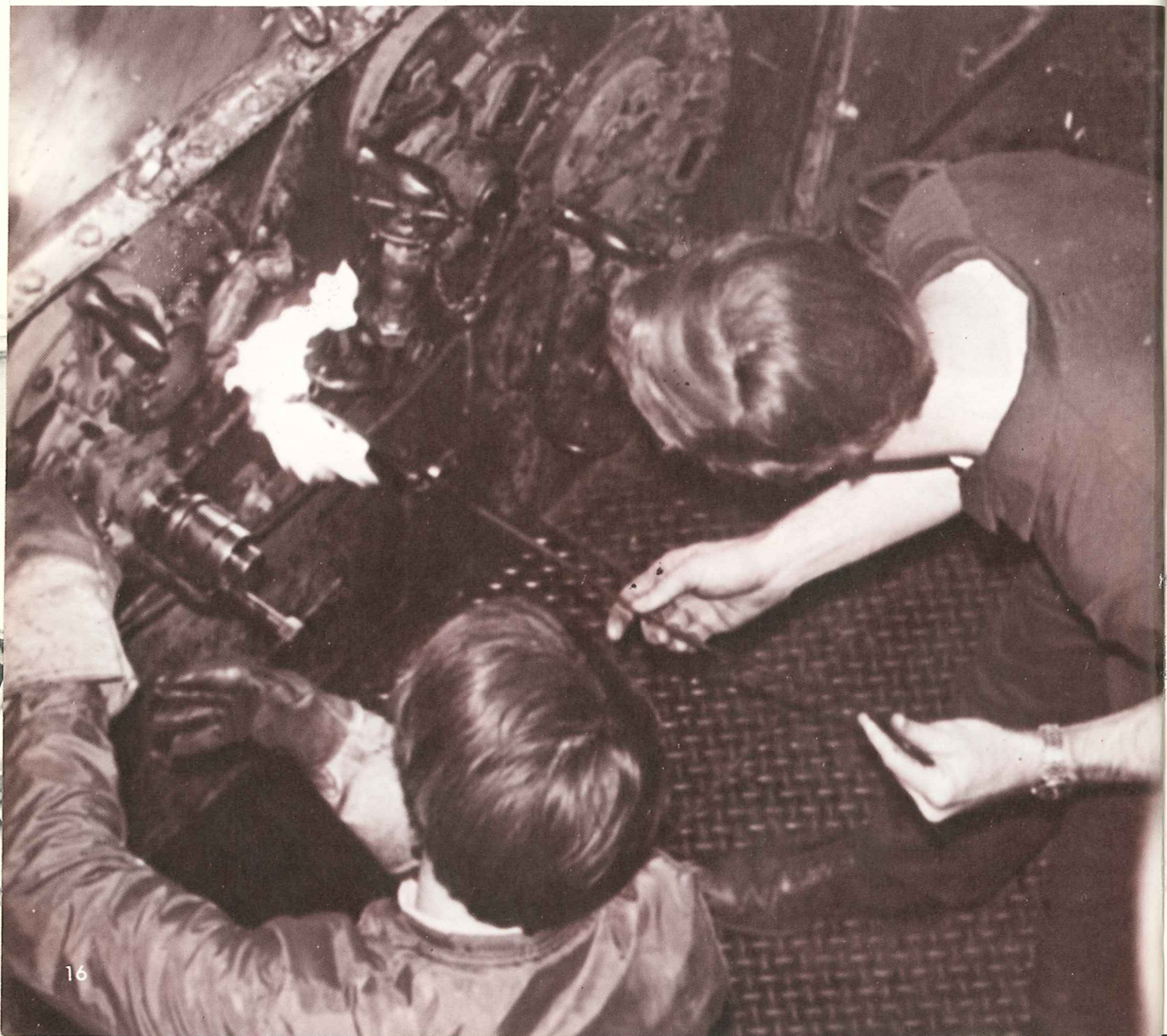
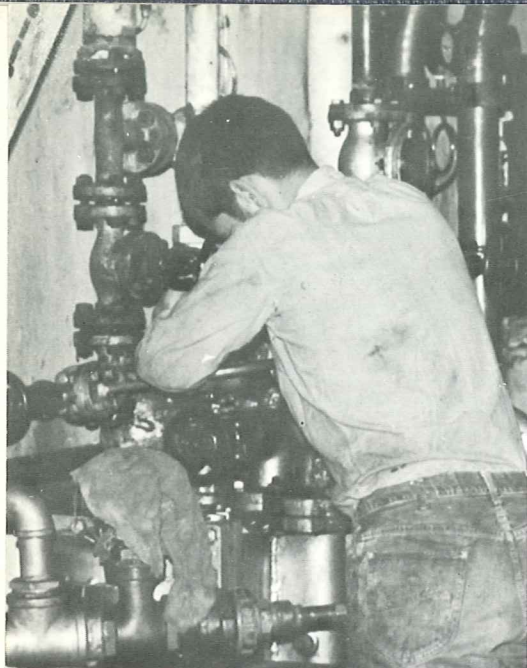
Formations are a way of life here at KEEMA. They play an important function in that it is the only time when the whole corps is together as a single unit and the faculty meets the midshipman face to face.

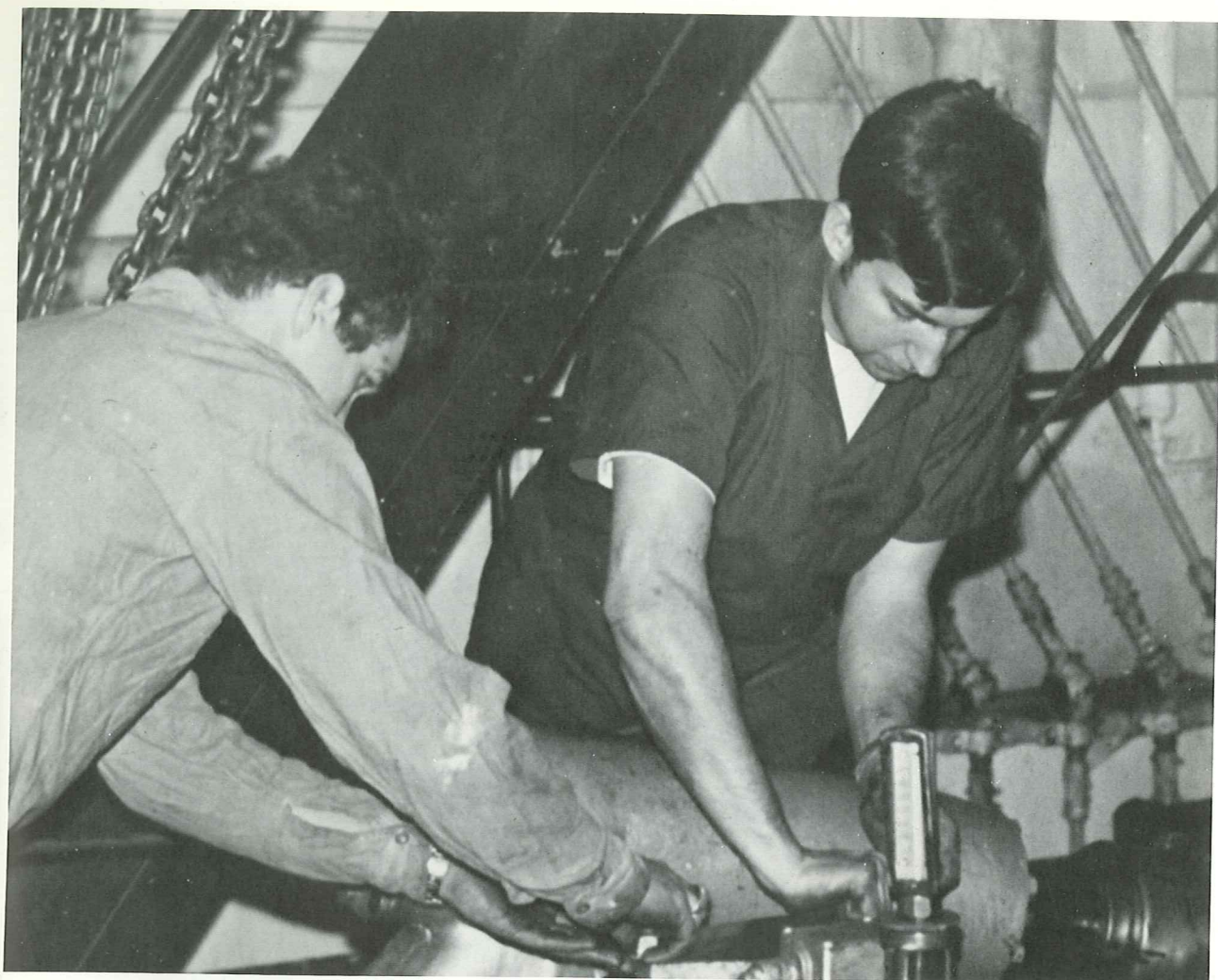

For each person, each day brings something different. Some wait expectantly, while others find the unexpected. But mostly, everybody goes on like the day before.

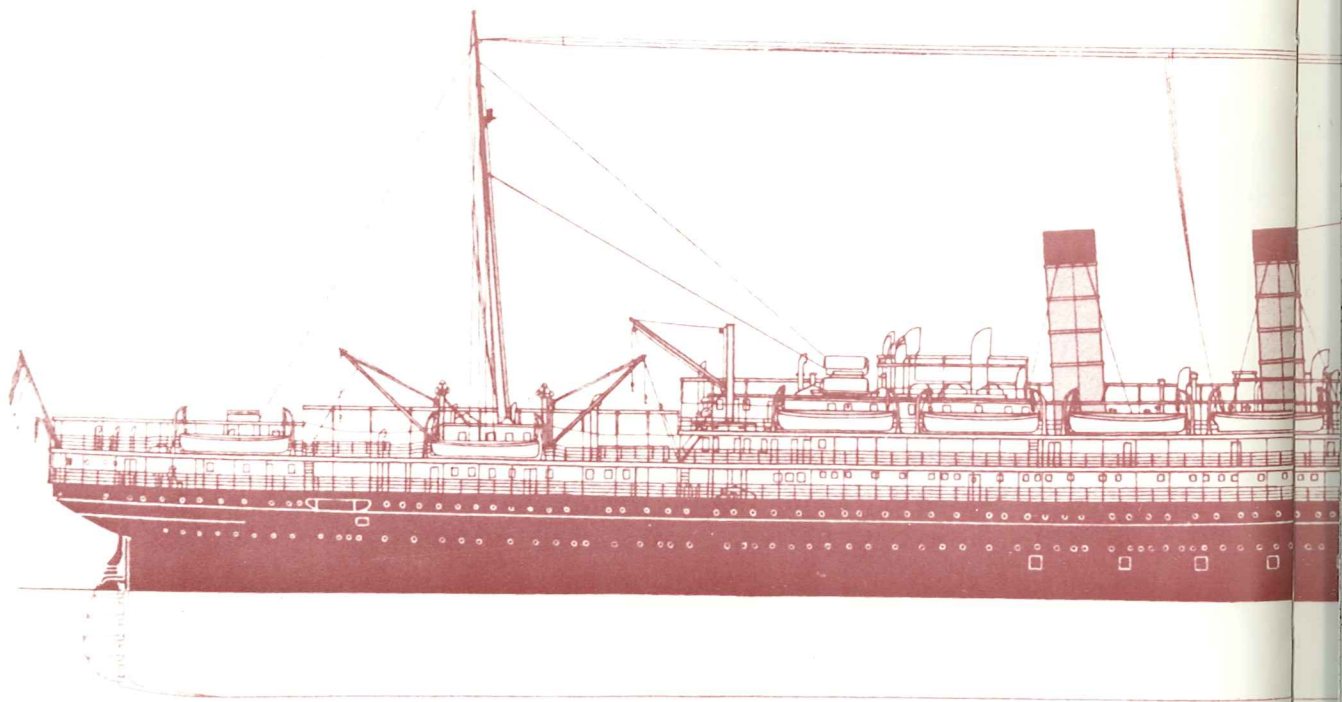


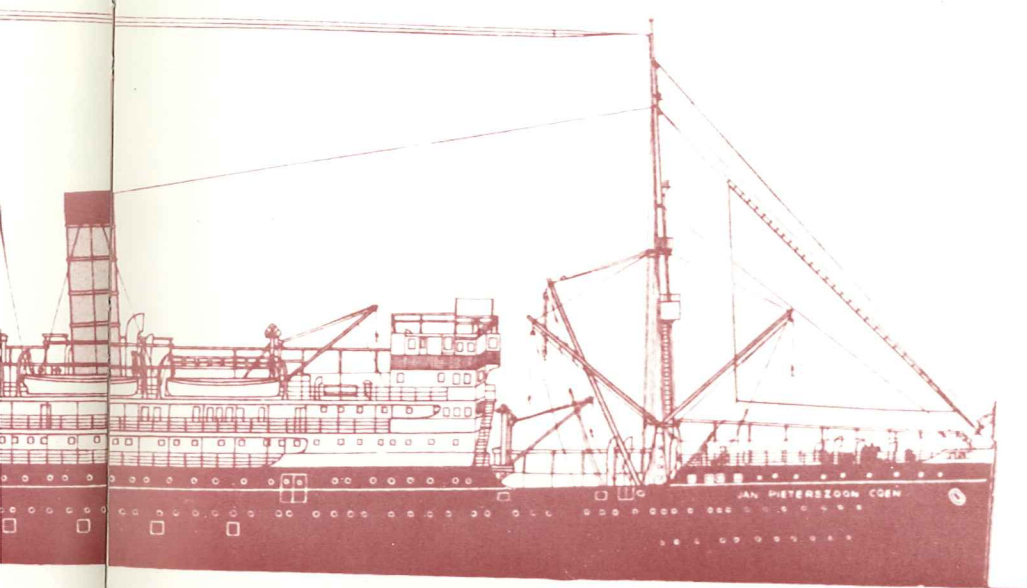

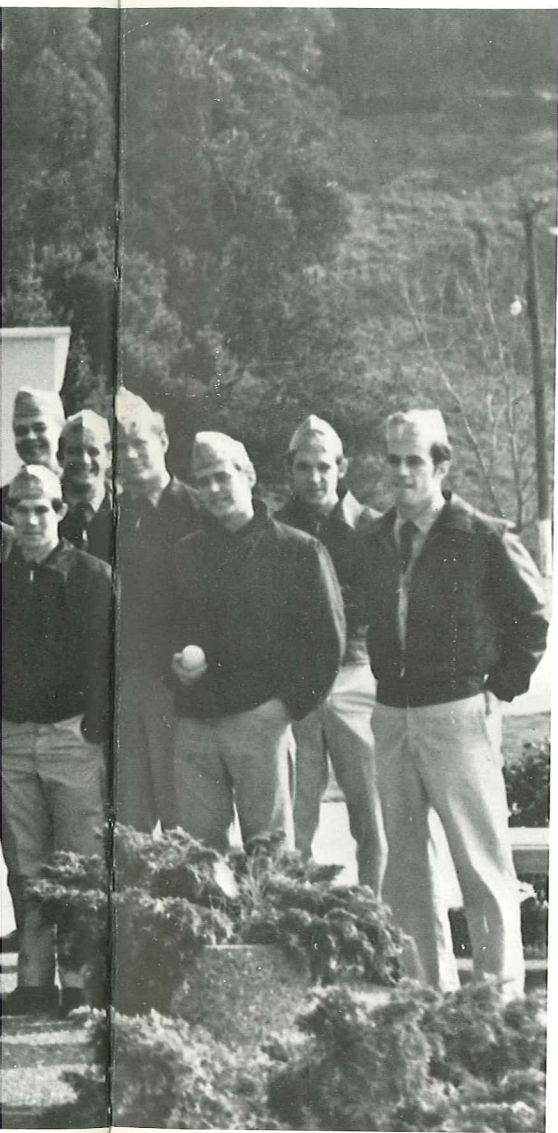
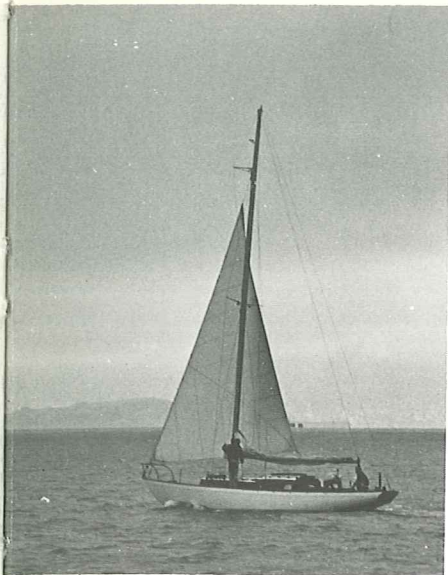


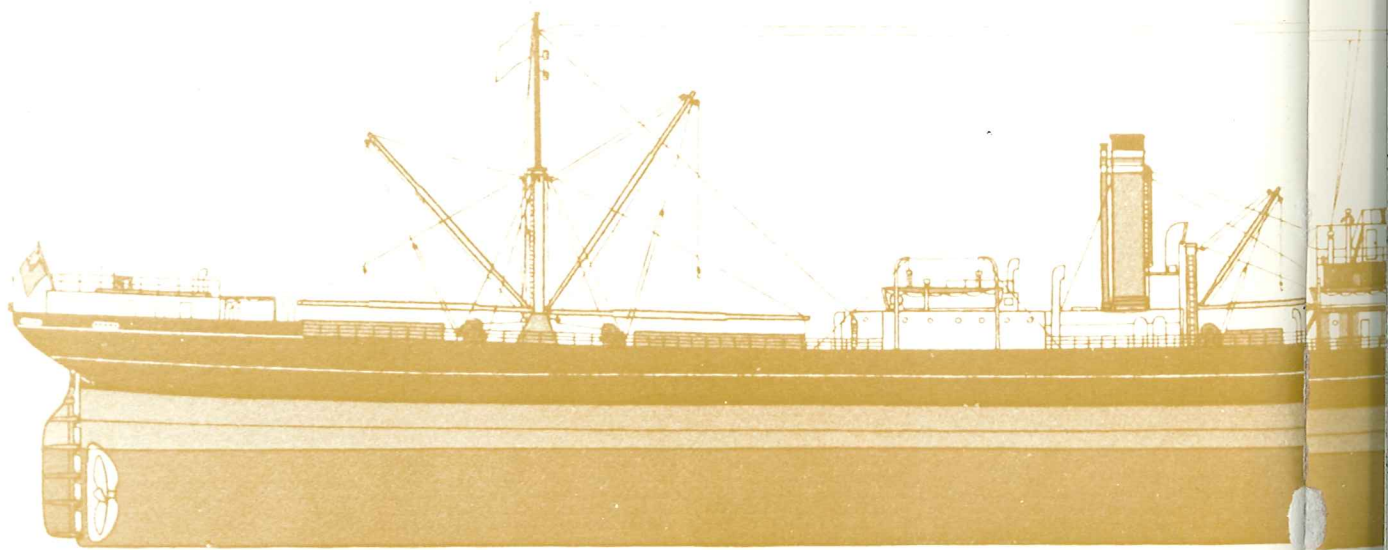


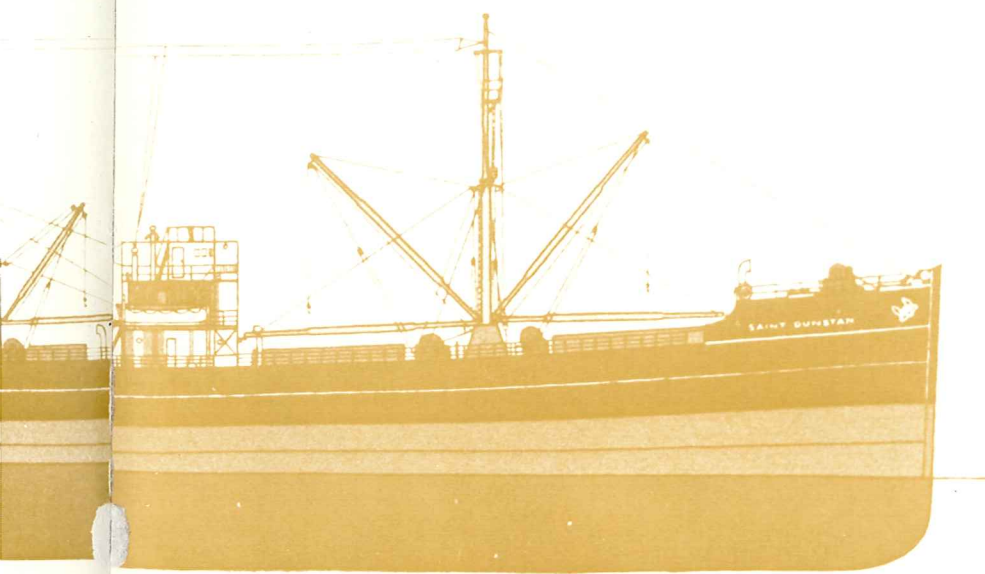
SAILING CLUB

The Sailing Club enjoyed many an afternoon on the placid straits off the Academy. They even managed to venture as far west as Angel Island while participating in traditional sailing activities.

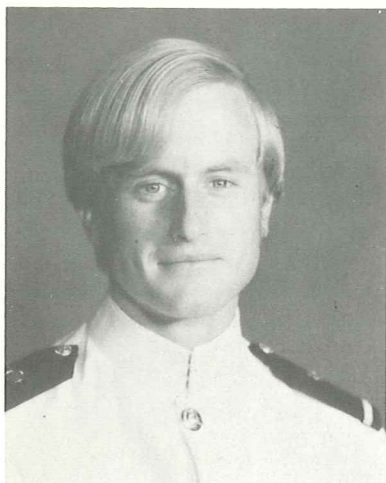
