tired in 1990 from Rockwell

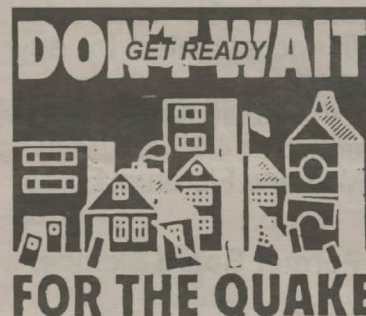

to the Village.

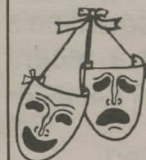

There was the usual preposterous list of Union proposals which no one ever expects to be agreed upon, but are meant for just what is said, "Negotiating." Since this was presented in open board meeting and has been on Channel 12 twice, ILV does not print a full report here. However, if you have missed it be sure to look for it in the official VOICE.

LV Association Counsel, James Lingl, Spoke At A Ventura County Condo Meeting

Morley Goldberg has sent to ILV an article clipped from the LA Times, Valley Business section of August 10th 1993.

There is not space to quote the whole article but we believe home owners will be interested in what James P. Lingl, who is Leisure Village Association's attorney said at a recent meeting of condo associations.

We quote in part:

"Condo and homeowner association boards are loath to raise fees," Lingl noted. "And management companies hired by boards of directors often low-ball their budgets so they can get hired or avoid being fired. What happens," Lingl explained, "is that corners end up getting cut - at least in the short term."

Opinion Expressed

we would like to express our opinion.

1. We were never one of the hundreds of people interviewed who objected to the association dues. We feel we get so much for our money. Other associations with which we are familiar are charged so much more than we are for less services.

2. We resent the criticism against the previous boards. We think they have done a wonderful job in the past and had the villagers' financial welfare as their main concern.

3. Taking videos of our employees put us into a police state. It is disgraceful. We hope this won't lead to a conflict with the union. The worst thing we can think of is to have our Village picketed by any union.

The appearance of our Village and the manner in which it is operated is the envy of other home owner associations.

We deserve high marks. Even our own dissidents admit this is a nice place to live. Yes, they complain but they do not move out. Fortunately, most of the villagers are understanding adults who can see the whole or the "big picture".

ciation office; be reminded that the cost for roof replacements on structures in the common areas are NOT covered in the roof reserve. #7. Change of the irrigation system. #8. Substantial increase in water rates, trash pick-up, insurance premiums, etc., etc., etc.

Statements in the ILV article published on August 7th, written by Donna Duke, brings me to my major concern: Employee Harassment!

The video tape, taken by a resident, which showed unacceptable work performance by a very limited few of the landscape employees. This tape incident has been written up in ILV, the Village Voice, committee minutes, discussed at Board meetings, committee meetings, club affairs etc. Each time emphasis being placed on plans being enforced to get a full day's work for a full day's pay. This we all agree with. However, these few employees should have been dealt with personally, instead of the inference being made that ALL our employees fall in the same category as the few who appeared on the tape.

The majority of our staff are qualified, dedicated, and have the best interest

of the Village at heart and work hard to keep the Village at its best.

Qualified volunteers have been removed from committees and have been replaced by persons who have publicly harassed the staff; this has also been demoralizing.

Employee morale is at an all time low and understandably so. It is not because they want or expect more pay but it is the lack of trust and respect.

Harassment toward the Staff by residents, committee members OR the Board should be an unacceptable practice. Demoralizing the staff will certainly take away the secure and caring atmosphere that brought most of us to Leisure Village in the first place!

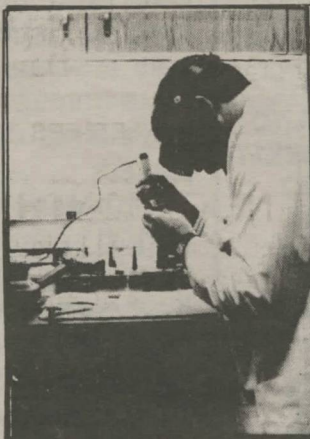

PLAYERS (pla'-erz), n. persons who play parts on the stage; actors. GUILD (gild), n. an organization of persons with related interests, goals. Editors of the Random House Dictionary of the English Language must have had Players Guild of Leisure Village in mind when they approved these two definitions.

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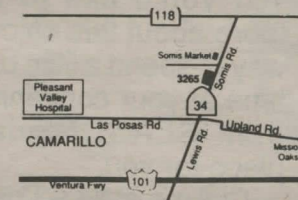
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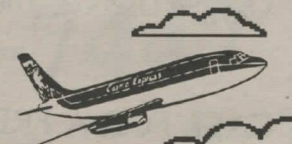
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The Meaning of SEASONS
