Debate On Prop. 186 Featured M.D.'s With And Volunteers **Opposing Views**

Over 200 villagers attended the Current Issues Forum on October 10 that featured one doctor supporting and one opposing the California Health Security Act, Proposition 186.

Supporting the single payer plan that provides complete medical coverage for all Californians, was Dr. Jennifer Reifel, a resident in Internal Medicine at UCLA Center for Health Sciences.

She claimed that you will be able to select your own doctor, will be able to choose your own hospital, will not have a large tax increase to pay for this coverage and will have full coverage for prescription drugs, long-term home or nursing home care and more.

Dr. Gosta Werner Iwasiuk, a surgeon who lives in Santa Paula. graduated from UCLA in 1967 and currently has offices in Santa Paula and Ventura.

He believes that should the State government take-over health care, bureaucrats and politicians could decide what treatment is appropriate and available for you, there would be a huge personal tax increase and should the system run short of money, they could cut or ration medical services and procedures.

Following their talks, villagers submitted questions which were answered by one or both guests. It proved to be an interesting 90-minute program.

President Donna Duke. speaking at the Security and Safety Committee meeting on October 13, the morning after the first malathion spraying epi-sode over Leisure Village, expressed her appreciation to staff people and volunteers from both inside and outside the Village who arrived very early in the morning to unwrap water fountains, hose down the tennis courts, swimming pool deck, and to do other clean-up chores around the Recreation Center.

Donna Duke and board member Bill Blauer coordinated the volunteer program to help more than 100 people who called in to ask for assistance in hosing off skylights and patio covers at their homes.

It is only with attention to precautions before each spraying that we will be able to avoid or minimize damage to property and human health during this tentative six months' "siege."

Many good questions were asked by our residents and guests. Most of them could be answered by using common sense. Avoid inhaling or contact with the spray, wash everything exposed to it the next morning. The question most asked was, "How do we wash our skylights?"

This meeting was arranged to alleviate our fears of the damage the insecticide Malathion can do. However, the controversy on this subject has not been settled. Scientists on both sides of the Malathion issue are not agreeing on the safety or long term effects of Malathion, especially after 10 or 12 applications. Only time will tell who is right.

Our Village Voting Record

Residents of Leisure Village have an exceptional interest in community, state and national affairs and show this active interest on Election Day. We boast that up to 85% of us exercise our franchise while the general population may have only a 35% turnout. Villagers voted overwhelmingly in favor of a recent school bond issue, although the city of Camarillo as a whole did not pass it.

Our Current Issues Forum sponsors candidates nights and discussions on state propositions. These meetings are well attended because villagers wish to be informed about the issues.

The glaring exception to our good record was the recent "Blue Ballot" election which ran from early July to September 2. Clary Morgan, election inspector for the Village, reports that less than 50% of eligible voters actually voted on this.

Issues on the Blue Ballot pertained to Village matters, one financial and one affecting our internal elections. Each affects how the Village operates, and yet voter response was dismal. Why?

Information sent to homeowners in the mailing along with the ballots was excellent in delineating the issues. The Board made a good presentation in each case and the information went out to each homeowner by first class mail, as our CC&R's require. Bob Cullatti, our General Manager, reported that the election cost the Association \$2000. He also wonders why we paid those election costs but did not participate by returning the ballots. Yes, why?

Why do we vote heavily in national and state elections but neglect to cast a ballot on issues which affect our own daily lives here in the Village?

Why the lack of response on internal elections? Are the voters saying: 1. They need more information? This was amply supplied. 2. They need more time? The Board set 8 weeks response time, more than generous. 3. They just don't care about Village operations? If the latter is true, we will get Village Government only by default. Do you really want it that way?

Inside Leisure Village is appalled at the voter apathy demonstrated in this case. We certainly can't boast about this election.

We all sympathize with the farmers and wish them well. However, we must also care for our loved

LETTERS.....from pg 2 ones and for ourselves. The issue in the malathion aerial spraying is: are those two goals in conflict?

Is aerial spraying of malathion over Leisure Village every two weeks for six months essential for farmers? At the very least there is reasoned argument that the medfly already is established beyond any eradication efforts possible in Southern California.

After 18 years of medfly eradication efforts costing hundreds of millions of taxpayer dollars, to say nothing of evidence about fearful adverse effects on citizens' health, every year medflies appear somewhere, often only a few miles away from the areas where malathion was sprayed earlier.

A medfly expert at the University of California at Davis, a member of the State's own medfly task force, has insisted for the past several years that evidence indicates that the medfly has established it-

and elsewhere. It means taking ameliorating measures earlier rather than spraying by air over populated areas. It means working with crops not susceptible to medfly, and different harvesting periods for crops that are susceptible. Without going into too much agricultural detail, there has been much research and thought given to this. Remember that the Mediterranean countries from whom the medfly obtains its name, continue to have very successful agricultural enterprises. So does Hawaii also where the medfly is now in residence.

But you say, "So what?" If malathion is safe, if it can be handled carefully, why not continue to spray over areas like Camarillo and attempt to eradicate the medfly if at all possible?

I just wanted to let you know I had entered the Floriculture division at the Ventura County Fair with my Tillandsia Plants and I had won five ribbons. Three second prizes, one third prize, and one honorable mention. They were entered in different categories, such as dish gardens, and plants mounted on driftwood bark, and coral. Tillandsias are air plants and have no roots. They are mounted with a glue gun and grow best outdoors with indirect light. They only require watering once a week, with a sprinkling of the hose on their leaves. They bloom at different times of the year, depending on the type of Tillandsia.

I'd be happy to show off my plants, if anyone is interested in growing them. Just give me a jingle.




First Aid And **CPR Class**

10 YEARS AGO


A check for \$15,000 was presented to the Leisure Village Association by Leisure Technology. A Town Meeting was held to discuss renovation of the Recreation Center.




