

BLOOD DRIVE

Blood donations for the second blood drive of this year will be accepted on Tuesday, April 25, from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m. in CB 100. The crack Houchin Bloodmobile crew will be in

charge of the situation.

The purpose of the drive is to build up a campus bank for use by all students, faculty, staff and their immediate dependents. Under the plans of this bank the cost of blood for those needing it is trimmed from \$40 to \$15. The \$15 amount is payment for processing costs.

The faculty and staff as well as the students are urged to donate blood, since this plan affects everyone. Sign-up sheets, which allow a person to set the exact time that he wants to donate his blood, now exist in SS 110, Activities Office. It is desired that people do sign these sheets. However, if that is impossible, come on the 25th anyway. The following donor instructions should be observed:

1. Do not eat any dairy products or fatty foods three hours before donating. Black coffee, water or juice may be taken at any time.
2. You may donate every three months.
3. You must be between 18 and 65 years of age.
4. You must NEVER have had Yellow Jaundice or Infectious Hepatitis.
5. You must weigh more than 110 pounds.
6. You must not have had recent surgery, injury, serious illness, heart disease, or have received blood within 6 months.
7. If you are a woman, you must not have had a child within the past 6 months.
8. If you have a cold, you should not give.

Arrangements have been made with Dr. Geigle and Dr. Lassater to transfer their classes to alternate rooms for this time period. Dr. Geigle's Political Science class meeting at 12:00 in CB 100 will meet in CB 105. Dr. Lassater's English 325 class, meeting at 1:30 in CB 100, will be in CB 105, also.
