

Undefeated Gators kick off homestand against Cal Poly

The Gators come marching home tomorrow afternoon when they meet Cal Poly of Pomona at Cox Stadium.

Head drum major Vic Rowen and his band will have a tough time matching the tunes of the visiting Mustang contingent.

Cal Poly, undefeated and untied for this year, as is Rowen's group, will bring with them two passing quarterbacks and a slew of fast ends and halfbacks.

Mike Arnone and Allen Hammerschmidt are the two alternating quarters. They are credited with wins over San

Diego State and Sacramento State.

On the grabbing end of their aerials are Laddie Potts and converted halfback Warren Hazard.

The Mustang running game is paced by Mike Curran and Larry Reed, a pair of smallish speedsters.

The Gator offense will be managed by signalman Dick Valois.

The golden-armed quarterback, last year rated twelfth among collegiate passers, has scored two touchdowns and thrown for three more.

He has accounted for 32 of the Gators' 36 points scored this year.

The game promises to be "one of the toughest we'll play all year," said Rowen.

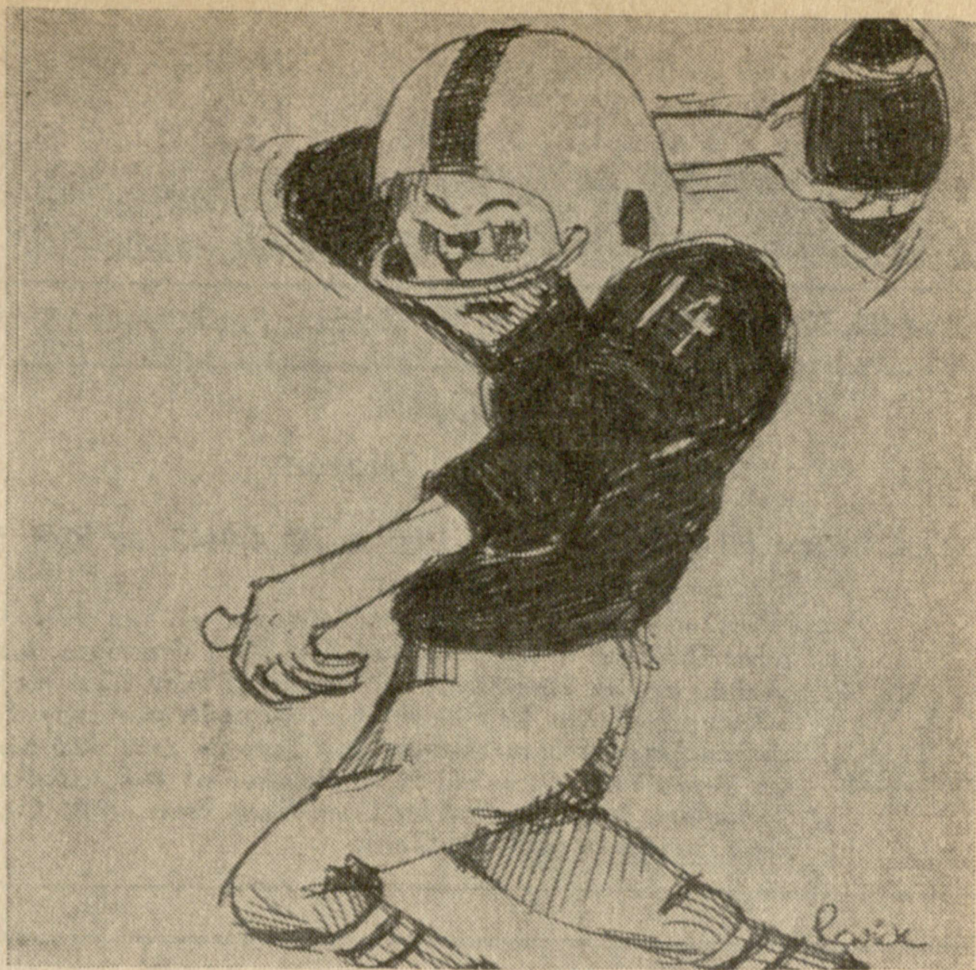
"They claim that they have a lack of depth, but in all our scouting reports, we've seen nothing but sheer power.

Snipes at Nixon

Racial relations top crisis for SF officials says Boas

Strong support of better San Francisco racial relations, a blast at Nixon, and a slap at architectural planning were highlights in county supervisor Roger Boas' visit to SF State Wednesday.

During a talk in the Gal-

lery Lounge, Boas outlined points for better San Francisco government and sniped briefly at the Nixon gubernatorial campaign machine.

Of the three points, Boas emphasized racial relations as a crucial problem.

"The most serious crisis we face in San Francisco is racial relations," he said. "The problems in light of the Central Junior High School situation have been building up for years.

"We need both whites and non-whites at the top levels of city government—the supervisors, in the mayor's office, police and school board — to bring these separate factions together. We must have communication," he stressed.

Boas attacked Nixon's turn-

about stand on communism, saying he "underplayed" this point in his presidential campaign. He also called Joe Martin's (Republican national committeeman) letter to the Federal Civil Service Commission about Democratic violations of the Hatch Act "a ploy."

In his other points, Boas said:

- Improvement and planning in the 1100-acre area south of Market St. must open up; this would be accomplished by blasting out the south end of Market St.
- Spend the amount of money needed and make the proper long-range plans to revamp the Presidio for public use if and when it it turned over to San Francisco by the Army.

SF State bolsters loan program

SF State has joined the United States Aid Fund making \$26,000 immediately available for loans to qualified student through the student loan office.

The decision to join the fund was made Tuesday when the AS Legislature voted unanimously to allocate \$1,000 from the Student Leader Loan Fund to start the new loan plan.

Dean Ferd Reddell in outlining the program stated that the fund works in conjunction with the Bank of America and Wells Fargo Bank granting loans to students at 6 per cent interest to be repaid in 36 monthly installments be-

ginning four months after graduation.

The fund was originally set up by the late William Volker, a wealthy philanthropist who donated the money to set up the Volker Foundation, now the USAF.

In accordance with Volker's will, when a college puts up \$1,000 the USAF adds \$25,000. Each succeeding \$1,000 is matched by the fund with \$12,500.

To be eligible for a USAF loan a student must have completed his freshman year.

Students may borrow \$1,000 per year or a combined total of \$3,000 to cover the costs of undergraduate or graduate education.

The deadline for filing petitions for AS Legislature posts was extended until 3 p.m. today.

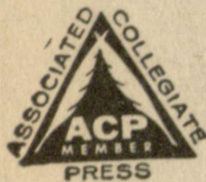

Paced by Craig Spilman, SF State's cross-country team will meet Alameda State and Chico State tomorrow at 11:30 a.m. on the Harding course.

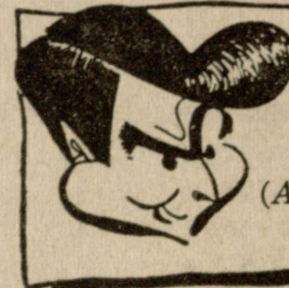
Though beaten in a time trial last week by College of San Mateo, the Gator morale hasn't been affected, said coach Tom Skinner.

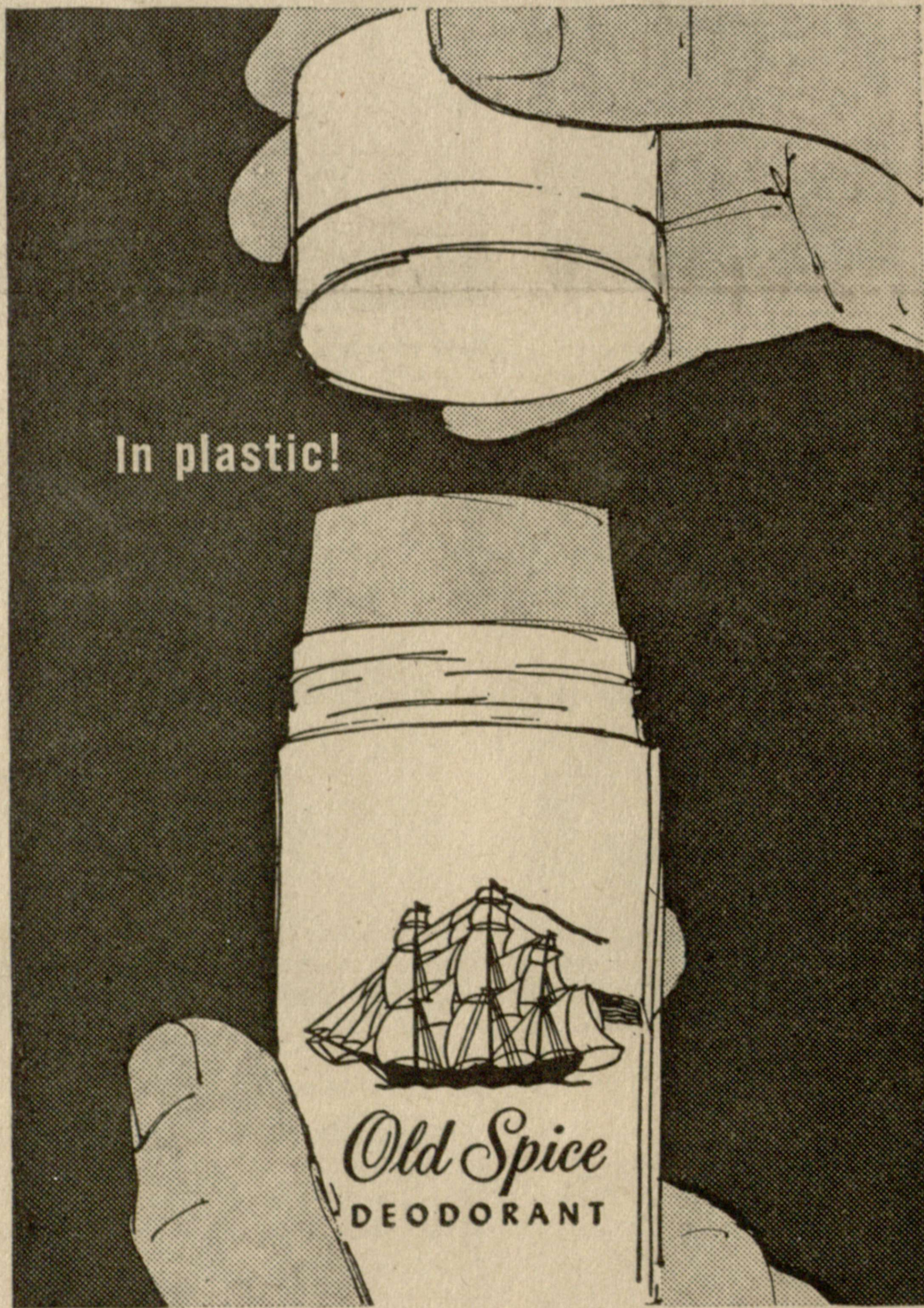
