Amendments, candidates go before LV voters

'A quorum of voters must prevail in both contests,' LV general manager says; ballots due by 5 p.m. June 25

By now, all LV homeowners should have received by mail the official ballots for this year's election, which will conclude on Thursday, June 26.

Notice the word "ballots." It's not a typo; in this Association election, there are two ballots. Both of them are important, and both of them should be completed and sent in by the deadline of June 25 at 5 p.m.

The first important decision that homeowners will make is to elect two members to serve for the next two years on the LV Board of Directors. Two candidates are on the ballot for those positions.

The second ballot requires a vote on a series of changes proposed for the Leisure Village governing documents — a reminder that homeowners are the "deciders on how the Village shall operate."

"A quorum of voters must prevail in both contests," explains LV General Manager Bob Scheaffer. "For the Board members' election, that means we need 50 percent plus one of all homeowners; that is 1,069 voters. The percentage is higher for the vote on the governing documents. That requires a vote by two-thirds of eligible voters. That's 1,415 voters."

If a quorum is not obtained, the ballots submitted are not counted. The Annual Meeting will be adjourned, ballots will be resent to homeowners, and the election will be held all over again. Scheaffer reports that the mailing cost alone is about \$2.03 per homeowner; repeating due to lack of participation, therefore, has an additional price tag.

70 years of wedded bliss

They were both 15 years old. They both lived in Chicago suburbs. But he was a jock — football, baseball, any kind of competitive sports. She loved opera, art, ballet.

Yet when Don and Millie Seidler met at a party in 1943, Don says he knew right away: "I'm going to marry you."

Millie said, "No! I'm not interested in anything that has to do with a bouncing ball."

But Don was persistent. And we know the rest of the story.

On June 18, the Seidlers will celebrate their platinum wedding anniversary — 70 years together, the last 25 living in Leisure Village.

Their feat is so unusual that the U.S. census stops at golden anniversaries, noting officially that only 6 percent of marriages last 50 years. The number of couples who go beyond that is infinitesimal.

Don Seidler calls it "lucky;"
Millie says "blessed." They agree
– with smiles – that it's "a lot of hard
work."

The family count is four children, eight grandchildren and eight greatgrandchildren. They've lived and worked in South Carolina, Illinois, Northern and Southern California and Germany.

The newlyweds were married in 1944 by a rabbi in Chicago, and then they drove in a '37 Plymouth to Charleston, South Carolina, where Don was stationed in the Army Air Corps. After his discharge, Millie and Don moved back to

Don't be dogged by fear of coyotes

We all love our open spaces, our lush landscaping and our birds and squirrels and rabbits. Unfortunately, covotes love our bushes (for dens), birds, squirrels and rabbits as well. This is the time of year when the pups are being weaned and taught to hunt, so you may see an increase in coyote activity.

Some simple rules make coexistence safe for you and your pets.

- · Don't feed the birds and other wildlife. Not only is it against our rules and regulations, but seeds and food on the ground, including fallen fruit, attract rodents, which, in turn, attract coyotes. For sure, don't feed the coyotes as they have plenty of food in the Village!
- · Don't put your trash out overnight. This is especially important if the trash includes food or bones. Wait until one hour before pickup if possible or at least the morning of pickup.

- · Don't let your cat out overnight or unattended.
- Walk your dog on a short leash in the mornings. This is when most sightings are being reported. Pick up your small dog if you see a coyote.
- · Help make the Village unattractive for covotes. This is known as hazing. The rules above are forms of passive hazing — making our environment less nourishing for them.
- Use active hazing tools if you encounter a coyote. Whistles, shaker cans (pennies inside) and shouting are good noise tools, while spray guns with vinegar water, pop-up umbrellas, and waving a large towel or jacket are good surprise tools. Be persistent; haze every time you see too-close-forcomfort behavior, and don't stop until the coyote leaves the area.
- Be big, bad and loud but be careful. From March through July, coyote moms are protecting and training their young and may be more aggressive in seeking food, including your Chihuahua!







Two forms to know about

There are two forms that are available from the Assessor of Ventura County that could be important. I recently became aware of them from an escrow officer. They are the Claim For Reassessment Exclusion For Transfer Between Parent and Child and Claim for Reassessment Exclusion for Transfer From Grandparent to Grandchild.

In the state of California, real property is reassessed at market value if it is sold or transferred, and property tax can increase dramatically as a result. If the sale or transfer is between parents and their children or from grandparents to their grandchildren, in some instances, the property will not be reassessed if certain conditions are met and the proper application is timely filed.

These propositions, 58 and 193, allow the new property owners to

avoid property tax increases. The new owner's taxes are calculated on the established Proposition 13 factored base year, instead of the current market value when the property is acquired. A claim must be filed with the county assessor's office by the earliest of the following: within three years of the transfer or prior to transferring to a third party.

Forms BOE-58-G and BOE-58-AH are on the Internet, available for printing; however, you will certainly want to consult with your tax or legal adviser. Information is available from the Ventura County Assessor's Office.



to the governing documents range from extending the terms of LV Board members from two years to three years to outlawing "cumulative" voting for directors (casting all one's votes for one candidate) to making mandatory legal changes.

The two ballots are color-coded: salmon for the candidates with a blue sealable envelope, and yellow for the changes to bylaws and other governing documents with a yellow sealable envelope.

The ballot boxes can be found in the Rec Center and in the Association Office. The votes will be counted at the Annual Meeting on June 26.





On Tuesday, April 22, at about 4:15 p.m., that sound, that fire engine noise, stopped at my house. What happened to me after I had taken a shower and while I was casually watching afternoon TV, was a numbness and tingling on my left side beginning at my face and leading down to my foot, all on one side.

I live alone, and without someone to call, I quickly decided this was something serious. I managed to get to my phone and speed dial, and because I had previously preset it, the LV emergency staff promptly answered. I identified myself and described my situation.

While talking to them, the numbness and tingling stopped. I thought I was fine and maybe it wasn't necessary for them to follow up with me; they decided differently and said they would be there immediately.

They were.

Talking to me and realizing I may or may not have had a stroke, they suggested calling 911.

Admittedly, I was scared and agreed to that call. Paramedics arrived quickly and, after putting a blood pressure cuff on my arm, determined my blood pressure was a whopping 190. They recommended I be taken to Pleasant Valley Hospital.

Hopping on the gurney, because I could, I was whisked off to the hospital. A doctor reviewed what had occurred and planned a series of tests.

With my first free moment, I got out my cell phone to call my kids. Guess what? The battery was dead. Where was my charger? One was at home; one was in my car - logical places, I thought. I didn't even know my kids' phone numbers because I was used to just speed-dialing. What was I to do?

Explaining my dilemma to the first person I saw, I was offered their universal charger. Whew! Within a short time, my smart phone was charging and I was able to email my kids.

The paramedics shut and locked my front door as we left. They weren't aware that my house keys were on a hook in my kitchen. Fortunately, I had a key hidden outside, so I was able to get in when I returned home.

The following is very important. The purpose of this is to remind all residents this is something that could happen to you. I am using my experience to share some hints to help in the event you suffer a similar emergency.

Are you prepared?

- 1. Do you have the emergency number for LV in your speed dial? It is 388-3636.
 - 2. Do you have a list of the your

medications (and dosage) readily available in your wallet?

- 3. Do you have the phone numbers of your immediate family and close friends written down?
- 4. Do you have the phone number of the CAT should you be in a situation where you might need a ride home?
- 5. Do you have a house key with a neighbor or hidden somewhere outside?
- 6. If it is possible, you may choose to get the names of the emergency personnel who assist you, perhaps to later send a thank you note?
- 7. Be proactive! I was so eager to leave the hospital that I didn't pay much attention to the exit papers I

Home health care organizations and assisted living facilities were well represented.






