"It is difficult for a Mexican to admire and glorify native things without running down foreign ones. This is a deplorable way to act. I think my feeling on the subject dates from some remote moment when I realized, with anguish, that the Mexicans suffer from an inferiority complex.

"Since my hair was lighter than that of my schoolmates, I was picked to play Uncle Sam in parades and pageants. I would take from my stovepipe hat big pieces of paper, stamped with the dollar sign and hand them out, seeking to buy Mexico's conscience, its corn and its oil."

THE COMING OF THE RAZA

The Mexican has come to the United States as a unique immigrant. With no vast ocean to cross, he has come "to these shores" by crossing deserts. Superficially, this immigration by land has been far easier than most journeys to the New World. But this is not to say the coming of the Raza has been easy. The apparent privilege of an overland trek contains a number of deep-rooted, bitter implications that no one has ever bothered to dreg up. While it is true, for instance, that the Mexican immigrant has often made it by guarache alone, it is equally true that no Statue of Liberty has greeted his arrival; and that El Paso, Nogales, San Luis, and Tijuana have had to serve as his New York.

One can seriously doubt that any Mexican migrating north to America has ever thought of his destination as a new world. This world, to him, is very old indeed. He has been part and particle of it for centuries; certainly for longer than the United States has existed. "The land was ours, before we were the land's," read Robert Frost at Kennedy's inauguration. He was not talking to Mexican Americans. Or if he was, he failed to mention something: that the land was OURS first. As Mexicans, it was ours before Frost's great-grandfather was born. As Spaniards, it was ours before his great-grandfather's gringan ancestors even knew it existed. As Indians, it was ours before the world was round.

Unfortunately though, merely claiming land does not create ownership. History provides thousands of instances where might has made right, and the mightier has usually walked away with new property.

Cortez brought very few men to Mexico, but he had horses and muskets and gunpowder, so Aztec gold went to Spain. American colonists also brought very few men, but they too brought gunpowder and the first glimmerings of American "know-how" and eventually drove the Indians to the Pacific. It was this way when Napoleon claimed Mexico, selling the whole of the Louisiana Territory to Thomas Jefferson for a mere 15,000,000 bucks; and when his grandson, Napoleon III, planted Maximilian on a Mexican throne, driving Benito Juarez into the Sierra Madre. Above all, it was this way when Texans claimed their "republic" and rat-holed in the Alamo, foreshadowing the greedy war for land between the United States of Gringos and Mexico.

The Mexican, however, has not come to the U.S. seeking to reclaim the lost acreage of the Mexican War. As an immigrant, he has entered through the back door, but he has come considerably less naive than the hungry-eyed dreamer from the swarming ports of Europe or Asia. Squatting just across the border, the Mexican has not only been a unique witness to gringan growth, but he has suffered the additional humiliation of watching his former lands prosper in the hands of his ancient enemy. From the oil fields of Texas to the orchards of California, he has

only found case for frustrated resentment.

If, therefore, the European has been fascinated and drawn, full of ignorant optimism, to a new life created and built by American know-how, the Mexican has long been broken by it. From his vantage point, America has only filled him with overwhelming feelings of inferiority. Finally unable to beat the gringos, he has joined them, but not without a devastating sense of self-defeat. He has thus come with his sombrero in his hands, asking only for the meanest of co-existence with these cabrones, and being satisfied only to share a bit of their monstrous wealth. Quietly and unobstrusively, he has come seeking their cotton crops, and having found them, has picked out a row and disappeared into the depths of the field.



Una Nota Discordante

Cuando se emprende una obra que por todos conceptos merece el nombre de grande, cuando personas con el corazon bien puesto y animadas por la mejor voluntad acometen una empresa que con seguridad tendra que redundar en gloria y prez de una raza, un pueblo o una entidad colectiva, es casi seguro que surjan inopinadamente escollos, tropiezos, contrariedades y acres sensuras no solo de estraños, sino lo que es mil veces peor, de los propios que al final cuentas resultaran beneficiados. Tal es, explicitamente hablando, lo que ha ocurrido a ultimas fechas al aparecer en este nuestro querido y viejo amigo EL EXCENTRICO, el magazine quincenal tribuna de nuestro pueblo y fiel servidor de los intereses de nuestra gran colonia, no puede por menos de lastimar hondamente nuestros sentimientos, y mas todavia por venir de un companero de labores, de un colega de esta misma publicación que ya es un veterano dentro de las columnas del organo publicitario en que ambos hemos colaborado, y a quien por el mas elemental espiritu de compañerismo no puedo menos que estimar: Me refiero a la nota que inserta en su columna el señor David Sierra, aproposito del monumento a la memoria del joven gran Presidente de los Estados Unidos de Norteamerica, John F. Kennedy, cuya memoria pretendemos honrar los mexicanos inmortalizando en bronces de nuestra Patria su venerable figura. Declaro sin ambajes, que yo no concederia al desagradable incidente mayor importancia, y menos me ocuparia de refutar publicamente la opinion del Sr. Sierra, si no la considerara perjudicial en principio a la noble empresa que hemos emprendido, y a cuyo fin se ha formado el respectivo Comite que me honro en presidir. Al externar su manera de sentir con relacion al monumento precitado, el Sr. Sierra olvida que esta hiriendo los sentimientos de personas honorabilisimas como son las que integran el Comite de referencia y cuya nomina una vez mas inserto para conocimiento del interasado y de todos los que la ignoren. Las buenas obras, cualquiera sea su indole, encajan segun los moralistas en alguno de estos dos grupos: de justicia, cuando corresponden al derecho natural de cada personas, en cuyo caso obligan bajo conciencia, o de bondad y excelencia, en cuyo caso, aun cuando no estamos obligados a practicarlas, si lo hacemos demostramos una bondad y calidad humana que mucho nos honra y habla muy alto de la cultura y buenos sentimientos que denotamos poseer; la obra del monumento en memoria del Presidente Kennedy, pertenece a la segunda de estas clasificaciones, y por si sola, revela la calidad moral de quienes la apoyan y

ayudan y la de quienes por el contrario, la atacan y denigran. Nunca, segun lo comprueban los anales de esta ciudad, la inmensa colonia mexicana que la integra en gran parte, habia emprendido una empresa tan noble como esta, ni realizado una obra colectiva que tanto la significara ante las autoridades del país que nos brinda su hospitalidad, como esta que tratamos de llevar a cabo, y que es una verdadera infamia el tratar de sabotearla.

Los propios americanos, se sintieron en cierta forma avergonzados de que fueramos los mas debiles, los mas pobres, los mas humildes, los que constituimos los grupos minoritarios, los que pretendemos llevarla a cabo, y así fue como acogieron el proyecto con simpatia dandole desde luego el decidido apoyo que tanto necesitamos y que en el alma agradecemos.



To be Healthy

To be healthy it is necessary to have good pure food. Sometimes meat, milk, butter and water look clean, but they may be not pure, and may make people sick. To keep people from getting sick because of bad food, the city, state, and United States have health inspectors. They see that the food laws are obeyed.

They go into stores, markets, storage and packing houses to see that the food is kept in clean places. Milk, meat, bread, and butter should be covered to keep flies away.

If the inspectors find any spoiled food he orders it thrown away. If he find a man selling storage eggs for fresh eggs old rancid butter for fresh butter or watered milk the man is arrested and fined or sent to jail.

Many kinds of disease may be carried in milk. Because milk is used so much for food, the inspectors go to the store and dairies where the milk is sold.





LUCERO AND GALINDO VIE FOR POSTS ON JC BOARD OF EDUCATION

Thirty-three candidates have filed for election to the San Jose Junior College District Board of Education. Five will be elected to the Board in an election on March 10th. With the prospects of a Junior College in the Eastside in the future two qualified candidates from the Mexican American community are in the race. The candidates are Ignacio Galindo and Fred Lucero both residing in the eastside sector of San Jose. We have often questioned why more Mexican Americans do not take interest in serving our Community. Mr. Lucero and Galindo are certainly qualified and have taken the interest.

We present their qualifications for your consideration and hope that on March 10th you will go to the polls to vote for any five candidates of your choice. This column wishes to commend both Nash Galindo and Fred Lucero for their sincere interest in serving our community. It may be worthy of note that both candidates have expressed that they stand on their qualifications and should be supported as such for neither upholds the theory that a citizen should vote for a candidate because that candidate happens to be of the same ethnic group.

IGNACIO GALINDO

Ignacio Galindo, known to his friends as Nash, resides at 3365 Mt. Vista Drive with his wife and three children. He is a native of Texas having graduated from Del Rio High School. He received his BA degree from the University of Southern California and has done graduate work at the College of the Pacific. He received his law degree from Southwestern University in Los Angeles after attending Loyola University. He is at present engaged in intensive study for admittance to the Bar.



Nash is well known in the community as the present President of the local chapter of MAPA. He

has been active with CSO, ULAC and serves on the Board of Directors of the HI-Spot for the YWCA.

He is at present employed as a Supervisor for the Redevelopment Agency for the City of San Jose. His past experience has seen him as Probation Officer for five years in San Joaquin and Riverside Counties. He was also employed as a Parole Officer in San Jose and in handling his caseload has come into cantact with the students and schools in the Eastside.

He states that he is quite familiar with the problems of our youth and their desires. Nash ended our short interview by saying, "I feel that there is a definite lack when we talk about drop-out problems, delinquency problems and I feel very strongly that our Mexican American leadership should really take the leadership in these fields by getting involved in school activities, and knowing what is going on. Our students need more training because of automation and they should get skilled training or go on to colleges and universities. I feel that our Junior Colleges can do a good job of counseling students who are not quite prepared to select a course of study either in skilled trades or in the profession."

ATTORNEY FRED LUCERO

Attorney Fred Lucero resides at 2385 Mather Drive in the Eastside of San Jose with his wife & two pre-school children.

Fred is a native of Albuquerque, New Mexico but attended high school in Richmond, Calif. He received his BA Degree from the University of California at Berkeley. He majored in Psychology.

He received his law degree from Hastings Law School in San Francisco and is presently engaged in practicing law here in

San Jose. He was discharged from the Armed Forces in 1955. Fred is active with MAPA, PEG, and has worked with CSO and is presently on the Advisory Committee of the Mexican American Community Council service project. He is a member of the Lions Club and of the Santa Clara American GIForum.

In talking to Fred he expressed alarm over the statistics reflected on the Mexican Americans in regards to welfare, unemployment, youth delinquency and school drop outs. He feels that particular attention should be given to these problems faced by the Mexican American segment of the community which constitute a large dollar drain on the taxpayers of this County and State. He says that "education is one way of combating the alarming statistics that can be quoted."

He terminated our short interview by saying,
"A person should get on the Junior College Board that
can speak for this group, who can express what their
needs are and in this respect, I solicit the vote of the
Mexican American community."

If the Mexican American community is interested in having representatives on the Junior College Board who can speak up for our problems these two men who thru their hard work and initiative have attained an excellent education and stand ready to serve. 


