Leisure Village Safety and Security Update

■ Village officers share their current concerns

For fourteen years, LV's Chief of Security Manny Segovia has been focused on protecting the safety of residents, visitors, and property of Leisure Village. "The Village continues to be a safe place to live," he explains. "At the same time, we have security concerns that demand our attention." Chief Segovia, Officers Tony Winter and Paul Gomez took a few minutes recently to talk about their current safety priorities: The swimming pool, traffic violations, an increased number of emergency calls and emergency preparedness.

"The pool presents a serious problem," Chief Segovia begins. Residents who ignore the rules of the pool, who disregard the posted hours for children, who



The Two B's Wildlife Report

Golf hazards from bees to bunnies

Village golfers often encounter more than the usual hazards, especially two that begin with the letter "B," Bees and Bunnies.

As temperatures rise, bees swarm as they seek water sources, sometimes finding it under Village irrigation covers. Swarming usually accompanies a Queen bee and can be intimidating to those not used to them. Also, they can be alarming to persons allergic to bee venom. One such swarm was quenching its thirst a couple of weeks ago at the sprinkler controls behind JoAnne Bonetto's patio in Village 6, and near some golfers on the 8th hole tee box.

The incident is a reminder to residents not to attempt to control a swarm themselves; rather, call Security and an officer will be dispatched to determine the best course of action. Ventura County is among those where Africanized bee colonies are reported. That means any swarm should be assessed by a professional bee handler which the Village can dispatch.

As for those ever-multiplying bunnies, even a golf ball plopping down nearby rarely interrupts salad-time. Unlike bees, they are not a hazard just a reminder that the name "Conejo" on the nearby creek and valley is Spanish for rabbit.

names "Traffic, speeding and moving violations" as a major concern. "We see dangerous situations and aim to enforce the rules for everyone's safety," he says. "Of course, people aren't happy when they get stopped. But only a small percentage of them are difficult, usually guests or contractors. You'd be surprised how often residents thank us for enforcing these rules."

Officer Paul Gomez works the twelve-hour night shift and his perspective about Village safety is unique. "I am always on the move responding to emergency calls and patrolling our streets. I know the residents who walk their dogs at 2:00 a.m.," he laughs. But he's serious about the increase in calls that come in. Ten years ago, officers responded to nearly 800 a year. Last year, that total was 1300. "Not all are emergency medical situations," he adds. "Some ask me to check to see if next time."

someone's in their attic. And we do that, too, always. I treat residents the way I want to be treated."

Finally, our security officers worry about how many Villagers have a real emergency plan in place. Chief Segovia says "We will not be able to escort anyone to safety or provide food or water or call their families. During last year's fires, our guys came back to work all night. Small Space, Big Style: Kitchen

If your kitchen is on the small side, fear not. You, too, can have big style in a small space. With a focus on function, careful material choices, and a little creativity, your dream kitchen is possible — regardless of size. Check out our top five design solutions for tiny kitchens.

Stay focused. When space is limited, make meal preparation — the No. 1 job your kitchen — the focus of your redo. Look for tailor-made appliances, such as reduced-sized refrigerators and stoves, and singlebasin sinks. No island? No problem. Consider a butcher block-topped cart that can be rolled out when needed and put away when not in use. Maximize storage by using drawers instead of cabinets.

Keep things clear and open. When counter space is at a minimum, it's important to keep clutter at bay. Store what you can in drawers. Overhead cabinets may offer storage, but they also can make the room feel closed off. Consider replacing the cabinets with open shelves. Neatly stacked dishes can look surprisingly stylish. If that's not an option, replace the cabinet doors with glass fronts. The glass works as a visual trick to keep things open and light. You can use this same trick with tables and chairs—the clear versions create the illusion of openness.

Pick great materials. You may discover you can afford options that might be cost prohibitive in a larger kitchen. Great granite? Yes, please. Beautiful hardwood floors or a top-of-the-line faucet? Check. Don't be afraid of going bold with splashes of color. Be sure to select materials that coordinate with each other. Because your space is smaller, any clashing will be obvious.

Brighten and lighten it up. By keeping your color palette light, adding great lighting, and using reflection to bounce light around the space, your small kitchen will feel more open. A tile backsplash is a great opportunity to add reflection. Consider replacing fluorescent lighting with the newer LED recessed lighting. Add unexpected touches, such as under-cabinet lighting.

Go high, go low. Drawing attention to the height of the room will help your kitchen from feeling too closed in. If you have windows, consider hanging window treatments near the ceiling to draw the eye up. As for the floors, beautiful hardwood or cork is a great choice. If these are out of your budget, check your options in vinyl or laminate.

Farmers Club membership limited by available garden patches

It is perhaps the single most select guild in Leisure Village. Fact is, one cannot belong unless one holds exclusive sway over a particular patch of dirt at a specific spot, here-abouts.

Inside Leisure Village readers will not find this phantom fellowship listed in the Club News section, and will be hard-pressed to see the tranquil squad pop-up in pixels on their computer screens in LV eNews deliveries.

With 102 members in good standing, the Farmers Club is guaranteed to get no larger for as long as that number of garden plots is available to Leisure Village residents.

Al Pinto, Farmers Club president, said residents who hold the 102, approximately 4X12 foot size, "patches" at the garden, located within a fenced enclosure smack against the Ham radio shack, are automatically inducted into the club. Dues are nil, Pinto said, and meetings are held quarterly. "(The meetings) are not very exciting; mostly about any problems in the garden or ideas some people might have." Garden tools, watering hoses and even a communal herb garden are provided to members.

Pinto said the Recreation Center office maintains a list of garden plot candidates. Plots are provided free, but on an as-available basis with a current waiting list of some 15 names, representing about a one-year wait for a plot to become available.

Shirley Williams, who stopped in on a warm, Wednesday afternoon in early August to water her patch, said she has maintained a spot in the garden for some 24 years. She got lucky. Shirley said she was able to obtain her garden patch within about six months of her arrival in Leisure Village back then. At present her ground holds tomatoes, peppers and Swiss chard. Williams said patch holders are required to keep plots planted and not allow them to go dormant for extensive time periods, as there are always folks waiting in line for the opportunity to plant and harvest available parcels.

So, if going back to the dirt gives you a partial eclipse of the heart, you can get on the Farmers Club list; because if you have a garden and a library, Cicero said, you have everything you need.

Do You Need A Password Coach?

How to easily protect your information online

One of the secrets to a stellar baseball team is having a better-thanaverage manager. A championship manager is easy to spot. He knows how to put together a great starting lineup, senses when to pull a struggling pitcher out of a game and makes crackerjack decisions under pressure.

Perhaps like most people, you get by creating a single passphrase using numbers and uppercase letters. You employ this one super password across multiple sites. Using this technique, you feel ready for the internet big leagues. Yet if an opposing player gets a hold of your "really good password," he then has access to many of your accounts. This bad guy is now leading the game against you 10-0 in the bottom of the ninth.

It's time to bring in a program to manage your passwords. The advantage of employing a password coach is you only need to remember one password-the one you use to log into the program. Here is what you can expect from having a password coach on your bench: first, a password manager creates strong passwords for you. Imagine having a helper that can generate different passwords for you that no hacker can crack. An example of such a password might be "8v3G0Gfcvn."

In fact, the program will come up with a different password for each



site you have an account with. Second, your password manager will store your passwords in a safe place. These password manager programs use very strong encryption to guard your login data. Putting your passwords on a piece of notebook paper or on a stick-it-note is not the best option for security. Third, a top-notch password manager will enter your passwords into the login fields for you. Can you imagine typing a 13-character random password into the login box every time you visit Amazon? With a cyber-coach, you have help inserting these long, complicated passwords.

The password manager programs that are recommended by security experts are 1Password and LastPass. If you feel you need help setting up these programs, there are computer techs in Leisure Village who will be glad to lend a hand.
