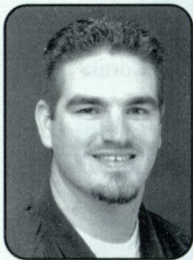

**PRESS CREDENTIALS:** Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located at the will call/player pass table located on the third base concourse.

**PHOTO CREDENTIALS:** Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted via the right field stairway. Due to the limited foul territory behind home plate, all photographers must remain to the outfield side of the coaching boxes at first and third bases.

**PRESS BOX:** The press box is located on the walkway behind the seats directly behind home plate. Limited seating is available with beat writers receiving priority. Radio positions and additional seating for the media will be made in the rows immediately in front of the press box.

**TELEPHONES:** The press box number is (714) 278-5327. Additional phones are available in the Sports Media Relations Office, located about 200 yards to the south of Titan Field. A public pay phone is located directly behind the electrical house behind the press box.

**RADIO LINES:** Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team(s). The charge is \$35 per game or \$100 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements with Mel Franks well in advance.

**PARKING:** Parking is available by:

a) Using lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday night and all day Saturday and Sunday.

b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

- Cal State Fullerton won national championships in 1979, 1984 and 1995. Its most recent championship came as a result of a 57-9 season where the Titans finished 1995 with an 18-game winning streak. The Titans also became the first No. 1 seed to win the national title since seeding began in 1988.
- Cal State Fullerton is one of only three schools (Arizona State and Florida State are the other schools) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given to the top amateur baseball player in the nation by USA Baseball. The three Titans who won the Golden Spikes Award were Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995).
- Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd join three other Titans who have been members of Team USA (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992).
- 26 Titans have gone on to play in the major leagues. Jeremy Giambi became the most recent Titan to make it to "The Show" when he was called up by the Kansas City Royals late in the 1998 season.
- Cal State Fullerton is 71-38 (.651) in NCAA post-season play and is ranked in the top five all-time in winning percentage for teams that have played over 100 games in post-season competition.
- No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska, and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won nine regional titles, all on the road.
- The Titans in 24 years at the Division I level have made it to the NCAA Tournament 20 times and have won 16 conference championships.
- Aaron Rowand became the eighth Titan to be selected before the second round of the amateur baseball draft. Rowand, who was selected in the 1998 draft "sandwich" round by Chicago White Sox, joins Mark Kotsay (Florida-1996), Tim Wallach (Montreal-1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal-1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs-1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City-1988), Phil Nevin (Houston-1992) and Dante Powell (San Francisco-1994).
- Cal State Fullerton has had 59 first-team all-conference selections in 15 years. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.
- The Titans have never had a losing season in the 24-year history of the program at the Division I level and never have gone winless in 20 years of NCAA competition.

The Cal State Fullerton baseball tradition had a most humble beginning, starting out as a club team and playing on a field literally scratched out of an orange grove. Only the wildest dreamer could have foreseen a program that now features three national championships, nine regional titles, 16 conference crowns and 26 alumni with major league playing experience.

It's been a memorable three decades since Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world. Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball developed into a national power. Larry Cochell kept the tradition alive with two College World Series appearances in his three-year tenure at Fullerton and Garrido did not miss a beat following his return in 1991 after three seasons in Illinois.

Beryl Kempton was the university employee who graded the field out of orange trees. Home plate sat near an old orchard residence, the brick structure now known as "Titan House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing structure in the city and is currently being renovated to host athletic offices.

The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west, paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pickup" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full fledged intercollegiate sport with Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970's as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing a second field farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

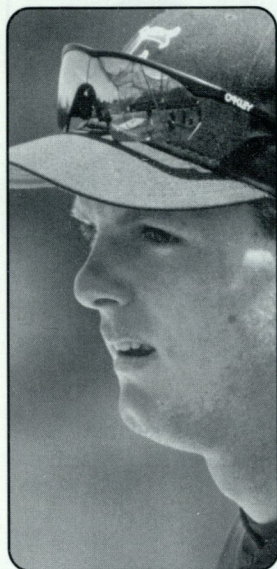
After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their successful tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans did not miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional, depriving the Trojans of a shot at a sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief, to say the least. They lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience would pay benefits. Fullerton repeated as PCAA champions in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games over San Diego State. But then came re-alignment of the league. The seven-team Southern California Baseball Association was made up of Fullerton, Pepperdine, San Diego State, Cal State Los Angeles, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title in 1977 with Cal State Los Angeles. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and a regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship, but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno, but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

Pitcher Tony Hudson was the College World Series Most Outstanding Player. Tim Wallach became the first Titan to win the Golden Spikes Award, given to the top amateur baseball player in the nation by the United States Baseball Federation.

Fullerton began a frustrating streak of post-season play in 1980. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, Arizona, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regional in Tempe, Arizona, to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine. In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the automatic NCAA tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth and another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. But a realignment of the infielders seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see the Titans win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA championship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a "Murderers' Row" field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of Fresno State and won the regional in 100+ degree heat.

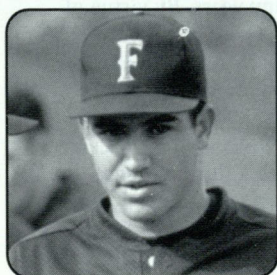
At Omaha, venerable institutions Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State, and finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way of a second NCAA title. In a World Series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminutive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life and beat Texas, 3-1, in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel set a CWS record for hits and won the Most Outstanding Player trophy. Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single to help beat ASU. The Titans outslugged Oklahoma State behind a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns, where John Bryant stole a base to set up the tying run and tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning.

The 5-foot-7, 133-pound Delzer allowed a couple of infield hits in the first inning for a Texas run, but that was to be all. He pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door for his 22nd save.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league championship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

There was no league title nor NCAA playoffs in 1986 as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth at home against UNLV and Matt Williams on April 5 and could never



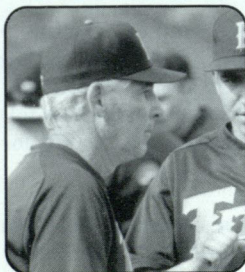
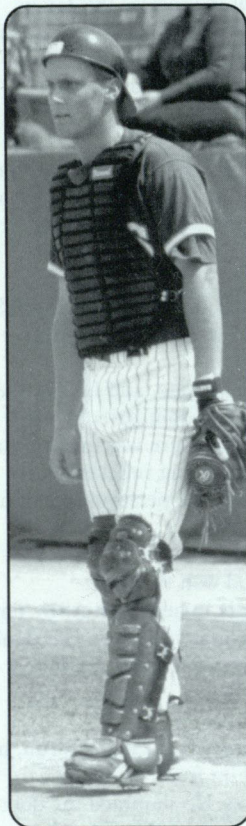




left to right, tim wallach, mark kotsay, and phil nevin, the 3 titan golden spikes winners

recover from the loss, finishing in third place with an overall 36-21 record behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road, Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its next 13 games on its way to a 18-3 PCAA mark and a five-game margin over surprise runner-up UC Irvine.

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them to the South II Regional in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a conference that never had won an NCAA playoff game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern.

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep pitching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, could not handle the Tigers as the Titans had to settle for a 44-17 season.

The 1988 season brought a changing of the guard, but no deviation in the Titans' success story. Garrido resigned and headed for the University of Illinois. Larry Cochell left the cold of Evanston at Northwestern University and headed west.

After an inconsistent start, the new combination clicked and the Titans won 30 out of 35 games before losing a home series and the conference championship to Fresno State. But an at-large bid was tendered and Fullerton parlayed it into a return trip to Omaha by winning the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi. Mike Ross hit a three-run homer with two outs in the bottom of the ninth for a 6-3 win over Texas A&M after the Titans had beaten the host Bulldogs twice.

Fullerton continued its winning ways in a revised CWS format in Omaha with well-pitched victories over Stanford and Miami. But Longo Garcia and Mark Beck could not repeat their feat and Stanford came back through the losers' bracket to drop the Titans to third place with a pair of Cardinal victories.

Despite the presence of All-Americans Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans endured Fullerton's worst season since 1973. The Titans finished in the second division of the Big West at 10-11 and the overall record was 30-27.

The end of a dynasty? Rival coaches thought so and picked the Titans to finish fifth in the Big West in 1990. Instead, the team romped to its first conference title since 1987 and rode that momentum to an impressive sweep of the Central Regional in Austin, Texas. Twice the Titans beat the host Longhorns to earn a sixth trip to Omaha.

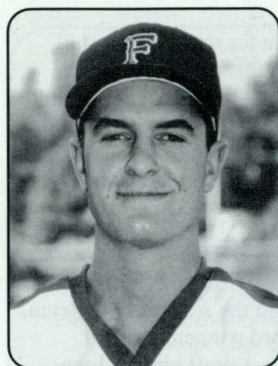
They crashed at the CWS, literally. Outfielder Rich Gonzales collided with the left field wall and concern for his health distracted the Titans in losses to Oklahoma State and The Citadel.

Cochell accepted a lucrative offer to coach at Oklahoma which created an opening for Garrido's return in 1991, a year the Titans would use Amerige Park in downtown Fullerton for games and practice with construction underway on a new stadium.

Fullerton started slowly, but ended the season on a high note winning 10 of its final 12 games and clinching a share of the conference championship, the second title in as many years. By virtue of head-to-head competition, Fresno State gained the automatic berth to post-season play. The NCAA Selection Committee did not look upon Fullerton's strong finish as being good enough to earn an at-large bid to tournament play. The snub left the Titans at home, but provided motivation for the 1992 squad.

The Titans had a dream season in 1992, one that seemed destined to result in a third national title. They opened the long awaited and revamped Titan Field in April, saw Fullerton alumnus Kevin Costner throw out the first pitch at the dedication game in May and blew through an NCAA Regional tournament at defending national champion LSU. But they came up one run short to longtime rival

Phil Nevin, who was an outstanding kicker and punter for the football team for three years, was selected *Baseball America's* Player of the Year, the College World Series Most Outstanding Player, Big West Conference Player of the Year, was the first player picked in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros, started at third base in the 1992 Olympics for Team USA and became the second Titan to win the Golden Spikes Award.

In 1993, the Titans had beaten USC twice during the regular season for the first time since 1987, but the Trojans would get their revenge by beating Cal State Fullerton both times in the Central II Regional in Austin, Texas.

In 1994, the Titans fought their way through the Midwest I Regional at Oklahoma State and beat the host Cowboys in extra innings to make their eighth appearance at the College World Series. A highlight of the 1994 CWS came against LSU when Fullerton tied a tournament record, scoring 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory over the Tigers. It came after getting shutout by Georgia Tech in the opening game of the CWS. The Titans fought back through the losers' bracket, routing LSU and overpowering Florida State behind Mark Kotsay's seven-RBI performance and the gutsy relief pitching of Dan Ricabal, who shut out the Seminoles over the final 8.1 innings. That earned Fullerton another shot at Georgia Tech and another pitching duel developed between the Yellowjackets' Brad Rigby and Fullerton's Mike Parisi. The game was decided in the 12th inning when Nomar Garciaparra homered for Georgia Tech in the top of the inning and the Titans stranded Dante Powell at third base with no outs in the bottom of the frame, ending the Titans' season.

Teamwork played a major role in the 1995 season. Thanks to an unselfish work ethic, the Titans put together the best season in Fullerton history at 57-9. Led by Kotsay, who won the Golden Spikes Award, Smith Award and was named *Collegiate Baseball's* Co-Player of the Year; All-Americans pitcher Ted Silva and catcher Brian Loyd, Cal State Fullerton earned its third national championship. Fullerton had to play with the pressure of being the No. 1 ranked team in the nation through most of the season, but put together an 18-game win streak to finish the season and steamroll through the postseason capped by an 11-5 win over USC in the title game. Loyd was MVP of the Big West Tournament, Jack Jones was MVP of the LSU regional and Kotsay won the award at Omaha.

Through the start of the 1996 season, it looked as if the Titans had not skipped a beat from their domination of opposing teams through the end of the 1995 season. The Titans opened up with a 38-4 mark, but hit an inexplicable stretch where they lost 12 of their last 19 games. Cal State Fullerton finished fourth in the Big West Conference, but still made it to the NCAA Midwest Regional in Wichita, Kansas.

Mark Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine RBI in the Titans' opening round win over Delaware and another win against Rice put Fullerton into a key matchup with host Wichita State. Regional MVP Brandon Baird, however, shut down the Titans with a magnificent pitching performance as the Shockers won, 6-1. Rice gained revenge with a 13-10 decision to end the Titans' season in disappointing fashion. Kotsay and Loyd both represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia, as Team USA won the bronze medal.

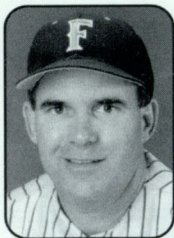
George Horton became the Titans' third Division I head coach in 1997 and as the program heads into the 21st century, the many qualities that have made baseball successful at Cal State Fullerton appear to be intact. Horton has led the Titans to a pair of NCAA regional appearances and national top 20 rankings and has a Big West Conference Tournament and regular season championship to his credit.

As George Horton begins his third year as head baseball coach at Cal State Fullerton, the Titan program clearly bears his personal trademark. All the returning players on the current roster have played only for Horton, who replaced former Coach Augie Garrido on Sept. 4, 1996, after serving six years as his associate head coach. The obvious traits of Titan baseball have gone unchanged in Horton's first two seasons. His teams have posted an 86-41-1 (.676) record, won a Big West Conference championship and a regular season pennant and made two trips to the NCAA regionals. They have usually been ranked in the national Top 20 polls. Seven Titans were chosen in the 1997 professional draft and five more last summer including outfielder Aaron Rowand in the supplemental round between the first and second rounds by the Chicago White Sox.

The only thing missing has been another trip to the College World Series in Omaha, where Cal State Fullerton has three titles, one second and two thirds in nine appearances.

"We've been close to a return to the national tournament in Omaha the last two years, but there's very little satisfaction to that sort of ending for anyone in the program," said Horton. "We all need to commit ourselves to all the disciplines it takes to 'get it done!' We believe we have the physical and mental qualities to have a great year. We are youthful yet experienced with the roster of 1999 Titans. The team seems to be willing to work at the level that it takes to have success."

In 1997, the Titans struggled to a 23-19-1 start but then rattled off 15 victories in their final 18 regular season games. They lost the opener of the Big West Conference post-season tournament at home, but then came back to win four games in a row at Blair Field including a doubleheader sweep on the final day against host Long Beach State to capture the league championship and the automatic NCAA tournament bid. At Stanford, the Titans placed third, losing to Santa Clara and Fresno State.

Last year, the Titans used a remarkably balanced squad to start strong and then dominate the Big West Conference regular season with a 25-5 record. But they stumbled at home in the Big West Tournament and then ran into a powerful buzz saw in Baton Rouge in the NCAA regionals, placing second at 3-2 with a pair of losses to the host LSU Tigers.

Horton fulfilled a life-long dream of being a Division I head coach when he was promoted to replace Garrido, who left to take over at the University of Texas. A 1978 CSF graduate, Horton had returned to the campus in 1991 when Garrido came back after a three-year stint at Illinois. In the next six years the Titans posted a 264-99 record and made three trips to the CWS, winning the 1995 crown with a phenomenal 57-9 season. Horton had input on virtually every aspect of the Fullerton program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff. His organizational skills, patience as a teacher and his attention to detail provided the backbone of the Titan coaching staff.

During the years Horton was responsible for the pitching staff, seven pitchers received All-America honors and Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins. This winter Naulty was traded to the World Champion Yankees.

Position players recruited and coached by Horton include Mark Kotsay (Florida), Jeremy Giambi (Kansas City) and Dante Powell (San Francisco/Arizona). He also coached the Angels' Phil Nevin, who in 1992 was the Golden Spikes Award winner, Baseball America player of the year, baseball's No. 1 draft pick and the College World Series MVP.

Kotsay and Nevin along with Brian Loyd, Jason Moler and Bret Barberie are five eventual Olympians tutored in part by Horton.

Horton, 45, began his head coaching career at Cerritos College in Norwalk, where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years. He compiled a 226-53 record and won the California titles in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).

He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Joel Adamson, Dan Patterson, Louis Medina and Jeff Hearron.

Horton was a player on the Cerritos College teams in 1972 and 1973. He won the most inspirational award in 1972. In 1973 he was the Falcon team captain, won the Dallas Moon Award and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began as an assistant at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with current Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953. He and his wife, Francie, have four daughters: Michele (19), Heather (15), Loyal (10) and Rebecca (8). Horton and his family reside in Yorba Linda.



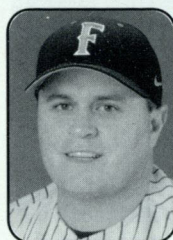

Dave Serrano returns for his third season at Cal State Fullerton as pitching coach and recruiting coordinator. He has been very instrumental in putting together the most recent recruiting classes which included the nation's No. 10 ranked class in both 1997 and 1998 by *Collegiate Baseball*.

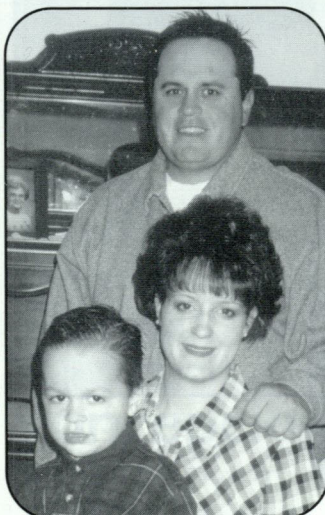
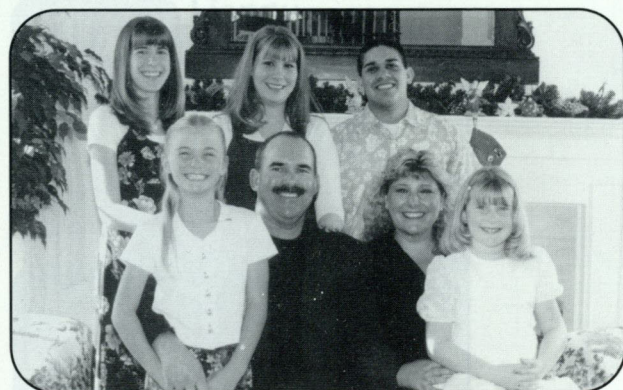
Serrano, 34, was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator for the 1995 and 1996 seasons at the University of Tennessee for Head Coach Rod Delmonico. In 1995, Serrano helped the Volunteers reach the College World Series for the first time in 44 years.

Serrano has coached more than two dozen pitchers who are currently playing professional baseball. In his two years at Tennessee, he produced two first-round draft picks in Todd Helton (1995, Colorado Rockies), and R.A. Dickey (1996, Texas Rangers). The top three starters on both the 1997 and 1998 Titan staffs were drafted – Matt Wise by Anaheim in the 6th round, Brian Tokarse by Anaheim in the 11th round and John Alkire by Detroit in the 13th round in 1997 and Erasmo Ramirez by San Francisco in the 11th round, Greg Jacobs by Anaheim in the 13th round and Benito Flores by Boston on the 17th round in 1998. Flores was the Big West Conference pitcher of the year in 1998 and is one of Serrano's six (with Wise, Tokarse, Ramirez, Adam Johnson and Mike Greenlee) all-conference Titan hurlers.

This is Serrano's second go-around as an assistant to Horton. He assisted him at Cerritos College for three years (1988-90) before Horton moved to Fullerton in 1991 as an assistant to Augie Garrido. Serrano remained at Cerritos through the 1994 season. In his seven-year tenure, Cerritos won the state championship in 1989 and won the conference title six times, including 1991 when Serrano was the head coach.

Serrano graduated from Cerritos High School in 1982 and played two seasons at Cerritos College. He earned all-conference and JC All-America honors in his final season at Cerritos. He pitched one season at Cal State Fullerton in 1986, posting a 3-4 record with one save in 15 appearances.

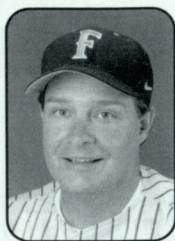

Rick Vanderhook is in his 13th season with the Titans as a coach. He will again coach the outfielders and hitters, set the defense and handle third-base coaching duties this season. He also is a key evaluator of talent in the recruiting process and is the director of Titan Baseball Camps.

"Hook" has coached two first-round draft picks (Dante Powell by the San Francisco Giants and Mark Kotsay by the Florida Marlins) and a supplemental round pick (Aaron Rowand by the Chicago White Sox in 1998) and 10 All-Americans at CSF since 1991.

The Titans' offense ranked in the top eight in the nation last year in 12 categories. They tied or set school records for home runs, triples, doubles and slugging percentage.

As director, Vanderhook oversees all aspects of Titan baseball camps, which help develop young (7 to 17 years) players to reach their top performance level. Among the graduates of Titan camp are former Titans Steve Chatham and Rowand. The teaching of fundamentals make Titan camps second to none.

Vanderhook, 36, first coached the Titans from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and worked with the hitters and defense in 1988. In his 13 previous years with the Titans as a player and a coach, they have made it to the College World Series five times.

Vanderhook spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernan at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, Northridge was the Division II national runnerup. Vanderhook returned to Cal State Fullerton prior to the 1991 season. He has coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and the Goldpanners finished third in the nation in 1986.

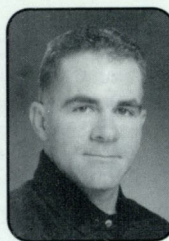

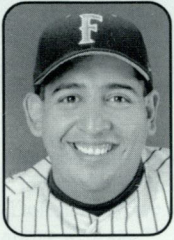
His main duties include working with the catchers, bunting, offensive skills and defensive positioning. His knowledge of the game makes him an important key to the Titans' offense as the first-base coach.

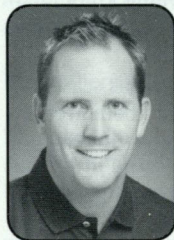

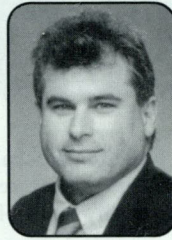

Rick Stassi begins his eighth season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Titan baseball program. Among his accomplishments, Stassi has trained more than 200 professional baseball players, including nine No. 1 draft picks, and more than 1,000 collegiate baseball players.

He is also the strength and conditioning coach for the Seattle Mariners and Cypress College baseball teams.

Stassi received his bachelor's degree in kinesiology and health promotion in 1993 and recently earned his masters degree in 1997 from Cal State Fullerton.

If you want to be the best baseball player you can be, then learn how to properly condition for it. Workouts are comprehensive and scientifically based on an energetic, muscle and biomechanical analysis of baseball. Everyone has his own genetic ceiling and my goal is to show you how to reach it.

### My program includes:

**Strength Training:** Working with weights will increase the kinetic and muscular power potential. This greater power will increase speed and hitting potential. Resistance training will also lessen the number and severity of athletic injuries and cut the rehabilitation time.

**Flexibility:** Will increase strength and elasticity of various muscle groups and allow the athlete full range of motion. Good flexibility helps to reduce injuries. A player that works out without stretching is inviting injuries. **Strength + Flexibility = Power.**

**Plyometrics:** Is a supplemental training method that works on strength, speed and power. It is a series of low impact jumps and bounds that help produce great leg strength and power.

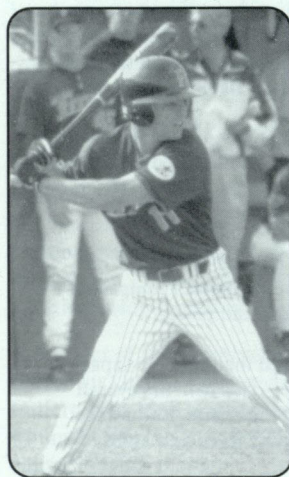
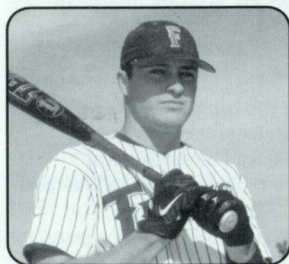
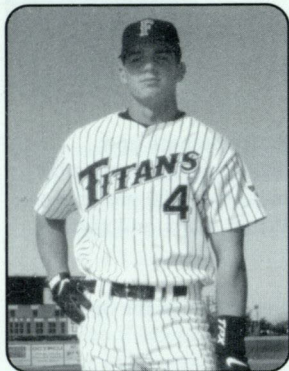
**Aerobic Capacity:** Ballplayers should build their aerobic capacity through distance running and stair master. This benefits overall stamina, joint strengthening and longevity in sports. Endurance training provides a base from which to build speed and agility.

**Anaerobic Capacity:** Speed training should be done two months before the season starts. A variety of drills can be used, but all should be done with a visual cue to stimulate reaction time. Volume should be dependent on the condition of the athlete.

**Sports Psychology:** Baseball is a failure sport, which in turn puts a lot of pressure on the ball player to perform. If you do not understand about sports psychology, you will have a very hard time making it in baseball, especially at the higher levels. Baseball people do not want to know how to deal with success, but how to deal with failure.

**Nutrition:** Without the proper nutrition habits you will not be able to train or work on baseball skills at a level you need to reach your genetic ceiling. You are what you eat.

Since Cal State Fullerton baseball became a Division I program in 1975, the Titans never have gone more than three years without returning to the College World Series. EVERY four-year Titan player has had the opportunity to play in Omaha.

But that streak is on the line in 1999 because the Titans have failed to advance beyond the last three NCAA regional tournaments, since winning their third national championship in 1995.

"We are quite aware of the situation," said Coach George Horton. "Our level of expectation is Omaha, so we're not putting any more pressure than usual on ourselves. It's more than time we get back there and then win it again. That's no pipe dream for this year's team. We just need to pitch and play well at the right times."

The 1999 Titans appear to have the offensive and defensive tools to compete for a national title. They have a nice blend of experience and youthful enthusiasm, more physically gifted athletes than in recent years and a rugged schedule to prepare them for the tension of NCAA play. But as it usually does in baseball, it comes down to pitching.

"It seems like every year we have to replace our starting rotation, but this year we were probably less successful in recruiting because the pro draft got in our way," he said. "We lost three pitchers to professional contracts after losing 27 wins and a lot of innings from Benito Flores, Erasmo Ramirez and Greg Jacobs.

"But we do have six experienced sophomores with a lot of potential. By natural progression, they should be a year better and a year more experienced. The roles will be determined as we see progress in January, but I would expect Jon Smith to be a weekend starter if he is healthy (back problems limited him to 28 innings in 1998). And Adam Johnson will play a significant role in the success of the 1999 staff, either as a starter or in his 1998 role of short relief specialist (freshman All-American).

"Kirk Saarloos has great versatility as he showed last year. He could be a starter or a stopper. He compares to Ted Silva in 1995 who pitched in both roles in the same season. We also have Ruben Jurado back but his health (back surgery) is an issue. Marco Hanlon and Cerritos JC transfer Matt Sorensen appear to be in the mix off their Fall efforts.

"The most improved guy was Jordan DeJong, who got his feet wet last year. He's better in every way – physically, mentally and conditioning. He may be the most improved of all the returning Titan players.

"Last year we had an abundance of lefthanded pitching and we will have good balance this season. Lefthanders Mike Garner and George Carralejo have shown spots of being capable and both are coming off good summers and will be important ingredients to assume some innings.

"Basically, we have to identify three weekend starters and a stopper, the guy in there when the game is on the line, and everything else will fall into place."

Veteran catching, a productive offense and a strong defense should make the pitching staff's job a little easier.

Behind the plate the Titans have junior letterman Craig Patterson backed up by letterman Chad Baum, JC transfer Jeff Gates and freshmen Sean Bishofberger from Granite Hills High School in El Cajon and late-arriving Brett Kay from Mater Dei HS.

"Patterson has done himself and the team some good by taking the summer off from baseball and bulking up his strength," said Horton of the El Dorado HS in Placentia product. "He is throwing better and has the leadership details you are seeking. He can also steal a base. Baum is close to DeJong as the most improved Titan. He was not successful in 1998 but had a good offensive Fall.

"Offensively, we will have more choices than ever before in how to score runs. This is the best and deepest running team we have had. We may not have one guy steal 60 bases, but we had eight guys



run 6.8 or better 60s, which is phenomenal.

"Defensively, we will be able to put a very athletic defense on the field. Our coverage will be way above average."

The Titans boast most of their experience on the infield where freshman All-American David Bacani, Team USA veteran Ryan Owens and power-hitting third baseman Ryan Moore (14 home runs) are the returning regulars. Bacani solidified last year's infield when he won the second base job in February and this year shortstop looks to be the pivotal spot.

"Bacani had a great freshman year and off this Summer and Fall, he has emerged as one of the best middle infielders in the country," said Horton. "Ryan created some positive momentum in the summer with Team USA and it carried over to the Fall. He's quite capable, his confidence level is the key. Moore was a productive hitter last season and he looks to be improved offensively and defensively off his Fall performance."

"Shortstop will be a tough call," said Horton. "It's like our outfield last year and still this year. It's competitive and deep. Freshman Shawn Norris (Alta HS in Draper, Utah) is a star in the making. He's one of the better infield prospects we've had here, offensively and defensively. And Owens played short most of last year with help from Chad Olszanski."

First base is wide open with Kevin Duck signing a professional contract. It could become a platoon situation with converted outfielder Chris Beck battling Chapman University transfer Aaron Rifkin. Beck had an excellent Fall making the defensive transition and Rifkin surpassed expectations, particularly with the bat.

Beck's apparent move opens up some playing time in the outfield, where junior Reed Johnson has emerged as one of the team's top players, but Horton has six potential centerfielders, "None of whom would hurt us out there." Spencer Oborn brings a proven Div. I bat with him from Brigham Young and there are other exciting newcomers in USC transfer Rod Perry, Rancho Buena Vista HS product Chris Stringfellow, Lemoore HS graduate Robert Guzman and Rudy Simpson from Etiwanda HS.

"Perry is as exciting a player as I've been around, since Dante Powell," said Horton of the former Mater Dei HS multi-sport star. "He gets better every day. The young players are more advanced and better than we had thought."

Bischofberger is another young player in that category.

"We like him a lot," said Horton. "He plays beyond his years. He is a complete hitter with power and it will be difficult to keep him out of the lineup somewhere. He's primarily a catcher but his best chance this year will be at third, first or designated hitter."

The Titans play another nationally competitive schedule with 3-game series against Stanford, Alabama, UNLV, Fresno State and Houston in addition to a single game with Arizona State and the traditional home-and-home single games with USC, UCLA, Pepperdine and Loyola Marymount. Then there is the revised Big West Conference scheduling format which will produce a pair of 3-game series between Long Beach State and Cal State Fullerton.

"I like the new format," said Horton. "Long Beach State will be good from the start of this season and might be the best team Dave (Snow) has had there. They filled some gaps and now may have to deal with higher expectations. Nevada is always strong, but they have a lot of innings to replace in their pitching staff."

The Titans open their season with a Jan. 30 exhibition against a professional alumni team featuring some of the 26 major league products the Titans have produced. They also hope to add an annual home date with the Anaheim Angels.

Cal State Fullerton had a depth problem with its 1998 baseball team.

No, the Titans weren't shy of quality players. They just had too many of comparable abilities which made it difficult to pinpoint a regular lineup and/or batting order.

"Our players are to be commended for the way they handled the situation," said second-year Head Coach George Horton.

"Players who aren't playing aren't happy about it and that is to be expected. If they are, then they are not the kind of competitors we want.

"Fortunately, they made me look great many times by contributing at a high level when given the opportunity. Pinch-hitters came through and defensive switches paid dividends."

The 1998 Titans didn't have a marquee player the caliber of a Mark Kotsay, Phil Nevin or Tim Wallach as they have had in the past. They did have two outstanding collegiate pitchers in Benito Flores and Erasmo Ramirez, a dominating, at times, closer in freshman Adam Johnson and a lineup sprinkled with unexpected extra-base power led by outfielder Aaron Rowand, who would become a "sandwich" pick in the baseball draft by the Chicago White Sox between the first and second rounds.

But Rowand was the only Titan to automatically be inserted into the lineup card all season, holding fort in right field. Eventually, freshman second-baseman David Bacani, first-baseman Kevin Duck and Ryan Owens on the left side of the infield became regulars. Ryan Moore was a late-season source of power at third base. Greg Jacobs was a Kotsay-like combo outfielder and pitcher who often was the designated hitter. There was a platoon at catcher and four outfielders -- Chris Beck, Steve Chatham, Pete Fukuhara and Reed Johnson -- fought for playing time next to Rowand.

The early portion of the 1998 schedule was a time for experimentation. Coach Horton tried numerous combinations around the infield and the outfield and freshman lefthander Jon Smith was a find in the starting rotation with veteran transfers Ramirez and Flores. Fullerton lost a pair of rain-affected games at Stanford before sweeping three games at Fresno State and taking a home series (2-1) against Alabama.

When Big West Conference play started, the infield was basically established with Bacani at second base, Owens at shortstop and Moore at third to go with Duck. Reed Johnson and Beck were the primary outfielders with Rowand and Patterson was sharing catching chores with first David Trentine and then Chad Baum.

But Smith developed a sore arm after the opening series vs. UCSB and didn't start again. Kirk Saarloos tried to fill the bill twice before Jacobs settled in as the No. 3 starter vs. Wichita State on Mar. 24. The Titans lost a showdown series (2-1) with Long Beach State on Mar. 20-22 to fall a game behind the 49ers and had to play catch up in the South Division for the next month.

Five losses in seven games left the Titans at 20-11 before the machine got rolling. With Reed Johnson bashing his way into the lineup ahead of Beck and Rowand establishing himself in the cleanup role, Fullerton won six in a row going into a home series with Nevada, the eventual champion of the north.

Fullerton didn't hit much against the Wolf Pack but got enough pitching and a clutch 9th-inning hit from Jacobs to win the series, 2-1. Then the bats got hot. The team averaged more than 11 runs from Easter Sunday through the end of the regular season and a 14-game winning streak included a 3-game sweep at Long Beach State which, in effect, clinched the South Division title.

Despite sweeping another series from Cal Poly SLO and taking 2 of 3 at UCSB around a mid-week win over Loyola Marymount as Chatham caught fire, the Titans were not playing as efficiently the last two weeks of the regular season. The ragged play continued in the Big West Conference Tournament where Fullerton went 2-2 before earning an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament and a No. 2 seed at the South Regional in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Coach Horton gambled in an opening round game against unheralded Harvard, starting Smith, who had pitched only one inning since early in the season. He responded with four brilliant innings and the Titans exploded for a 16-1 win. Ramirez and Adam Johnson combined to beat Tulane, 10-6, and set up a showdown with host LSU. Fullerton belted its way to a 7-0 lead behind Flores in the second inning, only to see LSU hit four home runs in retaliation and rally for four runs in the eighth inning for a 13-11 win.

Fullerton came back that night behind George Carralejo to stay alive with an 11-7 win over Harvard but then faced the prospect of needing two wins over LSU on Sunday. An early 2-1 Fullerton lead behind Jacobs evaporated in a five-homer, 10-run fourth inning and the Tigers advanced to Omaha with a 14-3 victory that left the Titans 7-5 in their final 12 games for a 47-17 season's mark including 25-5 in the Big West.

An interesting footnote to the season was the second annual on-campus appearance by the Anaheim Angels. Using their Opening Day Lineup for two turns through the batting order only two days before the season began, the Angels found themselves trailing, 3-0, as Ruben Jurado was outpitching Allen Watson with five shutout innings. The Angels rallied to win, 8-4, but Jurado was elevated to the Titan travel squad.

Founded in 1969, the Big West Conference consists of universities in California, Nevada, Idaho, Texas, Utah and New Mexico after a move to 12 teams for the 1996-97 academic year.

Members are Boise State (no baseball), Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Cal State Fullerton, Idaho (no baseball), Long Beach State, UC Irvine (no baseball), New Mexico State, North Texas (no baseball), UC Santa Barbara, Utah State (no baseball), Nevada and Pacific.

With Cal Poly San Luis Obispo being the only new member to have baseball, the Big West Conference brought in Sacramento State as an affiliate member to make two four-team divisions: Cal State Fullerton, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Long Beach State and UC Santa Barbara in the Southern Division; Nevada, New Mexico State, Pacific and Sacramento State in the Northern Division.

For the past two years there were divisional standings and then a post-season tournament to determine the league champion and the automatic berth into the NCAA Tournament. In 1999, however, a revised scheduling format will eliminate the divisions and crown the regular season standings leader as conference champion and NCAA tournament entrant. Natural rivals – Fullerton and Long Beach State, for example – will play a pair of 3-game, home-and-home series each year. Teams will play a pair of 3-game series with two other teams on a rotating basis and a single 3-game series with the remaining four teams for a 30-game Big West schedule.

If birth certificates were given to conferences, the one issued to the then Pacific Coast Athletic Association would be dated July 1, 1969. However, the unofficial history of the conference pre-dates that point of time, extending back to 1967.

Cal State Los Angeles, Fresno State, Long Beach State and San Diego State were members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, long recognized as the nation's premier college circuit. That conference was classified college division and therein lay a major source of dissatisfaction. Beginning in 1963, the four institutions had captured 16 national titles. The number swelled to 21 if the mythical football championships were included.

With no more territory to conquer at the college division, a step up to university ranks had to be considered.

At the time, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara and Pacific were members of the West Coast Athletic Conference but were enduring a strained relationship due to the limit of conference sports sponsored. That, plus the fact that national football figures UOP and SJSU were already competing as independents, led the schools to pursue a more broad-based conference alignment.

Therefore, officials of the seven colleges and universities assembled as a body in May of 1969, tied up loose ends and less than two months later the PCAA was born.

Direction in the early days of the conference came from such men as Dr. Stephen Goodspeed, vice-chancellor at UC Santa Barbara, the first president and chairman of the founders committee. J. Kenneth Fagans provided guidance as the league's first commissioner. Jesse T. Hill, one of the nation's most successful directors of athletics at USC, followed Fagans as the conference's first full-time commissioner.

SJSU was already labeled a university division school in all sports

when the PCAA emerged. San Diego State and UOP were granted university division status in 1970 and the remaining conference members shed the college division by 1972.

The conference's first 20 years were characterized by expansion and change. The original PCAA lineup changed in the early years and by 1975, charter members UCSB and CSLA had dropped football and SDSU bolted the conference in football only. In 1974, Cal State Fullerton moved into the conference. By 1977, UC Irvine joined the Big West and UCSB was back in — both as non-football playing institutions — while Utah State became the first non-California member of the circuit, transforming the PCAA into a regional conference.

Nevada-Las Vegas (1981) and New Mexico State (1984) soon followed suit, bringing the league's membership to 10 universities.

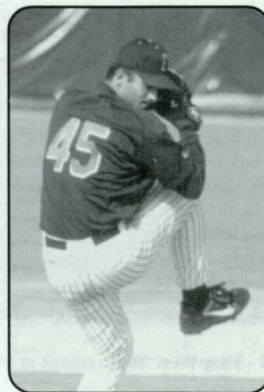
In the fall of 1983, the PCAA became the first western conference to incorporate women's athletic programs into the conference. Charter women's members UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara and UNLV competed in five championships.

By the end of 1985, Pacific, Hawaii, Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, San Diego State, Fresno State and San Jose State had joined the women's conference. The PCAA upped its women's sponsorship to eight championships.

The PCAA began its 20th year of existence by changing its name to the Big West Conference in 1988. With the inclusion of the states of Utah, Nevada, and New Mexico into the loop, the term "Big West" more accurately represented the conference. In addition, Fresno State left the conference and was replaced by the University of Nevada, Reno, in the fall of 1992.

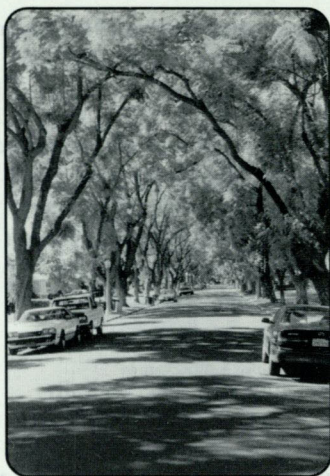
The Big West Conference has had baseball teams advance to the College World Series in nine of the last 11 years and two Big West teams appeared in the 1988 and 1991 tournaments. In addition, college baseball's Player of the Year has come from the Big West in three of the past eight seasons.

Numerous major league players have come out of the PCAA and Big West. The most notable are: Cal State Fullerton - Tim Wallach, Brent Mayne and Mike Schooler; UNLV - Matt Williams, Cecil Fielder and Todd Stottlemire; San Jose State - Mark Langston and Ken Caminiti; Long Beach State - Steve Trachsel and Randy Moffitt; Pacific - Joe Ferguson; UC Santa Barbara - Chris Speier; and UC Irvine - Brady Anderson.

The city of Fullerton was born of the railroads, grew because of oil and citrus, reached adulthood after World War II and is now maturing as an educational center of urbanized Orange County. It is located about 30 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles and about 20 miles inland from the beaches of the Pacific Ocean.

The first settlers were an Indian tribe known as the Gabrielenos, who were on hand when the first Spanish explorers arrived in 1769.

By the 1830s, the expanses of mustard fields and cactus became a part of a vast 35,000 acre grant of Juan Pacific Ontiveras, who sold off land to newcomers from the eastern United States.

The Amerige brothers, George and Edward, entered the picture in 1887 amid rumors of the coming of the California Central Railroad. They brought up land and offered a free right of way to George H. Fullerton, president of the Pacific Land and Improvement Co., a Santa Fe Railway subsidiary. They laid out the town from a stake at what is now downtown, Commonwealth and Harbor Blvd., and named it in honor of its benefactor.

Charles Chapman, a descendant of legendary "Johnny Appleseed," revolutionized the exploding citrus industry by introducing the Valencia orange. Under the same rich agriculture ground, oil was discovered and by 1912, wells extended for 12 miles along the hills into what is now known as Brea.

The city was incorporated in 1904 and Chapman elected mayor. An airfield was established in 1927 and Fullerton Municipal Airport remains a busy general aviation facility.

Another boom began as veterans returned from World War II and demanded homes for their young families. As that growth cycle slowed, the city was able to concentrate on providing necessary amenities and educational opportunities blossomed. Cal State Fullerton joined Fullerton College, which was established in 1913, and it was followed by Western States College of Law, Southern California College of Optometry and Pacific Christian College, now part of Hope International University. All are within a 2 mile radius in the east part of town.

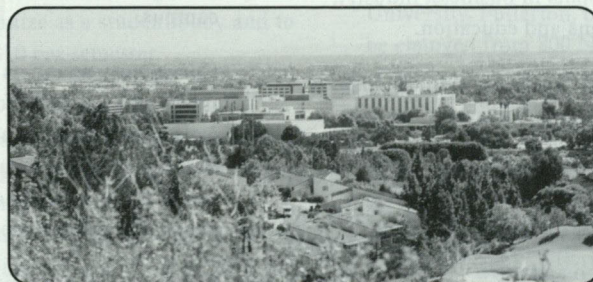

California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County.

Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents - and future - of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 40th year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 128,000 graduates. With 85 per cent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and a branch in Mission Viejo - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 24,000 students currently enrolled and more than 2,200 faculty and staff employees, Cal State Fullerton impacts the community by approximately \$600 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven schools: The Arts; Business Administration and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Science and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, teacher education and

theater. In all there are 91 degree programs - with 44 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Students are provided the best of current practice, theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities, and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 14th nationally in the total overall number of minorities who graduate, with a ranking of 12th for both Asians and Hispanics (No. 3 for both in Communications and No. 4 for Asians in both Education and Business). In California, the university is No. 1 for awarding undergraduate degrees in business and management to Hispanic and Native Americans, and communications degrees to Hispanic, Asian and Native Americans. A No. 2 ranking is held in California for undergraduate education degrees to Hispanic Americans.

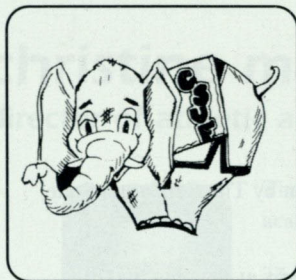
An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing. Classes are held evenings and weekends both on-and off-campus.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. Both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program is aimed chiefly at students, but is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, for which it spearheaded the fund-raising campaign. The center serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In less than four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of Southern California.





"What Exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young

institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the student's decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were

suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

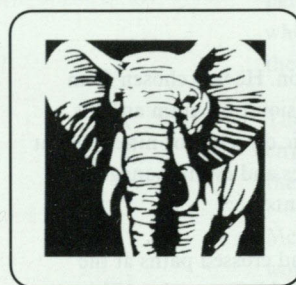


It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year

of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure

from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."



Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew

quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring of 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a Tiffany in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, furthered by former athletic director Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

Finally, there is the matter of the school's name. The name originally for CSUF was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard.

To out-of-staters, the school's name causes confusion because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state - the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens or commas, which is what most of the more than 100,000 graduates recognize. But since there is only one other major institution known as Titans (University of Detroit-Mercy), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

## **dr. milton a. gordon**

### **president, california state university fullerton**



Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on August 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He also serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

## **john easterbrook**

### **athletic director, california state university fullerton**



John Easterbrook is in his fifth year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department, riding the momentum of a most noteworthy inaugural four years. Under his leadership, the Titans have come out in the black budgetarily and have had three teams advance to the NCAA quarterfinals led by the 1995 championship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on September 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 58, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and chief executive officer of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1961) in commerce and law and attended law school for two years before entering coaching.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children, three granddaughters and one grandson. John and his two sons are avid golfers.



## christine mcCarthy

### director of athletic academic services



The Athletic Academic Services department was established at Cal State Fullerton to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletes.

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide academic and effective support services to help each student reach his or her academic goals.

"We want all of our student-athletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Cal State Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advisement, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services available.

The office is staffed by three full-time personnel in McCarthy, Academic Counselor Mike Miller and Administrative Assistant Barbara Kempton. There are also two half-time graduate assistants in Rocky Medina and Tammi Bories, who serve as academic counselors and peer mentors. Kempton has been at CSUF for over 30 years, and her knowledge of the campus and the athletics department is immensely valuable to student-athletes who may need help with administrative paperwork.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "Early Warning" system -- periodic grade checks -- in place which encourages faculty members to notify the office if a student is having problems with coursework and may require academic support.

Student-athletes at CSUF take an average of 4 1/2 to 5 years to graduate, and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist with selecting and registering for classes, referring student to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.

"Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments," said McCarthy. "We developed a re-entry program for former student-athletes who wish to complete their studies, offering them the same services which were available to them when they competed for us."

The office of Athletic Academic Services helps student-athletes feel comfortable in the CSUF environment and McCarthy's experience before coming to the department in July, 1992, helps the orientation process.

McCarthy received her masters degree in social science from Cal State Fullerton in 1987 and has been working in education since 1984. Previous to her appointment in athletics, McCarthy worked for three years as the Assistant Director of the Learning Assistance Resource Center at CSUF before budget cuts eliminated the department. At the LARC, she supervised 80 student employees who were responsible for the various tutorial, strategies classes, computer skills and study skill programs which were available for the university students.

Before coming to Cal State Fullerton, McCarthy was the director of student services at Western State University, College of Law, and before that was the director of student services at the University of Phoenix.

The current Titan Field became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on Apr. 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a doubleheader from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third on-campus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which also has played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Santa Ana and Orange Coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979 when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawaii and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

The current stadium boasts 1,540 permanent chairback seats with another 200 spots available on the concrete steps above each dugout. There is ample standing room around the concourse to the left and right of the press box..

The first stage of the press box pavilion has been completed with the addition of permanent restrooms. The second stage involves the concession stands located in the pavilion with the final stage involving the building of the press box on top of the restrooms and concession stands.

No timetable has been set for the completion of the pavilion, along with additional seating to fit with plans for Cal State Fullerton to eventually host a regional.

Titan Field's playing surface sported a brand-new look for the 1996 season thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turf was added to the warning track. A new nine-foot high, wooden fence was installed in December.

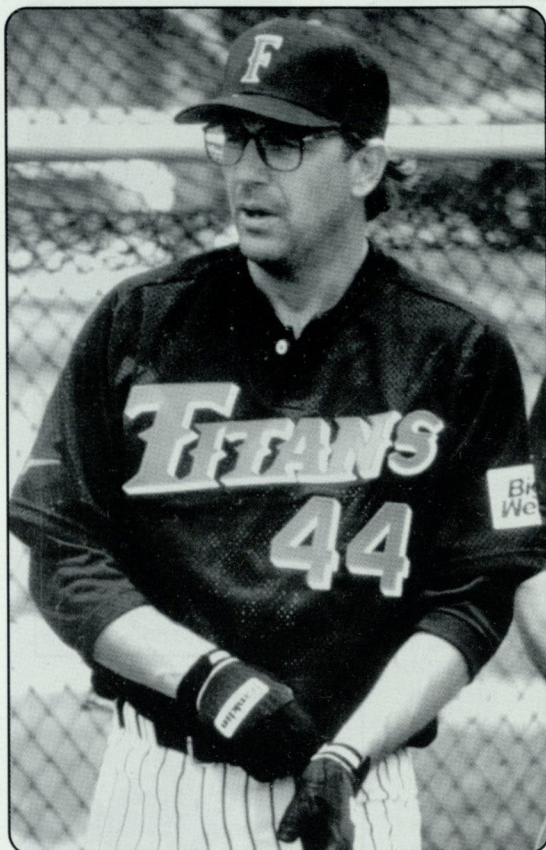
Grass also is planted on the berms where future seating is to be located. Bushes were planted that spell out "CSF" on the first base side and "Titans" on the third base side. Additional landscaping has been placed on the outside of Titan Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.
