



Safety Drill a success; too many 'no flags'

The Village Safety Drill on July 17 was innovative and successful in that Search & Rescue, Radio Communications, and First Aid were well organized and performed their basic functions as planned.

The LVA Board of

The LVA Board of Directors, along with qualified advisors, manned the Command Post in the Pavilion, and Certified Ham Operators maintained contact with the Cobra radio operators in each Village, who were busy assessing

simulated damage throughout the 2,136 homes.

An improved data bank of the disabled population was constantly reviewed by two computer operators. The 44 Village Coordinators radioed in their discoveries of pre-planted "emergency icons," (signs: house on fire, first-aid needed) throughout Leisure Village, as well as reporting the "no-flag" addresses of non-participants in each Village.

Sadly, there were 278 homes without any flags this time. This was far too many, even for mid-summer. It indicates that a lot

more effort is needed to properly support the volunteers who are practicing for a real disaster or emergency—to provide necessary assistance for everyone in this Village. By contrast, the two Villages sporting and pre-testing the new red ribbon "Donnel Flags" participated to the fullest.

"This was like a normal emergency drill for anywhere in this country — in school, business or industry — but some of our residents still don't understand that all of these exercises are for their own best interest and personal safety," exclaimed

Ken Curry, Co-Chair of the ESO. "We must emphasize how important it is for everyone to participate, for everyone to back up and support their volunteer helpers.

"Some residents may need more notification.
Others either forgot, didn't notice, of didn't care enough to put out their flags. Next time, this organization just has to do a much better job of promotion and education so that everyone is aware and participates!"

This is in response to the letter of Felice Perkins, which appeared in the July edition of ILV:

Everything in her letter concerning reverse mort-gages was true or close to the truth. That being said, it is still a valuable alternative to many residents, whether they use the funds for Village payments or other reasons. There is no generalized answer to use a reverse mortgage. It is not for everybody, especially if you are a candidate for an extended care facility.

The sums loaned are merely a percentage of your equity based on the actuary of the youngest of the owners, usually the wife. The remaining equity is sometimes quite substantial, depending on the value of the house. Right now, interest rates are extremely low, and the rate that the equity is receding to pay the loan is very slow.

One thing is sure. You will always remain in your home as long as one spouse is alive with no out of pocket loan payments.

I think Mrs. Sweeney's recommendation is not frivolous and may be a godsend for some people.

I am not a broker or lender, but I have taken advantage of this kind of loan. If you need some information, please call, or I can recommend experts.

Art and I have replaced the very effective Kelwin leadership team and appointed Ray McAtee in charge of the Search and Rescue Team after the sudden death of George Stutsky. We have transformed the Village into six emergency sectors which provides improved tactical response procedures. More members of ESO participate in Camarillo VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Assisting in Disasters) meetings, and we welcome back the Board of Directors to our Command Post, along with the Security Chief and the General Manager.

All five of these Board members have worked with the Leisure Village ESO in the past, and most of them have a great deal of experience in handling emergency and disaster work outside of this village, as well. Clair

Huffman has been a longtime member of the **Emergency Services** Committee and Board Liaison; Jack Prosen and Bob Ellis are former Village Coordinators; Dick Griswold was part of the ESO organization; and Mike Shapiro has a long background of working with ESO programs and supply budgets. More importantly, these Village leaders have conducted safety and disaster preparation programs before their Leisure Village retirement for the military, business, industry, and government.

Everyone in this Village stands to benefit, and the volunteers in the ESO are well-pleased. Of course, there are two sides to this coin. Early on the morning of the July 17 Disaster Drill, this Board of Directors arrived at the Pavilion and started asking questions and expressing concerns and

seeking solutions about some of the problems that the ESO has been working hard to resolve. In particular, on their way to the Command Center (30 minutes before the Drill), the Directors noted a lot of homes without the "A-OK" flags out in front. "Why?" they asked, almost in unison. We explained a few of the problems of transitional new leadership and told them we were testing a new Red-Ribbon Flag which had brought an excellent response in another village at the last drill.

"Where?" they asked, and then took off and walked to the neighboring Village 6 to see for themselves.

And then, when the Drill was over and the Debriefing Session was winding-down, Dick Griswold took the microphone. He offered appreciation to the many volunteers but also expressed his concerns. He then requested a written report about the "No Flag Count" because resident safety and well-being is very high on the Board's priority list.

Now, part of this report has been written: a graph showing the "no flag count" for each of the Villages. The list is for both of the last two drills (Feb. 20 and July 17) and has been submitted. The count was bad in some of the Villages. Not participating in a safety drill is a little bit self-defeating and not very mature. Retirement is certainly no excuse for ignoring the safety procedures of this Village. It's so easy to read pages 8 through 12 in your Village Phone Book to understand how vital it is to quickly assess this Village's need after an earthquake or a major wind and firestorm, when the cell phones are oversaturated, the power is off, and your neighbors need help.

The flag count is how the ESO can request emergency vehicles or teams, right away, by radio. We have been highly commended by DART (Disaster and Rescue Teams) and by the City of Camarillo for our early-alert procedure. We use 44 Cobra radio operators and several Ham radio operators, plus a computer data base about our disabled and caregivers to get this important data to the emergency people who need to know about it in a hurry

We have an equipped First-Aid and Medical team with gurneys and cots. We have RV backup. We have a new, insulated storage center with distribution carts, courtesy of the Women's Club. And there are many important efforts underway, especially building and strengthening our "buddy system." But we honestly need and would appreciate 100 percent resident support whenever we are conducting our volunteer-training emergency drills.

Residents should not say, "We're retired. We're old. We would do it if there was a real emergency." Some people forget what to do in a chaotic situation, even in our Leisure Village. Some people seem to think that putting out a flag about three times a year is a real imposition, regardless of all of the work and constant preparation that the volunteers are doing for them, for each and every resident. Even on Sept. 11, 2001, many people were saved because they had walked down those twin tower stairs on many previous occasions just to be prepared.

Our next drill is in October. We know that we are going to do much better, come next October. We know that there will be a lot more promotion when we announce the drill for next October. We know that all of our new residents and all of our new Village Coordinators and Phone-Tree Helpers will do a much better job in October! We know that this Board will want another report about October! We know that we will have more Villages with red-ribbon flags up at the October Drill! In fact, we just might have to use an old movie title for that next Drill: "The Search for Red (Flag) October."

Most Villagers will still be using the regular white or colored rag flags until enough of the ribbons are assembled by volunteers and distributed to one Village at a time.







in the middle of July. The ESO almost canceled out because of the number of people away from home at that time.

"It was decided that we really ought to see what would happen in an emergency situation where we would be understaffed and when many residents would be away. This created some unexpected handicaps and mistakes, as well. But, this is why safety drills are conducted under different circumstances. They are learning experiences for the volunteers and for the residents," said Co-Chair Art Thomson.

Throughout most populated spots everywhere in America, there are frequent disaster safety drills. They are for violent fire storms, high winds, hurricanes, tornados, and especially bad earthquakes in this part of the country. No Villager ought to ignore these short, infrequent (three times a year) safety drills. Being retired is no excuse for ignoring safety.

There are more than 100 volunteers in active service for each of these drills and they expect resident support. Some of these volunteers are the phone- tree helpers who phone five neighboring homes to remind residents to put out an "A-OK flag" so that the local Village Coordinator can save time and quickly go by and check the other homes which might be experiencing difficulties in a real disaster. This flag-check is the speediest method for assessing needs throughout the 2,000-plus homes in Leisure Village.

Also, in the Village Phone Book, on Pages 8 through 12, there is a helpful outline on how every resident should be prepared for a real disaster situation: medicine, food, water, lights, pets and other personal needs.

For the first time in Leisure Village, the new Red Cross First Aid "Triage Tag"

was introduced into this simulated emergency drill. Information radioed in by Coordinator Fred Sass was forwarded through the Radio Shack to Nurse Gertie Lupo to identify an emergency victim's needs. This valuable new procedure will be expanded in future drills.

Gale Blanchard positioned his RV at one of the six sector locations in the Village and participated in forwarding Cobra and Ham Radio Communications to the Radio Shack by the Pavilion and then on to the LVA Board at the Command Center. "Hot spots" were identified on a large Village map with color-coded thumb tacks, and decisions

were made as to what actions should be taken.

All of the Board Members visited Village 6, nearby, to see the 100 percent cooperation and effectiveness of the new red-ribbon flags which were paid for by the Your Neighborhood Care Group. Chuck Donnel and his flag committee assembled these flags with two Velcro hangers: one for the stucco and one for inside the garage or other storage location.

After the drill, the volunteers gathered in the Pavilion for a debriefing session. Several good ideas were generated from the experiences of the volunteers for future drills.

ast year's CC&R Lichanges regarding LV insurance created a very serious problem for us, LV homeowners, in that we don't know exactly what coverage we need for our HO-6 Homeowner Insurance — nor are we able to convey this need unambiguously to our insurance providers.

For almost a year now, several attempts have been made to get the LV Board and the LV Insurance Committee to identify and provide the required information. Ed Evans made a valiant effort in his letter to ILV on Jan. 17 to identify (with our General Manager's help) some of the items that HO-6 should cover. That was a good start, but the list is far from complete and is not official!

What the homeowners need from LVA specifically, and in writing, is:

What parts of our home structure, and what items - attached to our structure or not - need to be covered by the HO-6 homeowner policy.

The above list must also be accompanied by a clear statement that LV insurance does not cover these items.

This is required by HO-6 providers to make certain that homeowners are insured for these items!

The reason for this latter requirement arises from my personal experience. When I submitted to my HO-6 insurer a (partial) list of items that LV insurance would not cover (based on some statements voiced by previous Boards) - such as drapes, wall cabinets, wall paint, carpets, etc. - I was informed, in writing, that my HO-6 insurance will cover only those items that my LV insurance policy specifically excludes!

Unless our Board provides this information, we may be in a terrible spot should a disaster strike. I ask all homeowners to join me in this appeal to the Board.




