A dairy and 300 Jersey cows in Village 22

The first recorded owner of the land now occupied by Leisure Village was Jose Pedro Ruiz, a Mexican soldier and native of Spain who came to Alta California with Padre Junipero Serra and the Portola expedition in 1769. In 1837, the Mexican government granted him the ten thousand acre Rancho Calleguas. With the conclusion of the Mexican War in 1848, this area became part of the United States. The Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo confirmed the land grants under U.S. law. His son, Jose Gabriel Ruiz inherited the land in 1849.

Juan Camarillo was born in Mexico in 1812. At the age of twenty-two years, he joined the Hijar-Padres colonization expedition to Alta California. He married Martina Hernandez, a great granddaughter of Jose Ortega who also arrived with Portola. In 1875, Juan Camarillo purchased the land from the Ruiz family. Rancho Calleguas would become Rancho Camarillo.

Adolfo and Juan Camarillo inherited the land and the ranch transitioned into a diverse agricultural business using advanced farming techniques for lima beans, barley, corn, alfalfa, walnuts, apricots, avocados, citrus, Ranch produced 34,000 sacks 1,000 lbs. of milk every hour.

The Camarillo Ranch Dairy was established in 1901 near Village 22 with 300 Jersey cows, the largest dairy in the county. It was run by a six-horsepower steam engine with a capacity hogs and cattle. In 1909, the of separating the cream from

It was considered a model dairy and produced approximately 2,300 lbs. of butter per month. The butter was sold, but most of the milk was fed to livestock. Due to the lack of refrigeration, each dairy served only its own local area. At one time there were over 80 dairies in Ventura County.

The Camarillo family sold most of the Camarillo Rancho property in 1963, keeping only a few acres around the ranch house. The bulk of the land was developed into housing tracts and commercial and industrial buildings. The Pardee Corporation subdivided 1,312 acres in Mission Oaks. Leisure Technology, Inc. began building houses on 375 acres in 1973 creating our Leisure Village.

Vote by Mail begins this month

Villagers don't have to wait until November 3rd to vote in the 2020 Election. Ballots will arrive by mail to all registered voters in early October, and election officials are urging that they be marked and returned by mail - offered as a choice for voters concerned about potential health risks of inperson contact at polling places. The option is being promoted by a national VBM campaign, which stands for Vote by Mail, and can be accomplished in a few simple steps.

Track your ballot by signing up at WheresMyBallot.sos. ca.gov and see when it is mailed, received, and counted.

VBM recommends that citizens vote early by mail or at polling places which will be open on October 31, November 1, and November 2 from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM and on November 3 from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

■ How will the Presidential election impact real estate?

The year 2020 will be remembered as one of the most challenging times of our lives. A worldwide pandemic, a recession causing historic unemployment, and a level of social unrest perhaps never seen before have all changed the way we live. Only the real estate market seems to be unaffected, as a new forecast projects there may be more homes purchased this year than last year.

ABOUT REAL ESTATE By Sharron Parker

As we come to the end of this tumultuous year, we are preparing for perhaps the most contentious presidential election of the century. Today, it is important to look at the impact past presidential election years have had on the real estate market.

Is there typically a drop-off in home sales during a presidential election year?

BTIG, a research and analysis company, looked at new home sales from 1963 through 2019 in their report titled One House, Two House, Red House, Blue House. They noted that in non-presidential

years, there is a -9.8% decrease in November compared to October. This is the normal seasonality of the market, with a slowdown in activity that is usually seen in fall and winter. However, it also revealed that in presidential election years, the typical drop increases to -15%. But these sales are not typically lost forever, just delayed until after the election.

Will it matter who is elected? To some degree, but not in the overall number of home sales. As mentioned above, consumer confidence plays a significant role in the desire to buy a home. How may consumer

confidence impact the housing market post-election? The BTIG report covered that as well: "A change in administration might benefit trailing blue county housing dynamics. The re-election of President Trump could continue to propel red county outperformance." Overall sales should not be impacted in a significant way.

If mortgage rates remain near all-time lows, the economy continues to recover, and unemployment continues to decrease, the real estate market should remain strong up to and past the election.

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



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

What kind of wine is refreshing on a hot day? We enjoy a cold glass of rosé wine or an Italian favorite, the Aperol spritz.

We discovered the Aperol spritz in Italy where it's practically the national drink. It was hot touring Tuscany, and we liked to stop at sidewalk cafes for a breather. Prosecco, a moderately priced Italian sparkling wine, was the usual option. It's a bit fruity, and that's refreshing when served well chilled. We saw others having a drink called an Aperol spritz. Low in alcohol, aromatic with citrus and slightly bitter, Aperol is a liqueur that pairs perfectly with Prosecco for a refreshing aperitif.

To make one, fill tall wine glasses with ice, add equal parts of Aperol and Prosecco, then a splash of soda and garnish with an orange slice. It has a beautiful coral color and is so refreshing on a hot day.

Rosé wine is another great warm weather wine. If you've been to the south of France, you know I'm not talking about white zinfandel. Both are pink wines, made from red grapes, using essentially the same process to get a tinge of color from the skins before pressing off the juice for further fermentation. White zinfandel was developed by accident when fermentation for an experimental zinfandel rosé "got stuck," leaving some residual sugar. It was bottled, sold out instantly, and a new wine was born. Though maligned by many wine lovers, it eventually became the gateway for today's renaissance of rosé wine in the U.S.

Rosé wine is a dry pinkish wine. In southern France, it's typically made with grenache grapes. Some years ago we returned from the south of France with a real hankering for it, and it was nowhere to be found. Until recently, it was difficult to find any rosé in the US, except the occasional Mateus or Lancers, made in Portugal. Luckily rosé wines have become trendy, and it is now widely produced in the US. Many wineries now produce lovely rosé wines from red grapes they grow. Our favorite is rosé made from pinot noir grapes. Rosé is a beautiful color and is lower in alcohol than full bodied The very Italian and very refreshred wines. You can find rosé wines ing Aperol Spritz. by the glass on most wine lists now. Try it sometime.

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



MENS GOLF

Despite the best efforts of Landscape Superintendent Mike Undem and his golf course maintenance team, most of our tee boxes continue to be dug up with divots that show up almost as soon as they are repaired.

Course regulations posted at the first tee clearly state "wooden tees" are to be used at all tee boxes.

Club President Malinow thinks the divots are not caused by members of the two Village golf clubs who, he says, "Respect the course and want it to be in the best condition possible."

Rather, he suspects the damage is caused mostly either by resident "weekend golfers" who ignore the regulations and/or by non-resident golfers related to elderly residents. These golfers gain entry as visitors but head straight for the golf course, usually not accompanied by the resident whose name they use to enter the matter, at least potentially harm-



We want to remind you to VOTE on Tuesday, November 3rd, and ALERT & INFORM you about four ballot items that could pose threats to property owners in California

Proposition 15 - Tax on Commercial and Industrial Properties for Education and Local Government Funding Initiative

- Proposition 15 is a treacherous "split roll" property tax, a direct attack on Proposition 13. It repeals Prop 13 base value protection for all commercial and industrial properties statewide and requires reassessment to market value of business properties, resulting in tax increases on businesses where Californians work and shop. Those higher costs are passed on to consumers.
- Proposition 15 would raise prices, increase the cost of living and put countless jobs at risk as companies cut back or leave the state.

The proponents of this measure are seeking to weaken Proposition 13, and we can guess why. They can come after homeowners next once the proverbial camel's nose is in the tent. Protect Prop. 13.

Don't be fooled when "split roll" proponents say Prop. 15 only hurts businesses!

- When business costs go up, so do the prices you pay for goods and services.
- The "split roll" would make California's brick-and-mortar businesses increasingly uncompetitive with online businesses based in other states, where costs are far lower, and would accelerate business flight out of California.

Proposition 18 - Permits 17-Year-Olds to Vote in Certain Elections

- This ballot measure would change the voting age in California to allow 17-year-olds to vote in primaries and special elections if they will turn 18 by the date of the next general election.
- While some states allow this, California is different than other states because under Prop. 13 and Prop. 218, *tax increases must go on the ballot for voter approval*. These proposed tax increases are frequently on primary and special election ballots.
- Proposition 18 would allow high school students to vote on tax increases. This is unwise! The voting age in California should not be changed.

Proposition 19 - Property Tax Transfers, Exemptions, and Revenue for Wildfire Agencies and Counties Amendment

- Prop19 takes away a significant estate planning tool. Since 1986, CA residents have been able to transfer principal residences & limited other property to their children without increasing their property taxes (Prop 58). Prop 193 gave the same protection to transfers between grandparents and grandchildren if the children's parents are deceased.
- Prop 19 eliminates Prop 58 and a similar measure, Proposition 193 and would require property transferred within families to be reassessed to market value as of the date of transfer, resulting in a huge property tax increase for long-held family homes. The only exception is if the children move into the home within a year and make it their principal residence.
 - The bait for this measure is an expanded portability of Propositions 60 & 90.
 - Under current law, homeowners age 55 and older may move to a replacement home and keep the lower property tax bill from their previous home.
 - There are some limitations on this tax break: the replacement home must be either in the same county (Proposition 60, 1986) or in a county that accepts the transfers (Proposition 90, 1988). Also, the replacement home must be of equal or lesser value, and a homeowner may transfer the base-year value only once in a lifetime.
 - Proposition 19 eliminates the value and location restrictions and allows three transfers instead of one.
- Expanded portability on its own is desirable, but the value must be weighed against the trade off losing the exclusion from reassessment for parent-child transfers that is in the State Constitution. The price is just too high.

Proposition 21 - Local Rent Control Initiative

- This ballot measure would change state law to allow any city in California to pass expansive rent control laws. This could lead to restrictive laws previously seen in Santa Monica and Berkeley, where a landlord couldn't even raise an apartment's rent to market rent when a tenant moved out.
- If rental housing is made less profitable due to rent control, less units will be built in the future.
- Allowing local rent boards to implement any rent control measures they want could lead to restrictions not just on Apartments but on Single Family Homes as well!
