

DO IT RIGHT

If the Village planning experts deem it necessary that the swimming pool have a third walking lane, please, at least, get it right! The 31/2 ft. depth along the East side would be too shallow.

Exercising in water is beneficial because of its resistance to movement. In 3 ½ ft. depth, the water would reach the waist of an average size person. To get beneficial resistance for either walking or exercise, the water needs to be at upper chest depth. Also, wet upper body exposure during much of the year can be uncomfortably cold. Currently, most people walking widths are in 4 to 41/2 ft. depth, just inside the blue tile line, which is 12 ft. from the end.

If the depth in the planned configuration started at 4 feet, the walkers would then not be interfering with swimmers in the next lane.

Retrospection



As homeowners in Leisure Village, we own the land and patio areas on which our homes stand. But we must remember also that we are all co-owners of everything else as managed by the Leisure Village Association. Two standing committees of the Association, the Finance Committee and the Insurance Committee, function in areas usually found in schools of business administration.

The Finance Committee, chaired by Dan Olonoff, performs analyses of financial/accounting records and performance. Between annual audits by a C.P.A. firm, this committee audits L.V.A. records periodically, recommends adjustments when needed, reviews status of reserve funds, and makes recommendations to the Board and General Manager about annual budgets.

If these tasks were performed by an outside firm, the costs would be significant. Financial management and/or accounting backgrounds are desirable qualities for membership on the Finance Committee that performs quietly and effectively as it goes about its valuable work for the Association.

The Insurance Committee chaired by Ed Evans, a genuine old pro, provides a significant service by reviewing our insurance program and needs. The committee seeks bids from various insurers, evaluates the bids in terms of our experience and needs in variety of insurable areas, and makes recommendations to the Board and management. Of course, knowledgeof the insurance field and economics are desirable qualities for committee membershipbutinterest is a necessary quality, too.

When committees such as these two get down to their nitty, gritty tasks, they are essentially watching over theirown money as homeowners and Association members. This observation is true of all





CIMIS WEATHER STATION

The structure looking like a lunar landing gear beside the fourth tee on the Leisure Village golf course is CIMIS, (pronounced simis) and is the new LV weather station. CIMIS is the acronym for California Irrigation Management Information System. The station gathers and stores up to four months of information on wind speed and direction, solar radiation, air and soil temperature and humidity, and precipitation. It has its own lightning rod and a

solar panel to charge its self-contained batteries. Control and collection of the information gathered at the station, is accomplished with a single dedicated telephone line. The station, not yet in operation, will furnish data for both state and government agencies along with the Water Management Project currently under study by the Engineering Advisory Committee.

(There is no limit on the number of words; just 2 standard sized pieces of paper). Deadline for entries is April 15.






