

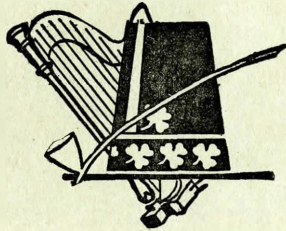

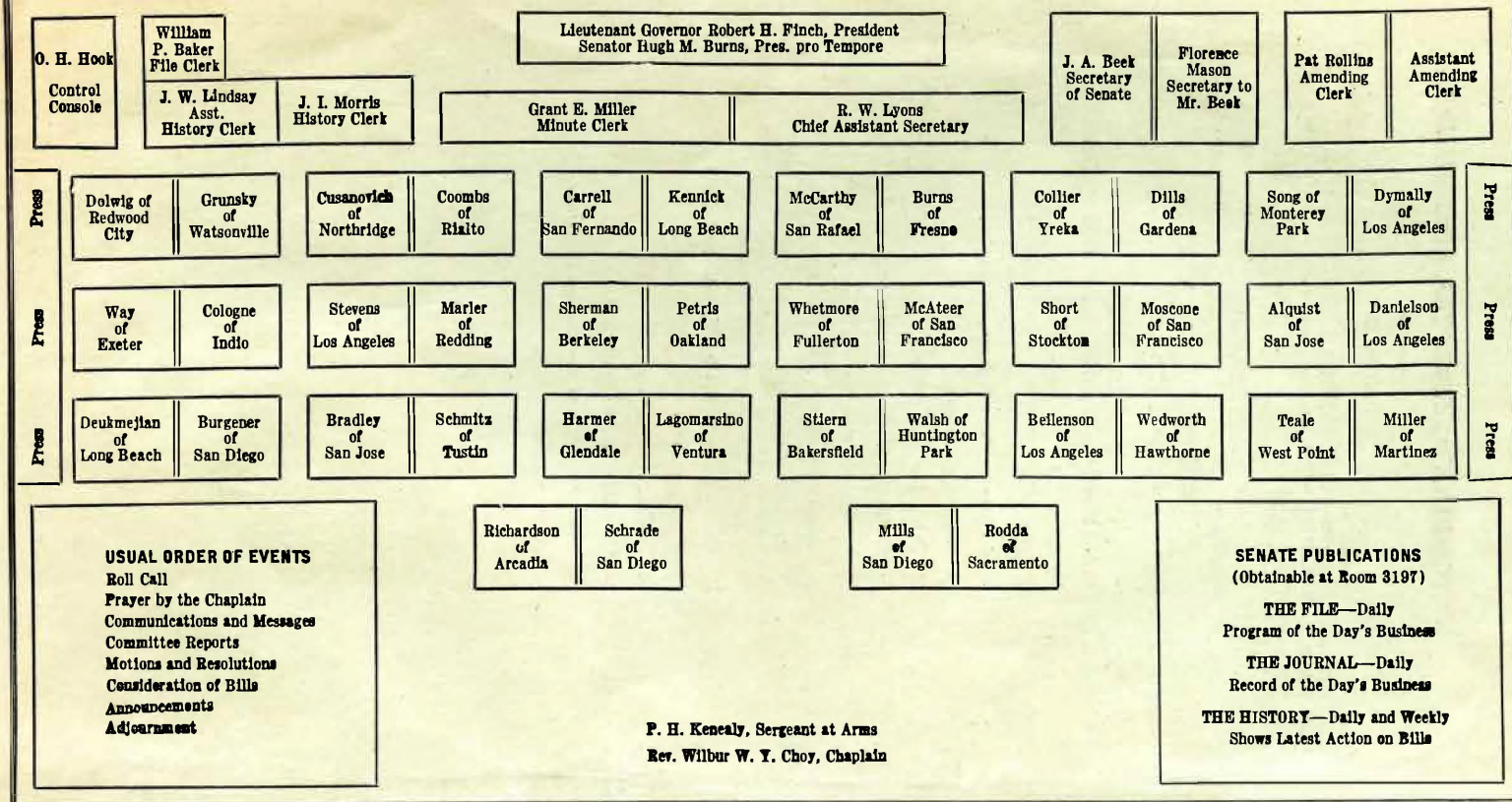

**FIRST DAY ON WHICH SENATE BILLS MAY BE
CONSIDERED IN COMMITTEE OR ACTED
UPON BY THE SENATE**

Article IV, Section 8(a), California Constitution

No bill other than the Budget Bill, shall be heard by any committee or acted upon by either house until 30 calendar days have elapsed following the date the bill was first introduced; provided, that this provision may be dispensed with by the consent of three-fourths of the members of the house.
