

# Readers respond to opinion piece, board's actions

Some recent spoken and printed opinions, are just that, and are not based on true facts. The facts are these:

The United States Constitution protects against infringement of rights by GOVERNMENT. It does not extend to private property or enterprises. The California Constitution is likewise limited. Leisure Village Association may limit things here that are considered free speech outside, fact!

Claims of "sexual harassment" or "hostile work environment" are serious. Statutes protect the COMPLAINANT. Attorneys eagerly sue under these statutes, because of usually large settlements. Attorneys warn of this and usually, the complainant prevails. Fact!

The Americans with Disabilities Act requires "reasonable accommodation" for handicapped persons. Compromises with Common Interest Communities have been made. One occurred in California

with a community having a golf course. Since persons not members of the community — guests, etc. — were allowed to play, the community was therefore operating a "public facility" under the law and was required to provide "accommodation" to handicapped persons. That was enforced, even though the rest of the facility remained "private." Fact!

Directors are unpaid volunteers, protected by statute to some degree, from suit due to mistakes made in good faith. This protection is in the "Good Business Judgment Rule," found in the Corporations Code. It states that such persons cannot be held liable for errors in performance if they have acted in good faith and considered recommendations from experts in the field. Such volunteers, often not experienced managers, make mistakes. LVA carries "Directors and Officers" insurance policies that insure directors against losses due to errors or omissions. There is, however, a catch. If outside

expertise has been obtained, and the Board chooses to ignore it, there is no coverage. The directors are at personal risk. Fact!

An employee complaint of sexual harassment or hostile workplace requires the management, by law, to remove the cause. Failing to do so is a violation of law, and supervisors are PERSONALLY liable for any awards. The employer is prohibited by law from covering those expenses. Fact!

The complaint puts the manager and the corporation at risk of suit. The protections provided by statute and insurance are limited. Those who decry the loss of their rights in this case demand that the General Manager and Board of Directors protection of the Association from liability be reversed, placing the General Manager and the Board members at personal risk! Fact!

As an LVA Board Member for four years, I would never bend to the





opinions of my constituents (the entire membership of Leisure Village, Inc.) to place the Association at risk. I most certainly would not place myself personally at risk in the process. The suggestion that it would be my duty to do so is absurd, and that is a fact!

I read with interest your recent opinion piece about transparency issues with the current Board of Directors. While I am in favor of transparency in all levels of government (including our BOD), and at the risk of continuing the controversy, I feel compelled to take issue with two of your comments/ conclusions.

First of all, I am not an attorney, but over 20 years in corporate management and numerous hours of lectures by our attorneys on two of the subjects of the article convinces me that you are off base in your comments about the artwork removal and the golf cart issue.

Although it is true that the library

is a facility intended for use by the residents, it also forms a part of the workplace for our employees. Like it or not (and frankly I do NOT like it), federal law protects workers from a hostile work environment and what could be considered sexual harassment — and the interpretation of the law pretty much says that sexual harassment and hostile work environments are pretty much in the eye of the beholder. Once the complaint is filed, it must be dealt with rapidly or you are subject to lawsuit and federal government investigation.

Further, the law states that once an individual is sued, the company may not provide legal assistance! In other words, if the General Manager had not acted and a suit was filed, he would be on the hook for the cost of an attorney which, needless to say, would not be insignificant. Given that, what choice did he have? Any recourse to First Amendment rights have long since been discharged by the courts.

As for the golf cart issue, the ADA

requires reasonable accommodation for handicapped people. If the Board tries the use of golf carts on a limited basis and then decides that the trial did more harm than good, there would be a valid argument that we tried "reasonable accommodation" and found that it didn't work. Does this mean that the Board can ignore written rules? Yes it does, if it means that we comply with federal law. Surely we can all agree that federal law trumps our CG&Rs and other local rules.

Finally, much of this controversy could have been avoided if there was clearer communications all around.

However, in doing so, the board was acting on behalf of the membership, thereby making the members the real clients. As a result, it can be argued that if we are the clients, then the attorney-client privilege exists between the attorney, the board and the membership. Under this argument, the board has no right to claim the privilege against the membership.

That said, the board is empowered to make decisions on behalf of the membership, and when they do, we must accept those decisions until we can express our unhappiness with their decisions and actions under the Leisure Village rules and regulations.





# Homestead Declaration protects equity if owner loses lawsuit

What is a Homestead Declaration? A properly recorded Homestead Declaration protects the homeowner from losing a portion of his or her equity due to lawsuits that result in judgment liens being attached to their property. All homeowners that reside in their home and use it as their principal place of residence are eligible for a Homestead Declaration.

The equity that is protected from lien attachment is as follows: Each person owning an interest in the home, such as an unmarried coowner, is \$50,000; head or member of family is \$75,000; single (65 years and older or disabled) is \$100,000; husband and wife (when one or both is 65 or disabled) is \$100,000. The California State Legislature

has periodically raised the amount of entitlement. Homeowners will automatically receive the amount of the increase without having to refile additional paperwork.

If you sell your home, the Homestead is automatically removed, and if you change your principal place of residence and you record a new Homestead, the first Homestead will cease to exist.

Items not covered are judgments for spouse or child support, tax liens and mechanics liens, judgments recorded before your Homestead and loans or debts secured by the property (Deed of Trust).



# La Brea Tar Pits center of Los Angeles history

Here we go again!

This is a piece I wrote several years ago, but I thought the new and some old members of our Village might enjoy it again.

Today we take a stroll around the La Brea Tar Pits and see what we can

First I will attempt a brief history of Los Angeles and Los Angeles County. Originally the tar pits were located about seven miles west of Los Angeles. They are still in the same place, but urban sprawl has put them smack in the middle of downtown Los

The tar pits were originally described as "The Salt Creek Oilfields." They contain one of the richest, best preserved and most studied assemblages of Pleistocene vertebrates. They include at least 59 species of mammals and more than 135 species of birds. In addition to the vertebrates, they include many

species of plants, mollusks and many, many types of insects - over 660 species in all.

Tar pits form when crude oil seeps to the surface through fissures in the earth's crust. The oil evaporates, leaving heavy tar or asphalt in sticky pools.

Tar from the pits was used by early native Americans as a glue and waterproof caulking for baskets and canoes. Later the tar was mined by Westerners and used for roofing. Scientists have been extremely successful in their excavation of the pits, and today the George C. Page Museum of La Brea is right next door, where a huge number of fossils are displayed. The Page Museum is part of the National Museum of Los Angeles County and is well worth visiting.

The history of Los Angeles began some 10,000 to 20,000 years before the first Europeans arrived. Hunters and gatherers of many Aztec and Indian tribes populated the area.

Around 1769 the first Mexican and Spanish settlers began to arrive. Among the most notable were Gaspar de Portola and Junipero Serra. Commanding the soldiers was the Mexican Rivera v Moncada. In addition, there were 80 indigenous people from Baja, California, 25 Catalan soldiers, a group of Franciscan missionaries and a dozen artisans. A permanent colonial settlement was established on September 4, 1781, as El Pueblo de Nuestra Senora la Reina de los Angeles di Porciuncula. It was named in honor of the shrine to the Virgin Mary, Santa Maria degli Angeli, Our Lady of the Angels in Assisi, Italy.

The construction of a Presidio and town was the project of Governor Felipe de Neve, mandated by King Charles III of Spain. The city was built on the Rio de Porciuncula, the broad river running through the valley, now known as the Los Angeles

good health, and used governmentissued rationing coupons to purchase gasoline, sugar and other necessary items during World War II.

In comparison, the privileged offspring of these pioneers had their own bedroom, drove cars or rode the bus to high school, participated in the sexual revolution and largely lived on credit rather than saving money upfront for nonessential material items.

Back in the day, my grandfather never heard of sick leave or paid vacations, and if you didn't work you didn't get paid, whereas I expected both as a matter of course.

These lifestyle characteristics and behavioral differences continue to be overtly obvious in Leisure Village, and in a few cases present minor conflicts that need to be addressed from time to

A phrase often heard from older residents, for example — a group that for good reason is slow to accept change — represents a largely unified perspective that the current rules and regulations have worked well for 35 years, and the community at large therefore need not amend the statutes.

The younger folks, on the other hand, oftentimes lack patience, and are much more impulsive by demanding change to meet their individual desires, hence the occasional reference by some to the Baby Boomers as the Me Generation.

One only needs to attend any one of a number of committee meetings to witness these differences in perspective between the comparatively old and older seniors.

Fortunately for our community, from strictly a financial perspective - particularly in view of the recent financial meltdown related to the housing market — a significant percentage of the homeowners and residents in Leisure Village are comprised of the Greatest Generation, average age of about 76 years, most of whom are not only extremely conservative in their spending habits, but also own their homes outright.

While many other neighboring homeowner associations are struggling with revenues needed for basic maintenance, our community remains comparatively solvent due in part to this important factor. Our reserves are in good shape at the present time largely because members of the Greatest Generation demanded in past years that we have money in the bank, rather than borrowing against the future, and to those gray-haired members we owe our thanks for having the foresight to keep our community out of debt.

As a side note, the quickest and easiest way to spot an authentic member of the Greatest Generation is at the grocery store, where the "little old lady in tennis shoes" stands in the checkout line with a handful of coupons, and carefully watches the cashier to insure that not a penny more than the advertised sale price is charged for any single item, and if that citizen is about 92, 5 feet tall and wearing glasses, she could be my mom, or perhaps even one of our other neighbors from here in the Village.







# Village's Billiard Room no hall from 'Hustler'

When most people visualize a pool hall they think of names like Minnesota Fats and Fast Eddy Felton, where hustlers and wannabes ply their trade in a smoke-filled environment, while onlookers spit tobacco juice on the sawdust floor and drink straight shooters of whisky backed by beer.

In places where women were occasionally allowed in such



establishments, they were long-legged beauties exhibiting ample cleavage and used only to serve the needs of men in the once-male dominated environment.

Although the description may have been accurate in the past (so I've been told), nothing could be further from the truth when peeking through the windows of the Leisure Village Billiard Room, where smoking and drinking are prohibited, and women often outnumber the men, both in numbers and skill.

Truth be known, and based on figures provided by Vice President Kathy Wirtz, of the 133 current members of the club, some 66 — or approximately 50 percent are women — and three of the five officers in the club are also of the fairer sex.

Historic records provided by Marilyn Holthouse, Village historian, suggest that a competitive pool league was first started in our community in 1977 (Leisure Village was started in 1973) with each village sporting a team, and the best players from each also competed against other teams outside the community.


The more modern Billiard Club as we know it today, however, was initiated in 1980, with many of the furnishings being provided by club members, including several of the tables. Ernie Ohmstedt helped build the hanging light fixtures fastened above each table, and most of the other accessories were donated by various members over time, not to mention that the Village patio was paid for and built via donations and volunteer labor (other clubs and groups also provided support) under the guidance of Bill Foeller, current club president.

The club also provides valuable social interaction on a daily basis, with free lessons provided.

If you are even remotely interested in becoming part of the mixed crowd that hangs out around the pool hall, Thursday after about 6:30 p.m. is the best time for the "meet and greet" sessions that include snacks, billiards, stimulating conversation around the fire pit, and/or a fast-paced dice game





A source of protein (chicken, beef, fish, etc.) should be the first ingredient listed, then limited amounts of grains. Check the list of preservatives and do not buy food with Ethoxyquin in it. This can be a poison for animals.

She suggested we check into pet insurance, since illness and accidents can be very expensive. At least consider a major medical plan. All vets have insurance information available.

River. The Spanish saw a full-flowing wide river, overflowing at times into vast marshlands that were home to a myriad of waterfowl and small animals. Though it flowed plentifully near downtown all year long, by the turn of the century it had become a dry wash for most of the year, and the ample stream had become a local joke that has never gotten any funnier. By the time the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers had lined its banks with cement they were literally "closing the coffin" on a river that was already dead. What a shame, and all in the name of "progress." Trees had been felled, the wetlands dried and the river diverted into a series of irrigation ditches, often spilling over with "garbage and foul matter."

The Spanish period was dominated by vast Ranchos, the result of land grants, common to this era.

Rancho San Pedro, soon known as the Dominguez Ranch, began as a gift of 75,000 acres in 1784.

The historic Gilmore Adobe was built in 1852. The original building had two rooms with a dirt packed floor and a brea roof from

the tar pits. Today, it is the location of the Farmer's Market.

California was ruled by Spain until 1822, when Mexico assumed jurisdiction. After a two-year period of hostilities with Mexico beginning in 1846, the area came under U.S. control.


In 1848, the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo made California a United States territory.

The County of Los Angeles was established on Feb. 18, 1850, as one of the 27 original counties, several months before California was admitted to the Union. It derived its name from the area known as Los Angeles, already a large community, and made the designated "seat" of county government.

On April 1, 1850, the people of Los Angeles County asserted their newly won right of self-government and elected a three-man Court of Sessions as their first governing body. In 1852, the Legislature dissolved the Court of Sessions and created a five-member Board of Supervisors.

In 1913 the citizens of Los Angeles approved a charter recommended by a board of freeholders which gave the county greater freedom to govern itself within the framework of the state law.



# America's music changes as our nation grows, matures

A foremost indicator of culture in our world is classical music, for which appreciation never fades.

Since most famous composers pre-date America's development, the classics were linked to names like Beethoven, Verdi, Bach, Mozart and Puccini. Americans are now among them, but we also gave a new music form - American "popular music."

Surprisingly, America's melting pot produced a brand of music that envelopes more than the Englishspeaking world. This "popular music" reflected the times of immigrants, first-generation Americans and after. For over a century, it took on a classic form of its own.

America's dramatic change was in tempo with that music — it portrayed our growth. The composers are famous names like Irving Berlin,

George Gershwin, Hoagy Carmichael, and Cole Porter — plus the Broadway musicals of Jerome Kern; Rogers & Hammerstein; Lerner & Lowe and others. Hollywood films and Tin Pan Alley also sprouted a cornucopia of great music - embellishing further America's unique pop-music culture.

This idiom of music took seed before the 1920s but bloomed later with radio's growth and Hollywood's new talking pictures. After that, prolific composers produced a slew of songs in tune with the times.

When the stock market crashed in 1929, "Brother, Can You Spare a Dime?" took hold.

"If I Had a Talking Picture of You" heralded Hollywood's new sound movies, while the music of World War II chronicled the war years and the mood of America.



The 1930s, 1940s and 1950s had a parade of hit songs that will never die — musical gems that became standards and perennial favorites. Bing Crosby led a line of crooners and singers. Many, like Frank Sinatra and Doris Day, came out of dance bands of the 1930s and 1940s, although dance bands were around before the 1920s.

All this great music was on the air when radio was alone broadcasting live band remotes and disc jockeys played the records that stores sold like hot-cakes. Good music is perennial. Its correlation with history should be taught in schools. When music resonates to the times, it befits — like a song to lyrics.

Proof that good music never dies are the Glenn Miller Bands, still alive, led by Gary Tole (United States); Ray McVay (United Kingdom); Wil Salden (Germany); Jan Slottenas (Sweden) and Bill Baker (Holland). This music also thrives in Japan, South Africa, Australia, Canada and Europe.

Exemplary is the United Kingdom, where Pete King publishes a widely read Big Band magazine for English-speaking countries.






to do nothing that is painful. Yoga is to be enjoyed, not endured.
