
An extensive Question and Answer period followed where residents asked the members of the Board varied questions on all

GIVING A PERSUASIVE ARGU-MENT on behalf of taxpayers to the Ventura County Board of Supervisors is Dick Van Horn. The tea bag on his lapel symbolizes the analogy between today's property tax structure and the British tax on tea in Revolutionary War times.

On July 12, 1976, a bus load plus a number of cars moved in on the Ventura County Supervisor's open session on the budget for 1976-77. The county homeowners displayed tea bags as symbols of homeowners protest against exhorbitant property taxes. County supervisors, the press, and T.V. media were very much surprised by the aroused but well disciplined taxpayers.

Richard Van Horn, member of the Leisure Village Board of Directors and newly elected President of Ventura County Homeowners for Equal Taxation, very effectively presented the organized concern of homeowners throughout the county. Specifically, he stressed the issue of increased tax rates and assessments. Van Horn said that the close scrutiny of governmental operations and revision of tax procedures and laws shall be the major program of the property owners.

As a postscript, the Ventura County Board of Supervisors adopted the final 1976-77 general fund budget so that is will not increase the tax rate on July 13, 1976.

And a special "Hello" to all our "Johnny come latelies" in the Village! Words to the wise—forget your carton-crammed garage, dig out your golf clubs, roll a Bocce Ball, swing your tennis racket, put on your dancing shoes! Tomorrow's another day—save the chores for then and live it up now! Get into the lively Leisure Village swing of things!

MEET YOUR NEIGHBORS!

Leisure Village Pioneer Edith Cruden, Country doctor's wife. Her late husband interned in Santa Barbara then in 1933 they moved to Saticoy (which is about ten miles north east of our Village) and set up a practice lasting thirty years except for the war years when they lived in Luke Field and Gila Bend, Arizona.)

There were about ten doctors in the county when the Crudens came to Saticoy. They settled in an old house and converted it into an office. The doctor's fee in those days was around \$2.00, but he was often paid in walnuts, turkeys or produce.

Saticoy was then a trading post for farmers. You picked up your mail in town, which consisted of a post office, a well stocked hardware store, five blacksmith shops which made farm tools, a drug store and a grocery store. The grocer stopped by in the morning, took your order and delivered it in the afternoon! Some service!!

Social life centered around the community church and the P.T.A. of the two-story school. While Dr. Cruden served on the school board, he was instrumental in having a new school built. In those days youngsters had to "bus" to High School in Ventura, leaving home at 7:30 A.M.

Edith did the laundry (no commercial laundries available then), was her husband's answering service and also specialized in janitorial work. Later on, they had an office girl who boarded with them as there were no rooming houses in the town.

Saticoy had only a small telephone switchboard with one operator. You had to turn a crank to ring the bell and the operator would answer. Telephone lines were open only a few hours a day—no night service—but the operator slept in the telephone office so she could get the doctor's calls and post Edith on his where abouts. The nearest hospitals were in Oxnard and Ventura.

A sign at the entrance to town warned "go slow and see our town—Go fast and see our jail!" It intrigued Ripley so much he used it as one of his "believe it or not" gems.

Edith reminisces nostalgically about those days, and chatting about them, has somewhat re-lived her interesting past as a "Country Doctor's Wife."

Village thirteen's Edith Ferrer graduated as a music supervisor in West Chester, Pennsylvania. She taught school during war years—also specialized in teaching a class of trainable retarded children for eight years. She spent time coaching P.T.A. show and Home Talent shows for teachers groups, the proceeds donated to scholarship funds for students going into the teaching field. Since retirement, she has concentrated on her four children and four grandchildren scattered all over the U.S.A.

Edith's husband, Jose, a native Cuban, became an American Citizen many years ago, and served in the U.S. Navy in the South Pacific.

She is an accomplished pianist-accompanist, and we look forward to using her talents and direction in shows planned for the Villagers' entertainment. Her past experience along these lines will come in mighty handy!

Newcomers in Village Thirteen—Herbert Arnold and his bride of one year. He retired after 25 years of civilian service with the Federal Government including quality assurance engineering on missile and space programs; he was closely associated with the astronauts throughout the Apollo Moon Program and Sky-Lab (America's first space station.) Herb was also involved in design, manufacture and testing of army guided missiles, Navy nuclear submariens, and several generations of National Aeronautics and Space Administration of space ships.

Herb's souvenirs of his years with NASA are a wall covered with certificates awarded for achievements, medallions brought back from the moon, and colorful cloth patches which flight crews wore during space voyages. After exciting and exhausting years on this job, Herb finds it a pleasure to live and relax here in Leisure Village.

Did you ever wonder about the man way up there in a tower, guiding your plane down to a safe landing? Villager Bud Tytler reminisces about that portion of his past when he started as a radio mechanic with TWA in Kansas City and went on to the operational side in San Francisco. His work in communication consisted mainly of talking to planes in flight, relaying orders and weather and being

liason with captains in planes and on the ground. Also supervising girls who ran the teletypes in the communication system. After leaving TWA on retirement, he worked as a group leader for North American Aviation for several years. Since then, he's been associated with various travel agencies in the sales end.

His wife, Betty, was escrow supervisor for the Hong Kong Bank for a few years and now does relief work for various escrow companies in the area.







The Board considers the broad spectrum of Leisure Village in their decision making. Some of the broad duties and responsibilities in which your Board is involved are:

- 1. To adopt and publish Rules and Regulations governing the use of the common areas and the personal conduct of the residents and their guests thereon.
- 2. To establish, levy, assess and collect the monthly Association fee.

- 5. To cause the common area and exteriors of dwelling units to be maintained in the manner provided in the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions.
- 6. To procure and maintain adequate liability and hazard insurance, as provided in the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions.

These are just a few of the many areas with which your Board must concern themselves. Your continual support of their decisions is most meaningful to your Directors. Every effort is made, when adopting or revising Rules and Regulations, to assure that what will be done is reasonable and beneficial to you, the resident.






