
COURSE WORK

Course work in the English: Literature and Writing program is completed in three areas.

- Foundation courses provide the tools for intellectual discussion of materials.
- Interdisciplinary courses provide connections with different ideas, approaches and ways of knowing.
- The required sequence provides indepth investigation in a specialized field of Multicultural Literature, Creative Writing or English Education.

- or a certificate in Technical Writing.






English majors keep a portfolio of work produced in each of their required courses and electives. Students work closely with their advisors in developing the portfolios, which are reviewed by the instructor as a prerequisite to the capstone/service learning course. At the end of the capstone, when all course requirements have been fulfilled for the major, the final portfolio is again reviewed.
