The LVA monthly bulletin "The Voice of the Village" which informs Villagers of activities and actions of the Board of Directors, Committees, and Clubs, is no longer being mimeographed and hand delivered throughout the Village by volunteers.

Villagers who had special incentives to look for it, found the paper, which is the same size as Inside Leisure Village, but has no connection with it, tucked in with the inserts. The original idea of using a different colored paper (which would make it easy to spot), could not be used at this time.

Deadline for copy for the February 10th edition is 17 days ahead of publication (Jan. 24). It takes time to prepare, and time for the Daily News to fit our work in with their own.

The Association's agreement with the Daily News seems logical and economical. Learn to look for "The Voice" on the second Thursday of each month.

At the January Board of Directors meeting, President Mike Sherman introduced Mr. Kenneth L. (Skip) Roberts III as the new General Manager of L.V. Homeowners Association.

Roberts comes to Leisure Village from "Ken Roberts & Associates," a Financial planning firm which has been operating in Thousand Oaks since November, 1981.

When Roberts received his B.A. in Administration (with academic honors) from California State University, Long Beach, in 1969, one of his instructors was instrumental in his applying for a position for the Klamath County YMCA in Klamath Falls, Oregon. There, he served as Program Director for three years and then returned to California where he was appointed Associate Executive Director for Torrance-South Bay YMCA. One special project in Oregon was developing a landscape and irrigation plan for a 13 acre site and supervising its implementation. In Torrance, he supervised a staff of 30, plus 60 seasonal employees and 170 volunteers. During this period, he returned to Cal State Long Beach for graduate classes in Public Administration, Personnel Management and Supervisory Management.

In 1978, Roberts advanced to Executive Director for Tri-Valley YMCA in Thousand Oaks, where he was responsible for developing and controlling a large operating budget, managing program sites and facilities and implementing improvements and maintenance programs.

Expansion of Channel 12 Proposed

With the idea of expanding and upgrading the present Leisure VIllage Channel 12 TV facility, a committee of volunteers has recently been formed with Joe Poliak as chairman. Committee members are: Frank Arnich, Charles Bellante, Jeanne Carlson, Josh Fallick, Lillian Goldman, Lillian Heimowitz, Art Kaufman, Milton Tobias, Elva Ward, Jack Whalen, John Zoller and Edith Zwiebel.

The purpose is to develop Channel 12 as another method of giving information. To this end, the committee's first task is to write a proposal to present to the Board of Directors for acceptance.

The second meeting, Jan. 11, was attended by board member Edward Salzer, and two representatives of Western Cable; Mr. Joseph Pugh, and Vice President Ray Stone. Western Cable has made the offer to furnish free use of a TV camera, a video recorder, and a tripod-dolly. The company will retain title for five years and at the end of that time, present the equipment to L.V. Obviously the possibilities are many. It might even be possible to have a mini closed-circuit TV station with a wide schedule of programs.

The Facilities Survey Committee, under the chairmanship of Don Holmes, has recommended to the L.V. Board of Directors an imaginative plan to increase the facilities of the Recreation Center, in order to satisfy present and future needs of the Village residents.

The Committee found that present craft (hobby) shops are over-crowded and therefore present certain safety hazards to the occupants. The Wood Shop, for example, is too small and is not only inconvenient but oftentimes actually dangerous. While the Ceramics Shop is reasonably adequate, certain improvements are needed, particularly a new and larger kiln room. The Lapidary Shop requires more elbow room between the machines.

In addition to surveying the use of the various craft rooms, the Committee made an extensive analysis of storage space in the Recreation Center Building, concluding that there is a great need for expanding this facility.

Having identified the various problems, the Committee recommended construction of a new Craft Shop and Storage Building, approximately 60 feet by 90 feet, in the space currently occupied by the Garden Plots. The new building, estimated to cost about \$200,000, would include a Sewing Room, the Wood Shop, Lapidary and Ceramic Rooms, plus a Dark Room for photography buffs and space for the Bocce and Tennis Clubs. There would also be a large area set aside for storage purposes.

Rooms vacated in the main building would then become available as additional meeting places. The present Wood Shop could be set aside for Television Programming in accordance with plans to expand the use of Channel 12.

This brief summary does not do justice to the very detailed committee report, which should be read in its entirety. It is to be hoped that copies will be made available in the Library.

ILV believes that this is no pipe dream. Certainly, there are many questions to be answered, such as the method of financing construction, not to mention relocating the Garden Plots, but the project is worthy of attention and discussion. We shall open our pages to any and all letters on this issue.

The Facilities Survey Committee deserves a round of applause for a spadework job well done. In addition to Don Holmes, other members are committee chairmen Bemrose Boyd (Architectural), Ottis Reid (Building and Grounds), Art Wilson (Education and Recreation), Tom O'Brien (Finance), plus Dorothy Fencl (member Finance Committee), and Irvine Feldman (member Woodshop Committee).

Know Your Security

Security Officer Richard "Rich" Hill only recently joined the L.V. Security Staff but brought a wealth of security background to the force. This includes a year of active duty in the U.S. Army, 4 years as a production foreman in a Los Angeles factory, and 15 years in the Los Angeles Police Department. During the latter period, he served at 77th St. Division Patrol, Harbor Metropolitan, and Hollywood. (None of these is an easy post but L.A. really doesn't have any easy assignments).

During his years with L.A.P.D., Mr. Hill worked patrol, detective desk, homicide, SWAT instruction, burglary-auto theft, and many other posts. He was twice nominated for the Medal of Honor and received other commendations.

Do you need to be in touch?

For many, particularly those who prefer to live independently at home but are alone, it can be a comfort to know that medical assistance is close at hand. ONE NEEDS TO KEEP IN TOUCH. LIFELINE is a system which can help you do just that.

The original program was designed by a Boston University physician, studied and tested under a research grant by the U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare, and technically approved by the Veterans Administration. Pleasant Valley Hospital initiated the service in June, 1981.

Just what is LIFELINE? It is an electronic communications system linked to your telephone which connects with an emergency station at the hospital. It is not difficult to use; you don't even have to dial a telephone. You merely press a button on a remote control device which you keep handy or carry in your pocket. It

works even if your phone is off the hook. If you are unable to push the button a timer on the unit which you pre-set will activate a signal for help.

When the hospital receives the signal a monitor will try to phone you. If there is no answer someone will be dispatched to your home, (paramedics or police, if appropriate). Otherwise, the "someone" is a neighbor or relative whose name is on file.

The subscription cost to a LIFELINE person is \$9.50 per month which includes inand monthly stallation maintenance checks.

Requests for units are filled based upon a "Needs Assessment Interview" which is conducted by hospital personnel. First consideration is given to those with established medical need, to the frail and elderly, or those "socially isolated."

Profile: John S. Herman, Energetic Optimist

'The Way' of life for John Herman has never deviated from an intense commitment to serve Christian principles through work with children, with music, and with community service. Although John and his wife, Pat, have lived in Leisure Village only since 1978, his work with the Camarillo Boys and Girls Club has earned him the Joel McCrea Volunteer of the Year Award for two straight years.

Casual perusal of the honors and awards displayed in his den indicates, like the tip of an iceberg, the depth of his involvement throughout his life. Even though he had retired, John accepted, as of January 1983, the responsible post as Principal of the Christian Church School in Camarillo with pre-school through twelfth grade children. He also participates in enough other activities to fill a king-sized calendar.

John's first memories are of

traveling with his parents, an older brother and his mirrorimage twin brother, Joseph, around the Orpheum Circuit. His mother and father were known as 'Williams and Williams, the Man, the Girl and the Piano, Singing Opera to Ragtime'. They were fine performers, and the children met many famous vaudeville stars along the way. When a baby sister was born, the family settled in Southgate, California, and father became an accountant with Owens-Parks Lumber Co. in Vernon. His mother continued to sing in church and at funerals.

Big brother William taught John the scale on a trumpet, which he played in elementary school orchestra. He switched to a baritone in high school. He joined a group which became known as the L.A. County Sheriff's Boys Band; under Col. Vesey Walker, where he played until he joined the Navy. At LACC, he played baritone, was Drum Major, and Student Director of the band.

John also played with the Elks 99 Band in L.A. from 1938-1942, and in 1940, he organized and directed the Women's Ambulance and Defense Corps Band which played at patriotic reviews and in parades. They were playing an Americanism concert on a Sunday afternoon in 1941 when the news came that Pearl Harbor had been bombed.

Twenty-year old John left LACC and joined the Navy as a musician, but was switched to electrical technician on the basis of aptitude tests, and wound up teaching mathematics in the electrical school. A friendship established in the Navy resulted in John's first teaching job in 1946, after service discharge and graduation from UCLA.

John and Pat, whom he had met at the Southgate Methodist Church, and married at a Naval Base Chapel in 1943, moved to Riverdale. John taught Math, Music, Science, coached both baseball and basketball, directed the Choir, and drove a school bus for the high school.

Eight years later the Hermans moved to Bakersfield where John taught Music and Math at North H.S., and became Director of Testing, Dean of Boys, Vice-Principal, and Summer School Principal.

In 1965 John joined the Los Angeles Schools, where he taught in Granada Hills, and in turn became school Psychologist, Superintendent of Certificated Personnel, and held various other administrative

positions. Retirement came in 1978.

So much for the formal career! When John retired from L.A. Schools, he and Pat planned to go to Samoa as missionaries for the Methodist Church of Western Samoa. Their application was accepted; delegates from the church who came to L.A. to interview them caused a sensation wearing their native Samoan costumes. The plan was cancelled after a physical examination disclosed possible medical problems, later diagnosed as osteo-arthritis in John's foot and leg. 'The Lord must have wanted me to be somewhere else, philosophizes John.

In every community where the Hermans lived, John was involved in the church, and in service organizations. He was a Lions Club officer in Riverdale. He became Charter president of the Optimist Club of North Bakersfield in 1956, and has had perfect attendance, meeting once a week, in Optimist Clubs for 27 years. He has

held many offices, among which is Chaplain for the Pacific Southwest District. He is now a member of the Camarillo Optimist Club, leading to his involvement with the Boys and Girls Club, which the Optimists support.

In 1979, John was on the Board of Directors of the Camarillo Boys and Girls Club, and Chairman of the Building Fund, which raised half a million dollars for the new Club Gymnasium. He is now Vice-President of the Board of Directors, and is justifiably proud of being able to see construction actually started.

In 1968, John worked with the very first Special Olympics Program which was held at the L.A. Coliseum for disabled and / or mentally handicapped children. In 1979, he organized a Special Olympics for children at the Camarillo State Hospital. Last year, children from five hospitals participated in track and field events, basketball, bowling and gymnastics.

John has directed church and community choirs in every

town in which they lived, as well as playing in and directing bands and orchestras. One was a Dixieland band in Bakersfield, and in Los Angeles, it was a community group who presented Americana programs at such diverse places as Disneyland, for PTA meetings, in churches, and 4th of July programs. He now directs the Camarillo Community Band which performed at the Camarillo Fiesta the end of October, and will resume practice after the first of the year at the Boys Club, or the Christian Church.

For two years, Mr. Herman was Chairman of the Camarillo Fiesta Association, producing two fiestas, and compiling a set of By-Laws to assist future directors.

After 39 years of marraige, family life is still a delight to John who describes his five daughters as all talented and gorgeous, and credits his wife Pat with skills in dancing, acting, singing, arts and crafts, and being the one most consci-

entious and loving mother and wife. Six grandchildren (so far) have expanded his family and he proudly displays tennis trophies won by two of his grandchildren along with his own golf awards. 

The Village Painters participated in a program of women's interest in photography at our Jan. 19th meeting.


On the first Wednesdays of the month, meetings will be devoted to slide competition and showing of slides of members.

Prisoners of Conscience

International. Amnesty winner of the 1977 Nobel Peace Prize, has been depicted by The Los Angeles Times as "a thin thread of civilization that circles the world.

Endorsing the Times' summary of the organization's three goals--namely, "to work for the release of prisoners of conscience, to advocate fair and prompt trials for all political prisoners and to stop torture" -- Robert H. Hethmon, professor of theater arts at UCLA, addressed a capacity audience attending the December 23rd Current Issues Forum.

Hethmon described the work of Amnesty International's "Adoption Group 14," which meets monthly in the Camarillo home of Bernardine and Gary Smith, both of whom were present to distribute literature and answer questions. This group currently is working to alleviate the situation of two men unjustly imprisoned, one a Soviet Baptist minister named Vasily Fyodorovich Ryzhuk and the other, Nguema Mitoghe, of


Billiard Club

Edith Ferrer: In Memoriam


