

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. When time permits, credentials will be mailed.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the field and the team areas and these rules, as modified due to the inadequate space behind benches at Santa Ana Stadium, will be strictly enforced.

PARKING: Free, ample and close to western grandstand with press box. No credential or pass required.

PRESS BOX: Is limited to working members of the press, radio, television and others whose duties require use of the press area. No one will be admitted without proper credentials (spouses included). Light sandwiches and soft drinks will be provided. Play-by-play reports by quarters, halftime and final statistics, scoring summary and post-game quotes will be distributed throughout the press box, which is located on the west side of Santa Ana Stadium.

TELECOPIER: One will be available on a page-by-page, first-come, first-served basis.

BROADCAST SPACE: One booth is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each holds four persons comfortably across the working counter with standing space available to the rear. Additional needs for radio and all television requests will be handled on an individual basis (read: rooftop).

TELEPHONES: One pay telephone and one usually busy Fullerton SID business line (714) 550-9361 are available in the press box. Additional phones must be ordered through Pacific Bell by calling (818) 811-3204.

INTERVIEW ROOMS: Do not exist. Interviews must be conducted outside the locker room areas which are located behind the south end zone on the field level.

SCOUTS: Professional scouts will be sold tickets in the grandstands (top row south of press box) and provided handout materials upon request at the press box entrance. Scouts from opposing schools will be issued press box passes if space permits in accordance with NCAA rules, but only if requested at least four days in advance.

The University

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 24,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and six certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fulleton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields. The long-awaited reality of an on-campus football/soccer complex and baseball stadium in conjunction with an on-campus Marriott Hotel recently was approved with a fall, 1989 completion date targeted for the athletic facilities. To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.







Administration



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb became the third president of Cal State Fullerton on Oct. 1, 1981.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities, she is the first black woman to head a major public

university on the West Coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 16 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School now serving as a resident physician at Mt. Sinai Medical Center in New York. is.

Athletic Department



Ed Carroll, Athletic Director

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 37, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

In his first year as athletic director, Carroll immediately upgraded the football schedule. LSU, West Virginia, Florida and Tulsa signed to host the Titans while the United States Military Academy (Army) agreed to a home and home series in 2001 and 2003.

Long dormant plans for an on-campus Youth Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball have been revived. The faculty Academic Senate and Fullerton City Council have approved plans which hinge on the construction of a Marriott Hotel to help finance the project. At press time, architects were preparing preliminary drawings of the \$6.7 million project.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history (1972) and physical education (1974) from Fullertor as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletic director and later served as acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985, for a similar post at San Jose State.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young children Brandon and Kimberly.

Titan Athletic Foundation

The Titan Athletic Foundation, or the T.A.F. as it is usually called, is a non-profit organization established solely for the purpose of generating financial and other support for the Cal State Fullerton athletic department.

Membership is open to everyone and the current rolls include not only alumni, faculty, staff and students but also a great many friends of the University, area businesses and respected community leaders.

Gifts received by the T.A.F. are used to provide a quality education for deserving student-athletes. The 1987 fund drive was the most productive ever with more than \$320,000 in cash pledged for 1987-88 scholarship aid.

History of Titan Athletics

Obstacles and adversity. Grass roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team — men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.



Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's past six teams have been factors in the PCAA race and have a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton also has competed twice in the NITTournament.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished fifth or better in the nation every year but one including the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently, Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards before suffering a fractured vertebrae in her senior season.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. And he won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as pitcher Greg Mathews of the St. Louis Cardinals. Pitcher Mike Harkey was the fourth player selected in baseball's June free agent draft, going to the Chicago Cubs.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series in eight years. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and have been ranked No. 1 in the nation most of the past two seasons.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. But football is the name of the game in intercollegiate sports and the Titans have won their share on the gridiron as well.

Dick Coury was the inaugural coach in 1970 and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Div. I were endured. But the program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy and now football is another topflight program of which Fullerton students, alumni, faculty, staff and the community can be proud.

The Nickname and Mascot

"What exactly is a Titan?" "Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in the first year of classes, 1959, at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that Spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek.

The mascot easily outlived the race. In 1963, one elephant charged into the crowd causing minor injuries and the early signs of a now-common liability insurance crisis halted a tradition in the bud.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was adopted just as the unofficial elephant.

When Lynn Eilefson was appointed athletic director in 1982, he furthered the cause of orange because of its uniqueness and brightness compared to the wide variety of blues. Thus, the "Orange Crush" booster group was born and the color remains predominant in most team uniforms.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. And that's only the start of the confusion.

To out-of-staters, the sky seems to be the limit because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state — the University of California and the State University system. So, we've been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, which is what most of the more than 50,000 graduates call it. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

Santa Ana Stadium



Cal State Fullerton football returns for a fourth consecutive season to Santa Ana Stadium – commonly known in its glorious history as Santa Ana Bowl.

Officially named "Eddie West Field - Santa Ana Stadium," the 12,000-seat facility served as the Titans' home during portions of the 1971 through 1975 seasons while Fullerton was alternating home dates with Anaheim Stadium. In 1984 the Titans returned on a "temporary permanent" basis and won all four home dates. After the 1985 season the Stadium's future was in doubt with approval of plans to raze it to make room for The Westdome, an NBA-size multi-purpose arena. But city fathers changed their minds and are looking elsewhere in the city for a construction site.

Located at 602 N. Flower St. between Sixth and Civic Center Drive in central Santa Ana, the "Bowl" is only nine miles south of the Cal State Fullerton campus and it boasts tradition as one of the finest stadium sites in Orange County. It was dedicated on Apr. 27, 1932 and has played host to a wide variety of athletic and entertainment events while undergoing numerous facelifts and remodelings. It is the home field for Santa Ana (Rancho Santiago) College and all Santa Ana High Schools.

The current structure was built in 1963. It was re-dedicated in 1981 in memory of Eddie West, long-time sports editor of the Santa Ana (now Orange County) Register.

The two-tiered, enclosed press box can handle two radio play-by-play crews in separate booths, numerous film crews on the roof and approximately 30 writers and statisticians on the lower level. The expected press box phone number is **(714)** 550-9361.

Home Field History

The need for a permanent on-campus facility was never more obvious than in 1983 when the Titans were forced to move the playing site of two of their three home games on 24 and 4 hours' notice, respectively, due to "rain clauses" in their Anaheim Stadium contract. The long-awaited dream of a permanent on-campus facility for Cal State Fullerton has been on a roller coaster ride of probability to rival the Great White Knuckler at Magic Mountain.

At press time, the Marriott Hotel Corporation and the City of Fullerton were making final preparations for a December, 1987 ground-breaking of an on-campus hotel and convention center. Its projected revenue will reimburse the city for the University's portion of the construction cost of the sports complex.

Excitement and competitive balance are the watchwords when it comes to Pacific Coast Athletic Association football. A typical PCAA game will feature wide-open, air-minded offenses and aggres-

sive, stunting defenses in a contest likely to be decided in the closing minutes. Of the eight schools competing for the title, five have won league championships in the past

eight years with Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State and San Jose State each claiming a pair. Four different schools have competed in the California Bowl since its inception in 1981.

Away from league play, PCAA schools have flexed their muscles with such victories as San Jose State at Baylor, California and Stanford; Fresno State at Arizona and Oregon State; and Pacific at Minnesota in recent years. Fullerton has scored WAC road wins at Wyoming, Colorado State and Hawaii. Future schedules continue to feature more and more nationally recognized powers from such leagues as the Southeastern Conference and Big Ten. The growing respect can best be measured by the appearance in the wire service Top 20 polls the last few seasons by Fullerton, Fresno State and San Jose State.



Head Coach Gene Murphy



"Enquiring" minds want to know. And they always seem to be asking about Cal State Fullerton head football coach Gene Murphy.

In 1982, reporters were questioning his job sec-

urity after 4-7, 3-8 and 3-9 seasons.

In 1984, the same scribes were wondering how Fullerton could keep him after back-to-back Pacific Coast Athletic Association championships including an 11-1 campaign (12-0 with forfeit) that included a No. 20 UPI national ranking.

And last year, after a disappointing 3-9 season, they had him rumored for job openings at Washington State, Wyoming and Hawaii among

others.

The fact he remains such a viable commodity regardless of his team's record is indicative of the status Murphy has achieved in the football coaching ranks and the esteem in which he is held by University administrators, the media and the football public. The job he did in building a Fullerton program literally from the ground up can not be forgotten. Nor do knowledgable people overlook Murphy's pleasant, entertaining demeanor — win or

lose - that belies his burning desire to succeed on the playing field.

"I've said it many times, but it's true. The only people we have to gratify is us — the Titan football family," says Murphy. "I'm a Titan. It doesn't get any easier, but I think the program has improved enough to sustain itself."

The challenge of an accelerated schedule in 1987 is foreboding, but Murphy and his staff haven't backed down. They have previously conquered other numerous obstacles by remodeling an old home for an office complex, building their own weight training facility, arranging a Fall training camp and even erecting their own stadium during the 1980, 1981 and 1982 seasons.

The University has responded with a full allotment of assistant coaching positions, a football secretary and a scholarship count approaching the NCAA Division I maximum. And soon, with the help of the City of Fullerton and the Marriott Hotel chain, the long-awaited stadium will become

reality.

"The stadium is the final piece in the puzzle," says Murphy, who has sent the Titans out to play at four different "home" sites during his tenure. "We are very pleased with our arrangement at the Santa Ana Bowl, but playing on campus in our own facility will be the ultimate."

Although it took four years for the results to show up on paper — in the won/lost column — Murphy's improvement of the Titan program began that January day in 1980 when he first set foot on

the Fullerton campus.

"We had to go back to square one — erecting the stadium, fund-raising, recruiting, building the weight room, creating office space, hosting a true fall camp...everything — to build a broad base.

"And from day one we had to build the self-image of the Titan progam. What we have developed is 'Titan Family.' You win with people. We put up with a lot of adversity but we do it together and I think it has made us stronger. It's something you have to experience to properly appreciate.

"I've said it many times, but I sincerely believe it. No one can match our staff of assistant coaches. We work together, they don't work for me. And it takes a special kind of person to play football at Fullerton."

Murphy, 48 on the annual PCAA Media Day and second only to Fresno State's Jim Sweeney in terms of seniority in the league, came to Fullerton from the University of North Dakota to "throw the football." His early Titan teams featured wide-open aerial assaults and more than a bagful of trick and gadget plays, all known collectively as the "squirrel derby" offense.

The I983 PCAA championship team and California Bowl entrant was built around a stubborn and ball-hawking defense and the 1984 squad put it all together: a strong running game to balance an efficient yet deep-striking passing game and an aggressive defense that was No. 2 in the nation

in creating turnovers. In 1985, the defense carried the load despite numerous injuries until the young offensive unit came together with the aid of a reach back into the "squirrel derby" bag. Last year, it was a relentless running game that bore the burden of trying to control the ball for a young and inexperienced passing attack and defense.

Consistent through a seven-year Fullerton record of 37-44 (39-42 with forfeits) has been the

importance Murphy has placed on special teams play.

"We feel the game is divided into three phases — offense, defense and special teams," says Murphy. "If you can win two of the three, you've got a pretty good chance to win the football game. So we spend a lot of time and front-line personnel on special teams and don't just give them lip service. We fell off in those areas last year and will try to get them back up to par for this season."

Murphy's rewards have included the 1983 PCAA Coach of the Year Award and in 1984 he was

selected United Press International's West Coast Coach of the Year.

"Those awards are nice, but it's the coaches and the players who deserve the credit," says Murphy.

Born Eugene Vincent Murphy on Aug. 6, 1939 in Jersey City, New Jersey, Murphy was an all-sports star at St. Peter's High School in New Brunswick and earned all-state honors in football (quarterback) and baseball (shortstop). His late father also was a coach and matched wits with the likes of Vince Lombardi at the prep level.

Recruited to the University of Minnesota by assistant Ray Malavasi under head coach Murray Warmath, Murphy soon found himself sitting on the bench behind Gopher star Sandy Stephens. He transferred to North Dakota and as a senior was the All-North Central Conference quarterback.

After attaining his bachelor's degree (physical education) in 1962, Murphy served one year as graduate assistant and then coached football, baseball and swimming at North St. Paul High School before returning to UND, where he stayed 14 more years — the first 12 as an assistant and eventually as offensive coordinator and then the 1978 and 1979 seasons as head coach.

While he was offensive coordinator, the Sioux won six conference championships and participated in three post-season bowl games (1966, 1972 and 1975). As head coach, he won the conference title in 1979 and was named conference coach of the year. The Fightin' Sioux went 10-2 and were ranked as high as No. 3 in the Division II national rankings. His 1978 team was 5-5, giving him a two-year mark of 15-7 at UND and a current career mark of 52-51 (54-49 with forfeits).

"I was very comfortable at North Dakota, too comfortable," Murphy recalls. "I needed a challenge and came to California to see the sun. I've had more fun coaching at Fullerton than ever before. I do NOT want to leave Fullerton, but I would be committing professional suicide if I didn't listen to the other offers that have come along."

Murphy spent five summers (1967-71) as an assistant "guest" coach with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. During his Fullerton tenure he also has turned down opportunities to return to the Canadian League.

A holder of two master's degrees (physical education in 1963 and secondary administration in 1977), Murphy served as interim athletic director at Fullerton for much of 1981.

Murphy has two sons. Tim, 21, is in his junior year at Cal State Fullerton and works for the athletic equipment room and sports information office around a budding ice hockey career. Michael, 17, is a tennis player at Esperanza High School in Anaheim.

Larry Manfull was reunited with Gene Murphy in 1980 at Fullerton and the development of his offensive line has paralleled the increased success of the entire Titan program... along with Jerry Brown, the only remaining members of Murphy's original Titan staff... Manfull and Murphy were assistants together at North Dakota (1972-75) before Manfull moved to the University of Pacific (1976-77)... Manfull has helped develop two recent NFL draft picks... both Daren Gilbert (New Orleans, 2nd round, 1985) and Hank Goebel (L.A. Rams, 8th round, 1986) were recruited off the basketball floor in high school...

Manfull previously coached at Wayne State (1964), Dubuque High School (1965-66), head coach at Hollister High (1966-68), assistant at Dakota State (1969) and head coach at Mayville State (1970-71)... All-American and three-year all-conference selection at Coe College (1959-62)... obtained bachelor's (1964) and master's (1965) degrees at Wayne State (Nebraska)... won 15 letters at Traer Public High in native Traer, Iowa... all-state two years in football and track and all-conference in basketball and baseball... hobbies are hunting and fishing... nicknames include 'Lumpy' and 'the Hogmaster'... children are Mark (24), Jeff (17), Bryan (13), Michele (13) and Dave (11)... he and wife Cindy live in Anaheim.

The Original "Hogs"

The nickname "Hogs" for offensive linemen gained national recognition a few years back as John Riggins and a group of mammoth blockers led the Washington Redskins to a Super Bowl victory.

However, the Redskins were more than a decade late with the term. The creator: Larry Manfull, now in his eighth year as the Titans' offensive line coach.

"The story unfolds back in 1969 when I was the head coach at Hollister High School in central California," recalls Larry, affectionately known as "the Hogmaster." "I was hunting wild boar and came across a group of six. Among them was one of the largest boars I had ever seen. His tusks seemed to touch the ground. I estimated his weight at 300 to 400 pounds.

"I scoped the group and as I laid the crosshairs on his upper right shoulder and squeezed

the trigger, the results were scary.

"The boar jumped straight into the air, landed on the ground, turned three complete circles and charged my pick-up truck. After a few seconds of utter amazement, I put the crosshairs on his chest. My 257 exploded and about 150 yards away, the Hog went down. He appeared to be dead.

Wrong. The Hog got up and charged the truck again. I leaped into the bed and fired my remaining cartridge. The Hog went down, but he got up again and charged the truck

once more. He rammed the side of the truck, quivered and fell dead.

"I stood in the back of the truck in shock. The boar truly was dead this time, but I started to think about that animal and what he was made of.

"I got out of the bed and pulled the Hog by the tusks away from the dent he had put in the rear fender. I saw that my first shot had grazed his back and sent him into a state of fury, charging in the direction of the sound from the gun shot. My second shot was in his right shoulder and the third shot was directly in the middle of his chest. I am sure the Hog was virtually dead when he got up from the last bullet and charged the truck.

"I took the Hog home, skinned and quartered him and he provided many great meals.

Now, each time I eat pork, I think of that boar and tip my fork in respect.

"That boar was the ultimate in all the things I think a football player should be on the field. He was the toughest animal or person I had ever seen. He never quit, even after he was hurt or, in my opinion, even dead. He had the killer instinct, he was strong and aggressive and he had character and pride.

"My linemen are charged with the responsibility to uphold the reputation of the "Hogs"

that played in 1969 and since then."

In honor of their nickname, every "Hog" has a T-shirt to wear away from the field featuring a ferocious hog in a design created by tight end Jim Thornton.



JOHN MIKLESH Outside Linebackers North Dakota (1973)

A double-edged sword confronts the Cal State Fullerton football program in 1987 as the Titans try to rebound from their first losing season in four years while playing by far the most ambitious — some call it suicidal — schedule in the 18-year history of the program.

After back-to-back Pacific Coast Athletic Association championships in 1983 and 1984, the Titans have tapered off to 6-5 and 3-9 records the past two seasons. To reverse that trend, they will have to overcome a schedule that includes trips to Southeastern Conference members LSU and Florida, perennial WAC contender Hawaii and independent Northern Illinois as well as the usual hazards of the PCAA schedule. The well-traveled Titans will play in five different time zones this year.

"At least we have five home games," says head coach Gene Murphy as he optimistically leaps into his eighth season at Fullerton. "I'd rather not be playing in the SEC, but it's something we have to do. It's a matter of money and I understand the necessity — to keep our grants-in-aid at the current number as well as pay for increased fees and cost of living."

To meet this formidable challenge, Murphy and his staff mothballed their freshmen-oriented recruiting strategy to bring in junior college transfers more physically and mentally prepared for the arduous task ahead. Unfortunately, many of the key newcomers didn't arrive until fall drills.

"Most of them had to obtain their Associate Arts degrees and were not eligible to transfer at the semester," said Murphy, who does have a solid nucleus returning with 14 starters back among 44 lettermen. "Particularly on defense, we didn't get a true look in spring drills and the May Bowl. But the attitude and intensity level was 100 per cent better than last Fall."

Offensively, the Titans return eight starters from last year. The glaring hole is at the running back spots where the Titans are without all-time leading rusher Rick Calhoun and two-year fullback Mark Hood. Hopefully, a veteran but remodeled interior line will make things easier for inexperienced lettermen Tracey Pierce, Eric Franklin and Tim Byrnes as well as Merced College transfer William Robinson.

"In the spring, we tried to polish what we do in our running game and get better at identifying defensive fronts," said associate head coach/offensive coordinator Jerry Brown. "We put some pressure on the running backs to find out who can make plays when we need them. We don't have another Calhoun, but we feel we have several capable runners.

"In the passing game, we hope to pick up where we left off with quarterbacks Ronnie Barber and Carlos Siragusa, two solid wide receivers in Todd White and John Gibbs and a potentially great tight end in Jim Thornton. We do want to knock down our interception rate so we don't put the defense in bad situations."

A switch on the interior line finds tackles Ed Gillies and Matt Fitts moving to guard to take advantage of

their excellent running skills and open up the attack. The move, forced by injuries for one game last year, is contingent upon the continued development of lettermen tackles James Good and Mike Oliver and JC transfers Kevin Bernell and Dennis Ellis. Senior Phil Benson could be the best yet in a lengthy string of outstanding Titan centers.

Defensively, the focus is on the front seven, which failed to play to expectations last year despite a veteran crew.

"We have to find some players' for the front seven," says defensive coordinator Steve Hall. "We need improvement and consistency from the returning guys and help from the newcomers. Because of the number of fall arrivals at these spots, we will probably be adjusting our defense at the season progresses."

Significant keys to the unit's success will be the ability of three-year letterman Ted Hinton to emerge as a leader at outside linebacker and senior linebacker Bryan Riggs to come back from knee surgery. Juniors Bill Bryan and Jeff Hipp were force fed at linebacker last year and should provide stability in 1987.

"We are not incredibly deep in the secondary, but we should be OK if some of the young guys come along," said Hall. "Some of them need to become players' and their spring work was encouraging."

Hard-hitting Mike Schaffel and Tom Phillips, who split time at safety last year, will likely be in the lineup together at the inside positions. Tyrone Pope and James Howard boast the edge on experience at the cornerback spots.

"We stressed the kicking game during the spring," said Murphy, who has used special teams play to great advantage in building a Division I program from the bottom up. "Both the kicking and punting. We have to develop the confidence factor again."

DEFENSE

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS — Two five-year players have departed in Sean Foy and Mark Chisom but the group could be physically as strong this year pending the development of newcomers. Veteran Ted Hinton (Sr., 6-2, 220) returns on the weak side backed up by letterman Darren Emery (So., 5-11, 205) while the strong side will see a wide open battle among converted tight end John Smith (Jr., 6-2, 230) and Bakersfield College transfer Damon Culbertson (Jr., 6-3, 227).

Steve Hall: "We lost a ton of experience in Foy and Chisom and must find someone who can be a force at that position. Hinton will be a major factor for us — he has the potential to be a big-play player and how he responds will be a key for us."

DOWN LINEMEN — There were several experimental position changes during the Spring in an effort to beef up the pass rush in an area where two starters have departed and experienced depth is a problem. Letterman Jeff Taylor (Sr., 6-3, 245) moved from tackle to nose guard with Freshman of the Year Harold Jones (So., 6-2, 240) moving from nose to end, but both are back at their original spots. Compton College transfer Tommy Thompson (Jr., 6-2, 260) had a great spring at tackle and is listed ahead of Dixie JC transfer Charlie Scott (Jr., 6-3, 260) and late 1986 starter Kelly Gogerty (Sr., 6-4, 260). Senior Dan Unger (6-5, 270), who also had an excellent spring, will likely open the season as a nose guard. An unknown factor because they weren't on campus in Spring are highly regarded transfers A. J. Jenkins (Jr., 6-3, 225) from Merced and Ed McFarland (Jr., 6-3, 230) from L.A. Valley.

Steve Hall: "Unger and Thompson must prove they can play at this level and we need more consistency from Gogerty. We've moved Jones and Taylor around and are anxious to see Jenkins and McFarland in person."

INSIDE LINEBACKERS — Another position where the true strength didn't show up in the Spring. In addition to late-arriving JC transfer Joe Scott (Jr., 6-2, 230), a key is the condition of senior Bryan Riggs (6-2, 230), who injured his knee in last year's third game and is coming back from major surgery. Young veterans forced into regular's roles last year are back in Bill Bryan (Jr., 6-2, 225) and Jeff Hipp (Jr., 6-1, 220). Redshirts John Lucas (Jr., 6-0, 220) and Gary Thornton (Fr., 6-1, 218) also will likely make a contribution along with former outside backer George Pritchard (Jr., 6-1, 200). Young Matt Hanna (Fr., 6-2, 200) joined Riggs on the sidelines in spring due to shoulder surgery and is an unknown contributor.

Steve Hall: "We are confident Riggs will make it all the way back and will be a good player for us by opening day. Joe Scott will be a major factor and Bryan and Hipp gained tremendous experience last year."

SECONDARY — Two starters have departed but there is a relatively experienced base returning in cornerbacks James Howard (Jr., 5-11, 180) and Tyrone Pope (Sr., 5-10, 170), safety Tom Phillips (Sr., 6-3, 195) and converted roverback Mike Schaffel (So., 6-0, 190). Lettermen challenging for starting roles will be Todd Prukop (So., 6-4, 200) at safety and Dupree Anderson (So., 6-3, 200) at rover while providing the depth at the corners are J.J. Celestine (Fr., 5-10, 180) and redshirted JC transfer Tony Williams (Jr., 5-10, 175). Also back after a one-year hiatus is 1985 letterman Rolando Jarin (So., 5-9, 190).

Steve Hall: "We are not incredibly deep, but will be OK if the group comes along as we think they will. We have a good nucleus of young guys like J.J., Tony Williams, Anderson and Prukop who need to become players."

OFFENSE

WIDE RECEIVERS — Two starters and three other lettermen return to a position that began last season with virtually no Division I experience. Todd White (Sr., 6-0, 193) in 1986 quietly had the fourth best season in Titan history with 41 receptions for 636 yards, the third-best figure ever. John Gibbs (Jr., 6-1, 170) was second with 28 catches for a sixth-best 542 yards plus six touchdowns. Both return and are backed up by young lettermen Curtis Brown (So., 6-3, 180). Mark Hill (So., 6-0, 172) and Carlos Ward (So., 6-1, 185).

Jerry Brown: "We have two solid guys coming back but we need a third guy to step forward."

INTERIOR LINE — A solid nucleus returns and it could become a dominant unit if the tackles develop enough to allow the anticipated switch of nimble-footed Ed Gillies (Sr., 6-5, 260) and Matt Fitts (Jr., 6-4, 265) to the guard spots. Tackles Mike Oliver (Jr., 6-6, 250) and James Good (Sr., 6-7, 290) saw considerable action in 1986 and will be pushed by junior college transfers Dennis Ellis (Jr., 6-1, 290) and Kevin Bernell (Jr., 6-4, 250). Lettermen guards are available in returning starter Greg Hammond (Sr., 6-0, 265) and sophomores Steve Rowe (6-3, 240) and Tom Holler (6-2, 260). At center, honors candidate Phil Benson (6-1, 260) returns for his senior year after attaining the proficiency level of previous Titan all-conference centers. He will be backed up by Don Hamann (Jr., 6-5, 240) and Marc Hauser (So., 6-2, 225), both of whom will be trained to fill in at any of the interior line positions. Fitts was sidelined during spring to recover from surgery to repair a herniated disc.

Gene Murphy: "The key to our line is the development of Ellis, Bernell and Hamann, which will permit us to move Gillies and Fitts inside. Both can really run. Gillies can be as good an offensive guard as we ever have had or ever will have. Good came on last year and must continue to improve along with Oliver and Ellis' weight is critical question."

TIGHT END — One of the deeper positions on the squad with returning starter and 1987 honors candidate Jim Thornton (Sr., 6-3, 250) backed up by rapidly developing Bill Brennan (So., 6-6, 235). With John Smith moved to defense, youngsters Damien Macaluso (Fr., 6-3, 230) and Rory Ewing (Fr., 6-4, 200) will be in reserve.

Jerry Brown: "Thornton will be a big-time player for us and we will have to get him more into the offense."

QUARTERBACK — Another spot with good depth. Ronnie Barber (Sr., 5-11, 180), who started the last 10 games of last season, is the incumbent but is pressed by southpaw Carlos Siragusa (So., 6-3, 210) and late 1985 starter Tony Dill (So., 5-11, 190). Barber passed for 1,613 yards, the fourth-best figure in school history, and 14 TDs last year and is the leading returning rusher with 71 yards. Siragusa has the superior size and passing technique and has shown his competitiveness in two Spring Game victories. Dill guided the Titans to four wins in four tries to close out 1985 but was 0-2 in 1986 before suffering a knee injury and gaining a hardship redshirt season. A fourth letterman, Rich Sheriff (Sr., 5-10, 180) fell behind when he missed spring drills after knee surgery.

Gene Murphy: "I think you can flip a coin between Ronnie Barber and Carlos Siragusa, although Ronnie is the No. 1 guy based on his experience and the improvement he showed by the end of last season."

RUNNING BACK — The biggest void on the roster with the graduation of all-time rushing leader Rick Calhoun and two-year starting fullback Mark Hood. The returning "veterans" at halfback are Eric Franklin (Sr., 5-11, 190), with 44 yards on 10 carries, and Tracey Pierce (Sr., 5-11, 195), with 55 yards on 25 carries. Also challenging will be Jon Bell (So., 5-11, 185) and Keith Bowman (Jr., 5-8, 180). Replacing the steady Hood will be either Tim Byrnes (So., 5-11, 208), who had 24 yards on 12 carries last year, or Merced College transfer William Robinson (Jr., 5-10, 215).

Jerry Brown: "Pierce and Franklin must contribute as we think they are capable of doing. Robinson has the potential to be as good as anyone we have had at fullback and Byrnes gets better every day."

SPECIALISTS

PLACEKICKER — A new face and leg is on the scene in Long Beach City College transfer Stan Lambert (Jr., 5-11, 170), who will be challenged by holdover Tim Wharton (So, 5-9, 180). Lambert was 7 of 10 in the field goal department for the Vikings including a couple of last-minute game-winners. He was perfect on 22 conversion tries.

PUNTER — The duel between Jim Sirois (Jr., 6-3, 190) and Kurt Bloedorn (So., 6-5, 200) resumes with Sirois, the two-year starter due to his consistency and performance under fire, likely to remain the regular. Bloedorn has a big leg but seeks consistency.

Gene Murphy: "We devoted a great deal of time to the kicking game this spring, particularly kick-offs and placekicking. We know our punting game is solid. We want to develop more confidence in our special teams. When we move the ball we want to get points more consistently."

On the Road Again

Willie Nelson's hit recording of the early 1980s has become the Titan football theme song as coach Gene Murphy has taken his team to most of the airports in the western United States. In his seven seasons, Murphy is 15-10 at a combination of four home sites, 22-33 on the road and 0-1 on a neutral site (California Bowl). The 25 home games represent only 31 per cent of his 81 total games, which included one streak of 10 **consecutive** road contests (last six of 1980 and first four of 1981).

But, it has been worse. In Fullerton's first five years of Division I play, the Titans played only 17 home games including just two each in 1978 and 1979. The home record was 8-9 in that period while the road mark was 9-29.

The Division I totals: 42 home games and 94 away from home in 12 seasons.







The Rick Calhoun Show

The disappointment of the 1986 Titan football team's 3-9 season was softened somewhat by the courageous performance of running back Rick Calhoun, who etched his name indelibly in the Fullerton record book.

The great expectations built up by back-to-back Pacific Coast Athletic Association championships and a fast-finishing victorious campaign in 1985 left Fullerton ripe for a letdown, and it didn't take long to occur.

An embarrassing 49-3 pounding at UN Reno to open the season and a first-ever PCAA win by New Mexico State the following week stole the confidence of the veterans, particularly the fifth-year seniors such as Sean Foy, Ron McLean, Calhoun and Mark Chisom, who had turned the program around as underclassmen. The Titans played competitive football the rest of the way, but numerous problems and nine road games, the most of any Division I team in the nation, combined to prevent Fullerton from gaining a winning edge.

Calhoun's performance ranked him among the nation's leaders and came despite a late start due to commitments to his family of four children. After limited duty in the two opening defeats, the 5-8, 190-pounder racked up eight games of 100 or more rushing yards including 204 yards vs. Idaho State and 197 yards on 36 carries at UNLV. He finished the year with 1,398 yards on 259 carries to rank No. 10 in the nation with the second-best total in Fullerton history. He ranked No. 4 in the country in all-purpose running and became the Titans' career rushing leader with a total of 2,646 yards.

The "lowlights" of August and September included season-ending injuries to offensive guard Mark Stephenson, linebacker Bryan Riggs and starting quarterback Tony Dill. A young secondary showed its inexperience, while a veteran front-seven failed to perform to expectations. The kicking game and the usually reliable Titan special teams faltered. And it took time for newcomer Ronnie Barber to emerge at quarterback and an untested corps of receivers to begin producing.

There were memorable moments as the Titans "won" one half of most of their contests. They played well in defeat in two nationally televised games on Thursday nights at Tulsa and Fresno State despite road games the previous Saturdays. They came from an early 17-7 deficit to beat Idaho State, 35-25, and they routed Utah State, 33-0. In the season finale, they drove 99 yards in the closing minutes for a touchdown and a decisive two-point conversion in a thrilling 39-38 victory at Pacific.

The Titans took a perfect 4-0 record in Reno into their season opener, but the streak came to an inglorious end as the host Wolf Pack quickly flashed the form that would carry them to the Div. I-AA national championship. Reno played a nearly flawless game while the young Titans paid dearly for every opening day mistake and Fullerton suffered its worst loss of the Gene Murphy era.

After punting on their first possession, the Wolf Pack drove almost effortlessly to touchdowns on their next four possessions of the opening half. Fullerton punted four times and gave up the ball on a fumble before Len Strandley booted a 40-yard field goal to get the Titans on the scoreboard just before halftime.

Eric Beavers, who became UNR's all-time passing leader this afternoon, threw his third and fourth TD passes of the game on UNR's first two second-half possessions and it was 42-3, Reno, with one and a half guarters still to play.

Fullerton used all four of its quarterbacks in a futile effort to produce a touchdown. Tony Dill started and played two series into the second half. Rich Sheriff, Carlos Siragusa and Ronnie Barber followed but none could get the Titans into the end zone.

The PCAA opener took the Titans to Las Cruces to face a New Mexico State team under new coach Mike Knoll. The Aggies were coming off a loss in their home opener to Div. II member Angelo State and they hadn't won a PCAA game in their first two years in the conference.

But all that was forgotten as New Mexico State survived a late Fullerton rally and logged what would be their only victory of the season behind the exceptional play of quarterback Jim Miller.

While Fullerton was unable to complete a single pass in the first half, Miller had a big night. He saved the best for last, driving the Aggies 63 yards in 6 plays after Fullerton had taken the lead midway through the fourth quarter.

It took the squirrel derby to get Fullerton untracked. A fake punt on fourth and six from the Titan 40 made it close and then a 42-yard pass from wide receiver Todd White to wide receiver John Gibbs set up Rick Calhoun's go-ahead scoring run.

Fullerton's final drive carried to the Aggies' 31yard line before Ronnie Barber threw four consecutive incomplete passes.

The long-awaited home opener got the Titans on the winning track in 1987, but you wouldn't have guessed it late in the first quarter. Idaho State had driven the length of the field for a field goal and touchdown and was poised on the Fullerton 8-yard line when Trent Baker stepped in front of a Mike Mariani pass in the right flat and returned it 97 yards for a touchdown. It was the longest interception return in Fullerton history and the catalyst of a come-from-behind victory.

The turnaround wasn't immediate. Idaho State went 65 yards in four plays for another TD before the Rick Calhoun show began. Calhoun scored the first of his three TDs to draw the Titans within 17-14 at halftime and his 59-yard dash on the first play of the second half set up his go-ahead score from one vard out.

ISU failed on a fake punt play at the Fullerton 44 and Ronnie Barber, in his first Titan start at QB, converted it into points with a 36-yard bomb to Todd White for a 28-17 Titan lead. Jeff Hipp intercepted Mariani and three plays later Calhoun scored from the 14 for a 35-17 lead.

Calhoun totaled 293 yards with 204 rushing and 89 on three kick-off returns to jump into the nation's top ten, where he would stay all year.

The Titans played their best first half of the season but contradicted it with their worst second half and dropped a disheartening game indoors at Idaho.

After the Vandals used a pass interception to set up a short TD drive, the Titans dominated the opening half, outgaining Idaho 224-107 in total yards. A 63-yard bomb to Todd White set up a TD pass to Mark Hood and a 40-yard bomb to John Gibbs set up a 5-yard scoring pass to Gibbs seconds before intermission for a 17-9 lead.

After Len Strandley missed a 49-yard field goal attempt, Idaho got back in the game on a 3-play, 68-yard scoring drive and then the Vandals used their dormant ground game to edge into a 1-point lead and control the ball most of the game.

Fullerton mounted a counterdrive that carried from its 34 to the Idaho 18 but Strandley missed a 36-yarder. On a third and one play, QB Scott Linehan broke a 71-vard touchdown run to boost the lead to eight. The Titans' chances to tie ended when Ronnie Barber was intercepted at the Fullerton 32.

For the second week in a row, the Titans started fast before wilting in the second half. Actually, the troubles began in the final minute before halftime when the Rebels went 82 yards in five plays for a TD to draw within 17-14 at intermission.

Fullerton had taken the opening kick-off 73 yards in 15 plays and more than six minutes to a TD and got a field goal on the first play of the second period before the teams exchanged touchdowns in the middle of the second quarter.

UNLV returned the second-half kickoff 71 yards to set up a go-ahead score and added a field goal after a Fullerton fumble at the Titans' 16-yard line. An 80-yard bomb from backup quarterback Eugene Bowen to George Thomas stretched the lead in the middle of the fourth quarter and put the Rebels over 300 yards in passing.

The ground-oriented Titans' came within eight points on Tim Byrnes' 4-yard run but the Rebels put the game away when Todd White was run out of the end zone on an aborted reverse for a safety.

The Titans made their first of two national television appearances of 1986 and treated the ESPN audience with an entertaining but losing effort as the Titans marched within the Tulsa 20-yard line four times without scoring a point.

Rich Sheriff got his first start at quarterback and moved the club well but a pair of interceptions spoiled his debut. After Ron McLean tackled Steve Gage in the end zone to draw Fullerton within a point, the Golden Hurricane veer offense drove 52 yards in 11 plays to take a 10-2 lead. Fullerton drove to the Tulsa 7 before Sheriff was intercepted and Tulsa went the other way for a field goal.

Fullerton recovered a fumble at the Tulsa 21 early in the second half but a fourth down pass at the 14 failed. The next time the Titans got the ball they moved to the 16 where Len Strandley completed a pass to Todd White on a clever fake field goal play that unfortunately failed to reach the first-down marker. Tulsa roared down the field with Gage breaking an option run for a 20-2 lead that survived another aborted fake field goal play at the Tulsa 4 and later a TD pass from Ronnie Barber to Bill Brennan.

All-American lineman Al Noga spearheaded a quick, aggressive defensive effort by the host Rainbow Warriors which throttled Rick Calhoun (19 yards on 10 carries) and thus, the Titan running game.

However, Calhoun made his presence felt in his new role as a punt returner. On Hawaii's first punt, Calhoun received the ball at his own 13-yard line from where he launched not only the longest but possibly the most electrifying punt return in Fullerton history. He sidestepped a couple of tacklers, juked one out of his shoes around the 30, sprinted down the sideline before stutter stepping his way around the last man with an angle and then reaccelerating over the final 15 yards for a 7-0 Titan lead.

Hawaii's Rick Saunders went to work and in a span of six minutes, Hawaii was ahead, 16-7. Saunders intercepted Ronnie Barber to set up a 33-yard field goal by Rodrigo Valverde late in the first quarter. Hawaii drove 36 yards in 11 plays for a go-ahead touchdown and got another score 56 seconds later after Saunders recovered a Tracey Pierce fumble at the Fullerton 11-yard line. Hawaii most likely would have had a bigger halftime lead but Clayton Mahuka fumbled the ball through the Titan end zone when hit at the 1-yard line.

Fullerton faced the unenviable task of flying home from Hawaii and then preparing for a Thursday night game at Fresno State before a full "Doghouse" and another national TV audience on ESPN.

Fresno State dominated at the outset, scoring a quick field goal and then driving the Titan offense backwards to set up a 36-yard touchdown drive.

A 14-play Fullerton drive produced no points but gave the Titans the confidence that they could play with the highly-rated Bulldogs. They got on the board in the second quarter on a Len Strandley field goal, but it was offset by Barry Belli's placement in the final minute before intermission.

A fumble forced by Jeff Hipp's devastating hit and James Howard's field-goal block blunted Fresno in the third quarter and the Titans tied the game on a 76-yard, 13-play TD drive and another Strandley field goal after a 10-play march.

A 64-yard kick-off return by Brock Smith set up a quick go-ahead Fresno TD but the Titans marched right back behind Mark Hood to tie it at 20-20. Fresno State went ahead again and then used a pass interception and another Belli field goal to sew up the victory.

The Titans finally got their look at the team that upset Fresno State's California Bowl plans and Fullerton came away more than impressed as it suffered its most lopsided home conference loss in the Gene Murphy era.

Spartan quarterback Mike Perez was out of action with a shoulder injury and Tony Locy stepped into the pocket. After one quiet quarter to get his feet wet, he threw three touchdown passes in the first 7:08 of the second quarter on his way to a 278yard day. A Fullerton fumble on the kickoff following the third touchdown set up a fourth Spartan score a minute and a half later and the outcome was sealed for the Titans.

Fullerton did get on the scoreboard twice before intermission but the closest it could come was 31-16 after a bomb from Ronnie Barber to John Gibbs late in the third quarter. Kenny Jackson took over for San Jose and the fourth quarter was left for the reserves to get some deserved playing time.

The wear and tear of a long season showed its effect on two defensive units who were virtually helpless in trying to halt the enemy offense in Fullerton's season finale against the Pacific Tigers, who still had one more game to go.

It was the kind of game where the team that had the ball last seem destined to win and only the clock finally put an end to the fireworks. After Fullerton made a dramatic 16-play, 98-yard march in 6:21 to take the lead on a Rick Calhoun TD run and Ronnie Barber's 2-point conversion pass to Todd White with 1:00 to go, the Tigers had one last shot.

Beginning from its own 31-yard line, UOP moved cautiously out to the Fullerton 48-yard line. From there, on UOP's 96th play of the game, quarterback Hue Jackson threw a 20-yard pass to Kennedy Bryant to set up a 45-yard field goal try by Ken Norgaard. It fell just short and possibly a little wide with two seconds to go and Barber fell on the final snap for the Titans' third win of the year.

The growth and development of the Fullerton football program can be seen quite graphically in the output of players into the professional ranks in the past few seasons. Multiple Titan selections in the annual NFL draft have become the norm with nine players chosen in the past three years after a total of only three Titans were picked in the previous 14 years.

Last year's choices both came on the ninth round with running back Rick Calhoun going to the

Detroit Lions and defensive lineman Ron McLean being picked by the N.Y. Jets.

The zenith was reached in 1986 when four Titans were chosen in the first eight rounds. Cornerback Mark Colins went to the New York Giants on the second round; wide receivers James Pruitt (Miami) and Corn Redick (Philadelphia) on the fourth and seventh rounds, respectively; and offensive tackle Hank Goebel to the Rams on the eighth round.

Actually, the list would have been more impressive had fullback Todd Gerhart and linebacker

John Nevens not signed USFL contracts prior to the NFL draft.

Titans have done more than just sign contracts and make rosters. Both Bobby Kemp and Collins hit the jackpot early, playing in the Super Bowl as rookies. Kemp started for the Bengals in a losing cause against San Francisco in 1982 and Collins saw considerable action in a winning effort against the Broncos in the Rose Bowl in January of this year. The former PCAA Defensive Player of the Year also gained a berth on the NFL All-Rookie team.
