Adopted Budget Helps Meet Long-Felt Needs

The proposed LVA budget for the 1999-2000 fiscal year beginning April 1 was presented at the Annual Budget Meeting on January 28. The Board described the budget process used in some detail in the preparation of the 120-page document containing line-item details for each of five departments: Recreation, Security, Landscaping, Maintenance, and Administration. By law, homeowners may have access to budget information.

Highlights of plans for the coming year include completing the Recreation Annex remodeling; replastering of the swimming pool; replacing the disintegrating, below-code swimming pool deck; and installing new pumps, filters, and plumbing so the pool can be maintained to meet environmental and health standards more efficiently. Like the shortage of fire sprinkler systems, some of the problems being corrected were created

L.V. Security Works!

A short time ago, the *Camarillo Star* stated in its Crime Reports that two incidents occurred in Leisure Village in January. This aroused considerable anxiety in villagers who tried to ascertain the nature of the trouble. The Police ordinarily do not wish to speak to us villagers, but have promised to inform the L.V. Security Department of any difficulty. Therefore, if there are questions, call our Security Department.

Research finally uncovered the "crimes." One incident was the report of a scam that happened nearly six years ago regarding a pre-need cremation plan. The other was a resident who reported an open garage door and thought he saw somebody go in. Neither incident involved criminals entering the Village to harass or rob anybody.

Villagers, your Security Department really does its job!

It is still a good idea to be vigilant in locking doors and closing garage doors when leaving. It is comforting to have neighbors watching out for unattached strangers, and reporting them to Security. Know your guests or service personnel whom you invite into the Village — do not permit strangers to come in.

Determined individuals could probably cross over the perimeter defense system, but that is a far-out possibility. The Security Department with Chief Max Moses and his officers are friends on the alert to help in case of need, and the new defibrillators in the patrol cars have added another layer of assistance to villagers.

Have faith, don't worry, keep busy, have fun.

"I Did It My Way" Has Faults

The song "I Did It My Way," a popular classic by Frank Sinatra, is an interesting concept to explore. Many in the Village held top positions in their working careers and have strong personalities. They often migrate naturally to chairmanships and even to the Board of Directors.

Emergency Services Organization

The Emergency Services Organization congratulates General Manager Randy Watkins for developing and distributing the L.V. Census form which we have been asked to complete. ESO's chair had asked for the inclusion of a *Your Buddy* category in order to nudge everybody into identifying one. Note, however, the difference between one's Emergency Contact and one's Buddy!

One's Emergency Contact, usually a family member or dear friend, is the person to be notified in the event of a *personal emergency* such as illness or accident. This person may reside across town, in another city. Your Buddy should be a neighbor in very close proximity to your home. In the event of a *wide spread emergency* such as an earthquake or flood, this is the person you will check on once you've determined that you and yours are OK, and he or

she will check on you and your family after securing the situation at home. If anyone needs help, you and your Buddy will assist one another in any way you can. This is also the person or persons with whom you will carpool if evacuation is ordered. It would be much easier to account for everyone if we all identified someone who would be most likely to know our status. If additional information or clarification is needed, please phone Duane Waln, 388-3704 or Nancy Kuebel, 383-9165.

On another topic, we have been asked about the training provided to L.V.'s security force on the operation of the Automatic External Defibrillation (AED). A portion of the training was audited by a member of ESO, and that training was exhaustive.

After an intense morning session learning theory and technical data about AEDs, the afternoon was spent in practical applica-

tions. Two life-size dummies were used. The instructor provided information about the victim's age and gender and a vague description of what happened, much like you would expect to hear from a distraught spouse or other lay witness.

The men, working in teams of two, then went into action. They started with an apparatus much like a cone or funnel used to breathe directly into the victim's mouth, then one applied CPR while the other hooked the patient up to the AED. The machine then provided verbal instructions on the appropriate use for that individual.

After the process was complete, it was critiqued by the other men who were watching and the instructor. The teams then rotated; each security person performed the process multiple times until the instructor was satisfied that they knew what they were doing and why. This level of training will be repeated as new personnel are hired.

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Funds Needed for New Signs At Main Entrance to Village

Mannie Abbate, Chairman of the LVA Architectural Committee announced that contributions are being solicited to raise approximately \$8000 in order to replace the dilapidated plywood "Leisure Village" sign that greets visitors and residents as they enter the Main Gate. The current sign was installed over twenty years ago when the Village was first built. Its style is vintage 1970 and is not comparable to the signage appearing on buildings, shopping centers and office complexes in the Camarillo area.

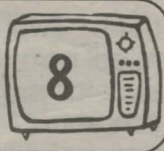
Last May the Architectural Committee recommended that the Association replace the sign with more modern signs that would send a message that Leisure Village is a "Vibrant Senior Community", as noted on the new logo for the Village. The Board of Directors agreed with the selection and agreed it would be submitted for inclusion in the 1999 budget. Unfortunately other matters took precedence and the proposal for the new signs

was NOT included.

A special account has been created for donations to the fund to replace the signs. The LVA Accounting Department will administer these funds. The lettering will be purchased directly from the manufacturer's representative located in Thousand Oaks. The lettering will be installed by professionals. Resident Services will repair and prepare the walls and grounds in the proposed sign areas. Information for the best method of lighting the signs will be obtained.

Donations should be made by check payable to "LVA for New Signs". It is hoped that LVA Clubs will make donations and that every resident will participate. Some of the Real Estate Brokers have already agreed to contribute to the fund as they feel this improvement will make the Village an even more attractive place for Seniors to consider for their retirement. The value of investment in the Village is directly related to the desirability of the property for resale.

senior activities and programs. He is assisted by two staff members who are federally funded. All of the classes, games and activities held there are led by qualified volunteers who are themselves seniors.

The Senior Center offers many kinds of games virtually every single day: bingo, bridge, poker, table tennis, billiards. There are also classes held several times per week: yoga, exercise, senior band, drawing. In addition, various special programs or services are regularly scheduled: AARP, HICAP, Grey Law, Senior Literacy, Meals on Wheels. The Braille Institute holds consultations and classes in daily living skills for vision impaired individuals. There are also social events, festivals and conferences which take place periodically. To join the center one must be at least 60 years of age and a resident of the greater Camarillo area.

The administrator described the purpose of the Center as enhancing the quality of life for seniors through socialization and activities. There are approximately 9000 seniors residing in Camarillo, outside of Leisure Village. An estimated 10% of these use the services of the Center. The present goal is to encourage and invite greater usage, including by residents of Leisure Village who might want to vary or extend their activities.

The facility is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and Sat-

urday from 9 a.m. to noon. Please call 482-1996 for information about scheduled activities.

Know Your Community Resources: Camarillo Senior Center

This is another in the continuing series of informational articles about resources in the community that offer special services for seniors.

The Camarillo Senior Center has been providing a variety of social, cultural and educational activities to senior citizens since the mid 1960's. It was first formed by a group of seniors in Camarillo who established and funded a small center on old Ventura Blvd. In the 1970's, the Pleasant Valley Recreation District took over the maintenance and administration of the Senior Center and in

1980 it was moved to its present larger location at 1605 Burnley Street.

The Center is under the supervision of five elected directors of the Pleasant Valley Recreation District. It is funded by that District; but it also receives income from donations and grants from county property taxes and from federal money under the Older Americans Act. There is a minimal membership of \$4 per year which basically covers the cost of the publication of its semi-monthly newspaper.

The Center is supervised by Paul Bruce, a trained recreation administrator, who is responsible for all

The 1999 president, Ed Vasquez (KC6UQO) of L.V. Amateur Radio Club, made this commitment to the club and Leisure Village, "The club will continue to grow and will continue to upgrade communication equipment. The Emergency Communication Center (ECC) for Leisure Village must be able to communicate via telephone, FAX, computer E-mail, computer video to receive and display earthquake data, weather reports, and to maintain a data base to alert residents in case of a disaster, and to assist L.V. Security, as directed. Skilled help is needed to operate emergency radios and computers. With help, the club will continue to organize the L.V. communication center to be a fully functional "Emergency Communication Center."

After the February 2 meeting in the Sun Room, members went to the ECC where Eddie had strip-plastic labeled each piece of equipment. Eddie then led the group to the emergency generator, which is on the SE corner of the garden spaces, about 20 yards from the ECC office. The location keeps noise and gas fumes from interfering with ECC operation and the generator will supply back-up power if AC (alternating current from Edison) should fail. Eddie demonstrated how to start the generator and how to get the voltage generated to the correct places without destroying anything.

Help is needed in a disaster from radio "HAMS," computer people, both men and women. There are many new people in L.V. Come and be a part of the Emergency Service Organization (ESO). For information call Paul at 987-1446. Next meeting is on March 2, 10:00 a.m, Sun Room.

Fifty L.V. veterans and spouses thoroughly enjoyed the interesting film video tape produced by Bob Vanderhaven, "Great Warplanes of Yesterday," on January 28. This excellent film featuring great warplanes from the Wright Brothers' Flyer in 1903 to the P-51 Mustang of World War II included both live scenes of World War II, and wonderful replicas of warplanes. Bob built these models to exact details and they appeared to be actual planes. Thanks Bob.

Ed Vasquez, President of L.V. Veterans, was the Mystery Speaker and gave an interesting talk about his years of experience as an employee with the P.1. Mugu missile program.

On February 25, a series of transparencies were presented by John F. McClain, Commander, USNR(Ret.) on the "Tragedy At Honda

Wreck Site." The story happened 75 years ago, on a dark, foggy September night in 1923, when nine destroyers went aground on the lonely, rock-strewn coastline, in a area known as the "Graveyard of the Pacific."

On Thursday, March 25, Paul Kirschner, coordinator, will present a talk on National Security World Threats. Paul Kirschner, Col. AUS (Ret.) attended a 2-week "Reserve Components National Security Course presented by the National Defense University at Dulles Airport in Virginia during the first weeks of February. This is the third similar course he has attended during the past ten years. This talk will have up to date information on how our country is looking at global security.

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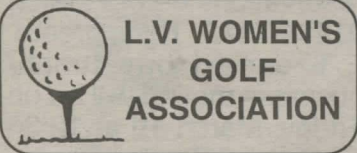

Regulation golf in March will be at Elkins Ranch Golf Course on the 18th.

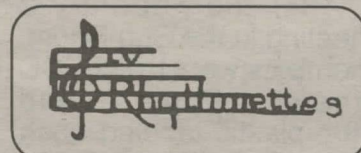

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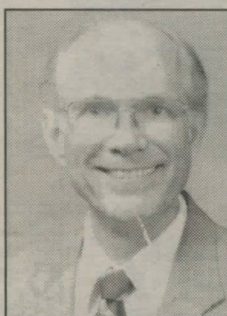
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Village 22 Celebration

Good Legislation For Seniors? You Can Make It Happen

You say you are worried about Social Security? Medicare? Long term care when you can no longer manage day-to-day activities? You want the State Legislature to enact laws safeguarding seniors from abuse (and there is much of that in our society today)? You are concerned that no one is paying attention to seniors' needs when it comes to transportation, problems with HMOs, high cost of prescription drugs?

Well, congratulations! This is your lucky day! Actually, April 15 is your lucky day. That is the day you can make it happen.

You have the opportunity of seeing to it that the most

important organization looking after the legislative needs of seniors, the California Senior Legislature, can remain in the business of proposing, advocating and protecting good laws for California seniors.

As you, or your tax preparer, completes your California Tax Return 540, look for line 49 under the "Contributions" heading. It is called the "California Fund for Senior Citizens." That is the very place where you can make it happen; you can make a difference. By making a contribution, large or small, and filling in the blank on Line 49 with that amount, you will help keep the California Senior Legislature in existence, as that Fund is

the only source or income to finance all of the activities of the CSL.

Over the years of the legislation which the CSL has proposed, more than 70% of their priority proposals have been enacted into law by the regular State Legislature. Leisure Village residents Joe Gaynes, V.29, and Joe Ellenbogen, V.16, have served in the California Senior Legislature, and both urge all LV residents to help keep this vital organization in the business of serving seniors throughout the State.

Remember, Line 49, and feel good about yourselves and your neighbors. Without your support, the Senior Legislature is in grave peril.

in the original installation 25 years ago.

In the landscaping maintenance area, five entry-level gardener jobs are to be added along with some equipment to help catch up and then speed up pruning and weeding programs. Tree removal, painting, and roofing needs as scheduled are included in the budget. The GTE cable television monthly cost is \$9 per home, or about a third of the cost to most cable customers in the area. The all-risk insurance policy was put out for bid and resulted in a significant premium reduction.

The total increase in the budget is just over \$693,000, which is met by an annual increase of 11.53% in monthly home assessments. In addition to the five gardener jobs, one clerical position and one junior accountant are planned to provide flexibility of staff in handling peak loads and meeting critical needs when an employee is absent. An additional employee is to be added to resident services, an area that pays for itself in fee services.

All in all, budget expenditures make "catch-up" progress in critical areas and, it is hoped, reduce needs for future major one-time costs. In any case, it appears that proposed plans are very much on track to meet some long-felt needs and resident desires.

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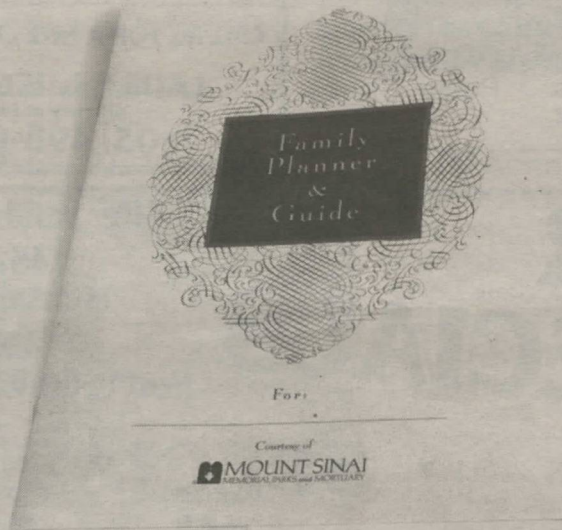

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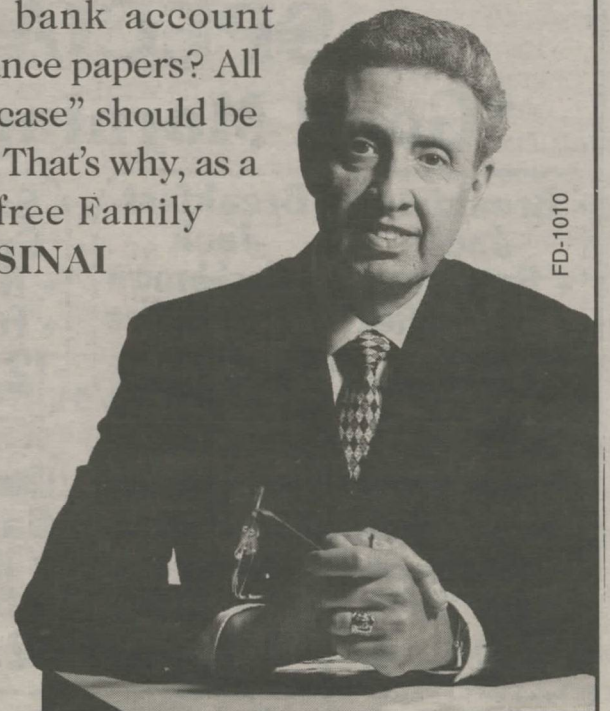
