EXHIBITS

Armenia. Imprints of a Civilization, a major exhibition in the museums of St. Mark's Square, in Venice, (16 December 2011 – 10 April 2012), hosted by the venues of the Correr Museum, the National Archaeological Museum and the Marciana National Library (curated by Boghos Levon Zekian, with Gabriella Uluhogian and Vartan Karapetian).

Sacred Word & Image: Five World Religions, currently on view at the Phoenix Museum of Art. The exhibition in Phoenix, Arizona features over 50 examples of the sacred written word and pictorial image as expressed in the cultures of Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism and Christianity throughout the past 1500 years. Drawn from several prominent private collections in Arizona as well as the Museum's collection, this exhibition includes manuscripts, textiles, prayer rugs, gilded shrines, crosses and icons, jeweled reliquaries and painted altarpieces that bring the history and interconnections between major world faiths together. A number of Armenian manuscripts and other Armenian religious artifacts are included, as well as other religious objects from the Ana and James Melikian Collection. The exhibition will remain on view until 25 March 2012. An electronic catalogue is available for purchase.

EVENTS

30th Anniversary of the Alex Manoogian Chair in Modern Armenian History and the Armenian Studies Program at the University of Michigan

From 13 to 16 October 2011, the University of Michigan and the larger community celebrated the 30th anniversary of the establishment of the Alex Manoogian Chair in Modern Armenian History and of the Armenian Studies Program itself. The events, which took place over a four day period, included a reception and dinner, a special exhibit at the Hatcher Graduate

Library, a presentation of Armenian films and a lecture on the subject, and a symposium.

Between Friday, 14 October and Sunday, 16 October, a group of scholars assembled in Ann Arbor to discuss the state of Armenian studies. This special project on "The State of Armenian Studies" that will result in a report on the subject with the cooperation of the National Association for Armenian Studies and a large number of scholars around the world was initiated by the ASP in 2008.

On the occasion of the 30th anniversary of the establishment of the first Armenian Studies Chair, Richard and Kathryn Yarmain have renewed their commitment to the program donating \$50,000 to the Program.




UPCOMING CONFERENCES

Western Ottomanists' Workshop Whitman College, 27 – 28 April 2012

The Western Ottomanists' Workshop was launched in 2010 as a collaborative group of west coast academics that sought to encourage in-depth conversations about faculty and graduate student research. WOW has already held two workshops, one at Portland State University (2010) and other at the University of California-Davis (2011). Consider this announcement an invitation to attend this year's workshop to be held at Whitman College, located in Walla Walla, Washington on 27 – 28 April 2012.

The WOW conference will begin with a reception dinner on Friday, 27 April at 5pm followed by a keynote address by Professor Fatma Müge Göcek of the University of Michigan. Professor Göcek will be discussing her forthcoming book entitled Deciphering Denial: Ottoman Past, Turkish Present and the Collective Violence against the Armenians, 1789-2009. The second day of the conference, Saturday, 28 April, will be devoted to our workshop presentations and paper commentaries.



Haroutyunian, Sona (University of Venice Ca’ Foscari, Italy) was a faculty member in 2012 at the Nida School for Translation Studies and was awarded a research fellowship (2012-2013) at the University of Venice Ca’ Foscari. Research program: Reflections on the Verbal System: From Comparative Linguistics to Translation Theory. This project concerns a comparative study of the temporal systems of the following languages: Italian, English, Modern Greek and Armenian, with a special focus on past forms, in particular the aorist. It aims at proposing a general theoretical hypothesis which might be useful both as in comparative linguistic studies and in translation theories. This project constitutes the first step towards a more comprehensive publication about the syntax of Armenian.

Hofman, Hazel Antaramian graduated in December 2011 with an MA in Art and Design (with distinction) from California State University, Fresno. Her emphasis was art history, focusing on medieval Armenian art for her thesis, entitled: An Interpretation of Textile Wealth in the Eleventh-Century Armenian Miniature Family Portrait of King Gagik-Abas of Kars. Her interests include art culminating from the interactive nexus of religions and cultures of the ancient and medieval Near East and medieval Iberia. As a studio artist, she is currently working on a theatrical read of the 1947 Armenian repatriation, to include studio drawings and paintings of the period.

Year of the Book

"Armenia: Imprints of a Civilization" Opens in Venice

A major exhibition titled "Armenia: Imprints of a Civilization" will open in the museums of St. Mark's Square in Venice on December 16, 2011. Hosting the exhibition will be the prestigious venues of the Correr Museum, the National Archaeological Museum, and the Marciana National Library.

The exhibition will mark the five hundredth anniversary of the first book printed in the Armenian language and will be open from December 16, 2011 to April 10, 2012. This exhibition will act as the official launch of the jubilee celebrations taking place in the Armenian capital of Yerevan, a UNESCO World Book Capital for 2012.

Among the distinguished scholars participating in the preparation of the catalog is Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, Haig & Isabel Berberian Professor Emeritus of Armenian Studies at Fresno State, who contributed one of the longest and most illustrated articles on Armenian manuscript painting. Thanks to the inclusion of several rare and precious manuscripts, another section will offer new perspectives on the development of Armenian historiography, literature, philosophy, science and theology.

An important segment of the exhibition will be uniquely devoted to shedding light on the practical realities of Armenian printing since 1512 and will include fascinating examples of printing in the dense network of Armenian colonies throughout the world. A special emphasis will be placed on the important tradition of the Armenian printing press in Venice, that reached its height of glory with the illuminated enlightened dedication of the academically-minded Mekhitarist Fathers.

The event is being organized by the Armenian

Ministry of Culture and the Foundation of Venice City Museums and is promoted by the National Committee for the Celebration of the Fifth Centenary of the Armenian Press (chaired by the President of the Republic of Armenia), the Ministry of Culture of the Republic of Armenia, the Foundation of Venice City Museums, the Armenian Mekhitarist Congregation, the Special Superintendent for Historical, Artistic and Ethno-Anthropological Heritage and for the Central Committee of the Museums of the City of Venice and the Municipalities of the Lagoon Region, the Embassy of Armenia in Rome, and the Marciana National Library.

Library of Congress Marks 500th Anniversary of the Armenian Literary Tradition with Exhibition, Publication

In 1512, Hakob Meghapat opened an Armenian Press in Venice, Italy, and published an Armenian religious book, "Urbatagirk" (the Book of Fridays). The era of Armenian printing had begun.

To mark the quincentenary of this event and UNESCO's designation of Yerevan, the capital of the Republic of Armenia, as its Book Capital of the World, 2012, the Library of Congress will open an exhibition, "To Know Wisdom and Instruction: The Armenian Literary Tradition at the Library of Congress" on April 19, in the South Gallery of the Thomas Jefferson Building. At noon, Dr. Kevork Bardakjian will deliver the 16th Annual Vardanants Day Lecture, titled "Scribes, Compositors and the Mind in the Making: the Armenian Script and the Creation of an Armenian Literary Identity." The exhibition will remain on view from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday, through Sept. 26.

Drawing from the Armenian collections of the Library of Congress, the exhibition will display the varieties of the Armenian literary tradition from the

era of manuscripts through the early periods of print and on to contemporary publishing.

Manuscripts in the exhibition will range from 14th- and 15th-century gospel books hand-copied by monks to 19th-century works on palmistry (Constantinople, 1894), fire-fighting (Venice, 1832), cotton production (Paris, 1859) and the first modern Armenian novel, "Armenia's Wounds," by K. Aboyan (1848). The first complete Armenian language printed Bible from Amsterdam in 1666 will be soon along with a richly illuminated missal copied in 1722 for the use of the celebrant of the Armenian liturgy and a rare 19th-century musical manuscript by Pietro Bianchini, who was the first to transcribe the Armenian liturgy using European musical notation. A 20th-century Soviet edition of the Armenian national epic, "David of Sasun" (1962) will also be on display.

In conjunction with the exhibition, the Library of Congress will publish an exhibition catalog titled "To Know Wisdom and Instruction: A Visual Survey of the Armenian Literary Tradition from the Library of Congress." The catalog was compiled by exhibition curator Levon Avdoyan, the Library's Armenian and Georgian area specialist in the Near East Section of the African and Middle Eastern Division. This 100-page softcover book with 75 images is available for \$25 in bookstores nationwide and through the Library of Congress Shop, www.loc.gov/shop/, (888) 682-3557.

The exhibition and catalog have been made possible through generous grants from the Dolores Zohrab Leibmann Fund, the Dadian Fund of the Library of Congress, Roger Strauch and Julie Kulhanjian Strauch, the Vartkess and Rita Balian Family Foundation and the Sami and Annie Totah Family Foundation.

The Library will also present a concert in conjunction with the exhibition. Armenian cellist Narek Hakhnazaryan will perform at 2 p.m. on Saturday, May 19, in the Coolidge Auditorium of the Thomas Jefferson building, located at 10 First Street S.E., Washington, D.C. Hakhnazaryan is a Young Concert Artists laureate who captured the First Prize and Gold Medal at the 14th International Tchaikovsky Competition in June 2011. The concert is free and open to the public, but tickets are required and are available through Ticketmaster at www.ticketmaster.com.

The Library's African and Middle Eastern

Division (www.loc.gov/rr/amed/) is the center for the study of 78 countries and regions from Southern Africa to the Maghreb and from the Middle East and the Caucasus to Central Asia. The division's Near East Section is a major repository for Armenian language materials on a wide variety of subjects in varied formats.

Founded in 1800, the Library of Congress is the nation's oldest federal cultural institution. The Library seeks to spark imagination and creativity and to further human understanding and wisdom by providing access to knowledge through its magnificent collections, programs and exhibitions.


