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

I've never thought of myself as a punk. I've listened to punk music for the majority of my adult life and have been into zines, and been to shows and worn pants with holes in them but I've never really thought of myself as a punk rocker. This whole dichotomy never really crossed my mind until recently, at a show, and then I just thought to myself 'Hey that's pretty weird I suppose'. So then of course. I went through a thankfully brief period of wondering whether this was in fact a problem of sorts. Lame: yes, but not without merit. Was I some hanger-on, completely missing the point? In the end, I

decided the answer was a resounding 'No'. I concluded that my status as a 'lay person' in the punk community came from a few key decisions that I am to this day very comfortable with. These were in order:

**b.** I've never been a big scenester. Yeah, I go to shows and see my mates and run into a few people from time to time but I have never hugged anyone at a punk rock show. No hugging...no scene connects. Oh well:

C. I'm not very cool. I still collect records and follow the trajectories of bands that were important to me 10 years ago. My t-shirts and ten seconds of conversation tell this story openly and punkers who think that Pennywise were pioneers of originality seem to look down their nose at me for it. And of course, I could care less, I know who Bob Bert is after all;

d. I look a little bit like a young Montgomery Burns from the Simpsons... except with hair, for the moment. So I've never been exactly normal looking and have thus seen little reason to make myself appear more 'original' as such. I just wouldn't feel like myself with a lip piercing and green hair. So if I want to go to punk rock shows looking a bit like an accountant on vacation, I figure that it's my prerogative,

after all the bass player from the Jesus Lizard really was So with all that accountant. consideration I've taken into decided to be proud of my predicament. I love your music punk rock people and I'm really interested in and support many of vour causes (many of which, I might add, are not solely punk rock concerns) but I think I'll pass on all the other stuff. "Women these days are stuck-up and psychotic. Have you worked that out yet? Twenty years ago you could get so drunk that you vomited on yourself and you could still get a blowjob. When you've had three hours sleep in the last couple of days and it's 3am and you're working at a place like that, coffee induced cross-cultural comraderie like that seems to means something.

I've been playing a few shows around the place with my new band (now on hold for a couple of months while our guitarist and singer follow the Queers and Mr T Experience around Europe). It's been great getting back up on stage and playing in a band again, you can't beat it. We've played with some good new bands too like Mervin Gribbs from Geelong, the Spazzys from Melbourne and the Hang-Ups from Ballarat. I also saw good shows recently from the Bangs (who are on Kill Rock Stars) and At The Drive-In (who are apparently moving to Melbourne for a while?) who were pretty awe inspiring live. Speaking of At the Drive-In, if anyone can explain any of their lyrics to me I'd be

appreciative. I think I know what "One Armed Scissor" is about but beyond that I'm basically lost. Is it some kind of feigned emotional/ intellectual gobbledegook or does it actually all make sense in some kind of postmodem/subvert-the-dominant-paradigm way or is it just bad poetry? It's been bugging me in any case.

P: I've got the Shock Records press release here, which I wanna get your reaction to. It says "With not a hint of bullshit, we can honestly tell you that this is pop perfection"...

M: Sheeesh...

J: That's very kind.

M: Who wrote that?

P: I dunno, maybe lan...

M: Whoa that's nice.

J: I mean it's flattering but I dunno, it's also about us so it kinda makes me sick. (we laugh)

P: So you don't take much notice of stuff that's written about ya's?

J: Yea I don't really bother reading it that much, like cool little fanzines we'll read sometimes but reviews and stuff we don't really bother with. I mean I don't really care about the size of the publication, it's just hard to read what you say y'know.

P: Ha, so I won't bother sending you a copy of this interview then ...

M: I'll read it!

J: It's like you're on the "me" motorcycle y'know... meeeeeeee. Y'know, talkin' all about yourself.

M: Yea it's just strange, just like when you hear your voice on a tape recording and you're like 'aw

do I sound like that'?

J: Yea exactly.

M: It's kinda funny too, coz as far as 'perfection' goes, if we ever did a perfect thing we'd throw in the towel, coz once you do that - I mean, if I ever made a record I was happy with all the way thru I would just quit because I could never do it again coz it's so hard. But for us we just keep trying to do what we do and hopefully...

J: Yea we'll just keep making records. We're gonna make another record at the beginning of the year. After all we've been thru we just kind of do what we do at this point, we don't really let a lot phase us. Y'know, whether we're playing in front of two thousand people or in front of twenty people we still put on the same show.

P: Cool, now I've gotta ask about Frank's split with the band midway thru the US Warped tour...

M: Yea...

P: Was it true that he quit coz you guys wouldn't let him play his Elton John cd's in the van on tour?

M: No, not at all...

P: I made that up by the way... (we laugh)

M: Oh, I was going to say, Elton John, I think he does likes him a little bit but not that much!

P: Only his clothes... (we laugh)

M: Y'know when he got in the band he only wanted to be in the band for a year as it was, and he was getting married and doing other things. And he'd been married once before and um, just didn't enjoy touring. He just wasn't into it.

P: How far into the Warped tour did he...

J: We only had three more shows left, close to the end. It was just a hard tour y'know, a lot of waiting around, it was really really hot outside, and I think it just got everyone y'know.

P: So how long had you been on the road for?

J: For about two weeks. But we did a few tours before that, we did a West Coast tour on our own. Then we did a Canadian tour before that with Swervedriver, and then we did another West Coast tour with Lagwagon


too. So we'd done a bunch of touring and I mean I just don't think he wanted to do it y'know.

P: So you're still mates with him ...

J: Oh yea, Mark talks to him all the time.

M: His birthday is comin' up.

J: Yea, I think he likes the idea of playing music, but I don't think he likes the idea of going and slugging it out on the road y'know...



M: And for us being actually a new band, it's a lot of work from ground zero...

J: And I think he realized just how much work it was when we got out there...

Me and Mark hac written all the songs for this record, and we hac already been rehearsing for a long time, and Frankhad only joined the band a week before we made the record y'know. He didn't really contribute that much to the song writing, I mean his input was amazing but ah we'd kind of done a lot of the work before that. We kind of knew it wasn't going to be a thing forever, but we thought fuck, let's just take advantage of it and make a great record...



M: Yea, have fun with it. That's what it was all about, just having fun recording. That's why we had a lot of extra tracks because we just had fun and made some songs right there... P: So there's still some more unreleased tracks from that O recording... J: Yea, there's still four more. " (remix)" "Cla -41 WAR VOTING VINOUNCEMENT M: Yea, like I said it was pretty productive for a while. Everything was clicking so we just went with it for a while. And like all things sometimes when they burn bright they don't burn as long, but that's ok. P: You've been in bands for ten - fifteen years, so what's the worst thing you've seen a band member eat? P: So you'd just pat him on the back and say thanx...


M: Yea, I'd probably just turn around and turn my guitar off.

P: You were saying how you haven't been totally happy with the recordings to date, is that just a striving for perfection thing?




P: I guess mixing it down and stuff you're listening to it over and over for days on end too so you'd get sick of hearing it ...

T: Just make sure everyone keeps their eye out for Scott e's video



Claye joins Ben, Marty and Mark to beef things up on stage. I had a chat with Claye to ask a bunch of typically lame Pee questions about beer...

PEE: So the 3 piece has expanded to a four huh...

P: So what do you reckon you've brought with you to The Gels, other than good lookin' dreads?

P: And the flavor of the gum would be ...


C: Um, I'd go the grapefruit I reckon.


P: I read an interview in another zine with an Adelaide band where they made a point of pointing out that they're not a christian band... C: Sure...

P: Can you give any dirt on the guys... like, who smells the worst in the studio?




P: Thank for your time Claye, anything you want to add?

P: Where would you like to see TRS be career wise in two years time?


**B:** I'd love to see TRS having done a few tours and have a full length under our/my belt.


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
