

there was no hint that the day would be in any way remarkable. True, our ship was scheduled to dock in Boston, and for most of these battle-weary veterans it would be their first view of their beloved homeland in four years. But the stop would be brief. With V-E Day behind them, the memory of their fallen comrades covering the beaches of Europe still fresh, these troops were scheduled for immediate shipment to the war in the Pacific. There would be no furloughs or passes.

As the ship's special services officer, I delivered news flashes over the PA system. I spent a lot of time huddled in the radio shack listening to the static, occasionally picking up tidbits I thought would interest the troops. But by now their morale was low; they just wanted to go home. There was a story one day about a powerful new bomb that had been developed to drop

on Japan, but it didn't seem newsworthy enough to announce to this apathetic bunch.

Nothing else seemed particularly newsworthy that afternoon of August 14 either, but as I stood on the bridge, a breathless radio officer shoved a piece of paper under my nose. I read it—and read it again. Then I shouted into the microphone, "Now hear this! Japan has surrendered! The war is over! I repeat—the war is over!"

I looked down at the

troops on the deck, expecting to see jubilation. But their expressions were even more glum now. Some shouted obscenities at me. Others stared over the ocean, blank eyed. Just then a fist crashed into my jaw. "Shultz, you son of a bitch, what kind of a joke do you think you're pulling on us!", shouted a burly sergeant. He raised his fist again, then dropped it as his eyes widened in disbelief. Over my shoulder appeared Boston Harbor, piers crowded with cheering civilians carrying homemade signed signs: "Welcome Home!" "The War is Over!" "The Japanese Have Surrendered." Newsboys could be seen holding up extras, and then the ships' whistles opened up in a cacophony of joy! Suddenly our glum soldiers were shouting, dancing, going happily insane. From the lower decks, dozens of khaki-clad fig-



ures leaped in Boston harbor and swam toward the nearby piers.

That to me—sore jaw and all—was V-J Day.

there was no hint that the day would be in any way remarkable. True, our ship was scheduled to dock in Boston, and for most of these battle-weary veterans it would be their first view of their beloved homeland in four years. But the stop would be brief. With V-E Day behind them, the memory of their fallen comrades covering the beaches of Europe still fresh, these troops were scheduled on Japan, but it didn't for immediate shipment to the war in the Pacific. There would be no furloughs or passes.

As the ship's special services officer, I delivered news flashes over the PA system. I spent a lot of time huddled in the radio shack listening to the static, occasionally picking up tidbits I thought would interest the troops. But by now their morale was low; they just wanted to go home. There was a story one day about a powerful new bomb that had been developed to drop

seem newsworthy enough to announce to this apathetic bunch.

Nothing else seemed particularly newsworthy that afternoon of August 14 either, but as I stood on the bridge, a breathless radio officer shoved a piece of paper under my nose. I read it-and read it again. Then I shouted into the micro-phone, "Now hear this! Japan has surrendered! The war is over! I repeat—the war is over!"

I looked down at the

troops on the deck, expecting to see jubilation. But their expressions were even more glum now. Some shouted obscenities at me. Others stared over the ocean, blank eyed. Just then a fist crashed into my jaw. "Shultz, you son of a bitch, what kind of a joke do you think you're pulling on us!", shouted a burly sergeant. He raised his fist again, then dropped it as his eyes widened in disbelief. Over my shoulder appeared Boston Harbor, piers crowded with cheering civilians carrying homemade signed signs: "Welcome Home!" "The War is Over!" "The Japanese Have Surrendered." Newsboys could be seen holding up extras, and then the ships' whistles opened up in a cacophony of joy! Suddenly our glum soldiers were shouting, dancing, going happily insane. From the lower decks, dozens of khaki-clad fig-



ures leaped in Boston harbor and swam toward the nearby piers.

That to me—sore jaw and all-was V-J Day. Dr. Leonard Shultz, V. 11 (Originaly published in Life Magazine 12/89)

SO YOU HAVE SPRING FEVER?

So you have spring fever-so do I. For every colorful blossom I see starting in January (geranium, clivia, pear blossoms, impatiens, blue hibiscus, etc, etc,) I think "I want one of those." If you REALLY have spring fever you go out and BUY "one of those" and then come home and try to find a place to put it.

There is a much better way. First, realize that those little babies grow up to be teenagers. For example: the pittsiporum Wheeler dwarf, the lovely little mounds of green in the one gallon or two gallon cans grow up to be two feet high and three feet diameter (according to the gardener's bible-The Sunset Western Garden Book). Don't you believe it. In our beautiful Camarillo climate they will grow to 31/2 feet high and 5 to 6 feet around. If you stick three of these little mounds in between three rapheolepsis (aka raphs, pink lady) or hibiscus or whatever, pretty soon you are going to have a "forest" of shrubby plants that will need extreme pruning in order to have "their place" in your garden, or else all will be

pruned into one glob that will fit your bed, so that the lovely mounds now become hedges.

Here are some guidelines:

 Remember that plants have special needs. Just as each child is dif-

ferent so each plant grows better in certain environments. These special needs include requirements such as sun or shade, much water or little water, loose soil or heavy soil. Know what environment YOU have to offer.

2. Plan and measure for the minimum or maximum number of shrubby plants your bed or area will accommodate—using the maximum size listed in the garden book or the sign at the nursery. Remember to put low growing shrubs under the windows, tall ones at the corners of your house, or in the blank wall areas. Leave space for them to grow to full size.

3. Then, while you are waiting for the shrubby/ woody plants to grow to maturity you can fill in with plants that are not woody. These could come from plants or flowers such as dwarf agapanthus (if you want the large agapanthus you need to plan space for them as you would a

woody shrub.) society garlic, richmond densis begonias, day lilies, impatiens, geraniums, etc.-plants that can be dug up easily as your woody shrubs mature.

So you have spring fever? Just adopt the number of those little darlings that you have space for and that will go into your overall design of your plantings.

If you would like help with your planning you might be able to consult books on gardening, talk to someone at a nursery or write a note to the LV Landscape committee and ask for help.
