A Legacy of Good Works

"We wanted a community," recall Stan and Loretta Reshes, as they describe their feelings when they moved into Leisure Village in 2004. And seventeen years later, it's clear that this caring and creative couple not only found a community, but they have also worked tirelessly to support and grow the activities and outreach that define the Village. Now they are leaving that legacy – a move to be closer to family – but their contributions won't be lost or forgotten.

The "community" of Stan and Loretta has been inside and outside LV's gates. When they first arrived in Leisure Village, Stan was still working full time and commuting; and Loretta was soon as busy here as he was in LA. She volunteered at the City of Hope, with Hadassah, and she joined LV's Players Guild, convincing Stan to sign on soon after. For 16 years, they have been the "go-to" couple whether for aftershow goodies for the audiences

or directing productions. (See the Players Guild Column on page 12 for details about their lives.)

The Women's Club also caught Loretta's eye. She and Barbara Crome led a fundraising program selling See's Candy at Club meetings, other Village events, even a home-delivery system. Bringing everything from fresh food, canned goods to plastic baggies to The Somis Pantry, a nearby facility providing free sustenance to nearby families, was also a favorite of Loretta. Her to-do list is a long one. "I guess I've always been other-directed," she says. "From my days selling cookies as a Brownie, I am happy to do it."

Stan admits he is more reticent than his wife – or, perhaps, was more reticent. He worked first for more than two decades for Chevron, then nearly that long as the owner of an automotive paint company. "I didn't want to retire. I was sure I'd have nothing to do," he recalls with

Flowering Trees of Leisure Village

We have many flowering trees in the Village. Some are tropical trees from Asia and the Southern Hemisphere. Every seed comes from a flower, so actually all trees have some kind of flower. Some are absolutely gorgeous, others are not so impressive. Eucalyptus, Oaks and Pines bloom, but not so noticeably. Since pine trees pollinate by wind, they do not need bees or other insects that are attracted by colorful flowers. Here are the main flowering trees in the Village.

Evergreen Pear (P. kawakamii) has abundant clusters of white blooms. It is usually the first tree to flower in January, but the fruit is

seldom seen. This is the most common flowering tree in the Village with 357 planted.

The Purple Orchid tree (Bauhinia) has fragrant orchid-like 2-3 inch long pink to purple flowers that bloom January-May. The related Hong Kong Orchid tree has larger 5-6 inch long flowers. Both have large thick twin-lobed leaves and produce many beans. There are nice ones across from the south entrance to Village 6.

Weeping Bottlebrush (Melaleuca) is from Australia with flowers

that are long (4-inch) hairy spikes. The one near my house bloomed bright red in April.

Flowering Trees

The Strawberry Madrone (Arbutus) near the new Gym are blooming with clusters of small pink flowers. This tree has beautiful smooth red-brown bark.

Sweetshade (Hymenosporum), native to Australia, bloomed in April with clusters of 5-pointed fragrant yellow flowers. There is one across from Village 4.

Majestic Beauty Indian Hawthorn (Rhaphiolepis) has leathery leaves and many half-inch pinkwhite flowers in winter-spring. It usually grows as an evergreen shrub, but we have three small trees at the entrance to Village 19. The term "tree" is subjective. I call it a tree if I can stand under it.

The New Zealand Christmas tree (Metrosideros) is starting to bloom with hairy red flowers. It is an evergreen with leathery leaves that are white and wooly underneath. There is a nice one starting to bloom near the north entrance to Village 25.

blooms from May - September. The tree is native to Brazil and can be messy. It has clusters of 2 inch long tubular flowers and fine fern-like leaves.



Weeping Bottlebrush tree (Melaleuca)

Its large round flat seed capsules can be seen on the tree in winter.

Magnolia is an evergreen with big glossy leathery leaves and large 8-10 inch long single white flowers. It blossoms in early summer. Many in the Village are the smaller "Little Gem" variety with 5-6 inch long flowers.

The Silk tree (Albizia) is from eastern Asia. It has showy pink flowers, puffy like a pincushion,

that will bloom soon. Its ferny bipinnate leaves can fold up at night. The seed, a flat brown pod, often remains on the branches.

Crape Myrtle (Lagerstroemia) is a deciduous tree from Asia. It has crinkled clusters of one-inch long flowers that vary from purple to red to white, blooming profusely from July to September.

The Chinese Flame tree (Koelreuteria) blooms in late summer with large clusters of showy red-orange two-inch flowers with a pleasant fragrance. Its large 12-24 inch long bipinnate leaves are divided into oval leaflets. There is one near the south entrance to Village 20.

We also have many Lemon trees (Citrus limon) with small white flowers year-round. Apparently, they were given to the original LV home buyers.

Liquidambar is another colorful tree worth mentioning. Although its blooms are inconspicuous, this deciduous tree native to the Southeast brings color to us in the fall. It is recognized by its five-pointed star-shaped leaves

and spiny seed balls that hang in the bare tree all winter.

The Village does not necessarily replace trees. Landscape Committee member Claudia Balke says that homeowners can have trees planted by special request, if on the Approved Plant List. The homeowner pays for the tree stock (\$100-200) and Village staff does the work. Each request is considered on a case by case basis.

Another COVID-19 Game Changer, Telemedicine Catches On

Though habits wrought by the pandemic are changing every corner of our lives, none are more dramatic than combining health and teleconferencing to the very walls of our homes. We sheltered in place while attending to business; we sat in on meetings; celebrated holidays; and met up with family and friends --- all from behind a screen. The year-long pandemic was a crash course on how much we can get done remotely when we have to.

Zoom was the breakthrough technology which served business and soared as a tutoring platform for education. But you only need a cell phone or landline for remote health care; a world-wide example of how the pandemic shrank our world. Teleconferencing and telemedicine were long-available, but never caught on. 2020 was their year!

The Covid crisis pushed hospitals to a breaking point, and patients stayed away – whether out of fear 11% to 46% in that one year. or because they had to. Changes often happen slowly in health care, but with record speed, telemedicine skyrocketed!

A decade before the pandemic began, Davis Musinguzi came up with his big idea: a system that would allow people in Uganda to text a tollfree number and have a doctor call them back for a consultation. He cofounded the Medical Concierge Group in 2012, to introduce his theory, convinced it would work. Now he admits it was way too early.

When the pandemic struck, the number of users soared 10-fold between March and November. Covid-19 was a game-changer. Similar spikes in telehealth usage were reported globally. Patients could communicate with their primary doctor from home, and if necessary, confer with a specialist the same way. In the U.S., telemedicine skyrocketed from

Africa has about 10% of the world's population and 25% of the world's disease burden. Cellphone penetration to make the contact is now over 80% in Rwanda, Kenya, Nigeria, and some other parts of Africa.

The pandemic will end, but many of our habits and preferences have evolved, and will continue to be valuable. For health care, remote services are destined to stay on post-Covid; and telemedicine can indeed make people's lives easier and better in most cases.

The slate of candidates running for the open seats on LVA's Board of Directors was announced last month, giving Village homeowners two months to make their selections prior to the Association Annual Meeting on June 24.

Full biographies, personal statements and photographs of the candidates are posted in the Atrium of the Recreation Center. Ballots will be sent to all homeowners in mid-May with instructions on how to complete the vote and how to return the ballot.



A WORD ON WINE By Don & Barbara Senior

Right in Our Backyard: Santa Barbara County

Just up the road from Camarillo, Santa Barbara County is home to over 200 wineries and 7 American Viticultural Areas that straddle Highway 101, El Camino Real, from Gaviota to Santa Maria. Located on the receiving end of east-west oriented mountains, the area is a maritime-influenced desert with morning fog cover, cool afternoon ocean breezes and well-drained soils. The whole package results in cool, slow ripening grapes with longer hang time, making it ideal for cool climate grapes like Chardonnay and Pinot Noir. Santa Barbara County has a long history of ranching, but it took ingenuity and risk-taking to fulfill its promise for viticulture.

In 1971, Richard Sanford was studying microclimates of the Santa Rita Hills, an area that straddles Route 246 between Buellton and Lompoc. Soon he and his partner, Michael Benedict, planted the first Pinot Noir grapes in Santa Barbara County. Chardonnay was planted soon after, and the grapes thrived. Wine was made in a small redwood barn, and a small tasting room opened in a rustic clapboard house. Quickly the wines set a new benchmark for Pinot Noir and Chardonnay wines and put the county among the top wine producing regions in California.

The Sanford and Benedict Vineyard formed the backbone of what is now the Santa Rita Hills appellation. It was this vineyard that supplied cuttings for many of the surrounding vineyards. It is still producing wines from the county's oldest Pinot Noir vines. Recently, an eco-friendly facility of adobe and recycled wood replaced the clapboard tasting room and barn. Sanford Pinot Noir and Chardonnay wines are still renowned for their distinctive quality. Visits to the winery are truly a premium experience.

The success and buzz of Sanford & Benedict's venture led other pioneers to plant vineyards. Three founding wineries can be found on Foxen Canyon Road, starting north Mesa and Rancho Sisquoc.

In 1972, Brooks Firestone took the reins of his father's Santa Barbara ranch where he founded an experimental vineyard, the second vineyard planted in the county. Brooks soon built his own production facility and a beautiful tasting room on Zaca Station Road. It is still an outstanding place to visit. Firestone wines are very affordable, most being less that \$15 with wines that cover the spectrum of styles and varietals.

Founded by five friends in 1973, The Zaca Mesa Winery is a few miles up the road, and the third winery established in Santa Barbara County. Experimentation was an integral part of those early days, and in 1978, Zaca Mesa planted the first Syrah in Santa Barbara County. That Syrah is the oldest Syrah block on the Central Coast, and it remains one of Zaca


> Rancho Sisquoc Winery is a throwback to the days of rustic winery buildings and less formal tasting experiences. It's a bit further up the road and easy to miss. Foxen Canyon opens into a wide valley and curves to the left. On the right, a narrow, paved track leads to the tasting room in a grove of trees. The first vines were planted in 1972, and soon Rancho Sisquoc became a bonded winery with a rustic tasting room. The tasting experience is without fanfare and the wines are affordable and very well made.

> These days, tastings are in small groups and appointments are required. So there you have it, Santa Barbara County and some of the founding wineries, right in our backyard.





Watching Walt working his computer and the system he has devised for the many elements involved, one can imagine Walt Wilson comfortable calling out rocket he devised.



veggies are nice and brown, tossing regularly. Remove chicken and all veggies to a separate dish, wait a minute on the squash. Remove skin from chicken. Remove pan from heat.

You just need to keep the heat as low as possible because at best you want to let it cook very s-l-o-w-w-l-y, an hour or longer. The slower it cooks the more tender the chicken. Serve over a scoop of rice and top with peanuts, raisins and scallions. Offer chutney on the side.




