Transportation For Severely Handicapped

A meeting has been scheduled for Monday, March 29, at 4:00 p.m. in the MPR for villagers interested in the Paratransit Service for the Disabled. The meeting has been opened to all interested villagers to gain information, and to inform those who might not be able to attend and might need Paratransit. Lynette Sikes, the Ventura County certification coordinator, will give an explanation and answer questions.

The Paratransit Service comes under the American Disabilities Act of 1990, a Federal Law, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in using public transportation.

The City of Camarillo's three new buses, which should be in service June 1, will be accessible to most of our villagers. However, there may be a few persons whose disability or condition prevents them from using the regular buses. In that case, under certain conditions, the Paratransit Service will provide curb-to-curb service for them. Individuals will be required to fill out an application and describe their disability or condition which must meet ADA criteria for certification.

The Paratransit Service is not scheduled to start until July 1, but it is im-

A Few Words To The Hearing Impaired

As probably most of you have learned, an infraredray electronic sound system for the hearing impaired was to be installed in the AR. It is expected that by the end of March this marvelous event will have taken place. If so, this scientific sound system will be ready for use at the Board of Directors Meeting of Monday, April 5 at the usual time of 10:00 a.m. in the AR. But this is not definite, so watch Channel 12 for the official announcement.

For those who own their headsets, they may bring their own for any occasion that warrants the infraredray system to be turned on. But for those who do not own a headset, the Village will have twelve of them to loan out for use only during certain functions in the AR. Then at the end of the program, they are to be returned to the attendants located just inside the front doors to the auditorium. They will be ready to dispense approximately one hour before the beginning of the program.

When you are first loaned a headset, you will leave with the attendant either your current driver's license, Visa card, Master Card, or American Express card as a guarantee that the headset will be returned. We will have only twelve

Inside Leisure Village Enters Fifteenth Year

With this March issue *Inside Leisure Village* begins its fifteenth year of publication in Leisure Village.

There are many people to whom we must be grateful for our having such a publication. We know of no other Senior Citizens' community that has a paper of such scope available to them at *absolutely no cost whatever* to the administration nor to any resident.

We owe much to Hank Crockett, publisher of the Camarillo Daily News in 1979, when it all started. He approached Sandy Okum of the Village with a proposal that the Daily News publish such a paper, in conjunction with the Leisure Village Board of Directors. The Board, still controlled by Leisure Technology, turned him down.

Sandy came to a meeting of a writers' workshop here in the Village looking for volunteers, because some people felt very strongly that we needed better communication within the Village. Workshop participants agreed and called a meeting of interested people. About 25 residents responded and we had a name and a staff.

No one in the group had ever had any journalism training, but with the help of Novella Killian, composing room supervisor at the Daily News, we published that first amateurish issue in March 1979.

Looking back, we are amazed at how much we have learned. Actually much of each edition still retains the folksy flavor of a small town newspaper with a more professional format. In many ways Leisure Village is a small town within a larger city.

While many of the residents do pursue wider interests, within the Village we are bound closely together by age and by many common needs. That is why the name, *Inside Leisure Village*, and why we attempt to restrict its content to just that. There are many outside sources to keep us in touch with the great wide world beyond. Items of activities outside the village are used when space permits.

Over the years, contributors have numbered in the hundreds. Each issue represents 50 to 70 writers and it is impossible to thank or recognize them singly. Some are more skillful than others; some represent more residents of the Village, and some have more information to impart. Using these criteria, we try not to edit more than is absolutely necessary to keep contributor's personal style, whenever possible.

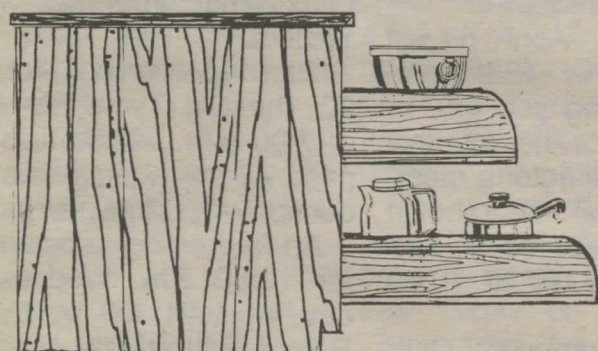

Employee Withholding Tax Advice

I'm writing on a different subject. Something I do not want any LVERS to learn the hard way. Please don't let happen to you what has happened to so many. The subject was brought out when two appointees to the U.S. Attorney General's office had to bow out. I'm not speaking of hiring illegal entrants to the U.S. but of the avoidance of employee taxes. I lived and worked as a Social Security Administration Field Representative for over 30 years, so I know.

For instance, a person files for Disability or Survivors benefits with the Soc. Sec. Adm. We'd request the earning record from Baltimore, where they're kept. In too many cases there were practically no earnings upon which to base and compute benefits. Question-

ing brought out that the disabled or deceased had worked as a maid, household help or in similar employment for several different employers, or maybe just one employer. We'd get the employer's name and address. I had to reconstruct the earnings record. Employer was devastated to learn they had to pay Internal Revenue taxes for several years back, PLUS interest and PLUS penalty!

The employer(s) had paid cash to the employee, and had not reported those earnings to Soc. Sec. Adm. or even on Form 1099 to the Int. Rev. Service for income taxes that should have been withheld or reported by the employee.

Many workers will say they are self-employed AND may be. But, it would be wise for anyone in LV who has any doubt

or questions to clarify the employment status of anyone working in your home. You can phone Internal Revenue on 1-800-829-1040; Soc. Sec. Adm., on 1-800-772-1213 and the Calif. State Employment Development Dept. (805) 654-4505.

headsets to loan out, perhaps not enough for the demand. And it will be on a first come, first served basis. Thus, we encourage you to purchase your own. Herbert Marks in Village 44 is the man to see. His phone number is 482-1311. He states that if he gets enough orders, Herb is confident that he can get a price break and a little savings to you.

At the baptism of the infraredray sound system, hopefully on April 5, the hearing impaired will be instructed to sit together in two back rows of the AR which will be reserved for them. Then a few headsets will be passed out. The person receiving one will listen on it for five or six minutes and then pass it on to the next person sitting beside her and so on until everyone gets a chance to use it. Then one can decide in her own mind if it would be a good decision to buy one. For a little more money, you can purchase an emitter easily attachable to the back of your TV. Then with your headset you will be able to enjoy normal hearing.

Finally it is hoped that the infraredray electronic sound system in our AR will bring much joy to our hearing impaired for years and years to come.

Also, in the aftermath of a major earthquake, you will need vital personal information for a variety of reasons, including the processing of insurance claims and disaster assistance applications. For a list of the items and documents, call me at 987-1446 and I'll give you a copy.

Then I received the current ESP Focus, titled: Focus On Children. But it's valuable information to us adults and you can pass the leaflets on to your kids and grandkids. They're on the Library table. If supply is gone, leave your name and phone number or wait a day or two and I'll have the Library resupplied.

Dancing At The Plaka

We were enjoying a holiday in Greece. During the day we had clambered over the ruins of the Acropolis which towered over all of Athens. At night we had witnessed the Sound and Lights from the Pnyx, a hill across from the Acropolis. We could see the lights playing on the Parthenon in exalted beauty. The voices of English actors came from loud speakers to tell the story of Athens. As they related the burning of the Acropolis by Xerxes' armies, the lights turned a malevolent red, as if the entire hill was being devoured by flames. It was moving, thrilling, unique.

The next evening, after a few drinks and a great meal, we set out to find the Plaka, a district that lies just below the Acropolis, within walking distance of our hotel. It is the old part of Athens, and during the Turkish domination it housed all there were of the Athenians. Today it contains the tavernas, like the one in "Never on Sunday."

To find our way, all we had to do was ask any Athenian on the street: "Plaka?" They would point and we would follow. Soon we were directed to turn into an area that was completely without lights. Our eyes could discern nothing and we just felt our way in an enveloping darkness. We

knew no fear, because this was 25 years ago, when mugging was an evil reserved for the future. Finally, we heard faint sounds ahead. They came from the plinking of the Greek mandolins, called "bouzoukis."

As we turned a corner, we looked up a narrow street along which were the tavernas from which came the sounds of the bouzoukis. We wandered about, enchanted, until we came to a large taverna which looked especially inviting.

An orchestra was playing, and on the dance floor were three Greek men, arms around each other's shoulders, dancing to the sound of the music that comes alive only in Greece. We quietly sat down at a table near the orchestra and ordered two beers. We were nonplussed when the waiter delivered two quart bottles. But we were not deterred, be-

cause there are two things I cannot abide: One is an empty bottle and the other is a full one. So Esther and I attacked our beers with fierce determination. Feeling fortified and adventurous, I asked the orchestra leader in sign language for music that we could dance to.

Enthusiastically he ordered up a rollicking polka. In those days, Esther and I could dance about everything, and we cavorted about the floor like Rocky Mountain goats bouncing down hill. Across the hall, a half dozen Greeks cheered us on. We sat down to much applause, and in a moment the waiter delivered two more quarts of beer. We protested that we hadn't ordered any more. But he merely shrugged and pointed to the group of Greeks who were still applauding. With that kind of support we next danced a swing,

followed by two more beers, a cha cha with two more beers, and a lively Viennese waltz with the last two.

We soon realized it was time to get back to our hotel before the flood gates opened; we just could not face another Greek rest room. So we marched across the dance floor to thank our new friends before leaving. They greeted us boisterously, thrusting into our hands tankards of the Greek cordial called ouzo. It is colorless, it is flavored with aniseed, it tastes like creosote and, in quantity, it is as potent as boilermakers. We were reluctant to add to what we already had in our systems, but when our new friends lifted their own tankards and shouted "Good lock," it was bottoms up, while the whole world got rosier and rosier. They spoke no English, we no Greek. But that never stopped Esther who openly admired their white teeth, their black hair, their sparkling eyes, and in particular some iridescent worry beads that one of the group was playing with. He promptly gave them to her with a deep bow and a devastating smile.

At last we left, to a flood of Greek good-byes, and weaved our way down the steep road into almost total darkness. We had no idea how to get back to our hotel. Happily, we soon heard voices approaching us and we called out "Olympic Palace Hotel?" Two cheerful Greeks came up to us, nodded, and motioned us to go with them. On the way, the indefatigable Esther related in sign language our wonderful adventure in the taverna. She displayed her new worry beads, indicating how much she appreciated the lovely gesture of the donor. We walked and

A Simplified Explanation Of A Revocable Living Trust

A Trust is a legal arrangement in which you, the Trustor, place your property in trust for the benefit of yourself and your heirs, who are called beneficiaries. You name yourself as the initial Trustee, so that you will manage the assets just as you do now. You will name a successor Trustee to manage and distribute the assets after your death.

Your Living Trust must be tailored to your needs and wishes. Do not accept a form Living Trust. A Living Trust operates during your lifetime and is in force from the moment that your trust agreement is signed and the Trust is funded.

To be valid in California, your Trust must:

1. contain a specified purpose (such as care of the surviving Trustor, education of the grandchildren or support of a disabled child).
2. contain specifically identified property.
3. indicate one or more verifiable beneficiaries.
4. provide for a Trustee to manage the assets.
5. provide for a termination date.

Title on all of your property must be changed to your name as Trustee of your Trust in order to avoid probate. Pour-over Wills will be used to place any assets into the Trust which were not placed into the Trust during your lifetime.

A Conservatorship is part of a Living Trust and your Successor Trustee will begin taking care of your finances when you are no longer able to do so.

For a married couple, a Living Trust will save nearly \$300,000 in estate taxes and probate costs if your estate is \$1,200,000. If you are single you cannot save estate taxes, but

you can save probate costs which are a statutory minimum of \$11,150 to the attorney and another \$11,150 to an Executor or Administrator on a \$500,000 estate. Probate is expensive, often unnecessary and can delay distribution to your heirs for a year or more.

Remember there are no estate taxes or probate costs on community property when the first spouse dies. However, if you enter into a Living Trust after one spouse dies, you no longer can save on estate taxes.

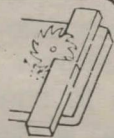
The Solo Club met on February 19 and approved a donation of \$50 to the Senior Center.

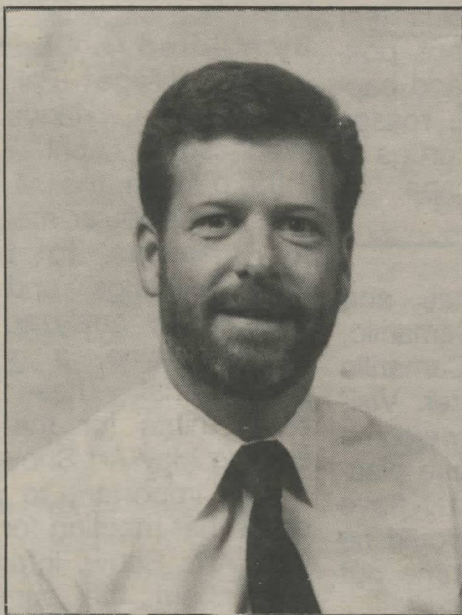
The assignment was "Trees and Flowers" and the response was over-

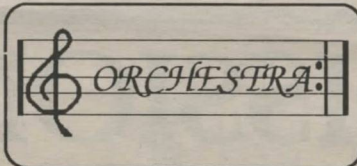

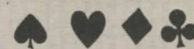
The Self Awareness Group meets on Monday evenings in the Lanai from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

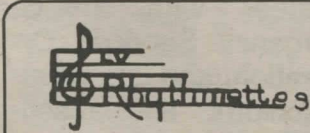

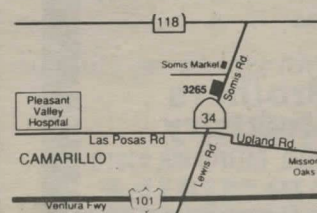
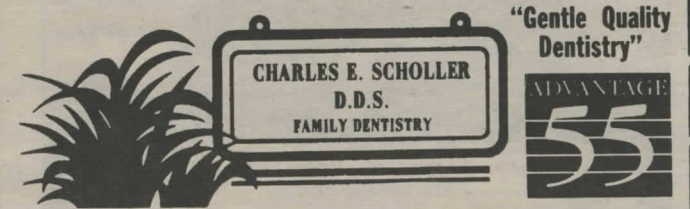

Leisure Village Travel Club

Planning and working for your enjoyment

Village trips don't just happen. By the time a trip is displayed on the bulletin boards or on Channel 12, a good amount of legwork, phone work and paperwork has been done by a dedicated, hard-working group of volunteers on the LV Travel Committee. Time is then spent in the office taking reservations, and each person is responsible for the trip he or she is escorting from planning until completion.

Every trip is planned to give you the best buy for your dollars and to ensure a smooth and easy, fun-filled adventure. The committee is a non-profit group, so all trips are priced as close as possible to actual cost, including portage and gratuities, entry fees and tickets. Meals are sometimes included or "on your own", all clearly defined in descriptions.

The LV Travel Committee has been in existence since the early beginnings of Leisure Village. Presently, a group of 14 volunteers make up this committee. Bob Chass is the chairman. He is responsible for approving, scheduling and pricing trips, balancing costs and expenses, and a myriad of details involved in keeping the committee running smoothly and in the black.

His stack of record-keeping papers runs several feet high, but Bob is on top of everything so that each trip runs according to plan. Ruth Resnik is Bob's assistant, in charge of office procedures, and training new members of the committee. Sara Kass is the efficient bookkeeper, posting, balancing, writing checks, etc., with Bella Amber her capable assistant, filling in when

Sara is not available.

Other members of the committee are Bill Berger, Sy Blau, Bernice Epstein, Sylvia Goldstein, Garnette Holmes, Muriel Hurwitz, Jeane Kane, Charles Kent, Bess Mast and Esther Rudnick.

In addition, the LV Board of Directors has given Bob Chass the responsibility of approving all buses coming into the Village, including charters by clubs and charitable organizations. Bob will ensure that all bus companies involved have the required amount of insurance and will coordinate bus arrivals and departures to avoid congestion, confusion and chaos at the Recreation Center.

The Village's support is needed so that trips can go as planned. When it is necessary to cancel a trip, many people are disappointed. Trips are priced for full bus loads and if an insufficient number of people sign by the cancellation date, the trip will not be able to go. Cancellation dates are set by the bus company, hotel or restaurant, or all of them. If a person cancels before the posted cancellation date, a refund will be made, less two dollars per seat, except when theater seats are involved. Refunds for cancellations after the cancel date, or theater trips, will be made only if the seat or seats are resold. The resale of canceled seats is made from a list of stand-bys. If it is necessary for the Travel Committee to cancel a trip, full refunds are given.

The Travel Committee plans a gambling trip once a month, either to Las Vegas or Laughlin. These trips are well received and booked quickly. Yearly repeat trips include the Rose Parade Floats, Santa Anita, Laguna Arts Festival, Los Angeles Dodgers, and the Hollywood Bowl.

The escorts try to find many new and varied

ideas, to museums, dinner theaters, plays, musicals, etc. Plans now include a longer trip almost each month....to National Parks, special events, and places of interest all over the country.

On overnight trips, each person is limited to one piece of luggage, plus a carry on bag. There is a seat rotation plan so that no one must ride in the rear of the bus for the entire trip. The back seat of the bus is never sold unless someone insists, and he or she must occupy that seat for the entire trip.

Proposed long trips for 1993 include Washington, D.C. in April; Arizona in April; Santa Fe, New Mexico in May; Kingsburg and Sequoia in May; Portland Rose Festival in June; Yellowstone in August, and New England/Nova Scotia Fall Foliage in October. For longer, more expensive trips, arrangements are usually made for payments to be made in instalments.

The committee welcomes your suggestions, so feel free to call the office or drop by when it is open, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings from 9:00 to 11:45 a.m. A new listing of trips is posted on Fridays, so watch your bulletin boards and Channel 12, as some trips sell out quickly. When a trip is sold out, you may put your name on the stand-

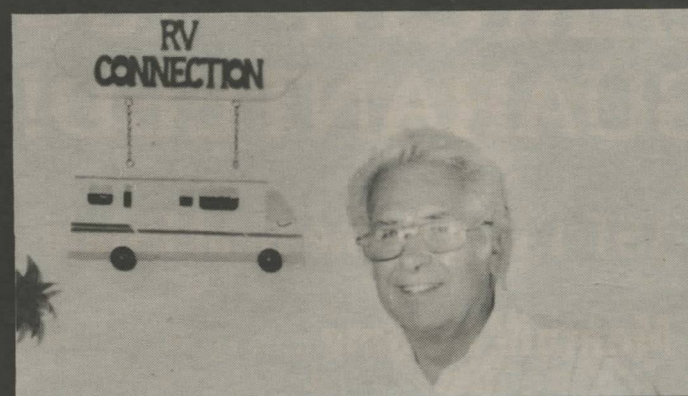


by list for possible cancellations.
