A Decisive Vote

The proposed amendments to the CC&R's affecting principally the insurance deductible were resoundingly defeated in the recent referendum ballot.

The vote was 410 FOR and 1,148 AGAINST. In precentage terms, only 26% of the units voting favored the changes urged by the Board of Directors.

It is significant that, given the requirement for a 75% favorable vote mandated by the CC&R's, even if every valid vote (1,558) were cast in favor of the proposition, that still would not have been enough, since 1,602 (75% of 2136) is the required number.

What does this vote mean? It means that the residents here have overwhelmingly rejected the Board's philosophy; namely, that payment of the fire insurance deductible is not to be shared by all homeowners -- as was the practice in Leisure Village before 1985.

It means that the Villagers would rather be selfinsured for \$1,000 at a cost of around \$2.00 a year, payable into the Insurance Reserve Account, as explained previously in several articles published in ILV.

Finally, it means that the Board must do some serious thinking toward restoring its credibility. It would not be amiss for this Board to cooperate with the former Association presidents whose challenge to the Board's direction was sustained by the referen-

December is renewal time for the LVA flood insurance policy. It is high time, therefore, to ask these questions:

What coverage do we get for our premium dollars?

What is the cost?

Is flood insurance really needed?

As described in the Insurance Information summary distributed in December 1985: Each residential unit is insured to a maximum of \$10,000 per unit except four-unit structures, which are insured to a maximum of \$35,000 or \$8750 per

Flood insurance is subject to a deductible of \$500 per single unit and \$1000 per structure on all multiple units (2 units \$500 each, 3 units \$333 each, 4 units \$250 each). The Recreation Center and Administration buildings are covered to \$100,000.

This year the premium cost has aggregated over \$100,000, or \$49 per unit. The Association has been told to expect an increase of at least \$23,500, or \$11 per unit, thus driving the cost of flood insurance to an annual rate of \$60 per unit.

We may well ask, do we really need this coverage? Consider these facts: All units are on pads that are above the 100-year flood level. The bridges on Highway 101 are being raised and widened. The berms along the Conejo Creek have been raised.

Furthermore, CC&Rs state that the Board may purchase flood insurance, provided such purchase is "prudent" (meaning the exercise of sound judgement in practical matters).

In my opinion, it is not prudent to renew the flood insurance. May I urge you to let the Board

know how you feel? Ed R. Salzer (V. 30)




The beautiful sparkling turquoise 1956 hard top convertible T-Bird of Bill Brunken was one that received many favorable comments both during the parade and at inspection





PROFILE: Village 17's Joe & Sylvia Selden

"We visited here almost every weekend during the first five years we owned our V. 17 home," says a smiling Sylvia Selden, "I just couldn't keep him away from the woodshop."

Who is this man whose talents and unselfish efforts to help others have earned him acclaim for "jobs well done" many times during the past ten years? Our spotlight is on Joe Selden, a Woodworking Club member par excellence.

Joe came to California at an early age and tragedy struck soon after, with the loss of his mother while he was still a youngster. In his teens he worked in a sign shop in order to afford fare to travel to L.A. Polytechnic H.S. and after graduating secured employment as a

Sylvia has also been a resident of California since early childhood. Her dad was involved in sales and until high school days she claimed many towns throughout the state as home. The family became permenantly located when her dad opened, in Signal Hill, what was probably America's first supermarket.

Joe first spotted Sylvia on the school athletic

"She was a super field hockey player -- and pretty too," says Joe. "I managed to get invited to her 'Sweet 16 Birthday Party' and that was the beginning of our life story."

Joe found it easy to express himself through the medium of pencil and sketch pad and took evening courses in interior decorating at the Otis Art Institute. On the basis of his sketches, a large company, Crown Upholstering, hired him and he was on his way learning the business from the ground

Soon he was foreman of the upholstery department but further advancement was halted with the advent of World War II. Having a family of two boys, Joe joined the engineering department of the California Ship Building Corp. as a senior draftsman and checker. His war-time activities were at both Long Beach and Terminal Island and soon after the close of hostilities he returned to his previous employer.

Now Joe's talents really came through at this 75,000 sq. ft. plant that had some 200 employees. He designed furniture, both functional modern and modern contemporary, and advanced to the position of designer and plant superintendent.

CURRENT ISSUES FORUM

The topic of the Sept. 29th Current Issues Forum was "KNOW YOUR COMMUNITY". The panel consisted of City Council member Bill Esty, Emcee; Sandi Bush, Mayor of Camarillo, and the following city staff officials: Larry Davis, Asst. City Mgr; Tody Boden, Planning Dir.; John Bressor, Dir. of Community Svcs.; Dan Greely, City Engi-

Bill Esty made a primary easy-to-read chart illustrating the ladder of Council City members starting at the top with the citizens of Camarillo. He then introduced Ms. Sandi Bush, who spoke on what she called "Projects on Tap". She mainly concentrated on road construction, alleviating areas of congestion such as adding extra lanes, street signals, parking for "Park and Ride"

people, etc. In some cases, due to construction, some inconvenience may be encountered, but "Please bear with us", she said.

Next on the agenda was Larry Davis, who said there are at least 45,000 residents in the city of Camarillo. His department deals primarily with policies of day-to-day operation of the city. Davis said the city budget is around \$18 million, expenditures about \$9 million. Income is from sales and property tax, building permits and

Next, Esty introduced Tony Boden who is mainly concerned with land-use elements such as layout of shopping malls, industrial areas, allotting land for different economic income families, seismic faults (if any), recreation for schools and public use, parks and in general:

community design, architecure, beautification, zoning ordinance, standards, etc.

Community services, a relatively new department (3 years old), was described by John Bressor. This department works closely with Engineering. Bressor said that there are 170 miles of streets in Camarillo. Community Services is concerned with refuse collection, landscaping maintenance, sweeping of streets, public transportation, Great American Stagecoach (which makes connections between Ventura, Oxnard, Camarillo and several other points on it's way to LAX), and the newly adopted program of spring clean-up every year.

Dan Greely, City Engineer, said that the citizens of Camarillo ask for various things. Then it is up to Engineering to translate these things into reality within reason. Engineering consists of several divisions within itself. Dan said there is an overlap, and understandably so, of the different departments.

One of these overlaps is being a watchdog to outside contractors. Another is the Capital Development Division with an outlay of \$8 million. In addition, there is the Public Service Department: clerks, maps, developers, to name a few. He also stated that the population of Camarillo has doubled over the last 10 years.

Ms. Gina Manchester represented Camrosa Water District. She said that this district is governed by five elected officials who serve as board members. These board members work closely with the above mentioned departments.

A number of questions were asked by the audience, which were ably answered by the panel.



Aging does not have to bring illness

By Sol Robin

The notion that disability and senility are the inevitable companions of our later years is not only false; it is medically dangerous. Negative images of aging are self-fulfilling prophesies that can crop up to harm us all.

The facts are that only 5% of the elderly are institutionalized at any one time; not all become severely demented, and the average admission age is 80. Therefore, 95% of those over 65 are living and functioning in the community, not vegetating in nursing homes. Yet it seems impossible to correct this popular misconception about our older citizens.

By the year 2000, one in eight Americans will be 65 or older. Today there are 25 million in this socalled seniors group. During the next 50 years that number will be more than

double and reach 55 million, about one quarter of the population. The adage "Life Begins at 40" should read, "Life Begins at 55". We may be calling 70 middle age when more people start reaching the natural limit for human beings - 110 years.

Some gerontologists maintain a cultural myth has been created in America that people in their 70's, 80's and 90's are all automatically old and sick. If we believe this nonsense, we will only hasten our own aging. Older people need to develop a measure of average health expectancy as opposed to life expectancy, a measure of one's bioyears.



Subject: GYMNASIUM

A proposal recently submitted for your consideration asked that you authorize formation of a club which would be solely responsible for purchase, maintenance and control of a mechanical exercise facility.

The club would also provide training and managed use of the equipment. A staff exists for execution of these functions, and will be assisted by lectures from Nautilus. YMCA, and by college students, doctors and medical supply establishments in the Camarillo area.

A large staff of monitors is also available to assist users and to oversee operation of the facility. The facility will be locked when there are less than two of these monitors

present. Monitors will be trained to take appropriate action in the unlikely event of rule infraction or medical emergency. The facility will therefore be governed at least as stringently as any commercial spa in the vicinity. Close coordination with the Security Department is planned to achieve optimum system of communication when needed.

Housing for this project ideally should be in the area of the swimming pool, where showers and the spa would provide a source of liquid heat to supplement exercises to stretch muscles. However, a contingency design suggests use of a space in the unused end of the shuffleboard court structure. This would entail a temporary structure to house the equipment and to protect it from weather; and from unauthorized use or theft. A temporary floor would



No money will be collected unless earmarked for specific use toward purchase or maintenance of equipment or supplies. It is estimated that four years would elapse before the full equipment goals are attained. Assessment of progress during any part of that time could easily be made.
