

On January 26, 1971, Professor Carlos Lozano was the keynote speaker at Porterville High School's "Brotherhood Week" program. In addition to talking about Cal State Bakersfield, he addressed himself to the role of education for both the Anglo and the Minority student. Professor Lozano received a most heartwarming ovation from the some 1644 students after his talk, which covered such topics as justice, morality, communication, drug abuse, and the role of the younger generation in the fashioning of a new world. Following his talk, he met with small groups of individuals from the high school.

Mr. Armand Vorce' and Mr. Jack Behrens presented a lecture on music appreciation to a group of 22 elementary school children. The lecture was viewed Saturday, February 5, 1971, on channel 23, Bakersfield, on Miss Beverly Ross' classroom.
