Village Microwave TV **Antenna Goes Up**

After many months of waiting, including considerable negotiations and acquisition of necessary permits, the installation of the receiving tower for the LV Microwave television system was achieved during January.

This 40-foot tower is installed across the walk from the Channel 12 Studios at the Recreation Center. The dish antenna atop this tower will receive its signal from a transmitting tower located approximately five miles away, near Moorpark.

This equipment is part of the system being furnished to LV by the Camrosa Water District, to replace the existing TV system which includes the 300-foot tower located near the 101 Freeway.

Camrosa must install another water storage tank on the site which is presently occupied by the Village tower.

is expected to provide improved TV reception in the Village. Before we relinguish control of the existing system, Camrosa will have to complete installation of their transmitting equipment and demonstrate satisfactory performance for a 30-day period. Stay tuned.



Urho Saari, a swimming and water polo coaching legend in his time, died recently, a victim of Alzheimer's disease.

His records as a coach may well stand for decades. He took tiny El Segundo H.S. teams in swimming and water polo to eighteen championships in 27 years. Urho was coach of the U.S. Water Polo Team for the 1951 Pam Am Games in Buenos Aires, the 1952 Olympic Games in Helsinki, and the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo.

A sports-loving couple, Urho and Wanda moved to Leisure Village in 1977. They could often be seen on the tennis courts, the golf course and were a popular couple on the dance floor. Urho is survived by his wife, two sons, one daughter and five grandchildren.

Permits Via **Architectural** Committee

The LV Architectural Committee, through the permit process, charged with the responsibility of maintaining the appearance and safety of our housing units. We try to balance that ideal with the individual needs and desires of homeowners.

Through the years, the committee has approved specification sheets and drawings which cover almost every possible addition or modification that homeowners might require. Copies of these are contained in a binder in the library. They would be very helpful to anyone planning exterior changes to their home.

Permit applications for changes covered by these "spec sheets" are rou-tinely processed in two or three days; even sooner if there is an urgent need for time saving.

Modifications which do not fall into the above category of routine, require a vote by the members, using a secret ballot.

We meet once a month on the third Wednesday. Please remember that if you file a permit application the day after our meeting, and it is something that requires a vote, you will have about a month to wait for your permit. Plan ahead and even consider appearing at the meeting to present your case.

Finally, if you receive a permit and then change your mind about the need for the project, please call a committee member or the office to advise us. Much time and effort is wasted checking homes where progress is non-existent due to a change in plans.




Kay was then presented with a delicate gold bracelet in appreciation of her term as President.

PROFILE: Kern Pederson...Cartoonist/Author



One may well say "He was born to draw," because at the early age of 16 he enrolled in a cartoon correspondence course -- and that was way back in 1926.

Let's meet Village 17's Kern Pederson, whose syndicated works have been distributed through the medium of newspapers, magazines and books for more than half a century.

During high school days he used his drawing skills in many, many projects, worked several years after H.S. graduation and then attended and graduated from St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN.

From 1936 until World War II he taught school and then, as a Navy man in Washington, D.C., did cartoon features for some 900 Navy ships and land bases. Returning to civilian life at the war's end. he became art director

and production manager for a national magazine with a monthly circulation of 1 million copies.

His cartoon strip, "Little Farmer,"featured in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, was syndicated nationwide and continued in circulation for almost 40 vears.

Teaching was also a great love of Kern's and in 1960 he went back to that profession, with classes in

art, history and social studies.

In 1970 he did a weekly Sunday feature, in full color, for the St. Paul Pioneer Press, called "Makers of Minnesota" and later did a 39-week series titled "Builders of Wisconsin," in full color, for the Milwaukee Jour-







crisis! Some people say "That's what we hear and read every year." The fact is, though, that 1986 was the last "normal" snowand-rain year in California.

Water Conservation

After five years of drought, the crisis is real; and water providers must take drastic steps to conserve. If users don't conserve, suppliers will have no choice but to reduce the supply.

About 70 percent of our water use in Leisure Village occurs outside the home, and this is obviously where we can make major reductions. As homeowners in our cooperative water-use community, our individual household water usage is not monitored. It is up to us, then, to do our own monitoring and conserving. Here are some suggestions developed by the Buildings and Grounds Committee:

1. Reduce both the California has a water number and length of showers. A 6-minute shower may use 36 gallons of water.

2. If you use the shower to wash your hair, try the kitchen sink instead. Wet your hair, turn off the water, lather your hair with shampoo, wait about five minutes, then rinse at the sink. Total water use is probably less than 2 gal-

3. For outdoor plants, use a watering can rather than the garden hose to water the base of each plant.

4. When you do shower, try using a pan to catch water used while you are waiting for warm water. Use the saved water for other purposes. You can get one "free" toilet flush or feed your

5. Before brushing your teeth, wet your brush and fill a glass for rinsing your mouth and cleaning your

6. Use your dishwasher and clothes washer only

for full loads. 7. Check for leaks in faucets and toilets.

8. If you wash your car, use a bucket and sponge. Then hose rinse quickly before using a chamois.

9. DO NOT USE YOUR GARDEN HOSE TO WASH LEAVES FROM GRASS OR DUST FROM DRIVEWAYS! A rake and a broom will do the job.

Practice conservation. Then the crisis may be comfortably faced.


