poet for the time spent on it. Of his two great poems, "The Deserted Village" has remained the favorite with the general public. Its descriptions are not only superior to those in "The Traveller," but their simplicity and tenderness are hardly equaled elsewhere in the language.

To touch on his power as a dramatist,—it has been said that "if one swallow could make a summer, "She Stoops to Conquer" would make the 18th century a period of genuine dramatic vitality, for it is one of the great comedies of the world." Its high moral tone, succession of lively incidents, good-humored satire, and pleasant flow of natural dialogue, render it one of the most popular plays of the English stage.

Goldsmith has given us specimens in nearly every kind of composition. and Johnson has said of him; "whatever he touched, he adored." His style is always simple, easy, graceful; he happily mingles with a sweetness and tenderness, such unforced humor, that we see in his writings but a reflection of the man himself; and while we admire him as an author, he becomes endeared to us as a man.

Goldsmith's career was cut short at the early age of forty-six. He was deeply mourned by a large circle who cherished the deepest affection for him through lije. I know of nothing that has been said of him better and truer than these words of Thackeray:

"Think of him reckless, vain, if you like—but merciful, gentle, generous, full of love and pity. His humor delighting us still; his song fresh and beautiful as when first he charmed with it; his words in all our mouths; his very weakness beloved and familiar; his benevolent spirit seems to smile on us; to do gentle kindnesses; to succor with sweet charity; to sooth, caress, and forgive; to plead with the unfortunate for the unhappy and the true.
